were passed around to other council members and the public.

Police Chief Barney Issel told the council he has written 40-45 traffic citations since the last month. He now has a cellular phone in his police car and can be reached at 530-2303.

City Manager Dotti Myers told the council 23 people had been sent letters regarding violations of the nuisance ordinance and that most were complying with the letters

Four city council positions are up for election on November 5, 1996. They are those of the mayor and three councilors. The councilors do not run for positions or seat numbers but as at large candidates with the top three vote getters being elected. To qualify for the ballot a candidate needs to get a filing petition at city hall. It takes the signatures of 25 regis-

tered voters to qualify for the ballot. There is no filing fee and petitions must be turned in to the city manager by August 28. Those people whose terms of office are up on January 1, 1997, are Mayor Delaine Kennedy and councilors Martha Weaver-Britell, Ralph Donaldson and George Kennedy.

The council reviewed a one year lease agreement with the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce for the visitor center at Battle Rock Park. A motion was made to sign the lease agreement as corrected was passed by a 5-1 vote with councilor Robert Warring dissenting. He questioned why the city should contribute funds to the chamber of commerce and asked why not let other organizations bid on the job of running the visitor center.

The council heard a presentation by Richard AuFranc and Ralph Donaldson representing the bed tax ordinance review committee. That committee has completed its review and turned in the pro-

posed ordinance for council review. Other committee members are Carl Eskelson. Walter Kaplan, Carl Miller and Robert Warring, Warring noted that the cooperation amongst committee members had been fantastic. Culbertson told the council the committee recommended making the revised ordinance effective on January 1, 1997. He said the council could consider including RV parks for collecting the 6% bed tax. Mayor Kennedy asked the council to table the review and approval of the revised ordinance until their workshop meeting in two weeks. Her main reason was the council had not vet received a legal opinion of the ordinance from the city lawyer about the ordinance. The motion to table passed.

The council moved on to discussion about the remodeling plans for the visitor center building at Battle Rock Park. Councilor Martha Weaver-Britell presented some newly drawn plans with a roof

design showing a 4 and 12 pitch now favored by the city parks committee. Chamber president Frank Smith spoke to council and told them he was concerned about the new drawing. He said the city already has a set of architectural plans for visitor center drawn up by Rotary Club member Fred Bitgood. Smith told the council not to gum up the works and to go ahead with the original plans for the remodeling which included a flatter roof than the new proposal. Alice Pfand liked the new plans and told the council to make the visitor center a beautiful building. A decision on the plans was tabled until the workshop meeting.

Next up was appointment of a municipal court judge. Four applications had been received by the city though one person withdrew their name. Mayor Kennedy declared a conflict of interest and handed her gavel over to Tim Sparks to act as mayor on this issue because she was one of the three applicants for the position. Councilor Warring read the advertisement that had been printed in the papers for the position and said no one who turned in their application letter mea-

sured up to the stringent requirements set forth in the ad. Councilor George Kennedy was eager to appointment a judge but Warring pointedly told him he was tired of making hasty decisions. The council decided to place the advertisement for the judge in the papers again and make Mayor Kennedy the interim judge for the July 9 court session. Councilor Donaldson said one requirement would be the person be of "good character".

Note: More council business was conducted but I left after the judge issue. However, Dotti Myers told me this morning the council passed a motion to purchase a new pump station for the dock with the money to come from the sewer construction fund. The workshop/council meeting is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, July 23, at 6:00pm.

### The Slime Masters By Donna Hoffmann Master Gardener

Several people have been asking what to do with snails and slugs. Personally, I prefer my snails with garlic butter and a glass of pinot gris, thank you. Seriously, we know they cause a lot of garden problems. I found some information of slugs (which is about the same for snails) from O.S.U. Some of the information surprised me and maybe you also. First off, the bulletin said slugs do beneficial things. Number one surprise! They cycle organic matter, enriching soil and are an important food source for other wildlife. They are closely related to snails and both related to common shellfish such as clams and are termed mollusks. Of all the pest species, all but one were introduced into this country, probably by accident. One pest, the brown garden snail, was intentionally imported as a gourmet food item, which we know as escargot. About 10 pest slug species are now established in Oregon. The home garden provide excellent conditions for the slugs - flowers, shrubs and vegetables for food; areas we water through the dry times of the season, and many places to hide. They

glide over a slime trail they produce. The mouth houses a horn-like rasping organ used to scrape at food. Damage is quite distinctive because of the feeding structure. Least toxic methods for slug control are to take advantage of their habits. They like dark, moist places in which to hide during the day. Place scrap boards on the soil under plants and between garden rows. Scrape the slugs off the boards each morning, into a bucket of soapy water, to be disposed of later. (And definitely not in the compost pile!) If you're persistent, you can keep the population at a low point.

Yeasty odors are highly attractive to slugs. Many people use yeast and water, or beer, as an attractant for slug traps. One trap design uses a coffee can in which a hole has been cut about 1/3 of the way from th bottom. Bury the can so that the hole is at ground level. Put about 2-inches of yeast and water or beer in the trap. Cover with the plastic lid to reduce evaporation and keep out thirsty pets! Check and remove dead slugs daily and replace the beer or yeast and water about every 4 days.

There is some evidence that copper strips or screens are effective barriers. Place

copper strips around raised beds and trees. Just be sure not to trap them inside your garden plot.

Diatomaceous earth is another good deterrent according to "Common Sense Pest Control" by J. Grossman and H. Oldowski. Spread the diatomaceous earth around the plants and slugs and snail won't cross over. You can even sprinkle on the plants for protection from other predators. Diatomaceous earth is good for lots of other things, according to the authors - spread around cracks and crevices to prevent cock roaches, sow bug, etc. Sprinkle on carpets to control fleas. It's not real easy to locate, but there are nurseries around that carry it. Again, follow the directions. Slugs and snails also have natural enemies. Some mammals such as raccoons and possums will eat them. Garter snakes, mallard ducks and bantam chickens are also good predators. Ground feeding birds feed on juvenile slugs. We once had a scrub jay that loved eating snails, preferring them over other foods. He would get one, fly to our wooden fence, crack it open using the fence and eat it. He did this several times a day. Would have loved to kept him.

Continued from Preceeding Page There are poison baits which can be used. Metaldehyde is the most common active ingredient. Be aware that poisoned slugs can recover from metaldehyde if they have access to sufficient water. If conditions are right, 100 percent of the stricken pests can recover and crawl off. Baits containing both metaldehyde and carbaryl (an insecticide) are considerably more effective but less common. Follow label directions carefully when using these baits. Evening, just after a rain or watering is best. Do not apply slug spray or dust on crops to be eaten or to be grazed by animals. Follow the label directions. And please, keep pets away especially dogs!

Regarding Councilman G. Kennedy:

Some humor for your week! Here are a few questions that I feel, need answering, so the citizens of Port Orford will be aware of things that are happening in our City Government.

The following questions require answers with City Council record documentation:

When was the amendment made to the 1995/1996 budget that gave the Police Department and Municipal Judge the funds by which to operate? Were the funds for the Police Chief shown as 75% from the Federal COPS Grant, and 25% from city funds?

In the 1996/1997 Budget, if the 25% portion that the city is obliged to provide, was not included in the Police Department budget, then was there a contingency allowed for that obligation in some other part of the City Budget? A stated contingency is necessary so that the city's portion of the three (3) year grant does not accumulate, and in the third year find there are no funds remaining for the city's portion of the grant?

When the mayor acted as the judge was she an employee, or a contractor? The 1996/1997 budget shows that the Municipal Judge is a contractor. If our Mayor was a contractor did the City Council have a contract with her that indicated the charge for her time, and that she was covered by her own Workman's Com-

pensation Insurance policy, and submit both state and federal tax numbers, to facilitate the submission of a 1099 tax form; at what meeting was this accomplished?

Will the contract with the Municipal Judge require that he/she have the required course that allows access to D.M. V. files, where driving records may be obtained, and if not, who will pay for this training? Will the judge supply his/her own insurance coverage for Workman's Compensation and Liability Insurance?

Thank you for your cooperation in obtaining the answers to these questions. We will ask the News Paper to have a column headed "The Truth By George".



### Letter to the Editor,

The current bear and cougar problems have caused considerable public debate. Representative Veral Tarno had the courage to hold open meetings so that anyone in the community could express their concerns to their elected official as well as to biologists from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Representative Tamo knew he was dealing with an emotional issue that has no easy answers or solutions. It clearly represents a losing situation for someone looking for votes. Most politicians run from unpopular issues and controversy. Not so with Representative Tamo. He is one of the rare statesmen willing to tackle tough issues head on.

He remained poised throughout the heated meeting, always polite and genuinely interested in the attendees opinions and experiences. He made sure that everyone




had their opportunity to speak and be heard. He did not allow any group or individual to dominate the meeting.

Testimony included stories of prts, even full grown horses being killed in broad daylight by cougars, mothers frightened for the safety of their children and accounts of livestock predations. Others though a minority at the Gold Beach meeting said we have no problem on the south coast and shouldn't be concerned with the 10 to 15 million dollars lost annually in Curry County to predation. They said the odds were against a child being attacked by a bear or cougar and we must accept that risk if you want to live outside a city.

Representative Tarno maintained a neutral attitude and listened to literally scores of predator conflicts as well as significant scientific data from ODFW verifying the increase in cougar populations throughout the state and their inability to deal in a timely manner with the increasing frequency of complaints.

No one knows what impact these public meetings will have in trying to find a workable solution to our predator problems, but I still appreciate the chance to voice my concerns and opinions directly to my elected representative. I feel better knowing that at least one person in the state legislature cared enough to listen to me and my neighbors.
