Agreement Terminated By Evan Kramer



The Port of Gold Beach Commission met on Thursday night and a contingent of people from Port Orford attended the meeting. Gold Beach Commissioners Scott

Boley, Gary Combs, Ted Ferguson, Larry Adcock and Milt Walker were present. Manager Mike Nielson was not in attendance. Retiring port commissioner Ted Ferguson was given a distinguished service award by the City of Gold Beach for his ten years work on the port commission.

The commission next heard from the public. But first let's set the stage for the following remarks so they are in context.

The Port of Gold Beach Commission, in their March 15, 2001 meeting voted to give notice to the Port of Port Orford of intent to terminate the Management Services Agreement between the two Ports effective June 20. This was done at the request of Mike Nielson, manager of the Ports of Gold Beach and Port Orford.

The Port of Port Orford Commission met in regular session on May 15 and voted by a 3-0 margin to send the Port of Gold Beach Commission a letter requesting

that the notice of intent to terminate be rescinded.

The regularly scheduled Port of Port Orford meeting for June 19 was postponed and rescheduled for June 26. No reason was given locally. However, in Mike Nielson's management report to the Gold Beach commission dated June 21, 2001 he said, "Port Orford deferred their regularly scheduled meeting of the 19th to await the outcome of the Gold Beach full Commission's position regarding the joint management agreement."

And now the public comment...

Sixes resident Bob Walters said the joint management agreement between the Ports of Gold Beach and Port Orford wasn't working. Walters said the job of manager of the Port Orford requires more time than Mike Nielson has to spend on it. Incoming Port of Port Orford commissioner Gifford Barnes said one of the biggest problems was what it is costing us (the Port of Port Orford). He said since January of this year the Port had been going in the hole and that there were very limited resources in Port Orford. Barnes said the Port didn't have enough money to pay Nielson \$3,000 a month, \$2,000 for the secretary and \$1,200 to the Port of Gold Beach every month. Gold Beach Commission chairman Scott Boley said


Gold Beach had gotten into the situation because Port Orford's cranes weren't working and other problems at the Port. Barnes said that grant money won't pay the fuel bills and that the fuel money fishermen were paying was going towards salaries.

Scott Boley said that Gold Beach had recently signed Mike Nielson to an exclusive five-year contract. He said, "We always recognized Port Orford wanted it's own autonomy." Jean Kilburn said we couldn't afford the combined salaries of \$75,000 a year and that we needed to rule our own Port not Gold Beach. Sixes resident Beverly Walters said that manager Nielson hadn't told the truth to the people in the Port District. She gave as examples the Representative Peter DeFazio letter of commitment Nielson spoke of (but which DeFazio was unaware of) and the check for \$321,000 from OEDD, which still hasn't been received at the Port and is still at the attorney general's office. She said Nielson continues spending money that isn't there and gave as an example the excavator work currently going on at the

Port. Jay Stoler, former editor and publisher of the Port Orford News, and a member of the Port budget committee the past three years said that when Nielson came on as manager he was overjoyed. But Stoler continued that Nielson "hasn't pulled the trigger, he hasn't solved the problems at the Dock." Stoler mentioned a recent incident involving Nielson where he signed a five-year contract with fish buyer NorCal that the Port attorney Randal Tosch said in a letter was not legal and that the Port Commission should have voted on.

Blane Steinmetz, president of the fishermen's association, said he was concerned about the fuel bill – that it wasn't being paid. He said we need a full time manager. Paula Cracas asked the Commission not to allow Nielson to continue being our manager. She said he doesn't communicate well with citizens. Cracas

said, "We love our Port and fishermen." She went on that we're small potatoes up here and want to find our own small potato to run our Port.

Scott Boley expressed his concerns when he said, "I don't want Port Orford to be a burden on the rest of the county or become a ward of the state." Boley told people to make sure they had thought their sentiments through.

The commission then dealt with the rest of their public agenda (nothing on it concerned the joint management agreement) before adjourning into executive session under ORS 192.660 (1) (a) Personnel regarding the Port manager. The press was told not to report on the executive board meeting.

The Commission resumed their regular meeting at 9:48pm. Chairman Boley said he would entertain a motion to rescind the letter of termination. No one spoke. Boley said hearing no motions and then

Gold Beach Port attorney Frank Roberts jumped in and helped him finish off the sentence, "the agreement is terminated June 20."

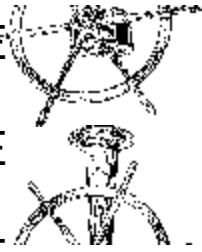

there was an unconscious, worn-out body, and that somehow you didn't exist any more. What a way to say "goodbye."

In the last days before death, the dying one slips in and out of this world - far more freely and with more awareness than we imagine. I was in New York, preparing for my first-ever Thanksgiving. Leaving the festivities, I wandered off into the forest and wept, uncontrollably, with a clear thought of my father-in-law in New Zealand. The following day, a telegram announced his death. Pop had dropped in to say "Goodbye."

So the answer to my friend was, of course your mother knew you were there, and that she heard every word that you said. Always say everything that is in the heart, and listen from the heart - this may be the last chance you get to say what you will kick yourself for a lifetime, if you don't say it now.

Last Words by Graeme Graydon



A friend asked me, "is a dying, unconscious person aware of people at the bedside, and can they hear what is said?" Countless near-death stories report that, although the body is left unconscious, the person, the consciousness, continued uninterrupted, sharply aware of everything around them. My first wife, who was a dental nurse, told me of a patient who was put under anesthesia. When she recovered, she asked the dentist why he did - some little thing. The amazed dentist asked her how she knew about it. "I saw you, I was standing right beside you." Anesthetics force us out of our bodies, which truly, are only vehicles. Some people are able to remain conscious, standing or floating near their body, where they can hear and see everything. They may have a lot to say, but no one can hear them. Every time I met a nurse who worked around surgical patients, I would ask about it. I have been told, dozens of times, of people who were able to accurately describe everything

that happened when they were presumed to be unconscious.

I came across a surgeon who allowed no chit-chat in the operating theater. He knew that his patients could hear every word that was said, although most would be unable to recall it. He insisted on this practice out of respect for his clients. In New Zealand, the native Maori people understand this very well. After death, it is customary, (for those still keeping the ancient wisdom), to place the body prominently on display for a long ceremony called a "tangi." As the guests arrive, they stand before the open coffin and speak directly to the deceased, who is presumed to be very present and very alive, probably standing beside his own body. It is a time for honoring, appreciation and even humor, not for the departed, but for one who is still there. The "tangi" is an important time which draws family and friends to celebrate the end of a dream and the beginning of a dream. Many people in the dying process, want to say "goodbye" to as many as possible, to say, "thank you" and, "I love you", and, to hear "I love you." How cruel it would be to have a loved family gather in silence around you, thinking that all that was

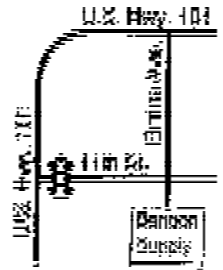

What Does The Future Hold?

Some very difficult choices await Port Orford residents 150 years in the future: whether to eat at Spacy's Fast Food or Chuckie Cheese, whether to visit the bowling lanes or shop for plastic clothing via computer, before deciding whether to fly a mini-jet from one of the lighthouse-shaped towers, take the underground Bandon Transport, or enjoy the more leisurely historic oxen cart through the scenic forest. At least, these are some of the options presented by kids, ages six to sixteen, who participated in Port Orford's 150th Anniversary Art and Literature Contest sponsored by POET (Port Orford Entertainment Team). One perception seemed clear and constant, however: Port Orford then as now, population 1000.

Winners in the Art Category were: First place in the ages six to eight class went to eight year-old Noelene Dacayana for her watercolor of Cape Blanco Lighthouse with a sailboat. In the ages nine to eleven

class, eleven year-old Signe Tronson took first place in her class and best of show for her comic book-style travel guide to Port Orford, 2151, as shown by guide, Xori. Second place in that class went to Evelyn Sweet, age nine, with her 3-dimensional diorama which featured the Downtown Fun Zone, Bartlett's Cafe, and the Bandon Tunnel. Nine year-old Todd Martin, took third place for his watercolor of Battle Rock with space towers. Na-Kia Neighbors, age thirteen, won first place in the twelve to fourteen ages class with her "Mermaid In Dreamland" tempura painting. In the fifteen to eighteen year-olds' class, Holly Garnette took first place for her pencil rendering of a lovely, ethereal lady and a child with a sea star.

In the Literature Category, eleven year-old Brett Martin won first place in his class and best of show for his essay on Port Orford 150 years ago, now, and 150 years in the future.

Congratulations to our talented youth, who certainly promise a colorful, creative future, whether "high-tech," "retro," or same as usual for our Port Orford town. An image of this quandary lingers, depicted in a pencil sketch by sixteen year-old Holly Garnette titled "Port Orford 150 Years From Now/150 Years Ago." In the drawing, Highway 101 is traveled one direction by spacecraft lined with skyscrapers and the other direction by oxen-driven covered wagons lined by forest. The open question is obvious: "Which way do we go?"

Winning works will be displayed at the library and winners will be invited to ride on the Fourth of July POET float, "Respect the Past... Embrace the Future." A total of \$197.00 was awarded to the entrants from POET celebrating Port Orford's 150th birthday. Many thanks to Tobe Porter and the Port Orford Library Staff for helping to sponsor this event.

**New Library

Now that framing is underway for the new Langlois Library, attention is shifting to plans for a new Port Orford Library. The Port Orford Library currently rents 2,200 square feet of space from the City of Port Orford and has been looking to expand into its own building for several years.

Port Orford Library Director Tobe Porter and Library Foundation members Jon Porter and Howard Lichtig helped set the record straight about plans for a new library. The Port Orford Library District includes all of the City of Port Orford and some areas to the north, south and east of the city. It is run by a group of elected officers who include Sonja Mowatt-president, Adria Merryman, Carrie Rogers, Barbara Leeling and Dot Mathews. There is also a group called the Friends of the Port Orford Library, which helps out with fund raising and volunteer work at the library. The main decisions concerning the library and possible expansion will be made the elected library board. The library foundation is there to recommend only, not make final decisions and can be described as the fund raising arm of the library.

The library foundation is an incorporated, private non-profit tax-exempt organization. All donations to it are "totally" tax-exempt. Right now the Foundation has \$4,600 in its checking account but plans on adding to that in its fundraising role for a new library. The Port Orford Library District has \$131,000 in its library expansion fund.

The Port Orford Library District is moving forward on plans for a new library. It will be built and owned by the Library District, which will also own the land. No building site has been acquired yet but the District and Foundation are looking for potential locations. Tobe Porter says their goal is for a 7,000 square foot library with ample off street parking located within the city limits and with a minimum lot size of 20,000 square feet. County standards are one parking space per 400 square feet. Porter said the new library would have a meeting room but will not share the building with NCFCC, Head

Start or other organizations.

Foundation board member Jon Porter told me the library foundation has set up a fund raising committee, which is looking for citizens willing to help with fundraising. This group will serve as a committee of the foundation. The Port Orford Library Foundation plans more local fundraisers including a breakfast at the Arts and Seafood Festival in September. They recently raised over \$600 at the M2=Music and Movies at the Savoy Theater. The seven member foundation board meets once a month.

Tobe Porter said that the library district needs a piece of property first, then architectural renderings of a new library and then it can go to big grantors with something to show them. The estimated cost of the new library is one million dollars.

Community Bldg. Spruce Up

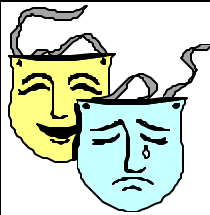
A group of local volunteers is making plans to fix up the Port Orford Community Building. Some of the plans are to finish painting the outside of the building and work on the landscaping.

Plans for the interior of the building include cleaning it, insulate and drywall the unfinished parts of the walls, replace the damaged ceiling tiles, paint the steel support beams and last but not least replace the side emergency exit doors which are rusted and falling apart.

The drywall will be purchased from Western Builders. People who want to contribute to the project can go to Western Builders and purchase a sheet or two of drywall. A 4'x8' sheet of drywall costs \$5.60 and a 4'x12 foot sheet costs \$8.40. The project needs four 12' pieces and fifteen 8' pieces. The purchased sheets of drywall will be picked up from Western Builder on the day work begins. Other supplies that are needed include four gallons of metal paint, Kilz paint, ceiling tiles, 5/8" drywall screws, mud and tape.

Western Builder provided the lowest bid for the steel exit doors, which was \$1768.75. Donations to help pay for this can be made to the City of Port Orford – door/community building. The city is a 501c3 corporation and all donations are tax deductible. The city will give you a receipt for your donation.

Scooting down the Coast

Ally LeCaux and John Morris are scooting and bicycling down the coast as a way to raise money for ovarian cancer research. Morris is riding a recumbent bike and pulling the "luggage" trailer. LeCaux is riding on a unique looking adult sized scooter and pushing and riding her way to San Francisco.

The two started in Astoria at the Highway 101 Bridge and plan to cover 1,000 miles before they finish their journey at the Golden Gate Bridge on July 22. LeCaux's goal is to get people to pledge \$20 for each mile the pair travels and finish up with \$20,000 pledged. The money is going directly to the Lynn Cohen Foundation for Ovarian Cancer Research. LeCaux's mother died of ovarian cancer on August 20 last year. Ally said that there is no early detection test for ovarian cancer. The Lynne Cohen Foundation is working on finding an early detection test.

LeCaux said 27,000 women were diagnosed with it last year and 14,000 died from it last year. LeCaux and Morris raised money for their trip expenses through garage sales, auctions and collecting bottles. They have had help along the way and when they stay in Gold Beach on Tuesday night Ireland's Rustic Lodges is putting them up for the night. The Bandon Chamber of Commerce held a barbecue for them on Saturday and in Seaside the Chamber donated a night's lodging.

Donations can be made by calling Barbara at the Burley Company in Eugene. Burley Company made the recumbent bike and trailer they are using on their trip and it is also where LeCaux works. pany that makes these distinctive adult sized scooters and which donated the scooter for this fund raising effort.

LeCaux and Morris stopped by the Fun Zone on Tuesday morning and Ally let me try out her scooter. She reminded me that it wasn't so easy going uphill as it was traveling along 101 in Port Orford. They then went to the Seaweed Café, had something to eat and then pedaled/pushed towards Nesika Beach where they plan on staying overnight before going to Gold Beach.

A While Ago . . .
By Jane Cramer

A while ago I received a gift that made me think about the things that worked together to contribute to the founding of Port Orford 150 years ago by Captain William Tichenor.

The gift consisted of copies of Captain Tichenor's own story of his life both before and after he settled in Port Orford.

Captain Tichenor was born in Newark, New Jersey on June 13, 1813 and made his first sea voyage in 1825. That voyage was the beginning of a lifetime love affair with the sea. "I was designed for the sea altogether" is the way he described it.

At the age of 20 he married Elizabeth Brinkerhoff and decided to quit the sea and settle down. He moved to Indiana to be away from the temptation of a life at sea and later on moved farther inland to Illinois.

By 1849 he couldn't resist the urge to head for the Pacific Coast to look for a place to settle. In 1850 a gale forced him off course on a voyage to the Trinity River. After the storm was over he found himself off Cape Blanco and took advantage of the situation to explore the coastline carefully in hopes of finding the best place to settle with his family.

He was so impressed with the harbor at Port Orford that he was determined it was the place he had been looking for.

The rest of the story is well known: the initial small party that landed in June, 1851 and the larger party in July, 1851. Even after he brought his family to Port Orford in 1852, he continued to satisfy his desire for a life at sea until 1868, when he gave it up for good.

Captain Tichenor was a man who lived a rough life full of adventure and some misadventures as well. He was a man who was willing to follow his dreams and fight for what he perceived to be his rights. He was enough of a natural leader on land or at sea that people were willing to follow him and trust him.

A couple of stories stand out for me. One refers to a wagon train headed for the gold fields on the American River in California. When Captain Tichenor decided the leader of the wagon train wasn't doing a good enough job, he split off from the group to go his own way. The people who chose to go along with him were glad they

had when his group reached the destination in good shape two months before the other group which had met with many mishaps.

The passengers on the Sea Gull when it wrecked in Humboldt Bay in 1852 appreciated his efforts in saving their lives. They presented him with a watch inscribed with an expression of esteem and regard of the passengers he helped to save. He treasured that watch and always carried it with him

All in all, it isn't surprising that a man who was "designed for the sea" would choose to settle in a place like Port Orford with a natural deep water harbor. And it is good for us to remember that our celebration in 2001 is possible because of his vision a while ago.
