## Ellen Warring Learning Center By Evan Kramer



A large gathering of friends and associates gathered on Saturday to dedicate the Ellen Warring Learning Center at the Storm Ranch at New River. The Learning

Center is located in a new two-story building adjacent to the parking area. The Storm Ranch is part of the New River Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC) and is administered by the Bureau of Land Management.

Several people spoke eloquently about Ellen including Holly Witt, a Port Orford resident and BLM employee. Witt said she had met Ellen through the Port Orford Watershed Council. The council had gone through difficult circumstances with a diverse group of people in the beginning but with no confrontation due to Ellen's efforts. Witt said Ellen Warring had been a role model for her and that Warring's life was equivalent to ten lives. She thanked Ellen's husband Bob for sharing her with us.

Ellen's friend Donna Roselius spoke next and talked about Ellen's love of music. The two played together in the Kammeroque Ensemble. Roselius said

Ellen had taught herself to play the viola, recorder and piano and that she did a lot of improvising. She went on to say that Ellen shared everything she knew with everyone and was never afraid of learning.

Curry County Commissioner Lucie La Bonte said Ellen understood consensus and people working together. La Bonte said Ellen had belonged to three watershed councils and was also involved with the Ocean Policy Task Force. La Bonte said she was glad the Learning Center was named for Ellen and that she had meant a lot to people from all walks of life.

Bob Bailey said he was here as a friend and also for his professional involvement with the Ocean Policy Advisory Council dealing with offshore oil and gas and mineral leases. Bailey said he had come to know and respect Ellen, who was also a member of the OPAC, having been appointed in 1992 by Governor Barbara Roberts. Bailey thanked the audience for sharing her at a larger state level.

Jim Britell said Ellen was a great facilitator and one tough person. Britell spoke about the positive effect the land use appeals Ellen filed had on the beauty of the coast. He called her the best land use attorney in the State of Oregon and said he had never seen her lose her temper.

Susan Richardson, Coos Bay Bureau of Land Management director, said though she had never met Ellen that she felt responsible for her legacy. Richardson thanked Neil Middlebrook for his involvement in the project. It was Middlebrook's idea to name the Learning Center after Ellen Warring.

Middlebrook gave a brief history of the BLM involvement with the Storm Ranch. The agency acquired the property in 1991 and a year later Middlebrook went to work for the BLM. Middlebrook said he had worked with Ellen on the management plan for Storm Ranch and that Ellen had spent two years working on the New River Steering Committee.

Middlebrook listed the goals of the Learning Center as maintaining the biological diversity of the area, protection of the Native American resources, and through educational programs maintaining awareness of the natural environment. He said the Learning Center would provide opportunities for school field trips and for students to do studies with hands on field experience. He said the Learning Center was available for other environmental and educational uses.

The Storm Ranch New River area is home to several hiking trails and a boat ramp.

**Community Planning Forum**

Citizens of Curry County are invited to participate in a community economic development planning forum for a countywide economic development strategic plan. The same planning forum will be held on three consecutive evenings. On Monday, May 21, the community economic development-planning forum will take place in the Port Orford area at Pacific High School Library, Highway 101. Commissioner Marlyn Schafer said she is encouraged by the enthusiasm and interest that is being shown in completing a countywide plan that brings all parts of the county together.

Rural Development Initiatives, Inc. (RDI), a private non-profit organization helping rural communities in the Pacific Northwest build capacity to make strategic decisions about their futures, will facilitate each of the three meetings. Fund-

ing from USDA Forest Service and the Oregon Economic and Community Development Department is paying for RDI's facilitation of this economic development strategic planning process.

In each of the economic development forums, the participants will collect their ideas of what they want Curry County to be like in twenty years. The group will then consider the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats that public and private groups in the county face when seeking to bring new jobs and economic development opportunities for all of the county's citizens. All ideas are welcomed and will be considered equally.

Since January of this year, RDI has been meeting with a core-planning group of Curry County citizens to move this economic development strategic planning process forward. In addition to attending one of the planning sessions, all Curry

County citizens are invited to comment by contacting Marlyn Schafer at 247-7011, extension 222.

After the long-range vision and the present strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats are identified, the core-planning group will develop planning goals, strategies and action steps – projects to bring jobs and needed economic development to Curry County. In the fall of this year, the core-planning group will once again hold community forums to present the results of their planning work. The final version of the economic development strategic plan will be available for citizen's review and comment by the end of the year.


# Wheelhouse Restaurant

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### Like Clockwork by Graeme Graydon



Last Sunday morning, as we walked towards my beach, I could tell that something was different. We had barely left the car when a barn swallow swooped around us, almost within reach – its blue iridescence flashing in the sun. “Well, Good morning,” I said, such exuberance, so early in the day. The tide was way out and there wasn’t a ripple to break the mirror image of the lagoon. By the time we reached the dunes, I could hardly believe how un-earthly quiet it was. The stillness was so powerful that I kept looking around as if looking would find explanation. The restless forces of wind and sea, tide and river, had collaborated to produce a pristine moment so hushed and peaceful that I felt as if I was in the calm pause between a vast outbreath and the breath yet to come.

Sitting on a log, I forgot about the issues that usually surface on my mind, instead, I became absorbed in the life before me. For once, the seals were completely indifferent to our presence, lying on their sides

sunning their happy bellies, an occasional sleepy stretch, but no raising up on the elbows to keep an eye on us. And there were baby seals everywhere, scampering about amongst the adults or so new that they kept close to their mothers. With no wind to ride on, the gulls were lining up on the river bank near the mouth to paddle out onto the stream, where they sat all prim and proper as the water bobbed them up and down on its standing waves, like a water-coaster-ride out to the sea. When threatened by an incoming wave, they flew back to take another ride. Now these guys weren’t feeding, washing themselves or drinking, they were joy-riding, again and again. (Just because gulls cant smile doesn’t mean they’re not smiling.)

A few hundred yards out to sea, lay Castle Rock, a nesting place for cormorants. We were sitting right under the fly-way of an unending procession of them, one after another, as they flew inland – at least a mile – and back, each with a single length of what looked like a dry stalk of grass for a nest. I wondered how they all knew that this was the morning to build nests, and how did they know the best place to get the right stuff. I don’t know how many stalks make one nest, but at 2 miles, (at least), per stalk, that’s a lot of flying time.

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Barn swallows, (unusual visitors to this beach), were picking up the fluffy, white down that the gulls had combed out, to take back to line their adobe houses.

Without thinking too much about it, I felt as if I was inside a kind of clockwork system that whirred and purred around me, where everything did exactly what it was meant to do, where everything was connected in harmonious inter-play with everything else, an intricate, perfect dance. Without calendars or watches, its sense of timing could hardly be matched in my world. (Will we ever get our garden in on time?)


It was easy to imagine that this whole vibrant scene had to be organized by some devoted entity, unseen, un-named by us, but whose hand was so obviously evident.

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
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### New at the Library By Paula Cracas

When was the last time you read a book that knocked your socks off? Sucker-punched you, but didn't lift you off the floor into a warm embrace and tell you that everything's right? A book that explains how when you were driving down the highway of big mistakes, asleep at the wheel, you were on a collision course. A book that you didn't want to put down, but wish, when you turn that last page, you hadn't read. Here a few quotes directly from the book.

"Every day in the United States, roughly 200,000 are sickened by a foodborne disease, 900 are hospitalized, and fourteen die."

"An American food processor can expect a visit from an FDA inspector, on average, once every ten years. At the moment, the nation's roughly 2000,000 fast food restaurants are not subject to any oversight by federal health authorities."

"Until August of 1997, about 75 percent of the cattle in the United States were routinely fed...rendered remains of dead sheep, and dead cattle...dead cats and dead dogs...purchased from animal shelters. The waster products from poultry plants, including the sawdust and old newspapers used as litter, are also being fed to cattle. Cattle blood is being put into the feed given to American cattle."

One final quote: "The Center for Disease Control estimates that about 280,000 Americans die every year as a direct result of being overweight. More than half of all American adults and about one-quarter of all American children are obese or overweight."

The name of the book is Fast Food Nation: The Dark Side of the All American Meal by Eric Schlosser. It serves up a crash course in processed foods. If we are what we eat...Yikes! Leave it to the Port Orford Library to have books that will challenge you; maybe even change you. Fast Food Nation. Check it out.

## Art & Seafood Festival News

In a cooperative effort to support the Arts and Seafood Festival 2001, a group of Port Orford area churches have joined together to host this year's Tuna Barbecue on Sunday, September 2. Rev. Doug Jamison, pastor of the Port Orford Christian Center, has been named coordinator for the Festival's largest seafood event. He will be heading up a team that will involve people from most of the area churches.

The Tuna Barbecue will be held Sunday afternoon, 2 to 6 pm in the new Christian Center Gymnasium in the heart of the Arts and Seafood "Strolling Area" and just a block from the Community Building where the Arts and Crafts Emporium will be held again this year.

Jamison said, "We will not be varying much from the pattern that has made the Tuna Barbecue such a favorite Port Orford event in past years — fresh barbecued tuna, corn on the cob and a variety of salads and deserts produced by dozens of people around town." Part of the revenue from the Tuna Barbecue will be used to underwrite other Arts and Seafood Festival activities and the rest will be used by the churches in outreach ministries to the people of the area.

The Tuna Barbecue at the Arts and Seafood Festival has been hosted in past years by the Port Orford Women's Fishery Network and the Port Orford Arts Council, both of which will remain as active partners in the Festival. The Women's Fishery will be serving their famous clam chowder both Saturday and Sunday in the Legion Hall and the Arts Council will be hosting the Fine Arts and Crafts Emporium and the Junk Art Contest and Show in the Community Building.

This year's Festival will also include a Religious Art Show, hosted by the area churches in the Christian Center Gymnasium, the Show and Shine Auto Show sponsored by the Port Orford Rotary

"It is our hope that, when anyone drives down 101 during the Festival, they will be so overwhelmed by the colors and sounds and aromas that they will be compelled to stop and stay awhile!" said Ronn Kerr, who, along with Jo Kerr, is serving as 2001 Festival Coordinator.

In the next few weeks, more than 200 organizations, artists, and merchants in the North Curry County area will be contacted about the details of the Festival and their potential participation. "In Port Orford, we are proud of our heritage as both an arts community and fishing community and the Arts and Seafood Festival 2001 will be a celebration of both these

great traditions," said Kerr. "Every year, the Festival has grown, more organizations and businesses have participated, and more and more visitors have come to know the unique charm of the Port Orford area. With the area churches doing the Tuna Barbecue and the Religious Art Show this year, the Festival will expand to involve even more of the community."

Do all of us lose bone density as we age? Is that dangerous? What's the best exercise for preventing osteoporosis? Walking, running, or jumping up and down? Any new treatments since Fosamax?

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### Infrastructure Milestone

The city achieved an important milestone on our path to rebuilding the sewer effluent disposal system that was destroyed in the 1998 storms with issuance of the Design Request for Proposal (RFP) this week. Last month the city selected two firms to compete for a contract to design the new system - often referred to as the "Outfall." The two firms selected to receive RFPs are: West Yost of Eugene and SHN of Eureka, California. This week we sent those two firms a detailed RFP with our requirements. Next, both engineering firms will submit project proposals.

In June, based on the project proposals, one of the engineering companies will be awarded the contract to design the sewer effluent disposal system. The company awarded the design contract will then proceed to prepare detailed engineering specifications, environmental assessments, and other technical materials which will serve as the documents we will use to solicit bids to select a company to build the "Outfall." Ellen Warring, who died in December 1998, deserves this Learning Center named after her. She was actively involved in Port Orford from the basket studio she ran with her husband Bob to playing music at the Roaring Sea Art Gallery. She loved animals and she and Bob had a black labrador they doted on named Jake. Ellen was on the Port Orford Planning Commission as well as being active for many years in the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society as land use chairperson. She was one of the founding members and secretary of the Port Orford Watershed Council. No matter what project Ellen Warring was involved she stuck with it and that is one of her best lessons. Her life is truly inspirational.

## 2CJ Board Adopts Policies

Kevin Gore told the board the seniors were making a last ditch effort to raise money for bus transportation and they were keeping their hopes up for the trip. The seniors need \$500 to pay for the use of the school bus and \$480 to pay for the wages of the driver.

Blanco School principal Judy Shay showed the board two presentations on recent events at the school including "A Walk Through Time" with students dressed as historical figures in fourteen different time eras. She also presented photos from the recent science and watershed projects.

Transportation superintendent Justin Potter told the board he had been asked to drive for Project Graduation. He said he would do it again as he had for sixteen years. Phil Sword gave the recently elected school board members their certificates of election.
