Public Works in Turmoil

For the third time this year the City of Port Orford is looking for a director of public works. Longtime director Dennis Gehrke resigned in February of this year and went to work in Coos Bay. Alan Wagner took over for him and lasted until June when he resigned and resumed his former job in the public works department with the City. Two weeks ago the City hired their third public works director this year, Louis Stansbury. He worked on the job for less than two weeks and resigned. What's going on at city hall? Why would three public works directors quit within a six month period of time? One of the big problems Alan Wagner faced was the city not having enough money in the budget to keep their equipment maintained. Councilor Donaldson spoke about the resignation of Sanderling and said the situation is "extremely serious". He referred to underlying problems with the City. He requested for a special council session soon to look at the situation.

Street Repair

City engineer Tor Flatebo reported on the street repair project. There were two bids received. The low bid was for \$147,974 from Bracelyn and Yaeger. The

council passed a motion to accept their bid along with adding \$2,500 for surface connections. The results of the USA company water system leak detection work were announced and to everybody's surprise they found none.

Police Report

Police Chief Barney Issel gave a report to the council announcing there had been 35 tickets issued since the last council meeting. Six illegally parked vehicles had been towed and eight more have been tagged. He reported three incidents of domestic violence. He said there had been 8 calls related to dog problems including one by a woman reporting two dog bites to her children but was told the family dog was responsible.

Councilor Martha Weaver-Britell said the City needs to get bids out for the roof on the visitor center at Battle Rock Park. This roof is part of the massive remodeling of the center funded by grant money.

Police Commission member Pat Di Giacomo spoke to the council and told them the police commission held their first meeting on August 7. The council had earlier received a four page report from the police commission which was much appreciated by the council particularly Robert Warring who said he had

never seen anything like it in the 22 years he has lived in Port Orford. Chief Issel spoke to the council and said he wanted the city crew to remodel the police department space on overtime.

Robert Warring read a section from the minutes of the July 8 council meeting where the council authorized purchase of a receipt register for \$160. It has been not been purchased and Warring wanted to know why. Acting city manager Norma House will purchase it.

H.G.E. engineer Matt Gray gave a report on the water system improvement phase I improvement plans. He said the design is 70% complete. He noted that Alan Wagner had concerns about the condition of the Deady Street pump station and that it may not last the winter. Gray said the plans would be complete in September for the health department review and the rate study for the \$1.5 million dollar project. He said the goal is to achieve 75% financing through grant money. He mentioned the grantors require a rate review study comparing Port Orford rates to other cities and that the project would raise water rates.

Filing Deadline Nears


The deadline for filing for three open positions on the Port Orford City Council and the office of mayor is nearing. Filing petitions must be turned back into city manager Dotti Myers by **August 28**. In order to qualify for the November ballot you need to get a filing petition at city hall and then have it signed by 25 registered voters in the City of Port Orford. You must have been a resident of the City of Port Orford during the six months immediately preceding the election to run for office.

As of August 12 the only person turning in the signature petitions for city council was Ralph Donaldson whose supporters gathered 60 signatures for him. Others who have taken out and are circulating filing petitions are Jim Campbell and Ruth Jamieson for city council and Gary Doran for mayor.

The council positions and office of mayor are 4-year terms beginning Jan. 1, 1997.

Some wrote wonderful essays about their problems. One person simply wrote DEER in big letters, not giving their name or phone number for the drawing! Another stated "gardener's knees" and one person wrote they were the garden pest/problem. And speaking of the drawing, Carol Davis of Brookings won the watering wand, Kate Jewell from Gold Beach, the fish emulsion fertilizer, and Dot Matthews from Port Orford received gardening tools. It's great that we had a person from each of the areas of the county.

And before I forget, Happy Birthday to us! Oregon Master Gardeners are 20 years old this year! Twenty and still growing! Watch what we do in the next twenty!

Well, no pun intended, we had the Home*A*Syst well water testing for nitrates a couple of weekends ago. We had a couple of wells that showed moderate levels of nitrates, which is an indicator of possible other problems. It was suggested they have a Home*A*Syst assessment of their well and were given a list of labs that can check for bacterial problems for a reasonable charge. If you are interested, call the extension office and you can be put in touch with trained volunteers who can help with the assessment of your well and septic systems. And the list of labs is also available. It's the same phone number as for your gardening problems - 1-800-359-3586. Give us a call. Until next time, good gardening!

The city of Coquille will host a third household hazardous waste turn-in on Saturday, September 7 from 10am until 3:30pm at the Coquille High School parking lot. Items which are eligible to be collected include: automotive products such as antifreeze, motor oil, engine cleaners and transmission fluid, insecticides and pesticides, household products like oven cleaners, used batteries, drain cleaners, aerosol sprays and medicines, chemicals in workshops and hobby areas, and all kinds of paint. Usable paint will be recycled by the DEQ. There will also be a table where residents may leave unopened products to be recycled to those who might be able to use them.

For Curry County residents, a similar event will be held in Port Orford on Friday, September 6 from 10am until 2pm next to Sentry Market on the corner of Highway 101 and 15th Street. Internet Security

Is your password secure? Are you safe from someone breaking into your account and running up bills in your name or sending unauthorized messages addressed from you? For most people, the answer, unfortunately, is no. In a recent experiment, one local Internet subscriber did an informal experiment to see how many accounts they could access. (Note this was attempted only with non-Harborside customer accounts.) In about two hours, they had successfully logged onto more than 50 people's Internet accounts!

How can you protect yourself? Pick a good password! An article in the Communications of the ACM (CACM) in the mid-70's gave a scholarly dissertation on good and bad choices of passwords as well as how to break them.

Here are things a typical hacker would try. Different hackers might try these in different orders and may have other tricks up their sleeves. Most will have a program written to automate their hacking so all of the following can be done fairly quickly and easily while they go off and do something else. If you avoid using any of the following for a password, you will have avoided the worst of the danger.

Step 1: See if the userid and password are the same.

Step 2: Try the user's name, names of wives, children, and pets, possibly in

combinations and with or without initials (eg. "valerie", "kramer", "vkramer", "valeriekramer", "valevan", etc.)

Step 3: Try simple passwords like all the single letters and numbers, words like "Password", "open sesame" and simple combos like "aaa" or "abc" or "111" or "123" etc.

Step 4: If you know the person and know their interests, try words associated with that. For example, my love of cats is well known so one might try words like cat, kitten, pussy, pusscat, furrball, etc. You might also try dates including birth dates, anniversary dates, or important historical dates.

Step 5: Brute force begins. Run thru all the names in a "name the baby" book or a telephone book. Run thru all the words in a dictionary. Run thru all permutations of letters then letters and numbers.

Step 6: give up and look for an easier account to break in. This is usually done before completing step 5.

So, how can you make a password that is easy to remember but hard to break? One way is to take the first letter of each word of a memorable phrase. For example, if your favorite song is "Amazing Grace" you might use a password of "AGHSTS". To make this much harder, include one or more special symbols such as a period (.) or any of the symbols over the numbers on your keyboard. For example:

"AG\$HSTS".

You can change your own password but it is a bit "techy." Hopefully Harborside will post explicit directions on their site soon but meanwhile, you can call them at 800-680-8855 and ask them to do it for you.

Public Works In Turmoil Continued from Front Cover

Frank Smith gave the council an update on compliance with the grease trap ordinance. He said 11 food serving business had gotten together and purchased grease traps from Lance Cox at Coos Curry Supply. They will cost each business \$375 which was considerably less than other prices they were quoted. Arrangements have been made with a plumber to install them by September 10.

Judicial Appointment

The council moved on to appointment of a municipal court judge. Mayor Kennedy began the discussion by withdrawing her letter of application for the job. She said there was a much more qualified person who had submitted an application for the position. A motion was made and passed for Mayor Kennedy to serve as interim judge for the August 13 court session at a salary of \$200 over the objections of Robert Warring who wanted to pay her \$100. Ralph Donaldson referred to the police commission report and their recommendation of Christopher Dornor for judge. He made a motion to offer the job to Dornor at \$200 a month and included in the motion the advice of the police commission that he serve as probationary judge for three months and if the council finds his performance satisfactory hire him for a one year period with annual reviews. The motion passed 5-1 with George Kennedy dissenting. Dornor will

be sworn in at the special council session on August 27. He lives in Coos Bay and has had fifteen years experience in the insurance claims industry as well as holding a paralegal diploma from Century Business College in San Diego.

Visitor Center Lease

The council took up the issue of renewing the lease of the visitor center building in Battle Rock Park with the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber had submitted a letter requesting \$12,000 a year for five years to run the visitor center for the City. Some council members wondered whether this request was tongue in cheek or serious. A motion was made to appoint an impartial negotiating committee to discuss the lease with the Chamber of Commerce or any other group interested in running the visitor center. Mayor Kennedy appointed a three person committee consisting of Carl Eskelson, Tim Sparks and city manager Dotti Myers to represent the City in the negotiations.

Parks Master Plan Grant

The City received a grant from the United States Department of Agriculture for \$25,000 for a recreation master plan and preliminary engineering study for a community center building. The council made a motion and accepted the grant.

Bed Tax Ordinance

The City Council received a six page

letter from their attorney Carol Cyphers regarding the recently rewritten bed tax ordinance. Her letter only added confusion to the situation so the council tabled discussion of this issue until their September meeting.

New Business

The council passed a motion that acting city manager Norma House will be paid at the same rate as city manager Dotti Myers for the period of time she fills in for Myers. The council voted to give acting public works director Alan Wagner a pay raise to \$28,000 a year effective retroactively to August 1. The council authorized Norma House to advertise bids for the new roof at the visitor center at Battle Rock Park. The council heard from Rob Ashdown representing the North Curry Watershed Coordinating Committee regarding a bridge replace-

ment on the South Fork of Hubbard's Creek. The grant for the project is \$25,000. A motion was made to accept the grant. The project will have no cost for the city.

Ed McQuade was appointed to fill a vacancy on the parks commission. The city received a letter of resignation from the bed tax committee from Alan Mitchell. The council passed a motion on the recommendation of Martha Weaver-Britell to authorize but not require the next mayor or designee to attend the Rural Futures Forum next year at a cost to the city of \$250.

Tom Hamilton and Ralph Donaldson were appointed to the Public Utilities Commission.

The council will hold a special session on Tuesday, August 27, at 6:00pm, in the council chambers. Issues to be dealt with include the public works turnover of personal, the Deady Street pump sta-
