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Public Fishing Dock

The Port of Port Orford Commission met on Tuesday, September 18, and got through their agenda in about one hour.

Commissioner David Darnell served as acting chairman in the absence of chairman Dave Knapp.

Jane Cramer spoke under public comments and thanked the commission for passing the public fishing dock motion (at their August meeting). She asked them how many grants had been applied for the public fishing dock and was told by Port Manager Kathy Sherbourne that none had been applied for yet. Sherbourne said the Commission needed to find a location to place the fishing pier. Cramer requested the formation of a committee to look for grants for the dock and that she would be willing to serve on the committee. The Port commission will add this committee to their list of committees and advertise in the papers for members. David Darnell said he was going to put Jane Cramer in charge of the public fishing dock committee.

Robert Ewalt, a resident of the Port District, spoke said he was concerned about consent to vacate a portion of 4th Street. He said he felt the Port decision was premature since the City of Port Orford had not made a decision on the street vacation. He said the Port should not be a leader in this process and it was wrong to jump the gun on the City.

Rick Francona said he had met with Dave Knapp earlier in the day about the citizen's advisory board. Francona said that board was just to provide advice and asked it be placed on next month's agenda.

Port commissioner Tom Hall made a motion for the Port not to vacate 4th Street. Commissioner Jeff Miles suggested that part of 4th Street could be a nature trail. The motion passed 4-0. The Port commission had as part of their agenda a copy of Resolution 2001-02 (4th Street Vacation), which would have if it had been accepted, agrees and approves the vacation of a portion of 4th Street. An adjacent property owner at the August Port meeting had requested this street vacation.


Jeff Miles made a motion for the commission to accept Resolution 2001-03 (special purpose grant funds). Commissioner Gifford Barnes said Dock con-

tractor Laskey/Clifton should fix the problems first such as the blackout in front of the crane. Barnes noted the electrical building is still leaking and that roof needs to be fixed. The motion passed 4-0. This Resolution appropriates unanticipated grant money in the amount of \$321,203.00 from Oregon Economic and Community Development Department toward retrofitting the cranes, correcting the fuel system and engineering and installation for modification to the fender guard system. A motion by Gifford Barnes that the Port doesn't pay Laskey/Clifton any more money until they fix the repairs on the dock-building contract followed it immediately. The motion passed 4-0 and Kathy Sherbourne added she has a punch list of items to be fixed.

The commission next considered the state legislature redistricting. David Darnell said he had talked to many people about the issue and they liked to see it stay the way it is currently. Chris Hawthorne told the commission it is not an option to leave it the way it is. He said it didn't seem like the Port needed to get involved and that in his opinion the Port would polarize the community by taking a position. Gifford Barnes made a mo-

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Travel Notes

In a soul-searching debate with newly met acquaintances over the events of September 11, 2001, I heard the following – “As long as 5% of the world’s popula-

tion, (that’s us Americans), use 70% of its resources everyone else is going to resent us.” It was the second day of a journey that began one sweet morning in Port Orford and carried me five days later to where I look out over a different ocean – some 6,000 miles east of where I began.

That remark about our ways of consumerism was given greater focus as I was driven to the San Francisco Airport in the early morning rush hour. Our cab flew easily along the left hand lane of what seemed to be 8 or 9 lanes of traffic. Then the lanes slowed down to a miles-long crawl – except ours which stayed fast and almost unused – it was the carpool lane. We hardly slowed as we zipped right through the tollbooth – all the others had to stop to pay their way,

one occupant per vehicle – thousands upon thousands of them. It was suggested that all those people chose to get up earlier and pay more so that on their way to work they could enjoy the feeling of solitude, they could be private, their only opportunity in an overcrowded world to be alone. I could find no sense in this. It wasn’t that they didn’t do what their leaders had suggested for years, (use the carpool), it was that it was more important to them not to carpool. Multiply the personal time, the fuel used and the fees paid by millions of times each day – the cost must be mind boggling. There is no orderly way to change this situation. The pattern is too deeply embedded to be fixed, except perhaps by some catastrophic event that would impose its own conditions that would allow no choice. Otherwise the insanity, as I perceived it, will continue to be regarded as normality and although I’m also one of them, I can live far enough away to see myself as being a little less crazy.

Another sobering memento of my journey came from Logan Airport in Boston, our departure point from American soil. We had already been stripped of pocket-knives, nail clippers, matches, cigarette

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lighters, the handles of my carry-on bag were swabbed with a pad which was then analyzed for traces of chemicals or explosives and I was finally cleared to pass through security into the focal point of a semi-circle of heavily armed, tired, unfriendly looking men. Today, as I continue to mellow-out in this unexpected paradise in the Azores, I suppose that the show of force was supposed to give me assurance, but it didn’t work that way for me. They looked just like the ‘goons’ hired by the baddies in any one of a dozen violent movies. I looked into their eyes. I could only find a couple who I would want on my side. There were Airport Police, Marshals, Border Patrol and others dressed in black uniforms. Two army types joined them, a clean looking boy with an AK-47 and another who carried a complex weapon that I guessed could throw tear gas grenades. No doubt he had a good heart, but his appearance qualified him for the bad-guy role in a horror movie. If the shooting started and that’s one of their ways of doing things, I, and a lot of other people could easily be amongst the unfortunate victims. It was a very, very scary feeling that I do not want to become accustomed to.

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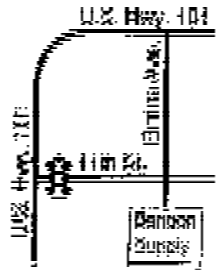
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A While Ago . . .

A while ago I visited the Port Orford Cemetery for the first time and was fascinated by the history I found there.

I walked among the headstones and found the oldest date of death listed was for Bridget Uican, who died in 1881. Bridget and her husband, Fred, were pioneers who survived the Great Fire of 1868 by hiding their family in a well while the fire roared past consuming their home and ranch. What a slice of Port Orford history is contained in that one plot!

Despite the hard life here in the early days, many in pioneer families lived to ripe old ages once they survived childhood. But the number of graves of small children and babies reflects the heart-break endured by parents in days when childhood diseases often killed.

As I wandered around reading the headstones, I found many names familiar to me from Port Orford history such as: the Nygrens, who built and operated the old hotel that has stood at 10th and Jackson since 1888; the Blacklocks, who operated the sandstone quarry at Blacklock Point in the late 1800's; two small daughters of James Langlois, who was lighthouse keeper at Cape Blanco for 42 years; and P. J. Lindberg, who built the Hughes House and so many fine houses that are still lived in today.

Slight humps in the ground in some large empty spaces made me wonder if some of the oldest gravesites might be unrecognizable now because they had wooden markers that didn't survive years of coastal weather.

Headstones range from old-fashioned upright white stones, to modern metal markers set flush with the ground. Among them are some unusual markers.

For example, Charles Pearse, a musician and song writer, and his wife, Rebecca, have their graves marked with rocks from their favorite fishing hole on the Middle Elk, near Pearse Peak.

Woodmen of the World, a Benevolent and Benefit Fraternity, once had a hall in Port Orford. Members wore cloth badges with a spiral metallic fringe. The badge on one side had red, white and blue vertical stripes and a round metal piece with the emblem painted on in color. At funeral services members would reverse the badge to show a black side with the words 'In Memoriam' printed in white. Several headstones note that the deceased was a member of this group.

A marker for James Howe, who died in 1903, is carved to look like a tree with the inscription *HERE RESTS A WOODMAN OF THE WORLD* circling an emblem on

the front. The emblem is difficult to make out after years of weathering, but I could see that it portrayed a woodman's tools and a dove with an olive branch in its mouth.

The headstone for Charles Crew, who died in 1912, was in the regular shape, but had a log carved on the top and the Woodmen Of the World emblem on the front. This emblem is easier to read since it is not as old and is carved in marble.

Plots in the original cemetery sold for as little as \$6 and are still reasonably priced at \$450. Although it began as a Masonic Cemetery, the Port Orford Cemetery Maintenance District was formed in 1961, and officers are elected by voters in the district to take responsibility for the care of it.

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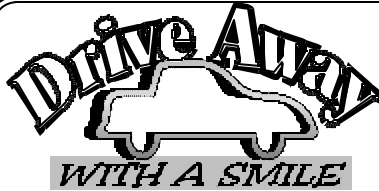
Gun Club News

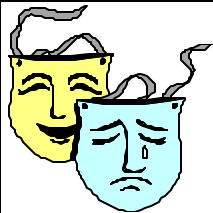

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County Computers Infected

The Curry County computer system was infected on Tuesday evening, September 18 by the "w32.nimda.a" worm, which is an e-mail spread virus. The worm was introduced to the county network at the end of the day on Tuesday, after most employees had gone home for the evening. The quick action of Curry County computer services staff limited any damage that might have occurred. No data was lost and the "firewall" that keeps unauthorized users out of the county system was not compromised.

On Wednesday, September 19, county employees were instructed to turn off computers and leave them off until further notice to avoid spreading the computer virus. Computer services staff and select county employees are working together to systematically "disinfect" each computer and then restore network operations as soon as possible.

Commissioner Rachelle Schaaf says that Curry County takes every precaution to protect its computer network and that many other government offices throughout the United States have been effected by the worm. County business continues

to operate despite the disabled computer network.

County Recycling Rate

The Department of Environmental Quality has released a recovery report for recycling county by county in Oregon for 2000 on August 15.

For the year 2000 Curry County residents disposed of 14,644 tons of garbage while recovering (also known as recycling) 10,387 tons for a recovery rate of 42%.

The amount of material recovered in Curry County has been on a sharp rise since 1992 when 2,863 tons were recovered and 10,555 tons were disposed.

The average per capita disposed in Oregon in 2000 was 1,617 pounds per person while in Curry County the average disposed per person was 1,381 per person. The average per capital recovered

per person in Oregon in 2000 was 1,028 pounds per person while in Curry County the per capita recovery was 980 pound per person.

The statutory or mandated rate of recovery in Curry County is 15%, a figure set by the DEQ.

The County recycling committee meets every other month. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 30 in Gold Beach at the commissioner's meeting room.
