Happy New Year By Evan Kramer

We had a successful Christmas. Not only did Santa pay us a welcome visit and leave us with many wonderful presents but we had no need to return anything we received. We called Valerie's parents on Christmas day and found them not at home but at Aunt Georgia's house in Mayfield Heights. They were preparing to sit down to a turkey dinner but we got to chat a little first and thank them for assisting Santa so well this year. I ended up talking to Valerie's father George about some of my favorite and least favorite subjects.

I have this interest in a white (snowy) Christmas. One year Valerie and I flew out to Cleveland to be with her parents for Christmas, partly so I could experience what Bing Crosby has been singing about all these years. The weather didn't cooperate and the closest we had to any snow was a brief flurry which didn't stick while we were walking around in downtown Cleveland. This year George told me there's plenty of snow. He measured 14 inches built up on a bench top at the church they attend. Brings back memories of the first Christmas I had in Port Orford which was the year it snowed and stayed with us for a full week. Of course, we didn't get 14".

Then we started talking about the leap frogging of professional sports franchises from one city to another with no regard for their loyal fans. In this case it is owner Art Modell and his Cleveland Browns who have played their last game in Cleveland's Municipal Stadium (part of which is known as the Dawg Pound). Modell is moving the Browns to Baltimore, a town which lost their beloved Colts to Indianapolis in 1984.

Cleveland is a much maligned city and at one time was a popular target of the comedy circuit. This was a City with an unenviable litany of laughable targets including the Cuyahoga River which was so polluted it caught on fire and burned. Let's not forget former Mayor Ralph Perk ("The Jerk") who declined an invitation to the Nixon White House in order to go bowling. Another Mayor Dennis Kucinich was known as "Dennis the Menace."



Recycling Makes Cents By Paula Cracas

Last week, we learned that one ton of recycled newspapers saved some of our valuable resources. This week we're going to explore further the advantages of buying recycled products.

To make recycled toilet tissue, newspapers account for only 5% of the finished product. Recycled office papers (which are fetching a hefty price right now) account for 15 to 20% of the volume. The rest comes from book and magazine publishers and printers in the form of overruns, misprints, outdated materials, and cuttings/shavings. But all the above go through the same process explained last week.

I was curious if our local school district used recycled toilet tissue (which it doesn't) and what their volume/impact is. In two years, our school district uses approximately 75 cases which would amount to 2 tons of recycled toilet tissue and a savings of 34 trees, 14,000 gallons of water, 6 cubic yards of landfill space, 8,200 kilowatts of energy, and would keep 120 pounds of air pollutants from fouling our environment. Additionally, I think there may be a lesson for our children...that recycling is important, both in the short run and in the long run.

On a personal level, if you used 75 cases of toilet tissue (or 3,375 rolls which equals about one roll of one-ply a week

for 65 years) you would be saving those resources too. And multiply those numbers by the people who live in our little county. Wow! That could make a big difference, couldn't it?

Institutions, like schools and hospitals (yes, our health district and hospital use recycled toilet tissue) pay approximately the same price for regular or recycled toilet tissue, according to Don at United Grocers in Coos Bay (approximately \$21 a case of 45 rolls). And yes, the cost to me

at the grocery store is a factor. Those recycled products always seem to cost more at the cash register. Is it time to consider other costs as well?

Is buying recycled products beginning to make sense? And not to worry about that hamburger carton made from recycled materials. It is as pure and clean as a container made from trees...and maybe more so because it's gone through the process two times or more.

Recycling. So simple, it works.
