Council Takes Big Step By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met in special session on Friday morning. They first heard from councilor Nathaniel Wander about the serious medical condition councilor Robert Warring is in. Wander was collecting signed cards for Bob, which will be taken to Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene where Warring is in the Intensive Care Unit. As of Tuesday afternoon he was still in the intensive care unit. In my opinion Bob Warring's thoughtful contributions and probing questions related to his work as a city councilor are sorely missed. We're pulling for you Bob.

The sole item on the agenda was authorizing a geotechnical investigation by KCM/Tetra Tech in the ocean off Agate Beach where the sewer outfall pipe will be located. The in-ocean work includes an underwater video of the proposed outfall route, sub-bottom probing to a depth of 40 feet into the ocean bottom at 30 locations, core sampling in five locations and an underwater inspection of the termination area of the outfall.

Temporary City Administrator Martha Weaver-Britell said she had spoken to

Ruben Kretschmar of the Department of Environmental Quality and he wants the sewer outfall replacement back on track now. She said she had contacted city attorney Randall Tosh and he said the City didn't need to go out for bid on the geotechnical investigation (because this is technical work). Public Works Director Jerry McNurlin said the City had a "window" of opportunity now and that KCM had a crew lined up to do the work.

Councilor Norm Leeling asked if the City should just pay KCM whatever they ask for. He asked if the figures were negotiated. Weaver-Britell said the City could put it out for bid but they wouldn't get the work done this fall. Leeling referred to the amount KCM was charging for the work as "flat out usury." He said their original estimate in September 1998 had been for \$60,000.

The council was asked why Advanced American Diving wasn't using a local Port Orford boat for their ocean work. Jerry McNurlin said the boat they need is not available in Port Orford. Later that day McNurlin stopped by the Fun Zone and clarified the boat situation. He said Advanced American Diving needed an 85 to 110 foot long boat because of the amount of equipment they would be carrying including a very large compressor.

Mayor Gary Doran said a person applying for a sewer hook-up from the City was denied their application because of the sewer hook-up moratorium. Ruben Kretschmar is sending an "order" to the City concerning the moratorium though he has already sent the city one letter on September 9. By Tuesday of this week Kretschmar had not sent a new letter to the city but according to Martha Weaver-Britell he would be "perfectly happy" to answer questions people have about the moratorium. The only new hook-ups allowed are those that are already paid for. Kretschmar's phone number is 269-2721, extension 23.

The amount KCM is asking for the "mandatory expenditures" is \$93,500 according to City Treasurer Joyce Hodge.

City Councilor Ralph Donaldson said the ocean outfall is going to damm well be feasible. Councilor Jim Campbell said it was worth it to pay a little more to get the project started now.

Councilor Donaldson made a motion that the city council adopt Resolution 9900-04 - "A Resolution to adopt appropriation transfers within the sewer construction fund for fiscal year 1999-2000." The motion passed 5-0. \$100,000 will be transferred from the sewer construction

Inter-City Bus Service Begins

It is actually going to happen! Inter-city bus service starts November 1 connecting Brookings, Gold Beach, Port Orford, Langlois and Bandon with transfers to Coquille or Coos Bay possible. The route runs North and South three times per day.

Departure and arrival sites are Rays #1 in Brookings, The Cannery at the Port of Gold Beach, Wheelhouse Restaurant at Battle Rock Wayside in Port Orford, Langlois Market and Deli in Langlois, and Ray's Market in Bandon. The bus will stop only at the designated stops in each town.

Rural residents may be picked up along Highway 101. A call ahead to the Curry Public Transit in the nearest town to let them know the pick up site route will be appreciated. The pick up site needs to be easily accessible and visible by the bus. The bus will only stop if the rider is present.

The cost is \$2.00 per segment. A segment being from one town to the next or a pick up point in route to the next town. Examples: Brookings to Gold Beach is \$2.00. Whaleshead, an in route stop, to Brookings is \$2.00. Pistol River to Port Orford would be \$4.00 (Pistol River to Gold Beach plus Gold Beach to Port Orford). Langlois is included in the Port Orford to Bandon segment.

For the months of November and December the fares will be waved to encourage people to get acquainted with the service. So come aboard and experience a trip on the beautiful Oregon coast at no expense. The new coaches are spacious and comfortable holding 14 passengers including two sites for wheelchairs. They are ADA (American with Disabilities Act) certified with large windows to enjoy the views along Highway 101 while someone else drives.

Busses leave northbound from the Wheelhouse in Port Orford to Langlois

and Bandon at 9:20am, 11:50am, 2:50pm. Busses leave southbound from Port Orford to Gold Beach and Brookings at 8:40am, 11:10am, 2:10pm.

Ballot Bag Drop

During the week of October 25th thru October 29th there will be a Ballot Bag Drop at the Port Orford City Hall from 10am to 3pm. On Monday, November 1st from 10am to 3pm and Tuesday, November 2nd from 10am to 8pm the same service will be available. 

The Last Word Graeme Graydon

After weeks of sunny mornings, this one was damply gray. Maybe it was the weather that got to them, but there was no doubt, they started their day on the wrong foot. It didn't seem to matter what they did - it became something to argue about. Nothing earth-shaking really, not much more than planning their day together, but it was more important to be impatient with each other than to resolve anything. They couldn't agree, so she stormed out of there, heading for town - a sort of unspoken last word.

Half an hour later, as planned, he followed her wondering if they would be able to pick up the pieces of their day. By the time he got to the highway, the fog was so thick he could barely see the road. Forgetting all about his recent confrontation or maybe because of it, he now became concerned about his wife - she was somewhere ahead of him in the murky brew. "I hope she's OK" he thought. And then, just north of town, flares burning on the road, flashing lights.

Oh No! People waving him to slow down, then, looming out of the fog, the outlines

of vehicles scattered grotesquely across the highway. He knew in his heart that she was in there, - injured, maybe killed. She had been so mad at him when she left. "Oh God, Please, Please, not that." But as he inched by, there was no sign of her car - she wasn't there. Others were in trouble but not her. He wanted to tell her how much he loved her, how much he needed her - right now. The stuff that got in the way earlier was so unimportant, so miserably unimportant compared to this.

I don't know what he said to her when they met shortly after. I guess that he was happy just to see her again. Their problems weren't solved but became pretty ridiculous in the light of who they were for each other.

I've been in his shoes a few times - it was easier for me to tell his story than to relive mine. I've learned that to have the last word is pretty stupid. It just props up some little belief that gives me the illusion of being better or smarter or whatever. But it's only for a moment and then I get to look in the mirror and deal with me again.

These days, I have a whole different slant on having the last word. Over the course



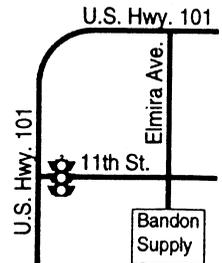

I'm referring to Curry County Ballot Measure 08/28 when I say vote yes on no. Nowhere in the caption, question or explanation does this Ballot Measure mention the Canopy Project but that's the real issue and why this initiative is even on the ballot. This election comes in time so the results will be considered at the Oregon State Parks meeting on Thursday, November 4 regarding the Curry County State Parks Master Plan. The meeting will be held at Tryon Creek State Park in the Portland area.

Holly Trees By Donna Hoffmann

As it is October, it's time to remind you to spray for the holly leaf and twig blight to protect your holly trees. Use Microcrop or another similar fungicide and spray the leaves thoroughly, following directions on the container. Be sure and clean up leaves and other debris from under the trees before applying solution. Burn the leaves/debris and don't put in your com-

post pile. This should be done before the rainy season starts as the rain splatters the disease back up into the tree. You'll need to do this again in January/February to avoid the blight as happened about 4-5 years ago. Remember how awful it was. It actually killed some trees.

I've been cleaning up our summer garden, getting ready for a winter garden. I'm planting broccoli and brussels sprouts again as they were wonderful and can't even compare with store-bought. They were so good. Also planting some leeks, cabbage, beets and carrots and winter lettuces too. And snow peas! Had so many this summer and are extremely easy to grow and actually like it cool so are perfect for a winter garden. Once you've raised your own, it's hard to go back to the other stuff. Plus winter gardening is so much easier - not as many pests about except maybe slugs which are with us year-round, having no particular season.

We've just returned from New York and Pennsylvania. The trees are in their fall colors and are gorgeous. Pictures don't do justice! More about that in another article. Garden questions, call 1-800-356-3986 on Wednesdays, from 9:00am to noon. Good gardening.

Program Needs Volunteers

The Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) program, mandated by ORS 419A.170, provides trained volunteers to all court cases involving abused or neglected children. Under the special assessment program, a property's assessed value is frozen for 15 years for purposes of local property taxes. Owners of commercial properties may reapply for an additional 15 years. In return for this benefit, owners are required to hold an annual open house for the public. The open house must be held at least one day a year for a minimum of four consecutive hours between 9:00am and 9:00pm. Owners may choose any date of the year except state observed national holidays.



Friday Night Lecture



Fire Season Ends

Effective 12:01am, Wednesday, October 27, 1999, the official forest fire season terminates within the Coos Forest Protective Association district.

The Regulated Use Closures within areas CS-2 and CS-5 will also be terminated.

At this time, debris burning permits will not be needed and fire tools and equipment will not be required for industrial operations. However, burning permits will still be required for log slash and heavy debris burning on a year-round basis under the Smoke Management program. Operators will also be required to obtain permits to harvest timber and operate power driven equipment and give notification of operations as in the past.

District Manager Gene Brock wishes to thank everyone for their cooperation during the past fire season.

If you haven't received your newsletter your subscription has run out and it's time to renew.







What's New at the Library By Paula Cracas

If you have a child, do you want a reading highbrow or a reading lowbrow? With television offering such enticing time-wasters, it seems more difficult than ever to expect children to spend time reading. Our lives are so busy, or so it seems, who can find the time to read to a child every night at bedtime? Did your parents read to you? Does a good book on a quiet afternoon seem like a dream come true? Do you read for pleasure? Do you agree that pleasure motivates most readers? With the Internet and television, is reading a book really necessary in today's complicated world? Most would agree that hours spent reading translates into success at school. Can we assume that reading translates into success in later life?

Reading an engrossing adventure (Forever Amber and Mickey Spillane were my favorites when I was 12) means increased comprehension, expanded vocabulary, and reading speed. A reader's world expands. By the time I got around to Lady Chatterley's Lover when I was 13, the Cockney accent didn't slow me down. The scenes in the shed did.

Judi Paul developed a computer program, The Accelerated Reader, to measure students reading. She says only 13 minutes a day is allotted to reading in the fourth grade classes. And reading time diminishes as a child moves on to higher grades. Further, she says, competent readers read 144 as much as the least able. Like basketball or cooking, reading expertise comes from experience. "If your child shoots 144 baskets a day, and my child shoots one, who will become a better basketball player?" she asks. You can't expect a star on the court to practice without a ball or a hoop. If you want a reading highbrow, here are a few suggestions to consider:

1. Read to your child daily. No time? How about once or twice a week?
2. Go to the library at least once a week, child in tow, and pick out books to read during the coming week.
3. Sign your child up for the reading programs the library offers on a regular basis.
4. Ask the librarian to recommend books appropriate for your child.
5. Any reading is better than no reading. Don't discourage comic books, magazines, romance novels, and the backs of cereal boxes.
6. What does your child love? Horses? Airplanes? Cooking? Dungeons and Dragons? Buy books about that subject. Read and discuss them with your child.
7. Visit the Driftwood School library. Some of my best references on worms were found there.
8. Artwork in children's books is very high caliber encouraging a lifelong appreciation of good art.
