Happy Holidays By Evan Kramer

I just returned from the Port Orford Post Office this morning where I deposited several more Christmas cards in the outgoing mail. That should about do it for anything getting mailed and received in a timely fashion. One of the highlights of this time of year is hearing from and reading about people who disappear off the face of the earth the other eleven and a half months of the year. I found myself just as guilty this year and waited until the last couple of weeks to catch up with people by writing several overdue letters.

Valerie and I decided to escape the Christmas crunch in Port Orford for a while and drove down to Southern California to visit with friends and relatives and take care of some business. We left on Tuesday morning with the wind howling—we wondered just how far south we were going to get. Surprisingly, Highway 101 was open all the way and we stayed on it for 850 miles. Going through California redwood country it looked like it had snowed tree branches on the road, though it remained open with many large redwood trees downed by the side of the road.

We escaped the cluttered reality of Los Angeles for a day and headed over to Universal City Studios for what used to be a tour of the back lot and has now become more of an amusement park. Keeping with the tradition of the tour from when it opened in the late 60's, they still offer a tram ride tour of parts of the vast 420 acre movie studio founded by "Uncle" Carl Laemmle on a chicken ranch overlooking the San Fernando Valley. Highlights of the tour for me included the town square where much of the *Back To The Future* trilogy was filmed. The day we saw the clock tower and other buildings in the square they looked a little frayed and forlorn and there was nary a DeLorean in sight (though the "back-to-the-future-mobile" was much in evidence in other parts of the park.) Other notable landmarks at the studio, were the Bates Motel, the old house from Alfred Hitchcock's most famous movie, *Psycho*; the school that Beaver Cleaver attended in Mayfield under the tutelage of Miss Landers (the Cleaver's residence has been dismantled; the "Pacific Ocean" set where the crew from McHale's Navy launched many of their schemes and the oversized plastic shark known as *Jaws* still swimming around looking for Christmas shoppers.

One disappointment with this version of simulated reality is we saw no movies or television shows being filmed. It wasn't until we were driving up Beverly Blvd. in Los Angeles that we saw a location shoot. Of course nothing was going on but a lot of people were standing around looking cold and bored.

I traveled down to Escondido to visit some friends who wanted to show off their new (to them) mobile home. On the way there I drove through Lake Elsinore looking for remembrances of the not so distant past in a city whose population has grown 800% since 1971. I drove by the Crescent Bath House, also known as The Chimes, and spotted a familiar face sitting on the wooden porch. It was Lory Watts, owner of the historic bathhouse built in 1887 and which is now his and wife Wilma's antique store. During our conversation I handed him a recent copy of *Port Orford Today* as a way of showing him what I've been up to the last five years. Some people hand out business cards, some newspapers. It was our December 7th edition featuring news of *Port Orford's* drinking water. The first thing Lory wanted to know is what we had in the paper about the attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese air force. When

Shop For Special Christmas Gifts

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Sixes Watershed Council

On an April evening in 1994, twenty-seven people attended the first meeting of the Elk-Sixes Watershed Council. The group's primary goal was the enhancement and restoration of salmonids in Elk and Sixes watersheds. Now, less than two years later, the fruits of the council's labors are beginning to pay off in an Elk River tributary.

In the 1950's, at the Western States mill site on Elk River, Bagley Creek had been detoured around the mill's fire pond and was impassable to salmon. In the fall of 1994, under ODFW guidance, members of Elk-Sixes Watershed Council and other volunteers made step pools from the mill's fire pond to the mouth of the creek.

On December 14, 1995, one year after completion of the jump pools, Jerry Stoope, watershed council member and local landowner, reports that he spotted an adult chinook in Bagley Creek. According to Stoope, "It made it over the falls and through two jump pools, and traveled about half a mile up the creek."

"Plugging the bypass and rerouting the stream back to where it belongs was done primarily by volunteers," states Jerry Stoope, recounting the restoration work accomplished by local residents. "Fish ladders and dams were built by hand to create step pools for salmon to get up Bagley Creek from Elk River," Stoope adds.

Blaine Marsh of the Marsh Ranch on Elk River remembers when the fire pond and log pond were constructed. "It's been about 45 years since a salmon could make it up Bagley creek," Marsh estimates, figuring that the stream was detoured in about 1950. "It's good to get them back," he says.

The appearance of Bagley Creek's first salmon in decades is an encouraging event for members of the Elk-Sixes Watershed Council. "This group has a core of dedicated people who really work for the fish," says Carolyn Osborne, council chair, "and seeing a spawner back in Bagley Creek makes everyone feel rewarded."

Summing it all up, Jerry Stoope remarks, "If you give anadromous fish any chance, they will try to come back."

Elk River Fish Hatchery

Elk River Fish Hatchery is well into the spawning season with three separate stocks of fall Chinook salmon on hand. As of Dec. 14 we have collected:

	Males	Females	Jacks
Chetco River	152	137	21
Hunter Creek	11	14	3
Elk River	259	149	285

We have been spawning on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays since mid November and we have a lot of "eyed-up" eggs to see. We have 390,000+ eggs from the Chetco River stock, 537,000+ from the Elk River stock and 42,000+ from the Hunter Creek stock.

Recent heavy rains have kept the Elk River full of run-off, so conditions are very good for the upriver migration of mature Chinook salmon. Fishermen have had mixed success, but because the river is staying full and turbid, angling conditions are generally pretty good.

108 third graders from Kalmiopsis Elementary school and 16 youngsters from the Gold Beach Head Start Program have visited us in the past few weeks to learn about salmon, watch the spawning activities and feed the fish. The third graders signed their names on our spawning records and have taken honorary "ownership" of the fish we will grow from the eggs we took. The kids all had a great time, even when they got rained on, and we look forward to seeing all of them again in the future.

We try to update the hatchery answering machine every morning for the benefit of interested fishermen; however, during power outages, high winds and high water we may not get the answering machine updated right away. In crisis situations we have a great responsibility to keep our eggs and fish alive, so hatchery operations come first. We appreciate your patience, and we will continue to do the best we can for you.

When an agenda is being made, "Public Input" is an item that allows the public to bring before the governing board items of concern that are not on the agenda.

This would seem to mean that city employees, a council member or even the mayor, can not take action on a motion without the acquiescence of a quorum of the council at a formal open council meeting. With this as an understanding when motions are made by a governing body they will be followed to the letter by all city employees.

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Kids, Your Pets, the Big Salmon!
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Letter to the Editor,

Contrary to the recent statement by State Rep. Veral Tarno, the tax refund checks Oregonians have been receiving were not sent because the state did not need the money.

They were sent because off the so-called "2% kicker", a 1979 law that requires state revenue forecasters to be clairvoyant by accurately predicting two years ahead how much money each Oregon individual and corporation will make - and pay taxes on. If actual revenue comes in more than 2% higher than forecast when the biennial budget was adopted, that law requires all of the surplus to be returned to taxpayers.

Individuals and small business owners should be aware that while they received about 6% of their state income taxes, thanks to the "kicker", corporations' taxes were cut by 54%.

Tarno said "We fought for people's interest, not special interest". Does he think that students in over-crowded classrooms or those unable to afford the sky-rocketing tuition at state-supported colleges represent special interests? How about the elderly and handicapped who need

state services? And what happens when receipts from the Oregon Lottery turn out to be significantly less than forecast just as more prisons must be built and staffed to comply with initiatives Oregonians approved last year?

When we carefully examine the real beneficiaries of the tax refund, we may ask ourselves whether the Republican-controlled legislature had ordinary taxpayers in mind when they refused to kill the "kicker", as many recommend, or even to suspend it as two previous legislatures did in response to the demands of Measure 5.

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
**Call for Artist



