Council Reaches Consensus By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council held a public hearing last Wednesday concerning replacement of the destroyed sewer effluent field at Agate Beach.

KCM representative Ron Bush had earlier presented the council with the final draft report entitled "Wastewater Effluent Disposal System Predesign Study." Bush said his company had been hired by the city to look at different alternatives and many of those had fallen by the wayside.

Bush said the logical reaction was to stay away from using the ocean as an outfall. He spoke about some of the problems with a wetlands treatment system including that phosphorous and nitrates would still be a problem. He said wetlands don't treat water to the point it's absolutely clean. Councilor Robert Warring referred to three articles he had read in "Small Flows" magazine about wetlands. He said there are plants that can clean water to the level of drinking water. He said we hadn't done an exploration of a viable alternative.

Bush was asked where other cities dispose of their wastewater effluent. He said

the vast majority of cities discharge to rivers.

Joe Edney, Department of Environmental Quality wetlands specialist attended the meeting. He emphasized that wetlands take up a lot of area and that the State requires constructed wetlands to be lined. He said, "The cost will put you out of business." Edney remarked that he has been working on this project since 1985 when he wrote the original grant. Edney said there were two viable alternatives including a community drainfield and an ocean outfall. Edney said he had been against the community drain field but had been overruled (in 1990). He said you couldn't build a drain field on an unstable landform. Edney concluded decisively "You have only one option left – an ocean outfall."

Councilor Norm Leeling referred to himself as a biologist and that he believes in wetlands. However he has become convinced we can not go to constructed wetlands. Councilor Jim Campbell concurred with Leeling "100%." Al Affonso asked how economically prudent is a wetlands. He received no answer. Affonso added that our water and sewer bills are exorbitant. Councilor Jane Cramer said she would rather not see the effluent going into the ocean but she sees no alternative. She said the city does not have the time to

explore wetlands. Councilor Leeling said the city had destroyed its credibility for wastewater alternatives. He said he doesn't want to engage in a war with the DEQ over wetlands and wants to explore ocean outfall alternatives.

The question was asked what is the downside of pumping effluent into the ocean. Joe Edney said the City of Brookings had done an analysis of their ocean outfall. He said it showed the biological community was more vital than before the outfall. He said there is a higher nutrient level and the animals love it. Norm Leeling said there had been no good long-term studies on ocean outfalls.

The council turned to consideration of the three ocean outfall alternatives including Tichenor Cove; Agate Beach directional drilling or Agate Beach attached to rock. Jim Campbell said he didn't favor Tichenor Cove because the operating costs were higher. Robert Warring said he was in favor of directional drilling. No matter what alternative the council reaches an Environmental Assessment (EA) or an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will be required. An EA will cost around \$250,000 while and EIS will cost at least \$1,000,000 and take up to four season's worth of study to complete. Edney said the DEQ intent is to go with an Environ-

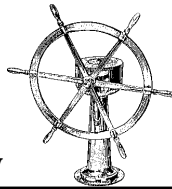
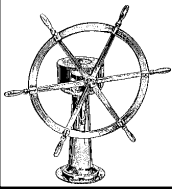

Cape Blanco Airport

The Cape Blanco Airport Association, (CBAA) an organization of local Curry County citizens dedicated to preserving the Cape Blanco Airport, and furthering aviation and the economic activity at Cape Blanco airport, today challenged the members of the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce to join them in investing in a permanent racing facility. Recent publicity would seem to suggest an "anti racing" sentiment among members of this organization in regard to the hobby club racing that has been held at the airport before the cancellation of this event by Oregon State Aeronautics. Rather than being "anti-racing" the group feels it would be better characterized as "pro airport". The main problem the group has with racing at the airport is with the destruction of the over 50 year old surface by the racing activity. CBAA feels the damage is obvious to anyone not wearing their rose colored glasses. CBAA also feels the facility will not be suitable for aviation or racing if racing continues. Upon learning of the race cancellation, CBAA scheduled a "fly in" for Cape Blanco Airport in an effort to develop an aviation related event to replace the racing. They feel this event has

an excellent chance at succeeding because of the North Bend airshow occurring over the same weekend, attracting aircraft from all over the west coast.

The group is sure many people in the Port Orford area are tired of having their hand out, looking for Government assistance to artificially "jump start" the economy. CBAA believes it can suggest a permanent solution to the racing event, and at the same time create a permanent, viable boost to the local economy. It is felt this can be done locally with private funds, and a little assistance from Curry County. Toward this end, members of the Cape Blanco Airport Association are stepping forward to pledge the first \$50,000 investment toward development of the County 60 acres adjacent to the Cape Blanco airport as a permanent racing facility, capable of accommodating various types of racing events. CBAA challenges members of the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce to match CBAA members contributions totaling \$50,000 and raise \$250,000 to launch this project immediately. An investment of \$25,000 per member is suggested, which would only require eight other members of the Chamber to invest to reach a goal of \$250,000

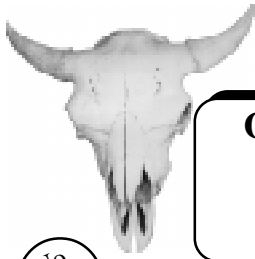

and kick this project off. CBAA feels certain those members of the Chamber who have avidly supported the racing and whose businesses have the most to gain will invest. With this fund in hand, CBAA feels the support of the county in making the 60 acres adjacent to the airport available for this use is virtually assured, based on the comments of County Commissioners. To keep the racing facility locally owned and controlled, CBAA feels no outside investment should be allowed. Based on the figures supplied by various Chamber of Commerce members, the single racing event brings from \$200,000 to \$250,000 to the local economy. A permanent facility with six or more events, and five more customers for the facility besides Team Continental, the hobby club racing group currently using the airport, could be well over a million dollar boon to the local economy as well as returning the investors a decent return on their investment. CBAA feels this project will create jobs, be good for the community, good for the area economy, and serve the interests of all parties involved. CBAA feels now is the chance to go beyond the talking arena and move to the action arena. CBAA sincerely hopes members of the Chamber will respond to this invitation quickly, so the project can begin immediately.

Lake Outlet Opened

Garrison Lake was back to a critically high water level on Monday afternoon. Heavy rains the previous days and high tides and big swells combined to send fresh and salt water into the lake from all directions. Ocean water poured in at the outlet and across the dunes adjacent to Lakeshore Drive. The City of Port Orford brought in Joe Marsh and his D-6 caterpillar to open a channel Monday afternoon. Public Works Director Jerry McNurlin was down on the beach with Marsh as he started digging a channel around 3:45pm and water started flowing out of the lake at 5:00pm. The channel he cut was at a 90-degree angle to the ocean at the outlet and this time when the lake water started running out it wasn't in a dramatic torrent – at least not at 5:00pm.

This is the third time during the 1998-99 storm season that the City of Port Orford or Curry County has had to physically

intervene and open up an outlet for the lake to partially drain. The city has an emergency permit from the Division of State Lands to open a lake outlet.

Tuesday morning, 8:10am: The “bottom” has dropped out of the lake overnight. At the 12th Street boat ramp and dock there was **no** water under the fishing dock. However several hours later the lake level was again rising. One question for city officials is what effect is the raising and lowering of the lake levels and increased salinity having on the animal and plant life in the lake and immediate area.

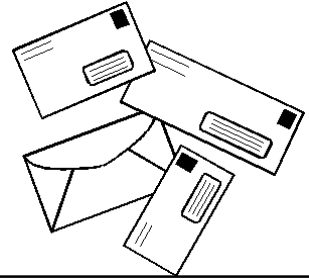

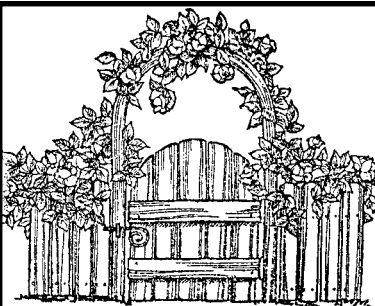

Yellow Alert

The American Red Cross blood inventory has hit a three-month low. More than 85 hospitals are notified of Yellow Alert for all blood types. A Yellow Alert on all types of blood, particularly type O positive and type O negative, has been announced. Blood orders for all blood types are filled at only 70 percent to more than 85 hospitals. The blood inventory has dropped more than 1,000 pints below optimal levels. Last week, red cell transfusions, were 600 pints above normal. During the holiday season, increased blood transfusion rates are typically due to more frequent traffic accidents and other traumas. In addition, regional hos-

pitals have recently performed several liver transplants, which may require 60 to 80 pints of blood each, and cancer patients, people with sickle cell disease, premature infants. 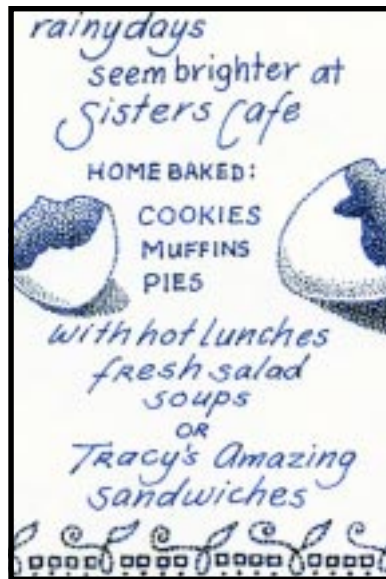

PGP Signing Party

PGP (Pretty Good Privacy) is an encryption program used to protect the privacy of one's files, email, etc. It is widely used on the Internet and may be downloaded free from www.pgp.com. The system uses two keys, a private one that only you know, and another public key that is used by others to encrypt messages to you and to validate messages from you.

The problem then is how does one assure oneself that the public key does indeed belong to the person claiming it? The answer is to have others "sign" it by encrypting it with their keys thus adding their vote that the key is valid. The more people who attest to its validity, the more likely it is that it is, indeed, valid.

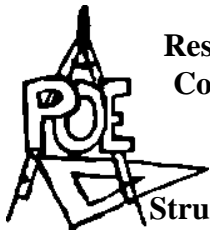

Recycling By Paula Cracas

I am a dedicated fan of recycling and worry our landfills are being clogged with products which take a long time or never break down; or are a hazard to our environment; or are wasted when they could take on a second life. Every day in America we send 60,000 garbage trucks to landfills. If you become (or are) a dedicated recycler, your garbage will be greatly reduced and the planet will appreciate less stuff going into the landfills.

A good place to start is by buying products with no packaging or minimal packaging. Buy products in bulk instead of packages inside of packages. Packaging accounts for 32% to 50% of the trash in landfills. Most packaging contains toxic inks and heavy metals and costs you between 12 cents to 30 cents of every dollar you spend. Plus if you buy in bulk, you'll save money. For example, organic oats cost 99 cents/lb. or six cents an ounce. Quaker Oats cost \$1.28/lbs. or 8 cents an ounce. Regular oats in bulk are 3 cents an ounce. Instant oats cost 28 cents an ounce. Avoid single-serving packages.

Always bring your own grocery bags when you go shopping. I made some big canvas bags and take them with me every time I go to the store. If you don't bring your own, when the grocery clerk asks "paper or plastic" say paper. only 3% of plastic bags get recycled compared to more than 70% of paper bags. Always choose packaging that can be recycled. Use produce bags over and over. Does it make sense to bag your bananas in the produce bags and then throw the bag away after only one use? Resources, like petroleum, go into plastic. Simply rinse the bags, dry them on your clothesline,

and take them with you on your next shopping trip.

Buck's Sentry will take 5 cents off your grocery bill if you bring back one of their big paper bags. Some stores in Coos Bay will take 5 cents off your grocery bill for any and each bag you bring for your purchases. If you have extra plastic bags, Common Good and the Senior Center will be glad to have them. You can recycle brown paper bags at Sister's or at the landfill. Every time you go to the dump, if you take along stuff to recycle, you will reduce the bill to dump the rest of your trash. A good deal!

The true cost of most supermarket products isn't listed on the price tag. Environmental damage, dwindling resources, loss of animal species, and consumer health problems haven't been factored in. We pay for these hidden costs a little bit everyday with the fading quality of our lives and in big chunks of income at tax time. Recycle! You can make a difference.

mental Assessment.

Edney told the council it has always been the position of DEQ that if the city is making progress on a new effluent disposal system they will grant extensions as far as when the project has to be completed.

Ron Bush told the council that directional drilling from Agate Beach is his preferred alternative. Edney concurred. However on page 19 of the report it is stated that the feasibility of directional drilling must be proved by the use of jet probing to determine the type of material they will be drilling through. KCM estimates this cost at \$60,000.

The council at this point was ready to vote on directional drilling at Agate Beach but held off since this was only a public hearing. They will formalize this consensus at their January 25 special meeting which will start at 6:30pm.

A Seasonal Affair **By Graeme Graydon**



If you have waited till now to do something about protecting yourself from winter-season colds, you're probably in step with the rest of the Nation, but it's a bit late. There are some folk who have a high health credit in their account, they never have to worry about colds. I wonder if it comes from several generations of reasonably healthful lifestyles. Others have to go through an annual ordeal of misery, medications and discomfort.

All my life I have taken notice of anyone who could give me a clue as to how to handle this common illness without having to rely on commercial or professional help.

The naturopathic doctors, (who actually healed people), understood that the seasons should be observed in the body. For winter they prepared by cleaning up and building reserves to cope with the lack of fresh foods. The original Spring Tonic was a herbal mixture designed to throw off the effects of eating preserved, salted, smoked and stale foods eaten in winter.

In my home, until I was 17, the closing-in of the autumnal days signaled the beginning of a regime which was a normal part of my life. There was an early morning yeast drink, made the night before, a serving-spoonful --"Open Wider!" of a dark, thick goo that was mostly cod liver oil, minerals and plant extracts, (it was so sticky, it had to be chewed off the spoon like soft toffee), and each evening after a bath, five minutes back and front in the purple/green light of a UV ray lamp - yes, we had tans all winter - all over.

But if you haven't done anything to clean up and prepare, and you don't have a high health credit, you might like a few ideas to help you through a cold.

For those weird people who think that they should and can take care of themselves:

- 1) At the first warning sign - stop and look at your life. What's going on? What should I or shouldn't I be doing? Take action, use common sense and Rest.
- 2) Take the toxic pressure off. (Remember that bacteria and viruses don't move in unless there is a toxic environment). If you smoke cut way back and chew a stick of cinnamon. Clean out, whether you like the idea or not, an enema can do great good. Learn about it.
- 3) Stop eating heavy, sugary, fatty or processed foods. Use home-made soups, fresh vegetables or fruit juices, salads. Lots of Good water and herbal teas. Rest, avoid TV - give your mind a break.
- 4) Consider the hot toddy trick for the beginning of a fever.
- 5) There are many ways to use fresh lemon juice, raw garlic/onion, ginger, Chinese herbs, Vitamin C, peppermint, Echinacea, oils of eucalyptus, melaleuca, (tea tree), peppermint as supplements, drinks, baths and packs.

If you only manage the first 3 steps - you will have done what is most important - taken care of yourself.
