Port Orford Scenes By Evan Kramer

Valerie and I took a trip up to the BLM Sixes River mining site panning for gold on Sunday. Valerie was thrilled when she found her first tiny speck in her pan! There is gold in them that hills and the BLM site, some 13 miles up the Sixes River Road, is a few acres of public land set aside as a place where the public can try their luck. Don't have a pan? Check the new stock at the Sixes Store. You probably won't get rich (or even cover your expenses) but its a fun excuse to get out and get some exercise.

Upon returning to Port Orford we decided to stop in at the Crazy Norwegians. Little did we know what we were in store for as, at the end of the meal, Alan and Hanneke Cassel with help from Hege Bakken decided to play a few tunes. Alan sat down and played the piano while Hanneke and Hege played fiddles. Don't ask me the names of the songs they played. Just say I enjoyed it and regretted missing the Hanneke Cassel fiddle concert at the Star Theater in Port Orford in March.

Works In Wood Continues

The current Rick Cook Gallery show entitled With The Grain II, Works In Wood continues through Memorial Day and the Port Orford Volkswalk that weekend. Eight artists working in wood have their original works on display including gallery owner Cook.

Port Orford resident Jerry Stoopes has four works on display. Stoopes medium is wood carving. Three of his pieces are of an elk, a hawk and a flower with an inlaid mirror in each sculpture. Stoopes' piece de resistance is a carved and finely sanded and finished salmon.

Rick Cook's specialty is high quality individually crafted one of a kind wood furniture. For this show he has on display a storage cabinet made from Port Orford Cedar and a chair made from ash.

One of the most impressive examples of wood carving is the sculpture by Donna Goss entitled Owlseed which was carved from Port Orford Cedar. Another piece that caught my attention and beckoned to be touched (a no-no) was a turned Binary Teapot by Hugh McKay.

Local artist Keith Wenner has contributed a group of turned myrtlewood bowls. Other bowls were contributed by Brandt Weaver working with maple and Alan Hanley working with mahogany. Harvey Shinerock has a distinctive redwood bowl on display.

Gary Miick has two wood sculptures

hanging on the walls including one entitled Shaman Transformation. The other sculpture which caught my attention goes by the name of "Elvis on Drugs, or My Helping Spirit". The Cook gallery is open seven days a week and features many other works of art in the main room.

Red-Necked Phalaropes Found Dead

A phenomenon has been occurring in Port Orford. For some reason, which no one yet knows, large amounts of rednecked phalaropes have been dropping from the sky dead. One resident said he saw 20 drop all at the same time. 30-40 were reportedly picked up at Battle Rock Park.

The red-necked phalarope is a shorebird of smallish size with a long (about 1.5" sharp beak, a white breast, and a reddish brown band around the neck. It's quite a pretty bird and they have been seen flying around Port Orford in large numbers. On Monday morning I saw a group of them feeding in a mud puddle located in the gravel road leading down to Battle Rock Park.

According to the National Geographic Society Field Guide to the Birds of North America the red-necked phalarope breeds on "arctic and subarctic tundra" and





If you've been waiting for "Windows '96" you're out of luck. The April 22 issue of *Inforworld* reported Chairman and CEO of Microsoft, Bill Gates, as saying that the next major versions of Windows 95 and NT will be released together about the end of 1997 or early in 1998. Given the usual delays, it looks like there could be a couple of years before there will be any major changes to Windows 95.

I've been using Windows 95 on all our machines since it was released last August and I like it a lot! The first time installation usually is easy. Special actions may be necessary if your system already has problems such as incorrect configuration files, interrupt conflicts, or unsupported hardware devices. Once past these hurdles, however, Windows 95 is much more stable and powerful than Windows 3.1. Recommended!

Also receiving rave reviews is the new game, "Zork Nemesis." The CD-ROM contains one version that requires Windows 95 and a second (inferior) version which just runs under DOS. The graphics are reported to be stunning and the game is highly addictive.

@Harborside has been working hard this week. On Monday they moved into their new digs closer to the center of Brookings. Being closer to the phone company's switch should make for better signals. On Tuesday, they began the Port Orford upgrade. At press time the project isn't complete. All twenty modems are sitting on their shelves but only the first 10 can connect to @Harborside.
