

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Thinking about Water

Thinking about Water

The Port Orford City Council held a workshop meeting on Monday morning dealing with water supply goals.

Rainfall totals for the first two months of this year are way under the 2000 totals. January 2000 the city received 18.62 inches and in February 2000 received 13.64 inches. January of this year the city received 4.13 inches of rain and 5.92 inches in February.

Mayor Gary Doran noted that water supply was the first item on the council priority list. He told the council this year is starting to look like a drought year and said the city should look at dredging the Hubbard Creek water impoundment.

Public Works Director Allan Wagner told the council losing the secondary source of drinking water (Garrison Lake) was the main problem. He said dredging the Hubbard Creek impound would cause turbidity and it would be hard to dredge it as the sole source of city water. Wagner said if the city could develop the Gold Run Creek water source they would have a backup for Hubbard Creek. (Gold Run Creek was the City's water source from the mid 1930's until late 1950 and the city

owns 1.4 acres of land where the intake was located) On Friday of this week the state watermaster will visit Port Orford and meet with Wagner and city administrator Martha Weaver concerning the Gold Run Creek water right. Wagner said in order to bring Gold Run online as a water source the boundaries would have to be surveyed, easements would have to be acquired and the impoundment would have to be dredged. He said there was power close by and that the Hubbard Creek raw water line ran nearby. Wagner estimated it would cost \$30,000 – \$40,000 to get the Gold Run Creek impoundment up and running by mid summer. Councilor Jane Cramer asked if there was money in the budget for this project. Martha Weaver said there was money available for Hubbard Creek dredging and that it could be done out of our water construction fund budget or a grant loan package. Cramer said she was concerned about the city incurring further loans and reminded everyone the sewer outfall needed to be corrected.

The council next discussed the corrosion control problem at the water treatment plant in Buffington Park. Oregon Health Division/Drinking Water Program has notified the city they have to take corrective action at the plant because they have "exceeded the action level for copper." Allan Wagner said this would be an addi-

tional treatment at the plant and reminded the council it was required.

The City is under pressure to complete all work on the water treatment plant no later than June 30, 2001 or it will be out of compliance with Oregon Economic Community Development Department, which is the granting agency.

Councilor Norm Leeling expressed his concern about how many things the council didn't know. He asked how the council could set priorities if they didn't have the engineering information to make decisions. He said there was a lot of talking and nothing gets done.

Allan Wagner said it had been tough working with the H.G.E. engineering firm on the water plant but not that many things at the plant are deficient. Wagner said he calls H.G.E. on a daily basis and either they're not in or they're busy. Martha Weaver said she would speak to Dick Norad with H.G.E. and threaten to send a letter to their bonding company.

Norm Leeling asked about the corrosion control and Allan Wagner told him the copper level exceeds the limit when it comes out of the customers' taps. Wagner said it was due to the corrosive nature of the water.

**Gift of Sight

Financially strapped cataract patients considering applying for Curry General Hospital's 2001 Gift of Sight Program have until April 20 to submit their paperwork. Now in its fifth year, the Gift of Sight Program allows medically and financially needy patients to undergo a cataract surgery at no cost. It was established to ensure patients receive quality medical treatment with dignity and compassion.

The procedure, as well as preliminary testing and post-operative care, are made possible by a medical and civic partnership including John Rush, O.D., Brookings and Gold Beach optometrist; John Flaxel, M.D., North Bend-based eye surgeon; Curry General Hospital and the Curry County Lions clubs. According to the patient's request, the application process and surgery can remain strictly confidential.

Since the program's inception in 1996, four patients – from Harbor, Brookings, Gold Beach and Ophir – have received free cataract surgeries.



I have just been invited to attend an event at the High School. To really get my attention, to make it impossible to stay away, the clincher for the deal, if you like, were the irresistible words, "and, all-you-can-eat dessert." You see, I have this genetic fault, if extraordinary amounts of wonderful food are available to me, I switch from being perfectly satisfied, to having a desperate need to try everything. It hasn't been easy to delete this program which probably comes from lean, wartime years.

Way back when I was making my living by helping people to lose weight and clean up their bodies, I was taken to a really famous Scandinavian Smorgasbord in the theater district of N.Y. City. It presented two small mountains heaped with a wide range of unbelievably fantastic dishes. Fifteen dollars purchased the right to extract goodies from those mountains as often as I liked, provided that I could still walk up to serve myself. On

that disastrous occasion, I honored the chef by eating everything. Don't ask about the next 24 hours. Months later, I was led back to the same place. No problem, this time I would be in control. Well, yes, but something happened again and I revisited Scandinavia – big time. By the 4th visit, I had given up all pretense of self-control, so I was surprised to find myself, cradling a plate under my arm, moving decorously around the heaps, tasting and selecting in my imagination. After careful contemplation, I loaded my plate, one time only, with what took my fancy. For such an attack of virtue, even my planets must have been lined up right. The real test would be to go back for the 5th time, something I could do because of some insight in this problem which has made me a little cautious.

Not far from my Health resort in the Catskill Mountains, was a world famous hotel. One Sunday afternoon, one of its staff members, turned up at our place. For years he had been maitre-d' at the Big place, and he came out to see who we were and what we did – he seemed a little strung out, and after gazing incredulously at our guests dining happily on a 12oz glass of fresh carrot juice, he explained

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

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
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Shore Pines Preview Sunday

Dow has played guitar for 40 years. He has been a member of the Old Time Fiddlers for at least three decades, serving as the state's vice-president and member of the national board of directors for at least 10 years. His music features familiar,

Water Quality Planning

As one of the original stewards of the land and water, agriculture in Oregon has a key role to play in protecting the state's natural resources for future generations. All Oregonians have a stake in cleaning up our rivers and lakes and agriculture is stepping up to the plate to provide some solutions.

The Agricultural Water Quality Management Act also known as Senate Bill 1010 was approved by the 1993 State Legislature and requires the Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) to help reduce water pollution from agricultural sources and to improve overall conditions in a watershed.

More and more operators are doing a good job of using sound stewardship

practices, but there is always room for improvement. Senate Bill 1010 directs ODA to work with farmers and ranchers to develop Water Quality Management Area Plans and Rules. These plans identify problems and outline ways to correct them.

Included in the term "agriculture" are the owners of small acreages, who will be asked to take actions that address problems such as soil erosion, runoff, and degraded streamside areas. These small landowners make up an important segment of the agricultural community. With the flexibility of this plan, each landowner develops their own approach to solve local problems. Landowners are encouraged to choose their own ways of meeting established water quality goals. For this reason it is important for landowners to keep informed of the progress of the Agricultural Water Quality Plan

and the best way to do that is to attend the monthly meetings of the Local Advisory Committee (LAC). These meetings are on the second Wednesday of the month, at the Extension Office in Gold Beach at 7 p.m. The next meeting will be March 14th.

I would like to extend a "thank you" to everyone who has supported the Dark Sky efforts in this community. The quality of life at my house has improved greatly due to skycaps placed at GTE, Circle K, our local streetlight, and Salsa Rita's. The light that shines into my house at night is greatly diminished.

Anyone interested in noticing the difference these Dark Sky lights make can see an excellent example down at our new dock. Many of the new lights are designed to shine their bright light down on

the ground where it is needed, and not out where it shines into your eyes making it difficult to see. From the overlook you can see the glow of the lights as they are directed down. If you go down to the dock you will notice the contrast between these lights and the square lights that are on the cement building next to the bluff. Also, there are a couple of old streetlights with their globes hanging below the fixture. These lights shine in your eyes and make it difficult to see.

Dark Sky lights don't diminish the amount of light, but direct it down to the ground so it is not shining in your eyes. Please be sensitive to where the lights at your business and home shine. At some locations these blinding lights cause safety hazards. I understand there a few Free skycaps left. Donations are still expected for this worthwhile project. 

New Connections is a non-profit, tax-exempt, all volunteer organization organized for the purpose of helping to provide to the community information on Living, Healing, Dying and Death.







There were 30 fishing boats lifted into the water at the Port of Port Orford on Tuesday, March 6, keeping crane operators Dave Barnes and Richard Mijs busy. It was a beautiful day in the Port Orford neighborhood. Some of the fishermen were out searching for live fish; others for crab and still others like the Shenanigan out Juneau, Alaska were going for urchins.

Sometime during last weekend someone slashed 41 crabs pots belonging to Port Commissioner and fisherman David Darnell. They cut the rubber part, which holds the pots together. Darnell said the dollar damage was about 5-6 dollars per pot or a little over \$200. He said the police did not respond to his call concerning the crime.

The Port is getting closer to the day the two yellow cranes are fixed and back in order and new dock contractor Laskey-Clifton can have their crane back. Laskey Clifton did some work on the base plates on Monday, March 6 and has the parts to fix the hydraulics on the cranes. The Port is awaiting the federal government funding commitment letter from Congress-

New at the Library

Doesn't it seem like rainy and chilly days are perfect for preparing something special in the kitchen? With the oven warmed up, smells of baking bread travel throughout the house. A big pot of soup simmering on a back burner welcomes everybody who comes calling. Yum!

Speaking of food, we have added a new, expanded and revised edition of *Joy of Cooking* by Irma S. Rombauer and Marion Rombauer Becker. It is described and aptly so, as the "all-purpose cookbook." I have an old, old copy of *Joy of Cooking*. The cover is long gone, but the pages are stained with spatters and spills, its margins have notes written in a hurried hand, but I use it to this day and I can't imagine life without it. I bet you have a favorite cookbook too. Joanna M. Lund does. Her new cookbook; *Cooking Healthy with a Man in Mind*, has more than "200 lip-smacking, man-sized, soul-satisfying" recipes.

Tired of cooking? Then check out *Kitchen Confidential* by New York chef Anthony Bourdain. He's written a "deliciously funny, and shockingly delectable book." 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**Hazardous Materials Class


I would like to thank Laura Jo Hoffses for the use of her facility for a Hazardous Materials & Blood Borne Pathogens class. I would also like to thank the City for sending three of our public works personnel to this class. I hope they gained new information and will put it to use in their everyday jobs.

The instructor for the class was Jan Glarum, from Warrenton, Oregon. A Paramedic/Fire Fighter. He presented the material in such a way as to provoke our thinking about the unusual situations where we would not think of (at that moment), what could or would be a hazardous scene. The class included domestic violence as a hazardous scene. The violence is not limited to homes, but to schools, against agencies, individuals with grievances against the work place etc.

We generally think hazardous materials to be those grocery delivery trucks, the tanker trucks that overturn and spill, the chemical plants, and various other situations. What about those Meth labs that are in our area? Who is at risk making

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your community safe when our police, ambulance crew, or firemen have a response to a location? Does the average person even know that, in large airborne quantity, and if you expose it to your skin, this is a lethal situation? Are you the community aware of the chemicals used in a Meth lab easily purchased from within your community?

We also have hazardous materials at home that some of you may not think about when you fill your burn barrels or clean out the garage and throw out old paint, oil or various other pesticide receptacles. How do you safely handle those articles? Your fire department enters a

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hazardous area every time they gain entry to a structure fire. Today we have a different meaning to fire hazards than the old time structures built of non-toxic materials, and non-chemical treated lumber. Should the public be aware of these hazards and how to stay away from potential dangers? Yes, I believe that more public education is essential in this day, with the changes in building materials.

I would like to thank the others attending the class for their help with tables, clean up and putting the chairs back in place. If you needed this class and missed it, you missed some good new information and a relaxing good time.

Our Dock, along with other Port property will provide leasable real estate of significant value. With this construction phase behind us, the work will begin.

We have many issues to deal with, such as the public fishing dock, dredging, dockage rates, lease rates, infrastructure such as



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water and sewer upgrades and continued development. We have growing expenses and diminishing revenues. With the help of Mr. Hill there is a chance we can overcome the bleak financial situation we are facing and develop a plan that helps this Port maintain financial strength by minimizing costs and diversifying revenue sources. I want to see this Port be a genuine asset to the community and not a drain catering to special interest. This is your dock and it should work for you as well as your neighbor.

I urge you not to be distracted by those that spin negative slurs on the hard work of others without knowing or ignoring the facts.

Thinking about Water Continued from front page

Mayor Doran asked about desalting lake water but Allan Wagner said it couldn't be done with the current equipment. Watershed chairman John Leuthe recommended that one quarter of our water come from the lake. Currently the city is not using Garrison Lake water because the sodium level is 956mg/L near the surface at the intake near the former Pinehurst dock. According to Martha Weaver's report any level above 250mg/L will affect the taste of the water. Allan Wagner said he didn't want to go beyond a level of 100mg/L of sodium in the water. Leuthe recommended moving the water intake to an area on Mill Pond east of the Arizona Street bridge. Leuthe continued that the lake was much better than Gold Run Creek and that \$40,000 wouldn't be enough to get that water source going. Councilor Robert Warring said he wanted documentation on the appropriateness of using Gold Run Creek as a water source. Allan Wagner said the city has a water right on Gold Run Creek and if they didn't develop the water right they would lose it.

Councilor Leeling asked for additional information on the quality of water east of Arizona Street and the cost of extending the intake line. Councilor Carl Eskelson said the area east of Arizona Street is notoriously polluted.

Mayor Doran said he had walked Hubbard Creek recently and the idea has been proposed for more dams or impoundment areas further up the creek. Martha Weaver said she would ask the watermaster about increasing the storage capacity on Hubbard Creek. Councilor Cramer said one of the council goals could be requesting the watershed council do an assessment on the Hubbard Creek and Gold Run Creek watersheds.

The council listed their water supply goals as follows:

H.G.E. – contact them and get water treatment plant complete.

Gold Run Creek – get more reports about feasibility as a water source.

Dredging the Hubbard Creek water impoundment and find out about storage rights.

Water quality tests of Mill Pond east of Arizona Street.

Writing the watershed council a letter requesting they identify the property owners in the Hubbard Creek and Gold Run Creek watersheds.

This is just a small sample of what was discussed on Monday morning and if seems tedious or uninteresting just remember how important water is in all of our lives.
