Slip, Sliding Away by Evan Kramer

I spoke with a couple of Oregon Department of Transportation workers out of Pistol River on Tuesday afternoon about the slide on Highway 101 south of Pistol River at Hooskanaden Creek. The slide, which started on Thursday, January 12, closed Highway 101 to traffic and it will remain closed with no reopening date set. The slide is 3 times the size of the Arizona Beach slide which occurred in April, 1993.

Some statistics I was given connected to this latest serpentine earth movement are that the slide covers 1,200 feet of the highway and is 1 mile wide. The road has dropped 25' vertically and 62' horizontally and is moving 2 - 4 feet a day. O.D.O.T. and private contractors have already brought in 34,000 yards of shale and rock and are bringing in 9,000 yards a day. 60 people are working at the slide site.

An alternate route is available from Gold Beach to Brookings. Cars, small trucks and motorcycle traffic is being allowed through the 21 miles of Carpenterville Road which begins just south of Pistol River and puts you back on Highway 101 in Brookings at the South Coast Lumber Mill. Be aware that no vehicles over 30' long are allowed on Carpenterville Road. Oregon State Police and weigh masters are monitoring the road for violators,

several of whom have been caught and ticketed. A fine of up to \$2,000 may be levied for breaking the road closure.

I looked up Hooskanaden Creek in the book *Oregon Geographic Names*. The book says the name came from the Wish-to-na-tan Indian tribe who lived at the creek. According to the book the original settlers had trouble with the name and ended up calling the creek Hooskanaden.

Port Orford Switches Water Supplies

The City of Port Orford announced on Thursday night, January 12, that it was switching back to Garrison Lake water. Public works engineer Dennis Gehrke made the disclosure at the city council sewer rate increase hearing. This change began on Friday, January 13. Dennis it was necessary because of increased and wildly fluctuating turbidity levels in the water entering the city reservoir on the north fork of Hubbard Creek. He also noted that water usage has been low recently.

Other Weather Related Items

This past weekend's Whale of a Wine Festival in Gold Beach saw attendance slip considerably from the 1994 level. 1994's attendance on Saturday was 800 with Sunday attendance 500. This year Saturday attendance was 540 while Sunday saw 235 walk through the turnstiles. Despite the closure of Highway 101 south of Pistol River, 92 people from Brookings

and 30 from Crescent City attended the festival.

I have a rain gauge in my yard and started measuring on Sunday afternoon, January 8. By Monday night, January 16, I had recorded 14 1/4 inches of rain in my yard. The small creek which runs along the property line in the back yard was the highest I've seen it in 5 years. It beat last year's high (I don't have a gauge for this measurement. I put sticks in the ground marking the high water.).

Highway 101 is sliding in other places too including just north of the Sixes River at the bend in the road as you come up to the fire station; south of Reedsport one of the southbound lane is closed and has dropped considerably, and on one of the cliff-edge curves south of Prehistoric Gardens between Port Orford and Gold Beach. Highway 42S between Bandon and Coquille is open again as the Coquille River has receded after being well above flood level.

I spoke with Jerry Russum at the Elk River Fish Hatchery about their rainfall totals. So far this year through January 17 the Hatchery had recorded 23.06 inches of rain. The highest single day total was on January 14 when 4.04 inches of rain fell. Jerry told me the river crested at 12 feet on the 14th which is close to flood level. The Sixes River did reach flood level on Monday, January 9, when the

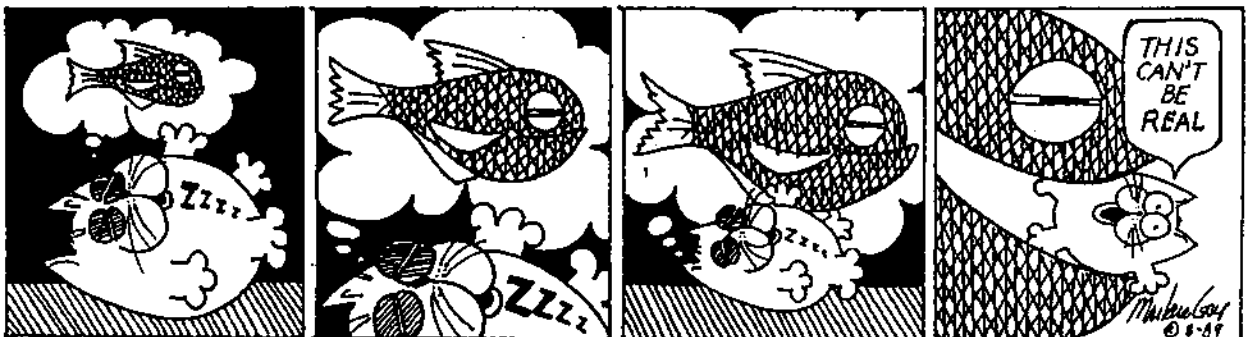

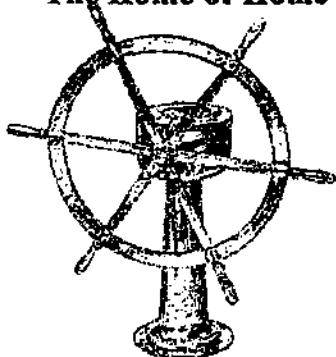

The Port Orford Arts Council presented the folk music duo Alice and Albert at the Community building last Saturday night. The couple, who now make their home in Brookings, took the stage a little after 7:30 and proceeded to deliver over two hours of song and between-song patter.

60 or so people who braved the wet and cold weather and seemed to enjoy the music, not to mention the cheesecake, baklava and espresso.

They started with an original composition called "There's A River". They write most of their own songs but did sing a couple of songs written by other artists including "Greed" by Steve Fisher and "The Circle Game" by Joni Mitchell.

Alice played the bass and wrote and sang an autobiographical song called "I Can't Read Between Your Lies" and "What's Wrong With This Picture" dealing with her failed marriage of 19 years.

New Fax Machine

The Downtown Fun Zone now offers Plain Paper Laser FAX reception. In the past, if you had a fax sent to us, it was printed on thermal paper which has a slick feel, fades, and curls worse than my mom's hair does in the rain. While this was a LOT better than nothing, the prices on plain paper machines have finally dropped to the point where we could afford to offer a better printout.

Many of the less expensive fax machines use an ink jet printer. The printout looks great but the ink can smear if it gets wet. We opted to get a laser fax which will not smear when wet. 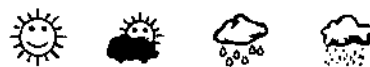

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Jury Says, "Murder!"

A Curry County jury returned a decision within 90 minutes of deliberation on Friday, January 13, in the murder trial of Richard Harris. Harris was on trial for the murder of David Nolen of Port Orford on July 13, 1994. Nolen was shot in the head and died at the scene at a house on Jackson Street. The jury convicted Harris of murder in the trial which lasted three days.

Sentencing will be in the hands of circuit court judge Hugh Downer. He will issue the sentence on Friday, February 17, 1995, at 9:30am at the courthouse in Gold Beach.

Recently in the Oregonian a reviewer of the latest filmed version of Louisa May Alcott's *Little Women* said that the movie is better than the book - a notion which might be thought of as heresy by many people. It does seem that most readers consider it a fact, "the book is always better than the movie!"

But maybe there is a semi-official list somewhere: Movies that are better than the book on which they are based. For instance, James Jones' *From Here to Eternity* was a good book - but the movie based on it was very, very good. And John Haase's novel *Me & The Arch Kook*

Petulia doesn't compare (though it is a cute story) to the bittersweet 60's film, "*Petulia*", which Richard Lester developed from the book. Nor does Davis Grubb's *Night of the Hunter* reach the psychological level of terror which the movie achieves. (And Robert Mitchum's best role, maybe?)

Of course there are some superb books which have made superb movies: *Schindler's List*, and *The Third Man*, and *Empire of the Sun*, and *Zorba the Greek*, for a start. And lots of entertaining books, which are equally entertaining movies. (David Dodge's *To Catch a Thief* is a nice example.)

What brings this to mind again now is the recent release of Paul Newman's latest movie, "*Nobody's fool*". Paul Newman, after all, is always terrific even when the movie he is in is less than terrific. From all reviews so far, it seems that this is indeed another terrific movie.

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And it is based on an extraordinary book, Richard Russo's novel of the same name. *Nobody's Fool* is a story for grownups. about grownups. Its hero is an ordinary middle-aged man who is living a marginal existence in a shabby city. The novel ought to be depressing; it is not. It is funny, warm, honest - though above all, realistic. So until the video is available from the Downtown Fun Zone, try the book! It is at our Port Orford library, and it is wonderful.

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Service Integration Project

The North Curry Families' and Children's Center has been notified that its proposal to have North Curry designated as a Service Integration Site by the Department of Human Resources, has been accepted. Only six sites were added this year, joining 33 sites throughout the State of Oregon.

From Medford to Portland and Tillamook to Eastern Oregon, local partners are working with the Department of Human Resources to redesign the way social services are delivered in their community. Service Integration pilot projects were first established in 1991, and are charged with the responsibility of developing a local service delivery system based on the needs and priorities of their communities. In 1991, a series of town hall meetings conducted by DHR identified a wide variety of concerns, with an underlying theme to all of them. Services were fragmented and difficult to access for the Department's clients. People had a difficulty identifying what types of services were available and where these services could be obtained. A friendlier system, with fewer barriers, and more citizen involvement was needed.

In the North Curry project, Curry County has made it possible to begin developing a more active presence of DHR agencies and programs, by allowing and facilitating the use of the North Curry County Annex by non-county service providers.



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Curry County department heads, DHR managers, the NCFCC board and staff have been meeting regularly with interested community members to find cost effective ways to better serve the North Curry area.

The North Curry project is unique in that in addition to working with traditional service providers, it also seeks to link community groups and individuals in the development of creative local solutions to ongoing problems and conditions in our area. A 1994 survey of 6% of the area's households, conducted by NCFCC in conjunction with the Curry County Commission on Children and Families, identified the need for youth and family activities as well as improved local services. NCFCC has and will continue working closely with the Port Orford Community Children's Center. It has and will provide research, data, and staff support for grant proposals developed by other organizations, such as the Curry County Health Department School Health Center grant proposal and a Gender Equity Grant at Blanco Middle School.

The NCFCC is presently funded by a Families Initiative Grant from the Carpenter Foundation and the Oregon Community Foundation. The NCFCC meets regularly on the 4th Thursdays of the month, at 6:00pm, in the Port Orford City Council. The next meeting is January 26, and everyone is encouraged to come and participate in the development of services and activities which address the

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unique needs and interests of the North Curry Community. It is hoped that Toni Peterson, Oregon DHR Service Integration Manager, will be able to coordinate her upcoming initial site visit to include attendance at this meeting.

Watershed Notes

The Port Orford Watershed Council met on Wednesday, Jan. 11. Frank Smith, who represents our watershed council on the Curry County Coordinating Watershed Council, gave a report on the last meeting of that group and had good news for our local group. The County council has approved funding for three different watershed projects for Port Orford.

One project for \$3,500 is for the construction of weirs along the feeder creeks into Garrison Lake. The weirs will be made of pre-cast concrete and installed at 8 different locations if approval from ODOT and the Curry County Road Department is attained. They will raise the water behind the culverts to winter time levels. This project was developed by members Justin Bauman and John Mayea with help from Hans Von Spaeth.



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Another plan budgeted at \$4,000 is for a concrete fish ladder at the city's reservoir on the North Fork of Hubbard Creek. The project was developed by member Holly Witt with help from Gary Suzac of the ODFW. The purpose is to enable fish to get from below the reservoir to the reservoir and above it.

The third project was funded for \$800 for a newsletter to be published quarterly. Ellen Warring and Frank Smith developed this as part of an educational program. It will be sent to every home with a Port Orford address and in the urban growth boundary.

The watershed council then studied the Garrison Lake and Hubbard Creek Wa-

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tershed Condition Assessments. The assessments were developed in council work sessions and assembled by Council Secretary Ellen Warring. They must be complete before projects are funded.

The next meeting of the Watershed Council will be on Wednesday, Jan. 25, at 7:00pm, in the city hall council chambers. A representative from ODFW will conduct a training session on "How To Do A Stream Habitat Survey." Members of the watershed council will accompany the ODFW in surveying the North Fork of Hubbard Creek the first week of February. The public is invited and encouraged to attend at Watershed Council meetings.



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
