Rocky Point Bridge Opening by Evan Kramer

Jim Risley, a district operations coordinator (public relations) employee of the Oregon Department of Transportation said the new Rocky Point Bridge will open for traffic on Tuesday, October 10. The 6 1/2 million dollar viaduct is 390 feet long and 44 feet wide. According to Risley it was built to last 100 years. Even though the bridge will be open on Tuesday work will continue at the site including eventual removal of the temporary bridge.

Risley who made the announcement at the Tuesday evening Port Orford Lion's Club meeting said the bridge construction included 179 rock anchors in the mountain. He said the foundation is state of the art and pilings have been poured up to 75 feet deep.

The final completion date for all work is February 14, 1996 but Hamilton Construction is expected to be off the site by December of this year.

Recycling Tips by Evan Kramer

In honor of Recycling Awareness Week (October 2 - 9) here are some suggestions for recycling.

Make double sided photo copies (use one sheet of paper instead of two.) Save old copies and use blank back sides for scratch paper. If desired, you can cut it into

smaller sizes or even apply glue to make pads.

Take your newspapers, slick magazines, clean bottles and cans and cardboard to the Curry Transfer and Recycle station in Port Orford. Bring your "regular" household garbage with you and they'll give you credit off your bill for the recyclable material. Here's how it works. The minimum gate fee for the transfer station is \$6.70. Bring in your recyclables and household garbage and receive \$2.30 off that minimum gate fee. The transfer station accepts used motor oil but they will charge you 5 cents a quart or 20 cents per gallon for accepting it.

Compost vegetable and plant matter. Rather than stuff it down the garbage disposal, make a compost bin and use the finished product in your garden. Chicken tractors are also an excellent way to recycle household food wastes and produce good quality eggs to boot.

Donate your unused eyeglasses and hearing aids to the Lion's Club. They will then pass these on to someone else who can use them. You can drop them off at the Port Orford Senior Center or at The Downtown Fun Zone.

Get a big dog. They will gladly recycle leftover food, particularly meat, though if they're like mine, they're not very fussy. Big dogs are also good for turning the soil in your garden and lawn. Just be careful where you step.

Leave your unwanted magazines off in the hallway in front of the Port Orford library for someone else to read and while you're there take home a few you haven't read.

Hold a garage sale and let your friends and neighbors buy your unused treasures. (They can recycle their extra money to you.)

Bring your used plastic and paper shopping bags to Sister's Natural Grocery where they will reuse them or you can take the paper ones back to the market you got from them and get up to 5 cents credit per bag.

The Common Good is accepting donations of used children's clothing. Members of the Common Good clean and repair the clothing if necessary and then make them available to the public at the Good House on Wednesdays. The Good also has a rack with children's clothing available at Driftwood Elementary School.

We received a few ideas on recycling from Rick Hazard, Education Director for the Kalniopais Audubon Society, who has turned recycling into a lifestyle. He recommends buying recycled products. He advises looking at the labels for packaging made from recycled material. Last but not least he advised that people ask their local stores to carry products made from recycled materials including paper towels, toilet tissue and copy paper.

Letter to the Editor,

I am concerned about the number and structure of special meetings held by the City of Port Orford.

At the City Council meeting on September 11, 1995, it was voted to have a special meeting on September 25, 1995, for the sole purpose of putting out bids for repairs to the Community Center roof. When it arrived, the agenda showed that three other items were to be voted also.

This special meeting took place in the Council Chambers, after the breakfast workshop at the Wheelhouse had adjourned. Only one person was in the audience.

It was an informal affair. At one point a person, whom I did not recognize, walked in and said, "Excuse me, I need to talk to Doti for a minute". This was not challenged and the council sat dumbly while the city manager had a four or five minute private conversation.

One of the new items on the agenda was a report on the agreement between the City and The Chamber of Commerce, which I was to make. Neither I nor any other council person, had seen this final

The Curry Breast Health Network, in partnership with Curry General Hospital (CGH), will celebrate National Breast Cancer Awareness Month with special programs, classes, group mammography days and - to top off the month - a two-day art exhibit and multimedia event.

Activities began on Monday, October 2, when Kathy Comer, coordinator, gave a luncheon presentation to members of the CGH Auxiliary. Auxiliary members also will attend their own "mammo day," a full day of mammogram appointments and breast health education, October 30, in the hospital.

Continuing in October, the breast health network will be represented at the annual Taste For Life, a benefit festival sponsored by the American Cancer Society, from 12:30 to 5:30pm, Saturday, October 7, in the Crescent City Cultural Center.

The CGH mobile mammography van will make a special after-hours visit to Brookings during the first Brookings Community Mammogram Day, Saturday, October 14. The program is aimed especially at reaching working women or others who have weekday scheduling problems. The breast health team is prepared to accommodate all those who make appointments. by Robert Maass, or The Four Seasons, by Ruth Thomson. Harvest Moon Watch, is a delightfully illustrated make-believe story about fourteen forest mice. It is one of four - one for each season of the year, by Kazuo Iwamura. A book called Starting Points, shows how to use colored leaves and other natural fall items in crafts.

Now that October is here, many children are eagerly looking forward to Halloween on the last day of the month. Halloween, by Joyce Keasel tells the history of this strange day and the origin of some of our customs associated with it. Two imaginative books, Harriet's Halloween Candy, by Nancy Carlson and Halloween With Morris and Boris, by Bernard Wiseman, portray animals doing what children usually do: wearing costumes and collecting candy. Harriet is a dog, Morris a moose and Boris a bear. Riddles That Rhyme for Halloween Time, by Leonard Keasler is fun and nonsense.

Dressing up and pretending you are someone else, even for an hour or two, is great fun for children. Charlotte Zolotow's, A Tiger Called Thomas, is a realistic story about a boy doing just that. It is also about making friends. While not a Halloween story, Carl's Masquerade, is about a costume party and a very small person who secretly attends. It is told with beautiful illustrations and a minimum of words.

Children aged 2 to 5 years are especially welcome at Saturday story hours, 11am until noon. Topic for Oct. 7th is Owls and for Oct. 14th, Who's Afraid?

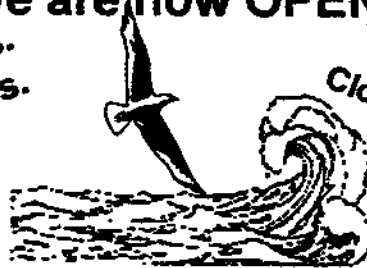

Bubble Fishery Approved

Stargazing

Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife announced that the governor appointed fish and wildlife commission has approved the bubble fishery between Cape Blanco and Humbug Mountain. The fishery was adopted as proposed. Here is the proposal as follows:

A Chinook-only commercial fishery from November 1 through November 7, 1995 with a 400 Chinook quota. A Chinook-only recreational fishery from October 1 through November 7, or closure of the commercial fishery. Both fisheries would occur in state ocean waters between Cape Blanco and Humbug Mountain.

Join Brian McNulty on a two part beach hike ending with a beach bonfire and stargazing. Part I begins at 3:00pm at the Thomas Creek Bridge parking lot. This is a strenuous hike down to China Beach. Part II begins at 5:00pm at Thunder Cove parking lot. Thunder Cove is 1 1/2 miles north of Thomas Creek Bridge. You will be on the beach at low tide, enjoy the tide pooling, have a bonfire and stargaze. Bring campfire food and a flashlight. You will be walking back out to the parking lot after dark. The hikes will be canceled if there is heavy rain. For further information call Brian at 247-2186.

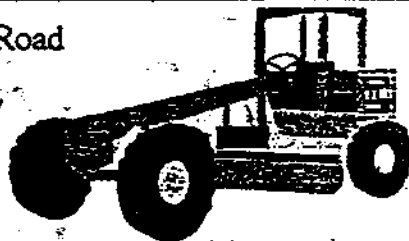

Bed Tax Committee Meets

The Port Orford Transient Lodging Tax Committee (bed tax) held their first official meeting on Tuesday, September 26. The final lineup chosen by the city council to serve on the committee are as follows:

Al Affonso, Port Orford Trailer Village, RV Park owners

Paul Bodtke, Port Orford Pottery, Citizen at Large

Ron Culbertson, Bartlett's Restaurant, Chamber of Commerce

George Kennedy, Port Orford City Council

Alan Mitchell, Home by the Sea Bed & Breakfast, Bed and Breakfast

Rosy Roselius, Battle Rock Motel, motel owners

Dotti Myers, Port Orford City Manager

Rosy Roselius was elected chairman and Paul Bodtke was elected secretary of the committee. Dotti Myers reviewed the 1994-95 bed tax funds and said \$2,000 had been carried over to this fiscal year. She expected revenues of \$27,400 for this fiscal year. \$2,000 was given to the Chamber of Commerce as part of their recently signed lease agreement. \$17,742 was allotted to the city park's department budget for operation and maintenance. This leaves \$8,426 remaining to be divided among several non-profit groups.

Chairman Roselius said the council can-

not allocate bed tax funds to the parks department until the bed tax committee has considered their request. Martha Weaver-Britell said the city council action was binding on the committee and that they allocate the funds. Alan Mitchell noted this is an example of the city paying its bill first. Frank Smith questioned what the \$17,000 was going to be used for. Dotti Myers said the current process is one of working backwards. She suggested the bed tax funding requests be turned in before, not after, the budget process is complete.

A letter was read into the record from Carl Miller, owner of the Castaway Motel. Mr. Miller recommended the bed tax committee allocate a percentage of each year's bed tax funds (7½ to 10%) towards marketing and advertising Port Orford.

The committee went into presentations by funding applicants. Between this meeting and their next one in two weeks the city manager will check with the city attorney about the legality of the city parks department getting their funds committed before first going in front of the committee.

Rick Cook spoke for the Port Orford Arts Council. They are asking for \$2,195 and want to increase their advertising budget with more emphasis on the I-5 corridor.

Frank Smith presented the Lightin' Bugs request for \$2,000. He said they need money for new light purchases and main-

tenance of existing lights. He said the Bugs would like to get \$1,000.

Frank Smith handled the Chamber of Commerce request for \$5,000. He said they needed the money for advertising. He said they were working on a video with help from Pacific High School students.

Ernie Gordon spoke on behalf of the Parks Committee. They requested \$1,500 for repair of tables and benches at Battle Rock Park. The money the Parks Committee is requesting is unused funds that were allotted to the Beautification Committee for benches and tables at Battle Rock Park and returned to the city because they were not used.

The Port Orford Children's Center had submitted a written request but were not present for an oral presentation. They asked for \$2,000.
