Time Changes by Valerie Jean Kramer

This coming Sunday, April 4, marks the start of 1999's "Daylight Savings Time." Clocks should be set ahead one hour at 2:00am Sunday morning. This change will persist until the last Sunday in October.

In a forward-looking move, appropriate to our entry to the 21st century (whether you believe it starts in 2000 or 2001) something new is happening this year the way we tell time will also change. Although little publicity has been seen on this yet, time will officially begin being measured in a metric-like manner befitting our global civilization.

Beginning Sunday, we will be using Swatch Internet Time. Instead of 24 hours, 60 minutes, and 60 seconds, we will have a day consisting of 1000 "beats". Each beat will thus represent about 1 1/2 minutes. Decimal numbers can be used for finer resolution - 0.01 beats = .864 seconds. An hour is 1000/24 = 41.667 beats long. The beats start with @000 (beat zero) when it is midnight in Biel, Switzerland. @999 is the last beat before the next day starts over with @000. Thus noon in Biel is beat @500, 6:00am is beat @250, 6pm is @750, etc.

The advantage of this is that the same beat number is used everywhere in the world. When it is @500 in Biel Switzerland, it's also @500 in Los Angeles, New York, London, Tokyo, ... everywhere! Thus you never need to worry about converting times when communicating with people in other parts of the world. (You still need to keep in mind whether @380 is their lunch time or the middle of their night!)

You can read more about all this at http://www.swatch.com/ or http://www.swatch.com/ or http://www.ryan.thiessen.com/swatch/about.htm or any of a number of other web sites. You can download programs to display the new time on your computer until you can go out and buy new clocks and wristwatches. The program will be voluntary at first with the government using Internet Time for official business. By the end of 2000, the old time methods are expected to be phased out.

There's just one other thing you should remember about this time - although much that I've said here is the gospel truth, it's also April Fool's Day! Happy April everyone!

The Oregon State Parks are currently asking the public their opinions on what they want from their local Curry County

State Parks during the next 20 years. State Park's staff held public meetings on March 8 and 9 in Gold Beach where they heard comments from the public. They will accept written public comments until April 23 and will present a draft Master Plan in Gold Beach on May 4.

The north Curry County State Parks that were discussed at this meeting include Floras Lake Natural Area (includes Blacklock Point), Cape Blanco, Port Orford Cedar, Paradise Point, Port Orford Heads and Humbug Mountain. They are all part of the Cape Blanco Management Unit. Cary Sutter is the park manager for this unit.

The state parks in North Curry County constitute one set of the boundaries of "my world." Not the world I own but the world I'm familiar with and inhabit. These are the places I go to when I want to take a hike and because of their close proximity to Port Orford are where I visit over and over again. I didn't think much about this until I read the article in last week's paper entitled State Park Plans by Cathy Boden and realizied how important these parks are to me. Boden is leading a series of walks on Monday afternoon at 4:00pm, starting at the Adventure Center in Buffington Park. The purpose of the walks is to familiarize people with our

City Budget Sessions Bv Evan Kramer

Port Orford City Administrator Johnny Alexander said Port Orford city budget hearings for the 1999/2000 fiscal year would begin in mid-April and by law have to be completed no later than June 30. The budget committee is composed of all seven city council members and one citizen member for each of them. If you're interested in being on the city budget committee contact Alexander or Mayor Gary Doran.

Alexander said he and Curry County Roadmaster Dan Crumley are working together on attaining a one-year permit from the Division of State Lands authorizing the city and county to open the lake. The emergency permit the city and county have been operating under is good for two months and expires on April 15. When asked what the level of Garrison Lake will be this summer Alexander said everyone has a different opinion.

Recently the City of Port Orford hosted a meeting of concerned agencies about the Garrison Lake problems. One agency that was invited and didn't attend was the Division of State Lands, which issues the permit to open the lake.

The group included Dr. Paul Komar, and representatives from Senator Gordon Smith's office, Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, Bureau of Land Management, State Parks, Army Corps of Engineers, League of Women Voters, Curry County Road Department, State Health Division, H.G.E. Engineering Firm and Stuntzner Engineering. City administrator Johnny Alexander chaired the meeting.

Alexander stated in his two-page report that "the consensus was reached that our current method of lake control was most effective for the next couple of seasons." Alexander ended his report with a recap of the meeting. The four things that came out of it were as follows:

- need to determine maximum lake 1. level.
- City and County jointly proceed with permanent permit to open lake as needed.
- Continue using bulldozer option to open lake.
- Continue searching for permanent solution.

The City of Port Orford public works department took advantage of temporary low lake levels last week to being riprapping the area adjacent to the Arizona Street bridge where water from Mill Creek enters Garrison Lake. Arizona Street between Madrona and Geer Circle has been subject to slumping and cracking because of the rapid lake drawdowns of this past winter and early spring.

On another matter, Alexander recently received a letter from Pete Smart with the

Curry Transfer and Recycling Company. Smart wrote that his company is moving the container to the Port Orford Transfer Station which is open Tuesday through Saturday, from 10:00am to 5:00pm.

Tax Talk By Cheryl Thorp

Curry County Commissioner

It's budget time again and the talk around town is that the budget of projected funding for fiscal year 98-99, ending June 30, 1999 for Curry County is short of funds by approximately \$133,000. As a fiscal conservative, I am going to seem downright stingy when budget time comes around on April 20.

I would appreciate some ideas about renaming the tax codes listed on your property tax bills. If you want to talk more about this and get a chance, stop by the Tax Collector's office and pick up one of those pie charts so we can all refer to the same facts and figures. Look at your tax bills and, don't panic, just see if you can quickly and easily pick out how many dollars you paid for your County Government Services. Let's see if you know which ones they are.

As a service to your community, we, the "County", have approved Special Districts, besides school districts, which serve special needs throughout Curry County. These road districts, sewer districts, water districts and so on are created by the people in certain areas to serve special needs. We also collected those taxes on behalf of each district. We "the County"

give the funds safekeeping and investment return on behalf of the taxpayer. Collecting taxes is not just a favor to taxpayers but is also a legal requirement.

Later, I hope to discuss the tax rate of .5996 per \$1000 of evaluation. This rate works out to roughly \$60 per year for every \$100,000 of assessed evaluation of property. If your property is valued at \$50,000 you will be responsible for about \$30 in taxes for Curry County Government Services.

Of all the property tax dollars collected by Curry County approximately 6.64% are kept to fund county services. Therefore, if you pay \$1000 per year in property taxes, \$66.40 of that goes to County Government Services which employs approximately 200 people.

DeFazio Blasts Rate Hikes

With most government oversight of the cable rates set to expire at the end of March, Representative Peter DeFazio introduced legislation to freeze cable TV rates and require the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) to investigate cable price increases. Cable rates have risen over four times the rate of inflation since enactment of the 1996 Telecommu-

nications Act, which deregulated in the cable industry.

"A funny thing happens when you deregulate a monopoly," DeFazio said. "Consumers get shafted."

In the 1980's the cable industry went unregulated by the federal government until consumer outrage over rising costs and poor service prompted Congress to approve legislation in 1992 to regulate the industry. However, in a dramatic reversal Congress caved in to industry pressure and deregulated the industry in the 1996 Telecommunications Act.

Congressman DeFazion was one of only 16 House Members voting against the 1996 telecommunications deregulation legislation. "The Telecom Act was a prime example of Washington special interests beating out the little guy," DeFazio argued. "The cable companies came crying to Congress and got what they wanted – a license to raise prices and a regulatory agency that refused to hold them accountable. My bill shifts the balance of power back to the people by putting consumer's rights first."

The 1996 Telecom Act reduces federal regulation of the cable industry through March 31, 1999, at which point the industry will be almost completely unrestricted. After this date, the government will continue to regulate prices only for basic cable service. More than 90% of cable subscribers receive expanded service.

The field trip will put what was learned in the lecture to practical application. Be sure to dress appropriately.

The workshops are presented by the South Coast/Lower Rogue Watershed Councils in cooperation with Curry Soil and Water District, OSU Extension and Southwestern Oregon Community College.

Letting Go By Graeme Graydon

I'm sure we have an agenda to complete in life, people to interact with, things to do, places to be, left-overs to clean up, lessons to learn. I expected a nice, orderly progression. But a crowded agenda means that as soon as an experience has been lived, I'm moved abruptly to the next phase with or without the trappings of what went before. I have learned that it is best to let go completely of what has been and surrender to the new experience. By doing this, I have been able to cram several lifetimes into this one already – I notice other people doing the same thing.

The difficult part is disconnecting from the familiar, the comfortable even if it was miserable. Think of the Monarch Butterfly cocoon. Inside the jewel-like case is a little guy who was born from an egg, grew into a caterpillar doing happy caterpillary things, who retired into an exquisite hideaway. One day he gets an urge, the beautiful casing breaks and he struggles out all wet and crumpled. I wonder what he would think if he could get hold of a mirror. Within a couple of hours however, he transforms into a creature of flight and heady sensuality. Seems to me that we humans get to a point of cocoonlike comfort and do everything in our power to stay there, holding tightly onto all that we have, never dreaming that there could be more

In the early 90's, I had a powerful lesson in this area. For no other reason than that I wanted it, I decided to learn how to jump out of a plane with a parachute. The training was arduous and boring, jumping repeatedly off a high deck onto deep gravel learning to land safely, and practicing shuffling my butt out the door of a plane, planting both feet on a landing wheel while working my way along the strut until I just dangled there under the wing. My instructors described the many ways in which I could kill myself – very

encouraging, but the worst was having to sign a waiver of all my Rights. If anything unplanned happened, like landing on power lines, fences, roofs, greenhouses or even a cow – I would be responsible for any damage – dead or alive. I began to feel like some kind of flying hazardous waste.

At 3000', squatting on the floor, helmeted and trussed up like a chicken, someone tapped me on the shoulder. I wormed my way out into the slipstream and onto the wheel, clawing my way out along the strut. This was not easy at all. This was crazy, what did I need this for? I should lose weight. Somehow I made it without falling off, hanging by my hands under the wing. I looked back into the comfort of the cabin hoping for reassurance, but the pilot gave me a "For God's Sake Do It!" signal. I arched my head back, closed my eyes - and let go. In that instant I entered an incredible, silent peace, I transcended into a place of tranquility – you could say I was "blissed out." But a voice crackling from my chest pocket receiver brought me back, "Check your chute." The colorful kite looked like the wing of an emerging butterfly, crumpled around the edges – I did things with the shrouds and it popped open all the way. Well, I landed on my behind right in the middle of the target with the chute collapsing gently over my head. I just sat there under it unable to stop laughing. Later that night I began to hear words, a new mantra in the stillness of my mind:

Holding on is very hard to do, letting go is easy.

Canopy Project Designs

The Curry County Commissioners invite all of Curry County to the unveiling of project designs and the final report of the Portico Group scheduled for Tuesday, April 6, from 2:00-4:00pm, at the Gold Beach City Hall.

The Portico Group has been working on preliminary architecture and engineering for the project since December. That work has resulted in concept sketches, operations budgets, patronage forecasts, economic impacts, and construction timetables and budgets.

Bill Roberts, Curry County Commissioner, said, "It is important that the people of Curry County get to know what this project is about. It has been designed for the benefit of the people who live here and around their stated concerns."

The project will not use local taxpayer generated funds. Rather, the project intends to annually generate funds for the county general fund.

The Canopy Project is forecast by Dean Runyan Associates (working under Portico) to create 110 jobs in Curry County by year five of operation and to generate

local state parks. Still remaining the next two Mondays are walks at Port Orford State Heads and Humbug Mountain.

This past Sunday despite the cold, wind and threat of heavy rains I drove down to Humbug Mountain campground and parked the truck at the beginning of the Old Highway 101 trailhead. I let Myrtle the dog out of the back of the truck and off we walked from the campground for a short walk up to the crest of the trail overlooking the new Brush Creek Bridge. One of the highlights of this walk is the waterfall you walk over on a wooden bridge which this time of year is running strong and full. The trail is paved because it travels along the route Highway 101 used to take before it was realigned to the west in the early 1960's. The distance from trail head in the campground north to where the trail comes out on Highway 101 south of Rocky Point is 2.6 miles. I've walked this trail many times and continue to enjoy being surrounded by old growth Douglas Fir, Myrtle trees and lots of varieties of ferns.

For those more adventurous a short walk through the campground leads to a human

sized culvert under Highway 101 and the beginning of the three-mile long Humbug Mountain Trail. The first half-mile is the steepest and will wind the average person including me but it gets a little easier after that. The trail breaks off in two directions somewhere around the 1½ mile point and you can walk to the top of Humbug Mountain one way and walk down a different way through a Myrtle forest.

Once you've completed your jaunt up Humbug Mountain (and everybody should do it at least once) there is another trail to take. This one begins near the entrance of the campground and follows along Brush Creek south to the day use area (another Myrtle forest) and further along to the gazebo where many weddings and parties have taken place.

The Port Orford Heads State Park is the site of the former Coast Guard lifeboat station which was closed in 1963. Currently the Point Orford Heritage Society has been painstakingly restoring the barracks building for a museum of local history. One of the highlights of this museum besides a wealth of Coast Guard history will be the display of part of Ernie Malasky's pharmaceutical collection. Those of you who used to shop at the Port

Orford Pharmacy when Ernie owned and operated it must remember his treasure trove of old bottles, pestles and things related to medicines. The Malaskey collection is far too big to display at one time but it will be a treat to see some of his collection again. I spoke with Heritage Society vice-president Frank Cramer and he told me the group is hoping to open the museum one or two days a week this summer. Other buildings at the Heads State Park include the officer in charge house and the garages. There is a pleasant paved trail out to where the "watch" tower once stood and is a great spot for viewing the ocean and taking photos. Volunteers have also opened up two new trails (not paved) one of which offers a good view of the cement weirs and pillers that once protected the Coast Guard life boats in Nellie's Cove. The boathouse was vandalized and burned down. The other trail offers a view to the north and an interesting insight into the destruction of the dunes and bluffs at Agate Beach.
