Council Has Busy Schedule By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council began their meeting Monday night with Mayor Gary Doran thanking council president Ralph Donaldson for standing in for him while he was on vacation.

Councilor Norm Leeling made a motion to accept the "Run to the Rogue" Proclamation which passed 6-0.

Port Orford Rural Fire District chairman Jeff Barnes then spoke to the council. He said the views he was to express were his own. Barnes said he had lived in the rural district for two years and then went through a chronology of events beginning with joining the volunteer fire department and going up through Monday night. Much of what he said was in his statement in this paper two weeks ago. Barnes said he joined the rural board because he wanted to resolve the difference between the rural board and the fire department. Barnes said he resigned from the volunteer fire department after the May 9 rural board meeting because of the behavior of assistant chief Randy Foster.

Barnes said he couldn't reconcile his differences with Fire Chief George Gehrke and Foster, saying they both wanted him to resign. Barnes said he wanted good fire protection for the whole area. He wants the rumors to come to an end and resolve the differences. Barnes said he wanted a fire chief who would work with the district and he wanted no more threats of mass resignation from the fire department.

Barnes and Councilor Jim Campbell had different stories about the legality of Brice Wagner driving one of the rural tenders last week. Barnes said he had called the insurance agent and was told Brice was insured while driving it despite the fact he is not on the fire department or rural board. Campbell said he had spoken to insurance agent Ron Mason and city attorney Randal Tosh and was told Brice was no longer insured though the fire chief or the rural board can authorize him to drive the truck. Wagner had been authorized by Barnes to drive the truck.

Councilor Ralph Donaldson asked Mayor Doran if the council should hear from the other side. Doran said he preferred setting up a separate meeting. The council decided to hold a special session on Monday night, September 18,

7:00pm, with the rural fire board and discuss the contract.

Councilor Jim Campbell commended the work of the fire department at the recent Tamco Mill and Stonecypher fires. Campbell said the department deserved some credit and this remark was greeted with a round of applause.

Police Chief Bill Rush spoke to the council about the recent arrests of four juveniles and said that at least 15 burglaries had been cleared up. He gave credit to a concerned citizen who gave him names and information leading to the arrests. He said he hoped these four arrests would clear up a few more of the burglaries. Rush then went on to commend the volunteer fire department. He said he has worked with these guys and gals and they're as good if not better than paid firefighters.

The council considered a proposal presented by a chamber and city committee for the chamber of commerce to move their office back into the visitor center. Councilor Ralph Donaldson said the chamber should have stayed there and wants them back. Councilor Leeling said he was troubled by the proposal. He said the Chamber had held the city up for \$5,000 and that the city did not ask the



Looking for Somewhere to Eat By Graeme Graydon



When considering building places for people, a pattern is a design feature, large or small, that, when embodied in a structure, causes people to feel more secure and happier without anyone really knowing why. The patterns have been identified by researchers who have studied all the information they can find about people and the buildings they work, play and live in. They found that many patterns have powerful and intimate effects on everyone – moods and attitudes are improved, relationships are better. A pattern can be the size or shape of a door, the height of a ceiling, the width of a path, how the inside meets the outside, the height of a window sill, the thickness of walls or simply, a sunny place. Many small patterns make up the bigger ones, like an entryway, a kitchen or a bedroom. A restaurant is the sum of a large number of little patterns which can lift the spirit just by being in it. Few designers today are asked to pay much attention to the emotional needs of people,

their goal is more to impress, the patterns are forgotten and we have impressive buildings with no heart, no one really likes to be there. I had a blatant reminder of this today.

My woman and I went to a Southern Oregon Coastal city and, as usual, needed to find a place to eat. So we set out in the car, (which was parked in front of a little eating place), to cruise the main drag. We found a large ethnic restaurant which gave no clue of its interior from the outside. Monique, bless her heart, tried to force the door inwards for me until I pointed out the "Pull" sign, whereupon she strained in the opposite direction as if setting an enormous mouse-trap that closed heavily behind our heels, sealing us off from the outside. The place was ethnically decorated, there was no obvious nice place to sit, the patrons ate, stoically silent, isolated in their private spaces, the waiter was ethnically decorated and demanded to know how we were doing, the menu was endless and the food expensive. It took about 2 minutes for the bad taste to work on us – "Lets get out of here!" Would you know it, we ended up in front of the little eating place, willing to give it a try.

Large windows gave a view of the inside, the door was wide open, it was a smallish, plain place to eat. The chef was right there – "You want to eat?" he called out. We noticed a bright inviting space up a little ramp – "Can we go there?" "Help yourself." It was more a greenhouse than anything else. A low, translucent roof supported solidly by white-painted beams and posts. Air, sun and delicious smells poured through the open windows that let out into a natural area of foliage, a real rock face with a waterfall and topical flowers. I chose to sit against the wall on a long bench made of 2x4's. In moments our heavy mood lifted into enjoyment, our day was completely changed. The chef came to tell us about his cooking, we could hear laughter and talking in the next room. And the food? It was different, wholesome and good.

Every nuance of our encounters with the two restaurants, both good and bad, was determined by how well the designers had followed, (or forgotten), the simple patterns that humans need to feel acknowledged and comfortable when in their buildings.





Letter to the Editor,

My glass block is being robbed from me.

He gave me a nice L shape of cinder blocks. But the best part of all was the abundance of large glass block windows which used to wrap my entire building. The designer thoughtfully placed these huge glass block windows in each and every classroom, office, library, bathroom, kitchen and especially large glass block window in the cafeteria. I called this my beautiful smile. The designer knew they would provide enough light, the right climate and a delightful learning environment for the children. This was an extra expense even in its day. What a beautiful building I was.

Jeez, which one do you think has been recommended by the paid architect, selected by our administrator and school board?

"Save the Glass Blocks" if you care, please don't let anyone take the sunshine from my smile.

Mrs. Ruby Lamphear of Lafayette, Oregon, died August 27, 2000, in an auto accident. She was 77. She and her husband, Walter Lamphear, lived in Port Orford from 1978 to 1989.

Dodrill will be on hand to discuss whatever the public brings to the table from 6:30 to 8:30pm in the city hall council chambers room


“I’ve been out walking precincts all summer,” said Dodrill, “and I’ve heard from

Hoists Not Working

There is trouble at the new dock at the Port of Port Orford. Both the new commercial and sport boat hoists are out of order. Mechanical trouble developed with the larger commercial hoist over the Labor Day weekend and it was taken out of service. Then the boat launching activity switched to the sport boat hoist and it developed the same mechanical problems and is now also out of service. The problem with both boat hoists is the hydraulic motors and gearboxes. The two bright yellow hoists were built by the Aurora Crane Company for Laskey-Clifton, the company that served as the general contractor on the new dock project.

Laskey-Clifton had never taken the temporary crane away from the Port and had it stored on Dock Road. It was quickly put back in service so fishing operations could continue at the Port. Laskey

chamber to move out of the visitor center. He said he was willing to let them move back and pay some modest rent.

Councilor Jane Cramer made a motion that three council members (Jane Cramer, Norm Leeling, Emily Francona) be appointed to meet with three representatives from the chamber to discuss and possibly work out an agreement (regarding the chamber moving back in). The motion passed 5-1 with Leeling voting no.

The council next turned to the evaluation for the city administrator. Councilor Donaldson made a motion the council accepts the personal evaluation form as drawn up by Norm Leeling and presented to the council. The motion carried and city administrator Martha Weaver will be evaluated in executive session on Tuesday, September 26.

Councilor Campbell said he had spoken to Curry County Commissioner Lloyd Olds about the Garrison Lake situation and that Olds wanted to meet with council and discuss some proposals. Olds had spoken to Campbell about the possibility

of getting two thirds of the cost of a lake discharge pipe for the city. The council decided to meet with Olds on the morning of September 26 and talk about his ideas.

Ron Bush, project engineer with Tetra Tech/KCM appeared before the council regarding the geotechnical ocean survey off Agate Beach. This regards the potential sewer discharge pipe which would replace the sewer outfall pipe on the beach. He said the company was ready to mobilize and get the geotechnical work done on Monday, September 18. The council had been present with a bill from sub contractor Advanced American Diving for \$25,829.25 for work already done and materials purchased. Bush asked the council if there was room to exceed the budget for the project, which is \$93,5000. Bush said when the money runs out the work would stop. City Administrator Martha Weaver said the city may not be able to exceed the contract amount but would be speaking to city attorney Randal Tosh about the matter.

Jay Stoler asked Bush what the percent of benefit the city gained from the \$25,829.25 bill and was told 25%. These costs were run up during the two previous attempts to conduct the geotechnical sur-

vey which were cancelled due to weather conditions.

Bush said the company may be able to get by doing less work depending on how the core samples turn out. He said they would know on the first day how much information they will need.

The council passed a motion adopting Resolution 2001-05 regarding an increase in duties for LaRae Liston and a salary raise of twenty-five cents per hour. Liston has assumed the duties of city clerk in addition to her job as city recorder.

The council discussed water/sewer rates regarding vacation homes. When people in these homes leave for the winter they have the water turned off and then don't pay any sewer or water charges. The council considered having these homeowners pay the fixed charges including bonded sewer debt fund and other funds whether they are in town or not. City administrator Martha Weaver will look into how the council can adjust the ordinance to have these homes pay the fixed charges.

Ballots in the city police levy election must be mailed or turned in by Tuesday, September 19, 8:00pm. A drop off box is located inside the city hall council chambers with two people

The council will meet on Monday, September 18, 6:30pm to consider the situation with KCM and the geotechnical survey.

A reception will be held for the State Fire Marshal on Monday, September 25, 5:00pm, in the council chambers. Paula Cracas helped the city get a fire rescue truck at no cost.
