Support Your Volunteers

This Sunday the Port Orford Volunteer Fire Department and Port Orford Volunteer Ambulance hold their first pancake breakfast in two years at the city fire station. I started thinking about what it would be like if you had a fire at your house or were suffering a medical emergency. You or someone else in your family dashes to the telephone and dials 9-1-1 and either no one answers or worse yet no fire or ambulance crews were available. But that scenario isn't going to happen in Port Orford because of the presence of a well trained volunteer fire department and ambulance crew in our rural coastal community. They make life better and safer for all of us. The presence of a fire department also lowers your homeowner insurance rates.

The volunteer ambulance crew has been busy lately with many emergency calls. Anyone who has availed themselves of the ambulance services is grateful they can dial 9-1-1 and know that a crew will get the call on their pagers. These calls don't always come in at convenient times. Lynda Foster, a member of the ambulance crew and the fire department they

recently had a call at 3:30am. That's when many of us are in our deepest sleep content to know we won't be bothered. Yet when the ambulance crew gets the call the comfort of home and a warm bed are quickly abandoned as they get dressed and head down to the ambulance bay to get the vehicle started and begin their run.

A while back the volunteer fire department responded to a call of house fire at Idaho and 16th Streets. It may have been 6:00am on a Saturday morning but show up they did and in strength. The fire was a difficult one and many fire fighters stayed at scene for several hours. They weren't paid anything for the privilege of putting out this fire and cleaning up afterwards. They did it because they are members of a large network of volunteers who are the ones responsible in large part for making Port Orford and North Curry County work.

The monies raised from the pancake breakfast this Sunday morning will go for equipment for the fire department and ambulance crew. Foster told me the fire department is saving for a new and better Jaws of Life while the ambulance will use the money for additional radios.

By showing up Sunday at the pancake breakfast you can both enjoy a nice breakfast and say thankyou to the people who

are there to help you in an emergency.

Boat Coming Home

An old friend will be coming home to Port Orford soon. Last Tuesday night at the Port of Bandon meeting the Port commission agreed to give a Coast Guard life saving boat back to Port Orford. The boat is currently on display in the Port of Bandon parking lot adjacent to Bandon Fisheries.

The 36-foot long life saving boat saw Coast Guard service in Port Orford where it was kept ready for emergencies in the boathouse in Nellie's Cove.

The Point Orford Heritage Society will take possession of the historic rescue vessel. It will be stored in Jim Rhodes salvage yard until the Heritage Society and the State Parks can agree where it will be placed at Port Orford Heads State Park. The Heritage Society also wants a carport type cover built for the boat before it goes on display.

Frank Cramer, vice president of the Heritage Society, was instrumental in bringing this life saving boat back to Port Orford. He was justifiably thrilled on Tuesday night after the Bandon Port Commission agreed to give it to the Heritage Society.

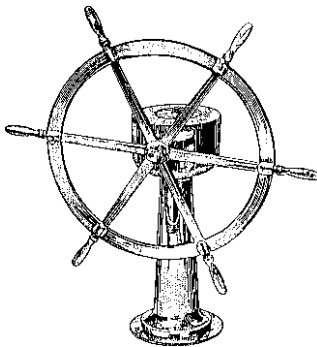

Chamber Supports Dredging By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce board of directors met last Wednesday at the Port and Starboard Restaurant. Chamber office manager Nancy Phillips gave a report on the recently held Governor's Conference on Tourism. She met many new people and was very enthusiastic about the conference. Her office report for the visitor center in March showed 401 letters for visits, 701 visitors to the center, 80 e-mails and 102 phone calls.

Chamber president Jay Stoler reported to the board the results of the two advisory votes the Chamber recently conducted. By a 19-0 vote Chamber members voted to write a letter to the Army Corps of Engineers supporting a dredge management plan for the Port of Port Orford and keeping the Port open. By a 12-7 vote they endorsed the Canopy Project. President Stoler wrote the two letters.

Jay Stoler updated the board on the tire situation at Cape Blanco State Airport. Team Continental had come down to Port Orford a week earlier and taken some but not all of the tires which were used as barriers at the annual Labor Day races.

They left between 500-600 tires at the Airport. Stoler has been in communication with ODOT Director Grace Crunican's office about help with the tire removal. Stoler made it clear the remaining tires are Team Continental's responsibility. Stoler will write a letter to Team Continental asking them to resolve this problem. ODOT had previously ordered them removed from Airport property.

Wilbur Green gave a Fourth of July Jubilee report. He emphasized that the Jubilee committee needs new blood if not this year definitely next year.

Jay Stoler gave a report on the Arts and Seafood Festival, which will be held over Labor Day weekend. He said some new events this year will include crab races and bike races. He said more artists and crafters would be involved this year.

The board discussed the upcoming circus performance at Driftwood Elementary School on May 16.

Jay Stoler announced that Mike Hewitt and Bob Harvey would be the invited guest speakers at the Chamber membership meeting on Monday, April 26, at the Paradise Café. They will discuss the Canopy Project.

Rabies Reported

The Curry County Health Department confirms that two Curry County residents in the Agness area have been exposed to rabies through contact with a sick cow; they are being treated preventively with rabies vaccine. It is speculated that the cow may have been bitten by an infected bat, as bats are the primary source of rabies infection in Oregon.

Rabies is a disease that is fatal to human beings and most mammals. It is preventable in domestic animals through vaccinations. Rabies vaccination and licensing is required for all dogs over 6 months of age.

The best protection against rabies includes two factors:

1. Avoid close contact with wildlife and with unfamiliar domesticated animals.
2. Vaccinate your cats and dogs. Unvaccinated cats and dogs are vulnerable to bites by infected wildlife and thus can bring the disease into contact with humans.

Unprovoked animal bites should be reported to the Sheriff's office and to the Public Health Department (247-7011). Wild animals that appear sick should be reported to the Fish and Wildlife Department at 541-888-5515. Questions about farm animals can be addressed to the Department of Agriculture. High Tech Children By Graeme Graydon



One of my great pleasures as director of a small museum in New Zealand, was to conduct programs for classes of school children either in the museum or out in the bush. I was never trained to be a teacher, but because of my position in the museum, I was expected to be one – I had to ‘wing it’ a lot of times. They taught me that healthy children are incredibly aware of what is going on around them and that I could learn much from them. I had a class of 10 year olds in the museum one day, taking them through the basics of

what life would have been like 500 years earlier, using displays of artifacts from the past, all gathered locally. Many of the pieces were in counter-type displays that the children could lean over to get a really good look. Some objects were still highly charged with a bio-magnetic energy reflecting the nature of the person who last owned or used them – a kind of life force/personality impressed into or around the object. For some reason this day, without saying a word about the ‘energies’ I invited the children to hold the hands, palms down, an inch or two above the glass counter-tops, over the artifacts beneath, and move slowly from one to another. I showed them how and then moved away.

“Wow! Feel this! – I don’t like this one, this feels happy! – this doesn’t do anything – Let me do that one again!” In a moment the kids were rushing around trying to feel their favorite piece. I watched their instant, unerring response to something most of their parents didn’t know about and wouldn’t be comfortable with if they did. It was natural to the children. Another time, I led 10 year olds – about 40 of them to an old Maori village site, high on a bush-covered hill. You could still see the outlines of the house sites, mounds and ditches amongst the trees

and ferns. It had a beautiful, happy feel about it – quite unusual. After the long hot climb to the shady site, I asked the kids to spread out, sit down quietly and close their eyes for a few minutes. For a while the drowsy afternoon silence returned touched only by the chattering and bell-like sounds of the bush birds. Then a little girl began to giggle-in the silence she could hear other children laughing-another heard a “sort of flute,” several others heard chanting and dogs yapping, children singing and playing. These modern children tapped into the sounds of village life in a place not occupied for a hundred years. All of the kids were enthralled and happy to be in an energy that persisted from another time – or was it a parallel time? I didn’t need to explain anything.

Twenty five years have slipped by since I observed the natural brilliance of children, able to discriminate and find their own way by their own instincts. We now have a high tech society that is expected to become more high tech. I wonder if anyone will encourage the natural high tech abilities that are normal to healthy children or will our society continue to reprogram them with “useful” information. In a kinder world, I’m sure we’ll see much much more respect and concern for the minds of our children and much less effort to make them turn out just like us.
