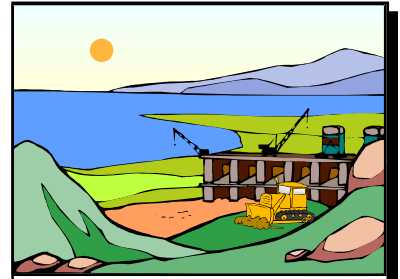

Full Speed Ahead**

### Full Speed Ahead By Evan Kramer



The Port of Port Orford Commission met last Tuesday night and heard Port Manager Gayle Paige describe the replacement dock project as proceeding

full speed ahead. Paige continued that the sheet piles for the new dock would be in next week or the week after. She said the pilings were being removed and Laskey-Clifton was preparing the temporary hoist area. She estimated the temporary hoist would be in place within 1-2 weeks. Paige said the contractor would be placing more traffic signs up soon warning people that authorized traffic only is allowed on the dock.

The Port Commissioners moved on to discussion of the title search. During this process they discovered liens filed against Premium Pacific Seafoods. They are also two months behind on their lease payments. Commission chairperson Leesa Cobb urged the Commission to send them a letter and get the lease payments current. The two liens against PPS are for \$911.07 for the county tax lien and \$1055.47 with the City of Port Orford. Commission member David Darnell made a motion that Gayle draft a letter to PPS informing them the two liens

have to be paid and that they are in violation of their lease. The motion carried 4-0.

The Commission discussed the dredging issue with Gayle Paige saying she was concerned with the condition at the end of the jetty. She said the problem is everything has been dredged to contract and the Army Corps of Engineers has no more obligations left. Leesa Cobb said we need them back here but Paige said they won't be back until after the first of the year. Local fisherman Scott Mecum described the area adjacent to the dock as a waffleboard with the depth of the water not constant. Gayle Paige said the Port needed another meeting with the Corps of Engineers, which she will try to arrange.

The Port Commission held a workshop on standardizing the leases on Monday, September 27. The Commission is still searching for a new attorney for the Port. This person needs to be familiar with public agencies.

The Castaway Motel had requested access to cross Port property to fix slide damage on the hill below the motel. Scott Macdonald made a motion to grant them permission to access Port property as long as they don't interfere with the Port construction and leave the property in decent shape. The motion passed 4-0.

The Castaway slide damage project fix was well under way on Tuesday morning of this week.

The Commission passed a motion to remove the Port Commission treasurer David Darnell as signer on the bank accounts until the dock project is over. This is a bonding issue and was done because the treasurer may have to sign many forms and reports.

The Port received a letter from Cal-Shell asking for three five-year lease renewals. They will be investing a lot of money in their new building on the dock. Jim Nodine turned in a request for a buying station on the dock. The Commission will work on these leases after the first of the year.

The Commission passed Resolution 99-05 transferring \$79,000 from capital outlay into personnel services and materials.

David Darnell ended up the meeting by saying the Port employees are doing a fantastic job. The employees are Larry Dell, Ken Flint, David Barnes, Richard Mijs and Sheila Boren and of course manager Gayle Paige.

One thing the port employees did a great job on is remodel the workshop building

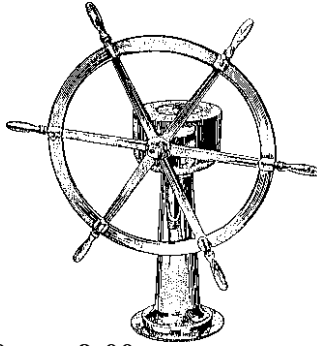

## Randy Scholten Responds

Thank you for covering the Sept. 15 Curry Health District board meeting in your last issue. Your question regarding withdrawal from the health district also is appreciated. If that's what the people of Port Orford want, we are willing to help, as I said during the board meeting.

The district board in the past has considered cutting Port Orford from the district and closing Curry Family Medical. Despite \$100,000 a year in tax base revenues the district receives from north county patrons, the Port Orford clinic loses money. That money instead could be used to help keep the county's one hospital operational.

Many north county residents have told us the clinic is essential to the well-being of their families, despite its multi-physician history. Those residents include parents with little ones, middle-aged and elderly with heart conditions, busy working folks who don't have the money or the time to travel out of the area for health maintenance, or patients requiring specialized care from our visiting physicians.

In response to questions about other health district benefits to Port Orford, here's a short list.

- Saves lives; numerous people are alive today because of the care provided.
- Supports Dr. Pitchford as a permanent doctor. (His contract states that he can stay as long as he wants) specifically for the Port Orford area, with opportunities for annual funding through 2001)
- Provides a pool of experienced business employees, accountants, legal advisers, clinical experts and managers familiar with the complicated and evolving rules of health care in the United States.
- Jobs for seven local residents – more than \$100,000 a year for the local economy.
- Physician recruitment. (Expensive, time-consuming and complicated)
- Health provider reference checks and credentialing.
- Local access to high tech, expensive diagnostic medical equipment (lab and x-ray).

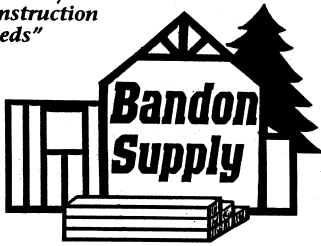

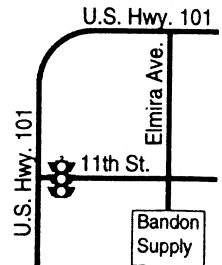

### Expect the Unexpected!

Arizona Slide Repair at Highway 101, Milepost 312: The truck climbing lane will be closed for construction, approximately one week, beginning September 27, 1999. This may cause some delays in travel. The rest of the north and south-bound lanes will remain open; another advisory will be sent out when the truck lane is re-opened.

Use extreme caution traveling through these areas, watch for workers. Slow down when you see orange barrels, cones and signs - even when there is no construction work visible. ### Flu Shot Clinics

In the continuing effort to promote a healthy community, the Public Health Department is offering a series of Flu Shot Clinics in which both the influenza and pneumonia vaccines will be offered. The cost of the flu shot is \$10 and the pneumonia shot is \$20. The Health Department will bill Blue Cross, Medicare and the OHP for flu shots. Medicare will also cover pneumonia shots when given at the same time as the flu shot. For both flu and pneumonia shots, all those with private insurance will be issued a receipt which may be submitted to their insurance company for reimbursement. The clinics will be offered on October 5th and 7th from 9-11am and 1-4pm in Port Orford.

In 1944, Aldous Huxley published **The Perennial Philosophy**, containing excerpts and interpretations of the works of the great writers and proponents of Eastern and Western philosophy. It emphasized the similarities in beliefs in widely diverse cultures and times and was received enthusiastically as "The Masterpiece of All Anthologies".

Since the mid '70s, Ken Wilber has been formulating not just an anthology of the works of the great philosophers, but an integration of their timeless shared truths. No less a luminary than Huston Smith, author of the multi-volume set **The World's Religions**, says, "No one – not even Jung – has done as much as Wilber to open Western psychology to the durable insights of the world's wisdom traditions."

The Port Orford Library has **One Taste**, one of Wilber's latest works, containing his day-to-day experiences during 1997, brief descriptions of his spiritual practice, critical observations on topics as diverse as feminism, popular spiritual movements, enduring spirituality concepts, psychotherapy, and theoretical work in the field of transpersonal psychology. It is a good start towards understanding his elucidation of the evolution of consciousness. Check it out!

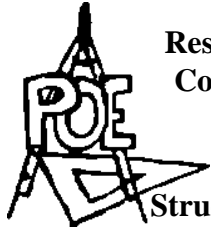
### Papermaking with Fibers

into the new Port office and soon to be meeting room.

### New Dock Progress

I spoke with Tom Wright on Tuesday morning down at the Port. He is the job superintendent for Laskey-Clifton, the Reedsport company demolishing the old dock and building the new dock. He told me the first set of sheet piles would be arriving at the Port on Wednesday of this week. The Y sheet piles which are the most important are scheduled to arrive on Thursday, October 7. Laskey-Clifton can't start setting the sheet piles until the Y piles arrive. The sheet piles are 57 feet long, 20 inches wide, one half inch thick and weight 1,800 pounds apiece. They will not be pounded into the sand but the company will use a machine, which vibrates them into place. They also cannot be put in place when the winds exceed 25-30 miles per hour.

Wright told me Laskey-Clifton has submitted a change plan to the Port for the hoist which he called Plan B. He said the original area that the temporary hoist was going to be placed wouldn't work

because there isn't enough water at that spot to launch the fishing boats. If the plan change is approved by the Port engineer the big yellow permanent hoist will stay in place longer and new dock construction will continue around it. Wright said the fishermen were happy with Plan B.

Wright said the biggest problem traffic wise is motorhomes driving down into the construction area ignoring the signs on the hill leading down to the dock that authorized traffic is allowed only (Turn around now).

Wright said 30,000 cubic yards of fill material have already been hauled to the dock with another 60,000 more coming before construction is complete. We were both admiring the beautiful warm and gentle weather on Tuesday but Wright knows the weather is the biggest unknown in this construction project.
