Council Adopts 96-97 Budget Approves Police Reserves By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council met on Monday night, June 24, and began with a half hour public hearing on the plans for the remodeling of the visitor center at Battle Rock Park. The council heard from city parks commission members Marilyn Kaplan and Ziggy Hoffman at length. They both spoke about changes to the original architectural renderings by Rotary Club member Fred Bitgood. One major change the parks commission has come up with a gabled pitch roof. They also recommended hiring out the construction of the roof but leaving the Rotary Club volunteers to build the rest of the structure.

The council moved into their special session and plunged into approval of the 1996-97 city budget. City auditor Rob Wall attended the meeting and sat next to Mayor Kennedy as the council began their deliberations. He told them it was okay to reduce their general tax base increase to 3.5% regarding Ralph Donaldson's proposal. There were at least two resolutions for adoption of the budget circulating amongst the public and council. One with the full 6% increase and the other with 3.5%. A motion was made by Martha Weaver-Britell

to pass resolution R96-11 as amended and corrected and read out loud to the public. This one took the 3.5% increase. Since the general fund levy was reduced by \$3,230 a reduction had to come out of one or all departments. Her motion included reducing the parks budget by the \$3,230. The motion passed 4 - 2 with Donaldson, Eskelson, Warring and Weaver-Britell voting for it and George Kennedy and Sparks voting against. Many typographical mistakes and errors in addition were found in the resolution and had to be changed as members of the public, Rob Wall and the council "caught them". Anyway, the city is in business for 1996-97.

The council was handed a copy of a police manual for the reserves compiled by police chief Barney Issel which they liked and on a motion by George Kennedy approved. They followed this action by approving Ordinance 96-12 establishing a police reserve. The ordinance was written by Chief Issel and allows up to 3 reserve officers.

Ordinance 96-13 creating a municipal court was tabled. Councilor Eskelson pointed out that parts of this ordinance were already covered in the city charter. He and councilor Warring informed the council it would take a vote of the people to amend the city charter. The council

discussed making the position of municipal court judge an elected one but no action was taken on that idea.

Councilor George Kennedy urged the council not to sign an agreement creating an "environmental partnership" with the DEQ (Department of Environmental Quality). However the council will invite a representative of the DEQ to the next council meeting. Kennedy favored accepting grant money from DEQ that is available but they should avoid signing a "legally enforceable Mutual Agreement and Order with them. The rest of the council concurred with Kennedy.

Jane Cramer was appointed to a vacancy on the city parks commission.

The consensus of the council was to table approval of the revised plans for the visitor center at Battle Rock Park until these plans are presented as architectural drawings.

The city has let bids out for a handicapped accessible fishing dock at the 12th Street boat ramp. A motion was made by Martha Weaver-Britell to designate city

Strategic Plan - Part 2 By Nancy Dowdy

Last week, I gave some background on the Port Orford draft Strategic Plan. I encourage you to obtain your own copy of the 27 page draft Strategic Plan at the Port Orford City Hall and read it yourself. A copy is also available for reading in the library. What follows is a brief summary of the plan, as I read it.

Community Assessment:

Strengths include natural resources and beauty, retirees able to support businesses, the Port, the quality of technology programs in schools, relatively affordable housing, proposed improvements to Highway 101, involvement and environmental awareness of citizens, and adequacy of the sewer system.

Weaknesses include remoteness, too small a population to support retail and service businesses, weak business development infrastructure, limited marketing of the area, poor maintenance of commercial and some residential areas, relatively unskilled and under employed labor force, business difficulties in hiring motivated employees with good work habits, some students dropping behind in school, few youth activities, alcohol and drug abuse by adults and youth, limited law enforcement, available housing becoming more scarce and less affordable, recent rate increases for sewers, and inadequate water supply.

Opportunities are seen in the retirement industry, destination ecotourism, exportoriented entrepreneurial ventures, commercial infill, Cape Blanco Airport, Cooperative programs with SWOCC, work experiences for students, community cleanup and esthetic improvements, youth community activities, telecommunications, water system improvements, and continued work on the sewer system.

Threats include loss of fisheries resources, over-dependence on retirees and loss of Official Weather Provided by the City of Port Orford Public Utilities Department

Attractions for tourists and those living in the area include a working gold mine; whale watching; Port Orford Heads State Park Interpretive Center, an Old Town with shops, studios, and coffee houses; an auto raceway; a community art center with studio space; a new library and community center; and a new visitors' center at Battle Rock Park.



Port Orford Library News



Fire Permits

Effective at 12:01am, Monday, June 17, 1996, the official forest fire season begins in the Coos Forest Protective Association district. This closure effects all state, county, private and BLM lands within CS-1, CS-2, CS-4, CS-5, SK-1 and SK-2. This action puts the Coos district at a Level 1 closure. After this date, logging operators must have their fire tools and equipment as required by law and all open burning will require a permit.

Burning permits will be issued at the site. Plan any burning in advance to allow ample time for an inspection by the Forest Officer. Call the nearest Coos Forest Patrol office listed in the telephone directory to request permits. Permits for open burning are issued for no more than ten days and incinerator permits may be issued for extended periods of time. All permits must be signed by the permittee and Forest Officer at the burning site.

If you live in the Port Orford or Langlois area you may call Forest Officer Joanne Ruoff at 332-1625 or our Bandon office at 347-3400 for permits.


