New Animal Control
Off to a Fast Start!

Animal Control Changes By Evan Kramer



Big changes have been made in the Curry County Animal Control Department. Ted Hawkinson retired as Animal Control Officer on June 28. The animal

control department was switched from being part of the Sheriff's Department and in his budget to being under the supervision and budget of the Curry County Commissioners on July 1. The commissioners hired Charles Garayalde as the new animal control officer. He will work twenty hours a week. Garayalde worked as Manager and Animal Control Officer at the Healdsburg Animal Shelter for five years from 1989 to 1994. He will begin working for Curry County on July 22.

Olds said other changes in the animal control department are the animal shelter in Gold Beach will be open seven days a week, from 8:45am to 3:45pm. Al Pearson is running the animal shelter as part of a work release program from the community justice center. Olds said that in the first week of July more dogs were adopted out than the entire month of June when Hawkinson ran the animal shelter. Olds stated his goal for the department was to

put down no more dogs. He said the Multnomah County Oregon Humane Society had called him and offered to give a second chance to any dogs held in the Curry County shelter over 30 days.

Most importantly to North Curry County residents, Commissioner Olds stated Garayalde will be in the North part of the County twice a week at minimum and will respond to calls for service. He will be driving around in a little brown animal control truck with a couple of cages on the back.

I can't thank Lloyd Olds and his fellow commissioners enough for these changes in the animal control department. It's one of the best actions they've taken since they were elected.

Arizona North Slide Repair By Evan Kramer

The Oregon Department of Transportation has taken a proactive approach to the Arizona North Slide on Highway 101 at Milepost 312. They're fixing the problem before the highway slides down the hill.

Jerry Gregory, Oregon Department of Transportation Area 3 Maintenance Manager, took me for a first hand tour of the slide repair work last week. As we drove south towards the Arizona North slide he pointed out the problems with the

Reinhard Creek slide. He said it was unusual how the slide was happening under the bridge. We then got to the North Arizona Slide work site where the contractor, Freeman Rock, has set up their headquarters. The problem they're attempting to fix is that the hillside is saturated with water and is composed on the surface of serpentine, a substance which moves when wet. ODOT's intention is to divert water away from the slide area. To accomplish this Freeman Rock will install over six miles of 1 1/2 inch diameter white plastic pipe and several hundred feet of culverts. Gregory referred to the work in progress as "dewatering the slide mass." He went on to say ODOT was trying to prevent "catastrophic road closures" similar to the one that occurred on the Arizona South Slide in April 1993. Part of the job Freeman Rock has contracted for is realigning and smoothing the Highway. This work is not scenduled for completion until May 31, 2000. The date for completion of the installation of the pipes



The Zoo By Graeme Graydon



Meditation is something everyone can do – but not everyone learns formally–I did. After several years of practice my class was

taken to Los Angeles for the next step. Our teacher surprised us one night - asking us to pack a lunch, go the LA Zoo at opening time to meditate on a highly organized schedule in front of the cages of different species of animals. We would be kept busy till closing time – for several days. Meditate in Public! Just a minute, it had always been a quiet, private thing. What would people think. As I entered the gates to the Zoo, my natural curiosity got all mixed up with the anxiety of being seen meditating in public. We broke up into small teams, my partners and I started at the polar bear enclosure. Great, Empty benches, No one around yet. No problem. One of the bears was a psycho-case pacing back and forth, the same number of steps, the same sharp turn in the same place endlessly. I sat down, lowered my hat over my eyes and tried to look as if I was

napping. My inner clock drew me back after the required 30 minutes. This was repeated all day long, one group of animals after another, with other teams taking over after we were done. The crowds arrived but somehow there was always a seat available and no one noticed the little groups of dozing people. By the end of the day, the zoo keepers, who we got to know, were puzzled, their animals were not behaving normally, the psycho bear had stopped pacing and a depressed elephant became playful. After several days the keepers were beginning to suspect that we had something to do with the improved behaviour but they didn't know what. Between meditations, I was leaning over a high wall at eye level with a family of giraffes. One of the graceful creatures walked over and rested its soft muzzle in my hands, nose to nose for minutes. But it was an old gorilla that made my day. We made serious eye contact for quite a while. His hand rested nonchalantly on the ground, grasping a small stick. He looked away but in that moment, he flicked the stick and it flew across the dividing moat to land at my feet. He appeared to be totally disinterested. I picked up the stick and lobbed it back to him. Without appearing to notice he sidled up to it and

It wasn't bad - looked like chewed celery fibres but I couldn't find a piece big enough to fire back. He had taken me to my limit, I couldn't follow that move.

To this day, I wonder what he thought about me and I still have the feeling that somehow he was brighter than me.





The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors met last Wednesday at the Paradise Cafe for their regular monthly board meeting. The short but meaningful agenda had only two business issues to contend with. The first order of business being the hiring of a replacement for departing Chamber Manager Nancy Phillips. Chamber vice-president John Ineson reported that he and a committee made up of Linda Culbertson and John Phillips had interviewed three qualified candidates, and although it had been a difficult decision, the committee chose Mechelle Billings. A motion was made and seconded for Billings to become the new Chamber Manager and was unanimously approved by the board.

Nancy Phillips and husband John, a Chamber board member, will leave for Yuma. Arizona the last week of July. John resigned from the Chamber board last month when his contract with the 2CI School District expired. John will become business manager for the Association of Government Services in Western Arizona starting August 1st. Tobe Porter, president of the Arts Council presented Nancy and John with Arts and Seafood Festival T-shirts and thanked them both for their outstanding public service work. Chamber president Jay Stoler told Nancy Phillips that she would be the standard for all Chamber Managers in the future.

Road Status Powers Ranger District

In November of 1996, the Southern coast suffered an extreme rain event that caused local rivers and streams to rise considerably. During that storm the district suffered severe damage to many roads. Through Federal Highway (emergency repair) money, the district is repairing roads damaged by that storm. Following is the status of work remaining, by road, across the Powers Ranger District.

Agness Road (33)—The Agness to Powers Road is expected to be passable from Powers to Agness by late fall of 1999. Work completed so far includes debris removal, culvert replacement and delivery and placement of riprap (large rocks).

Elk River Road (5325) – The NEPA and design work to repair Elk River Road is complete. However, due to a funding shortage nationally, the contract for the Elk River Road will not be awarded this year.

China Flat Road (3353) – Work will begin on August 6. This contract will also include one site on the Agness Road at the 53.1 mile marker (near China Flat).



During the repair expect up to 45 minute delays.

Coal Creek Road (3358) – Due to a funding shortage nationally, the contract for the Coal Creek Road will not be awarded this year.

Sixes River – Work will begin on August 6. When work begins, the road will be closed for a period of up to five days with two days open (cycle then may be repeated). More specific notices will follow.

and culverts is October 31, 1999. The cost of the Arizona North Slide Repair project is \$1.2 million.

Other ODOT projects that Gregory showed me are the newly installed traffic counters embedded in Highway 101 at the south end of town just past Battle Rock Park. This way ODOT will be able to count cars and trucks and not have to install temporary traffic counters. Work is continuing on the weather station/video camera across from Battle Rock Park. The concrete pad is complete and the tower installed. But the camera and weather station have not been delivered and set up.

We also took a look at the Brush Creek diversion and dam, which are designed to divert water away from the creek during heavy rains. The contractor will install a new box culvert, which according to Gregory is intended to improve fish restoration. They will also realign the stream bed, which will reduce log jams and rock build up at the head of the culvert. The Brush Creek project will cost \$160,000.

Work continues on the Crystal Creek Slide Repair project. According to ODOT, "The contractor will be performing excavation and hauling to the disposal site. Expect minor delays during construction hours from 7:00am to 5:00pm Monday through Friday. Traffic will be controlled with flaggers and advance warning signs, watch for equipment and workers adjacent to open lanes."

More Canopy News

The following is the text of a letter sent to the Forest Service on July 19 from the Curry County Board of Commissioners.

To: USDA Forest Service Ollie Jones, Willamette National Forest

Dear Ms. Jones:

The Curry County Board of Commissioners has taken action to move out of the lead role in The Canopy Project. Curry County will honor its current contracts on The Canopy Project, but end its involvement at that point. Further, Curry County has asked the Canopy Project Board to find another organization to sponsor the project.

Curry County was awarded Grant #ORNW-97-073 on 8/26/97 for the Preconstruction phase of The Canopy Project. The Architecture and Engineering Phase has been completed. The attached report details the scope of work which has been completed and the expenditures with the appropriate grant streams and matching dollars.

Curry County wishes to be released from the remaining scope of work on the Environmental Analysis in the Preconstruction Phase. We recommend that the Forest Service work directly with The Canopy Project Board (or through another sponsor) to support the Environmental Impact Analysis. Currently, the County holds a contract with Rogers and Associates for wild life surveys on the sites. This work will be completed by September 30, 1999. When our County Counsel, Jerry Herbage, spoke to you by phone, he informed you of the Board's action and discussed the County's current obligations in the grant #ORNW-97-073 which was awarded 8/26/97. It is Curry County's understanding that the County may move out of the lead role, but that the scope of work, expenditures, grant dollars, in-kind matches and cash matches must be reviewed before the USDA Forest Service could comment on the release or on Curry County's current obligations regarding Grant #ORNW-97-073.

Curry County wishes to thank you and the USDA Forest Service for your support in our endeavors to build Curry County's economy.
