this year the matching funds from the state and federal governments would be lost permanently. These moneys pay for over half the cost of the program that is administered by the USDA.

Two groups of citizens, one in the South county and one in the North county are assessing themselves close to \$30,000 to keep the protection the ADC program provides.

Public Health News

Did you know all women are at risk of breast & cervical cancer, that mammograms and Pap tests save lives, and that you can take charge of your health and your life?

The problem in Oregon is that at least 17% of women age 50 and older have never had a mammogram, and about 17% of women age 18 and older have not had a Pap test in the past 3 years. An estimated 2,100 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer, in Oregon, and an estimated 170 women will be diagnosed with cervical in 1994.

From 1989 through 1992, 23 Curry County women died of breast cancer, 6 Curry County women died of cervical and uterine cancer in that time.

Regular screening increases the chances of early detection and saves lives. Call your family physician, nurse practitioner or your local Public Health Department for an appointment.

Medicaid, Medicare and all private insurance plans pay for mammograms and Pap smears. Check with your provider for your individual coverage as benefits will vary. Public Health provides services on a sliding scale to uninsured women. Mammograms are available at Curry General Hospital through their traveling mammography unit which provides services from Coquille to Brookings. A doctor's order is not required.

Recycle Your Old Eye-Glasses Mary Lou Wilcox

Recycle your old eye-glasses through The Flying Doctors. Help someone see through lenses that no longer work for you!

Bring your old eye-glasses to Gayle at Sea Breeze Florist or the Port Orford Library. I will collect them and take them to my chapter of The Flying Doctors. From there they go to Soledad Prison where they are repaired and the prescriptions are read. The Flying Doctors distributes them under the supervision of an optometrist to remote areas of North-west Mexico where little or no medical services are available.

The Flying Doctors, Los Medicos Voladores, is a non-profit organization started in 1947 by two medical parishioners and an engineer/pilot. Since that time it has grown to 600 members in several chapters in Northern California. Each month except July and August monthly trips are made by plane loads of volunteers, flying to rural villages to provide health care, education and other assistance. Members who make these four or five day trips pay for their own expenses including cost of the small plane's flying expense. This ensures that all monetary donations are used to directly benefit Mexican families.

The Flying Doctors also accepts donations of medical equipment such as crutches, folding wheel chairs and walkers and medical supplies. Dental care is one of the primary services supplied by The Flying Doctors. Tooth-brushes and tooth-paste are always needed to give to the children to encourage good brushing habits.

Members of The Flying Doctors come from many professions and walks of life. The monthly medical teams always have a physician or dentist, an interpreter, pilot and assistants as nurses, hygienists, pharmacists and other volunteers who act in a variety of capacities. Even chasing cows and other livestock off the small dirt runways is an important task!

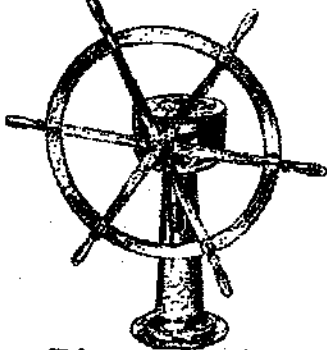
I joined Los Medicos Voladores in October, 1992. I have made one trip to Mexico where I worked as a dental assistant for the weekend. It is a great experience to see someone relieved of a toothache. I remember the happy smile of a pretty young woman when she looked into the mirror after her broken front tooth was restored!

To prevent the expensive duplication of each library purchasing and stocking basically the same books, the Curry County Libraries have each chosen one or two topic areas in which they will specialize. chases to two or three really good cookbooks. Cookbooks will be a major purchase item for the Curry Public Library.

A computerized card catalog covering all of the books in all of the counties libraries has been set up. I am not computer literate, so Bonnie demonstrated the process for me at the Port Orford Library. I am interested in American Indians. I was taken to the public access computer. I pushed "PLUS" twice. I then pushed "ENTER" twice and typed in, North American Indians. The screen informed me that there were 174 titles on the topic of North American Indians in the Curry County Libraries and presented me with subheadings and an alphabetical list of titles and where they were to be found. If I chose a title located anywhere in the county, I would ask the Librarian to check its availability for me. If it was available, I could pick it up at the Port Orford Library within the week.

People from all over the county work in Gold Beach. From among these people the libraries have developed a truly remarkable courier system at no expense to the public. If my American Indian book were at Chetco Public Library, someone who lives in Brookings and works in Gold Beach would pick it up on their way to work and drop it off at the Curry Public Library. Someone who works in Gold Beach and lives in Port Orford or Langlois would pick it up at Curry Public Library and drop it off in the Port Orford Book Return Box, on their way home.

Now think of the creativity and coordination involved in this truly cooperative effort. Think of the money it saves you. Think of the expanded number of titles that the Curry County Libraries are able to offer you through reduction of duplication of Titles. Think of it! And the next time you visit your Public Library give your Librarian a hug, or lacking that a great big smile.

Bussmann A No Show by Evan Kramer

Last Wednesday morning, September 21, a meeting was convened at Port Orford City Hall by the Oregon Department of Forestry and parties interested in speaking with Ernie Bussmann regarding repairs to the city's primary water supply.

Attending the meeting were Clark Seeley, District Forester - Oregon Department of Forestry, Ron Fox, Mike Schulz, Tuck Koreva from State Forestry, Dan Crumley - Curry County Roadmaster, Laren Wooley - Curry County Planning Department, Dotti Myers - Port Orford City Manager, Martha Weaver Britell - Port Orford City Council, Ellen Waring, Evan Kramer - Hubbard Creek/Garrison Lake watershed council and Matt Grey - Engineering firm of H.G.E. Another invited participant who did not show up for the meeting, and the whole reason for the meeting, was Ernie Bussmann, the owner along with Peter Bussmann of two 40 acre parcels of land on the North Fork of Hubbard Creek.

Actions related to logging, including road building, on the Bussmann property last Fall resulted in the City Of Port Orford

losing its ability to take water from its Hubbard Creek reservoir for over six months. The turbidity level increased to the point where it was unusable for drinking water.

Mr. Seeley began the meeting while we patiently waited for Mr. Bussmann by stating the purpose of this gathering. He said it was to bring the interested parties together and find out the long range plans of the Bussmann property from Mr. Bussmann himself. By 11:15am when I left Bussmann was a no show. I asked Ron Fox from the Forestry Department if he was sure Bussmann knew about the meeting and the time it was to be held. He said he had spoken to him and Bussmann was aware of the time. The Wednesday meeting had been rescheduled from Monday, September 12, for Mr. Bussmann's convenience.

Matt Grey stated that the corrective work on the Bussmann property was 80 - 90% complete. He said the final stabilization of the slide is not complete nor is the final engineering report. Clark Seeley advised the City to stay in direct formal contact with Bussmann through his attorney Michael Wells.

There are two important dates regarding corrective action on the Bussmann property and no one has been able to resolve them. The City's injunction states that as of September 15 the property owners (Bussmanns) were to have completed "remedial work specified by the Department of Forestry's repair orders". The Department of Forestry's repair orders state the work must be completed on or before October 1. At the last city council meeting it was suggested to the council that if the work wasn't complete by September 15 the city and its attorney (Frank Hilton) appear at the circuit court in Gold Beach the next day (September 16) and get a contempt of court citation issued.

I advise residents of Port Orford to contact their council persons including Martha Weaver-Britell, Gary Doran, Carl Eskelson, George Kennedy, Todd Smith and Tim Sparks; mayor Delaine Kennedy and city manager Dotti Myers and express their opinions on this situation. The city, its residents and water supply are being held hostage and we as a group have been very patient and understanding.

Langlois 2CJ School District

A state mediator has been requested to meet with the Port Orford-Langlois School District (district) and the Port Orford-Langlois Teachers Association (union) in an effort to settle contract negotiations as quickly as possible.

In the meantime, teachers are working under the guidelines set out in the current contract between the union and the district. The contract area being negotiated is only the salary schedule for the 1994-95 school year. The remainder of the contract is in force until June 30, 1995. The district's 94-95 year offer is a Cost of Living increase of 2.9%. The union has proposed a 5.5% raise on the base salary with special additional increments for identified teachers and an additional 6% raise if the PERS initiative (Measure 8) passes.

Oregon law provides for the mediation process as a positive approach to resolving disagreements.

Letter To The Editor,

After reading Walt Kaplan's letter in the September 22, Fun Zone give away paper [Ed. note: Port Orford Today], I want to express my opinion.

I think Walt was involved with Hospital Administration and I don't blame him for feeling unsafe about credit cards. As any bill I receive from the hospital (which is normally over billed, over priced and many times charged for service and goods not used or received). I had my own business in Southern California with up to 150 employees, and all employees who traveled and met with others for business had to use credit cards. As our accountant said, "It kept an accurate and easy record for audit purpose and for the IRS." It's funny 99% of businesses use them and I am sure the hospital you worked for had them. And Mr. Kaplan, our designated card holders do not always have \$300 to \$500 to take with them when we send them to school as required by job description and state rules.

I believe we have honest employees and I was one of the City Council members who voted unanimously for the card.
