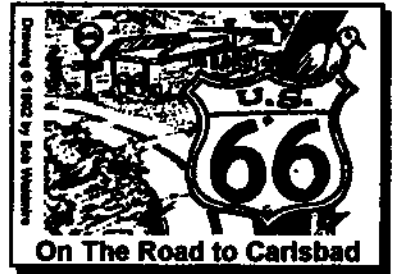

The main reason we could take a long and enjoyable trip was we have such fine employees. Nancy Broadhead ran the Fun Zone for us while we were gone with able assistance from her husband Greg, Sandy Eisman and Tammy Fanning. We were in and out of many restaurants, motels, businesses, parks and visitors centers for 17 days and we were struck by the difference in customer service from one business to the next. The ups and downs of the road made me all the more appreciative of the quality of people we work with here. Thanks to Nancy, Greg, Sandy and Tammy for helping make our trip possible.

We arrived back Saturday night so we missed the Celtic Fiddle Concert featuring Hanneke Cassel, Ryan McKasson, Cali McKasson and Katrina Cameron. But several people including Jack, Nancy

and Debbie made a point of telling me how much they enjoyed the music and musicians who played to a sold out crowd at the Star Theater. Nobody volunteered to write a review so I won't say much more about the concert other than, "how about putting on another here in Port Orford?"

We started from Port Orford on a typical rainy day and drove into a blizzard between Gold Beach and Brookings. It wasn't to be the only time we ran into snow on this trip. Somewhere south of Brookings, Valerie saw an omen for the trip. . . a sign painted on the end of a building that said, "Don't forget the magic!"

We drove as far as Laytonville, California on the first evening and stayed at a modest motel but did have some very good Chinese food for dinner at the Laytonville Inn. The next day we set out to make some major mileage and got as far as Bakersfield which has grown up quite a bit and now boasts a population of well over 200,000.

The next morning we left for Barstow in a Bakersfield fog but well before Mojave we hit sunlight and the first real rainless day in a while. Thanks to Valerie's insistence we stopped at the Tehachapi Loop and watched a north bound Santa

Fe freight train wrap around itself on the unique and world famous Tehachapi loop. Trains coming uphill from Bakersfield go thru a tunnel, wrap completely around a small hill and cross over themselves 77 feet higher, then continue to curve around and off to Mojave. Its a very busy spot and you don't usually have to wait long to see a train. Thanks Valerie.

We hit Barstow in time for lunch at Burger King and the start of a lot of Route 66 nostalgia. The El Rancho Motel now has a Route 66 memorabilia room as well as "66" signs all over it.

We left Barstow on Interstate 40 but a little east we detoured to the "Mother Road" as John Steinbeck referred to Highway 66 in his book, *The Grapes of Wrath*. We drove on 66 to the town of Amboy which is the home of Roy's Motel, Café and gas station. We let Myrtle out for a run but weren't really ready for a piece of pie at Roy's. We continued on 66 until we were shunted back to Interstate 40 because of a bridge closure. In Needles I bought gas at the world's most expensive Texaco - \$1.59.9 per gallon. Ouch! (A few blocks away from the freeway, gas was much cheaper - double Ouch!)

We continued on I-40 across the Colorado River then headed south on High-

Thorp Files for Commissioner

Cheryl Thorp, 52, filed for the Democratic nomination for Curry County Commissioner, Position No. 3, on Thursday, March 7, 1996.

Thorp, a Brookings resident since 1989, supports the natural resources upon which local jobs are based and balancing a high quality of life with a sound economy.

Thorp, a community activist, worked for Curry County Human Services and as Assistant Director of Nursing at Curry Good Samaritan Nursing Home. She also taught community college classes. Thorp negotiated labor contracts between county government and its employees, and coordinated a treatment program for abused children and adults. During this time, she was honored by her county Board of Supervisors, who passed a Resolution of Commendation for her work with county residents.

Thorp has extensive nursing experience in schools, public health and hospitals.

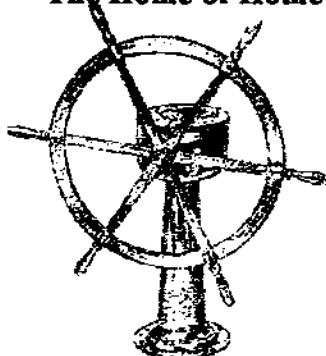
Besides working for county governments for more than 11 years, Thorp has been active in the Democratic Party in Curry County. She is a member of Curry County Commission for Children and Families, Curry County's Citizens for Human Rights, and the South Coast Humane Society.

Thorp states her concern is for people and our quality of life. "I'm here for the people." She said, "I have no hidden agenda. I am open to citizens' ideas".

Senator Brecke Appointed

The Oregon Senate President has appointed Senator Brenda Brecke (D-Coos Bay) to the Joint Legislative Committee on Land Use.

The committee is comprised of four members from the House and three members from the Senate. The panel is responsible for the oversight of the Department of Conservation and Development. Addi-

tionally, the committee will make recommendations to the Legislative Assembly on the effects of the state land use planning program on local governments and private landowners as well as how to improve the land use appeals process.

Senator Brecke was selected to serve on the panel due to her extensive background in land use issues. Before her current position as Director of the Workforce 2000 Skills Center, she worked for the Oregon Department of Forestry and she has owned and operated a small farm. During the 1995 Legislative Session her experience on land use issues proved valuable as a member of the Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee.

"I'm very excited about the appointment," said Brecke. "We all know land use issues are important here on the South Coast. I'm committed to bringing the views of South Coast residents to the committee when examining the practices of the Department of Land Conservation and Development. I encourage all South Coast citizens who have concerns with Oregon's land use laws to contact me so we can bring those perspectives to the committee."

Leaf Them Alone

Well now I've gone and done it. The Master Gardeners at the Extension office in Gold Beach saw my article on Master Gardeners and thought I should handle the PR for Curry County Master Gardeners. And since I love plants and gardening and sharing information I've learned, thought, why not?! So you'll be seeing articles from time to time, concerning your home gardening - some not so new ideas and others which will be brand new to both of us. So, here goes.

Since they're blooming all over town, don't cut off or remove the leaves of your daffodils, or any other flower bulbs for that matter, after the blooming period. The leaves, as long as they are green, are still making food which is stored in the bulb for next year's growth and flowers. If you remove the leaves before they die back, you're starving the bulb.

And while we're speaking of food for the bulbs, fertilizer is not plant food, regardless how it is advertised. Plants make their own food by photosynthesis, through their leaves, making plants sugars, needing only light (sun) and water to produce their food. Think of fertilizers as "vita-



mins" for the plant, which indeed they are. Just as vitamins are not food for us, fertilizers are not food for plants. And plants can have a deficiency, the same way we can be deficient in a certain vitamin. There are 17 elements needed for plant growth, not in producing food for the plant. So, if the soil is low or lacking one of these elements, the plant doesn't grow as well. Most all plants can use a little fertilizer occasionally and in choosing one, look for a well balanced, inexpensive fertilizer.

Whale of a Show

As the gray whales migrate north on their return to feeding grounds in the Bering Sea from their pleasurable wintering in the warm lagoons of Mexico, enthusiastic volunteers are arranging their schedules to allow time for "Whale Watching Spoken Here" week.

The dates are March 23 through the 30th. The Whale site is at Cape Sebastian State Park located 5 miles south of Gold Beach on Highway 101. Volunteers will be on duty every date from 10am 1pm. Watch for the signs.

Timed to match the gray whale northern migration with school spring break, several hundred visitors are expected to visit the Cape Sebastian site, as they have in past years. The best whale watching is in the spring when the visibility is usually better and the ocean is calmer. Also on their migration, the gray whales travel at a slower speed, and 2 to 3 miles an hour, and they stay in closer to shore, often as close as 2 miles. Volunteers will be at the site to answer questions and show some of the tricks in spotting the whales, such as how to tell a whale spout from a white cap. Although on a windy day when the ocean looks like a very big bowl of popcorn, even the experts are tried to their limits.

You don't have to be an expert to whale watch. Just bring plenty of patience, binoculars and dress warm. A word of warning should be added...once you have

way 95 to Lake Havasu City where we stopped and walked under and on top of the London Bridge (moved from London, England in 1967 and reconstructed and rededicated in 1971). The area was a total tourist stop with seemingly no reason for existence, save for the selling of postcards and souvenirs. We left, glad to be on our way.

We continued south to Parker Dam and drove across the top of it. We took a only a brief look at because the self guided tour had already closed for the day. The dam is considerably smaller than Boulder Dam and attracts far fewer people. This area was the only place we saw on the whole trip that Valerie thought might be as nice as Port Orford. The area is full of jagged rocks and hidden canyons and is very scenic. The Colorado River is like a long oasis in this barren country and makes a great contrast.

We drove on to Parker, Arizona and stayed at a motel almost directly across the street from the Pizza Hut. I figured we wouldn't have far to walk to dinner that way. We both got heartburn from the overly spicy, but very tasty, pizza. I took Myrtle for a walk and walked by Basha's Market where I spotted a flyer advertising a balloon festival for the very next morning at the Parker Airport. I hurried back to tell Valerie and we decided to get up early and go on over and see the 40 hot air balloons lifting off.

It was an unbelievably colorful sight. We got to the airport as the first balloon was readying to ascend and watched as the entire group of balloons were inflated and one by one floated up and away (though not very far away).

We headed south again. On the way, we saw a number of the balloons which had come back to dry land, having traveled only a few miles.
