The Phantom Motion By Evan Kramer



The Port of Port Orford Commission met on Tuesday, July 17, and they are in search of a new manager and port commissioner.

But first they had to deal with the minutes of previous meetings and there lies the phantom motion. Commissioner Gifford Barnes pointed out to chairman Dave Knapp that in the July 5 special session minutes there was a motion that was never made and voted on that nevertheless was in the minutes. Knapp told Barnes, "I guess we can do it at this meeting." Barnes was referring to the motion regarding increasing the interim manager's salary to \$36,000 per year with Gifford Barnes abstaining and the other three commissioners voting for it. The minutes were approved with the in question motion removed. The commission did not return to the subject later in the meeting.

Jay Stoler gave each of the commissioners his resume in a sealed manila envelope and told them he was applying for the port manager job. Cecil Ashdown, representing the Women's Fishery Network, requested the commission have a Port employee hook the light up and regular trash clean up in the area of the fishermen's memorial. Gifford Barnes made a motion to have port employees dump the trash, sweep the area and hookup the light and it passed 4-0.

Cheryl Douglass asked the commission about the port paperwork that is at the Port of Gold Beach and was told by interim manager Kathy Sherbourne that she hadn't been able to get it vet. Fishermen Chris Aiello spoke about the port charges to fishermen for leaving their crab pots on the dock. He said the rule has been on the books but not enforced. Aiello said he would like for the commissioners to wipe out those charges. He said the 3-day time limit for removing pots from the dock was unreasonable. He recommended a 7-10 day time period for removing the pots. Gifford Barnes made a motion to give the fishermen ten days to remove their pots from the dock and delete the previous charges already submitted to the fishermen. An amendment to the motion was offered making April 1 the deadline for the start of the ordinance and it passed along with the motion.

Jane Cramer said she was still looking for the public fishing dock.


The commission agreed to send a letter of thanks written up by Kathy

Sherbourne to former manager Mike Nielson

Commissioner David Darnel made a motion to accept Leesa Cobb's resignation from the commission. The commission will advertise in the two local newspapers for people interested in filling the position and make their decision at the next meeting in August. Paula Cracas recommended sending a letter of thanks to Leesa Cobb and the commission passed a motion to send her a letter of appreciation.

Ed Dowdy spoke to the commission about his work on "altering condition #18 of Amendment #3 to the Special Public Works Fund Financial Assistance Award. He said he had spoken with Chris Claflin with Oregon Economic Community Development Department on July 10 to see if the State would remove or relax condition #18 regarding litigation. Dowdy said there seems to be no information in the Port office documenting malfeasance of the contractors. Dowdy said he tried to get Claflin to relax condition #18 but Claflin was adamant about the Port pursuing remedies. Dowdy suggested using the clause for mediation in the contract with Laskey-Clifton. He said the reasonable process would be go into mediation with Laskey-

A While Ago . . . By Jane Cramer

A while ago a visitor to the Hughes House told me she had grown up in Port Orford many years ago. That caught my attention, of course, since I always enjoy hearing people tell me about the 'old days' in Port Orford.

My new friend's father was the town's dentist and her mother was the pharmacist so both had an important role to play in the health and well being of local residents. The family lived in an apartment that was part of the dentist's office and pharmacy building, which was located in the place now occupied by the Wheelhouse Restaurant. The family enjoyed the same view from their living room as patrons of the restaurant today enjoy while they dine, right down Battle Rock Beach toward Cabbage Rock.

My friend and her brothers enjoyed living in Port Orford and she told me about some of the interesting things that they found to do while playing with their friends. Growing up practically next to Battle Rock created a lot of interest in its history and local kids heard the stories of the battle many time as they were growing up. They were especially fascinated by the accounts of the warrior with the red shirt, the one who appeared to be the leader of the local Indian band.

As children of other areas often do, the children of Port Orford retold the stories their own way, usually with the intent of frightening their friends. Sometimes an active imagination can find ghosts where none originally existed. This was the way the ghost of Red Shirt was born.

When Lonalee, my new friend, mentioned a story she had written about Battle Rock, I was extremely interested in learning more because I thought of a way to incorporate her story, Red Shirt's Revenge, into Port Orford's 150th Anniversary celebration. When I asked if she would be willing to share her story with

others, she readily agreed and a few days later I received the story in the mail.

On Friday, August 3, an evening of entertainment called "Port Orford Portraits – A Patchwork of History" will be presented. Since the evening's agenda will include songs and stories connected with Port Orford's history, her story about Battle Rock should fit right in. My family and I enjoyed reading her story and we think you'll enjoy hearing it read by one of Port Orford's talented story readers.

I always enjoy talking to people who lived in Port Orford many years ago. Port Orford's 150th Anniversary celebration will be a good opportunity to learn more about the early years. In addition to Port Orford Portraits on Friday, descendants of Captain Tichenor will be in town for the 150th celebration and will be at a reception at the Senior Center the afternoon of August 4. I plan to be at both events and learn more about the Port Orford of a while ago.

Our Own Mountain By Graeme Graydon



Wherever I go, I notice the people – all kinds of people. We hold many things in common, we follow the same basic rules for driving on the roads, we speak the

same language, we wear the same kinds of clothing, have the same favorite foods, vote in the same elections and watch the same sunsets. Yet from all this similarity, there are only a few who I count as being like me, just a tiny few make it into my world, the rest belong to "them". But almost invariably, when I get to talk to one of "them", one on one. I'll find someone who is one of "us"- he. she is just like me – and then I remember that what we all share, no matter how similar or how different we may appear. is that each one of us has our own mountain to climb. Everyone has their own unique challenge to work out everyone, those who are counted as successful and those who don't seem to get anywhere. The ones with a wall-full of degrees and the high-school dropouts, it makes no difference, we all have our own mountain, and it's equally difficult for each one of us.

Our mountains have a lot to do with learning to love, and to be loved, they have a lot to do with building trust, it is deep personal stuff, like overcoming fears, getting rid of self blame and other inadequacies of not being good enough or not being recognized - and they're different in some way from everyone else's. No one can climb for another, a mother cannot walk for her son nor a father for his daughter. There are no maps to show the trails, because everything changes all the time. It is the quiet, unsuspected theme which has played behind everything that I ever did, my work, my marriages, my present. For a long time. I never realized that I had a mountain, for the most part it was invisible, looking more like the ups and downs of a life lived, but time brings focus and I can see the pattern better and there's a place which is a limitation to me - I have never been able to get past it and I've tried often enough. It's a tough climb, a challenge that I've never beaten before. I don't know quite what to do but walk towards it for another try.



Your Oregon Lottery dollars came back to Langlois on Thursday morning when a check for \$55,200 was turned over to Langlois Library Director Tobe Porter.

The Langlois Library applied for lottery funds in February of this year to the Coos Curry Douglas Regional Investment Board. \$1.8 million in lottery funds was available for the three county region. Last year the Regional Investment Board funded 66 projects. The Langlois Library was rated the #3 for projects in Curry County. The \$55,200 is to be used for construction of the library only and funds will be paid to Ralph Swanson's AAR construction company.

The Regional Investment Program funds projects for community and economic development with lottery monies mandated by the Oregon legislature through the Oregon Economic and Community Development Department.

Coos Curry Douglas Regional Investment Board is composed of 18 members including one county commissioner for each of the three counties and five citizens per county. It is an advisory board and all members serve as volunteers. Curry County Commissioner Marilyn Schafer serves on the Investment Board and is the chairperson.

Eileen Ophus, a community development coordinator with CCD Business Development Corporation, presented the check for \$55,200 to Tobe Porter. CCD is the fiscal agent for the Regional Investment Board.

Meanwhile the AAR Construction crew was busy at work building the new 3,100 square foot library. Contractor Ralph Swanson was ready to head back to Wolf Creek but the rest of the crew was installing roof rafters on Thursday morning. The roof trusses had been installed earlier in the week. The building has four "pods" attached to the four exterior walls

that give it a distinctive shape. Three of the pods will be used for storage and the fourth one will serve as the bathroom. There will be two front doors and two rear doors in the building and lots of windows as well as a skylight.

Hiking in the Wilderness By Evan Kramer

The Friends of Elk River sponsored both a bird watch and a hike on Sunday as part of a celebration of Wilderness Week. A brave group of people assembled at 4:30am for a drive up Elk River to Panther Creek to view the Marbled Murrelets flying above Elk River Road. These birds hunt for their supper in the ocean but live high atop old growth trees inland where they nest.

Other people showed up at Steelblue Chameleon Lodge on Elk River Road including Malcolm Young and myself around 7:30am for a delicious multi course breakfast. If only I could have tried one of everything. We then set out for the Elk River Fish Hatchery where hikers carpooled up Elk River Road to the trailhead for Barklow Mountain. It is nearly 20 miles from the hatchery to the trailhead and the Forest Service has done a fair job of maintaining the roads. Jerry Becker, one of the Friends of Elk River and hike leader, gave a brief history of the trail and the area before we set out on our walk in Port Orford's backvard - the Siskiyou National Forest. Becker said the peak of Barklow Mountain may have been a vision quest site where Native American teens went to pray and fast. He said later on prospectors used the trail. They used the trail to connect to the poverty gulch area where there was a mining community. Later the peak of Barklow Mountain became a fire lookout but the lookout has long since been destroyed in favor of aerial surveillance. The trail was abandoned when the fire lookout was closed.

Last fall several members of the Friends of Elk River and others went back to the abandoned fire lookout trail and worked to make it passable for hikers again. Becker said one thing to watch out for on the hike Sunday was being stung by yellow jackets. The group set out for the summit of Barklow Mountain, which is 3,579 feet above sea level, under clear skies. The trail was a gain in elevation of about 1.000 feet from the trailhead to the summit and a little over one and a half miles in length. Jim Rogers took part in the hike and provided excellent background information on the area including a historical knowledge of the various fires in the area and identification of different trees and their approximate ages. The hike was moderately easy other than a couple of steep areas which got our hearts beating (exercise that's fun). When we got to the summit we sat down to a brown bag lunch prepared for us by the Steelblue Chameleon Lodge. Thanks Mark and Mary Kimball and Deb Gehrke. The views from the top of Barklow Mountain were exceptional.

The Barklow Mountain Trail is within the proposed Copper Salmon Wilderness area. The Friends of Elk River have been working on this proposal for over fifteen years, which has the support of Senator Ron Wyden and Governor John Kitzhaber. The Copper Salmon proposal would protect 12,000 acres as wilderness in the Elk River headwaters and the North Fork of the Elk. Currently the land is designated Late Successional Reserve which means logging is to take place only for forest health. New GED Tests

Changes to the General Education Development (GED) will be initiated January 2002. Adults in Oregon who are working toward their GED certificate have until December 2001 to complete the testing. Starting January 2002, the GED Testing Service in Washington D.C. will release new tests to replace the current edition. Any GED candidate who has not successfully completed the GED by that time must start over again with the 2002 Series GED tests to qualify for an Oregon certificate.

Those students who do not pass all five tests will have to start over, including payment of the testing fees. Testing is available in Curry County through Southwestern Oregon Community College at the Brookings Center. Testing is usually done once a month and the fee is \$50.00. Since March of 2001, the Curry program had 23 students who have successfully obtained their GED. Free GED classes are available through all three locations in the Curry Program.

The Department of Community Colleges and Workforce Development have been trying to locate people who have begun work toward their GED certificate. "We have some 10,000 people who have completed one or more of the five tests and are in jeopardy of losing their test scores if they do not finish before the end of 2001," said GED Administrator Sharlene Walker, "and we don't want anyone falling through the cracks."

Finding those individuals who have started but not yet completed the five tests is proving to be a difficult task. More than 9,400 postcards were sent out as reminders, but 2,050 were returned because people have moved.

The first, in the amount of \$10,200, was awarded to the Port Orford Public Library Foundation by Meyer Memorial Trust. The funds are to be used to purchase computers and software for Port Orford, Langlois and Agness Public Libraries—see what working together can get ya? The members of the Library Foundation Board are pleased to have a successful grant under their collective belts, and the library staff are looking forward to a brand new computer.

The second bit of good news is receipt of a special Oregon "Books for Children" grant from the Libri Foundation. Clifton. Dowdy referred to this as a "discovery process." Dowdy went on to say many people are willing to help the Port and advised the commission to convene a board of advisors to help them.

Chairman Dave Knapp thanked Ed Dowdy for his efforts. David Darnell said the port would have to sue the engineering firm of PN & D. Jean Kilburn advised the commission not to hire a lawyer until they hire a full time manager. Dave Knapp said he learned towards mediation. David Darnell made a motion to start "arbitration" on the OECDD contract as soon as possible and it passed 4-0.

David Darnell made a motion to sign the supplemental grant agreement with OECDD. Gifford Barnes recommended not signing it until the mediation process is gone through. Barnes said he wants to send the fuel system work out to bid. Dave Knapp told him the fuel system was all tied to the project. The commission voted 3-1 to sign the agreement with Barnes voting no.

The commission elected new officers as follows: Dave Knapp – chairperson; David Darnel – vice-chair, Tom Hall – secretary; and Gifford Barnes.

The commission discussed the makeup of several committees including planning, ODOT project, lease, and budget. Kathy Sherbourne said she wanted two commissioners on each committee. Jay Stoler advised the commission to advertise for the committees. The commission left it as two commissioners, two members of the public, and the manager. People are encouraged to submit applications to serve on one of the committees.

The commission considered a letter from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife stating that the isolation under quarantine of imported fish is regulated under Title 50 of the Fish and Wildlife Regulations. The letter continued that the importation of any fish would fall under ODF&W and Federal regulations and requirements. The commission had received a letter from Kevin Lee, owner of Nor-Cal Fisheries on July 11 stating all their out of state products would "travel directly to the main facility in Oakland, California."

David Darnell made a motion to pay the bills when funds become available. Kathy Sherbourne said the Port was catching up on its outstanding bills. The motion passed.

Former City Clerk Charged

Former Port Orford city clerk Doreen Rangel was arrested in Oregon and arraigned on three felony counts of theft in the first degree on Thursday, July 19 in Gold Beach at the County Courthouse. Rangel was also charged with 20 counts of official misconduct relating to her being a government official misusing their position – in this case Port Orford city clerk which, at the time she held it, was a sworn position. The felony charges are because the amounts involved were over \$1,000 for two of the six-month periods of time and more than \$750 for one six month period of time. The information in this case was presented to the Curry County Grand Jury who then voted to indict the defendant and send the charges to the District Attorney's office.

Bail was set at \$100,000 and it has not been posted as of Tuesday morning according to Curry County District Attorney Charlie Steak. He said Rangel asked for a court appointed attorney to represent her. She will be back in court on Wednesday, July 25. This appearance is for scheduling purposes and not for entering a plea, which will be done at a later date.

Rangel left her job as city clerk in August 2000.
