New Blood For Fire Board By Evan Kramer



The Curry County Board of Commissioners met Monday morning and filled four vacancies on the Port Orford Rural Fire District. Commissioner

Lloyd Olds was ill and not present for the meeting, which was attended by Chairperson Cheryl Thorp and vice-chair Bill Roberts.

Cheryl Thorp said she had attended a meeting of the Governor's Mental Health task force. Curry County is putting together a list of the services they offer and what their goals are in the mental health field. Thorp said a grant had been received for \$75,000 to pay for a psychiatrist for Curry County. Thorp added that the Curry County Human Services Department was going to take over administration of the local drug and alcohol program. It had been administered out of Baker County.

The two commissioners moved to postpone appointments to the Law Enforcement Fact Finding Committee because Thorp wanted to excuse herself from participating (she is the commissioner liaison to the sheriff's office) and she questioned the need for the committee. With Olds not in attendance they wouldn't have had a quorum. Curry County Sheriff Kent Owens got up and spoke forcefully to Roberts. He told the commissioners the "Sheriff's door will not be open to this committee." He said the committee would not come into his office. He pointedly told Bill Roberts that "You have no authority to investigate the Sheriff's Department." He asked Roberts why he wasn't there at the community meetings that had been held for the sheriff levy last year. He finished by telling Roberts, "You tend to your business, I'll tend to mine." This agenda item was postponed. The Law Enforcement Fact Finding Committee was formed by Bill Roberts to determine why the sheriff's department doesn't have enough deputies to respond to calls.


Laura Tesler, regional manger for the State Department of Agriculture spoke about Senate Bill 1010. Her district covers Curry, Coos and western Douglas County. She said they have formed a committee to develop an agriculture-water plan regarding non-source point water pollution. Senate Bill 1010 is set up to address flagrant non-source point water offenses. Tesler said it was better the state deal with this than the Environmental Protection Agency.

Dinah Van Der Hyde, representing the ODOT public transit division in Salem spoke about working on public transit projects. Oregon's government formed the Oregon Transportation Network (OTN) in 1999. The OTN has increased the amount of money spent from \$7 million to \$16 million annually for a transportation program for seniors, the disabled and with an emphasis on social service clients. Here in Curry County it is in the form of small mini-buses serving Brookings north to Coos Bay with stops in Port Orford and Langlois.

Rural Fire Board Vacancies

The commissioners next went to work filling the four vacancies on the Port Orford Rural Fire Board. County counsel Gerry Herbage said all four appointments would be up for election next year in March. Position #1 will be elected for a two years term and positions #2, 3 and 4 will be elected to four-year terms. The appointments will put them in office through June 30, 2001. Commissioner Bill Roberts said he had received much support for putting former members on the board and staying with something proven. He said he didn't know about the work ethic of the people (other applicants) other than Gayle Wilcox. Commissioner Cheryl Thorp said she found it

Fire Season Begins

The Coos Forest Protective Association announced on Tuesday, June 20, that fire season will officially begin at 12:01am, Monday, June 26. The start of fire season activates restrictions on both public and industrial forest use on all private, county, state and Bureau of Land Management lands as well as rural fire districts within CFPA's protection boundaries.

The start of fire season means the end of unregulated outside burning for people residing in Coos, Curry and parts of Douglas County. Written permits and on-site inspections will be required for all types of outside burning, including debris burning and the use of burn barrels. Permits are free of charge and may be obtained as follows.

Rural Fire district residents can call their local CFPA office during normal busi-

ness hours, seven days a week, at one of the following numbers: Bandon and Port Orford, 347-3400; Gold Beach, 247-6241 and in Brookings at 469-2302. A Fire Warden will typically come to the burn site to perform the inspection and write the permit.

County residents within an unincorporated city should call their local departments for burning restrictions and permit details.

Industrial fire regulations will also go into effect. Industrial Fire Precaution Level (IFPL) 1 prohibits smoking while working on or traveling through an industrial operation. Specified fire tools and suppression equipment must be maintained at all operations. A three-hour watchman service is also required at all industrial operation sites, unless waived or modified in writing by a Fire Warden. Changes in the Industrial Fire Precaution Level apply to all contractors

and permit holders working on private, county, state and Bureau of Land Management lands.

Non-industrial firewood cutters must have an 8-ounce fire extinguisher and a shovel. Power saws must be equipped with an approved screen.

As fire season progresses, additional closures and restrictions may be imposed as weather conditions become more severe.



Health District News By Frann Grossman

This column was created to help keep district patrons up to date with new improvements and changes in the Curry Health District, reaching from Pistol River north to just north of the Sixes River.

The North Curry Community Health Grant program will host a men's free health screening from 9:00am to 4:00pm, Friday, June 30, at Curry Family Medical. The screening will highlight early detection prostate cancer screening and education for North Curry County men. Besides free PSAs and optional clinical examinations, the screening will include blood tests for cholesterol and diabetes, tests for colon cancer and skin cancer, refreshments and brochures. Patients are reminded to fast for at least two hours prior to receiving a glucose blood test (for diabetes).

The North Curry Community Health Grant program also plans two activities for later this summer: a bike safety event in conjunction with RAD Outdoor Club, August 1; and "North Curry Walks On," August 5. For details, phone Cathy Boden, coordinator, 332-1042.

With voter endorsement of the proposed Assisted Living Facility, advisory committee members continue preparing for construction which could begin as early as next month. Subcommittees will address building/design, grant requests, beautification/enhancement, and management contracting/marketing and operation.

Bond funded dollars recently helped purchase waiting room chairs for Curry Family Medical, and an upgraded walk-in refrigeration unit for the hospital dietary department. The planned upgrade of the hospital's admitting and lobby area is set for January 2001.

Ginny Hochberg, M.S.N., who replaced Millie Bird as clinical administrator on the hospital's management council, has been named acting administrator. Randy Scholten, the former CEO, left in March.

Curry General Hospital recorded 132 patient days in April, increasing to 153 patient days in May. Outpatient visits totaled 1,551 in April, increasing to 1,868 in May.

Curry Health District's fiscal year started July 1, 1999. It will end June 30, 2000. Looking at the census calculated during the fiscal year to date, inpatient days totaled 1,455 patients compared to 1,376 during the same period last year. Outpatient visits during the fiscal year to date total 19,521 in the current year compared to 17,074 visits in the same period last year.

Newborns in April totaled eight; newborns in May totaled 11. There have been 75 babies born during the current fiscal year to date, compared to 87 born during the same period last year.

Wherein lies the magic? Well, all over the place...as if you didn't know. Long time board member Mike Knapp resigned effective June 30. Another long time board member Don Smith resigned effective June 30. In his brief statement Smith said "Ten years is a long time to serve on any School Board and I feel it is time for someone else to take my place."

quizzical why people who resigned from the board would ask to be reappointed (she was referring to Richard Mijs and Gayle Wilcox). Two persons who applied for the vacant board positions were declared ineligible because they were neither registered voters nor owners in the district. They were Dave Naiman and Tim Hunter, Frank Smith spoke next, He was the chairman of the Rural Fire Board until resigning on May 30. Smith told the commissioners a lot of nasty things went on. He said he wanted to see new blood on the district board. He said the two people who resigned and were applying for the vacancies didn't do anything on the board. He said he couldn't believe they would be considered. Smith complained about the good old boys. He said thousands of dollars of work went to Foster's shop without being bid but when Smith raised an issue about it all hell broke loose. He said the money the board manages was being controlled by special interests.

Bill Roberts made a motion to appoint Richard Mijs to position #1, John Johnston to position #2, Jeffrey Barnes to position #3, and Janet Dacayana to position #4. Cheryl Thorp seconded the motion and it passed 2-0. Barnes, Dacayana and Johnston have never served on the board. (The other member of the fiveperson board is Brice Wagner.) Their first meeting will be on Wednesday, June 21, at the Elk River Fire Hall. The Board's first order of business will be to elect officers.

Transit Assistance Provided

The Oregon Transportation Network assists transit providers in Coos and Curry County with the following:

A grant of \$71,784 to pay for covered shelters at bus stops, provide waterproof route schedules posted at all stops, and to provide on board information stations for each bus in the Coos County system. This project enhances rider comfort, and improves customer service on the county system. In addition, six new vehicles for dial a ride service will be granted in Coos County to replace worn vehicles and add additional service.

A grant for \$20,500 in Coos County and \$17,000 in Curry County to increase dispatch hours for the Community Partnership Volunteer transportation programs.

These increases will allow volunteer transportation services to be expanded to include senior and disabled clients who need rides other than for medical appointments and to ensure a "one-call" coordination connection with Curry County Transit service.

Four small buses to replace old vehicles in Curry Public Transit's fleet. This will make service safer and more reliable, while decreasing maintenance expenses for the transit program. \$13,500 will expand hours of service.

These are just a few of many examples of how the Oregon Transportation Network is helping Oregon communities improve transit service and provide more rides for those who need them – elderly persons, persons with disabilities, and those who cannot or do not choose to drive a car.

Thanks to the members of the county councils, local transit districts, local transit providers and community nonprofit organizations who all help to make it possible for the OTN to offer these services in Oregon communities statewide.
