Celebrating 20 Years By Evan Kramer

Port Orford has many natural resources of all kinds including people. One of the finest examples is our Port Orford Librarian Bonnie Wagner. Bonnie and the community are celebrating her 20 years as librarian. The Friends of the Library are throwing a party for her at the library on January 8, from 3:30 - 5:00pm and everyone is welcome. Bonnie actually started in December, 1976 so she's now into her 21st year with the library.

When Bonnie was hired as the Port Orford Librarian she was then working as librarian at Pacific High School where she had served in that position since 1968. She had two daughters and a son attending Pacific High in 1976 and she told me they were happy to see her move over to the Port Orford Library.

Bonnie told me the Port Orford Library in its current location was opened on June 16, 1973. She said when she took over the librarian's job in 1976 the library had 10,500 books. Now they stock 18,500 books but are at capacity. She said the library buys 800 new books a year and has to discard 800 books a year. She told me the criteria for culling a book was if it hadn't rented in five years, it wasn't in good shape and it wasn't a classic. These

books are all sold at the various sales the library holds. None are thrown away.

I asked Bonnie what the most popular of the books are as far as being checked out. She said mysteries were the most popular, best sellers are a runner-up and how to books number third most read.

Bonnie took me on a tour of the library to the back room where the old magazines are stored. She told me that room had once been two jail cells and when Port Orford dropped its old police department the library got the space. Besides keeping three years of back issues of magazines the "jail cell" is home to a fishermen's library including many instructional video tapes and resources materials for the Children's Theater.

Bonnie explained the Library District was formed in 1982. She said 73% of the voters voted in favor of forming the district. The tax base then was \$24,000 while it currently is at \$68,000.

The Port Orford Library is home to more than books. They feature many weekly and monthly magazines. They started checking out books on cassette six years ago and now boast an excellent selection of over 600 titles thanks in large part to generous donations from Margaret Day. The library checks out videotapes and has 456 titles.

Bonnie made a point of mentioning all the library assistants she has worked with during the past 20 years. They include Dee Hansohn, Joyce Iida, Laura Doyle, Debbie Lohry, Dorothy Powers and Pat Lee. Her assistants now are Virginia Forsatsch and Shirley Nelson. Bonnie said Laura Doyle went on to be Langlois Librarian and that current Langlois Librarian Tobe Porter was a volunteer at the Port Orford Library.

The library has kept up with some of the changes in technology and now owns six computers. Two of them are in the jail room and are for public use for word processing. Another computer which was donated by the Pfand family is the Internet access computer. One other serves as home to the card catalogue.

Bonnie showed me the magazine and book exchange which are located in the hallway outside the library. She said the book exchange is a one for one deal and you are expected to trade books of equal quality. The magazine exchange works a little different. Basically people bring in their used magazines and leave them in the bins. If a person wants some of them they're free for the taking, no exchange is necessary. Bonnie asked that people not leave off weekly newsmagazines.



A Fisheries Dilemma by Sandi Eisman

Right now local fish are being threatened by over-fishing and habitat destruction. Our town's livelihood and traditional existence is on the line. For once, we as a community can have a major impact on, but we have to act *now* in unison to protect ourselves from extinction.

In 1976 the enactment of the Magnuson Fishery Conservation and Management Act extended federal fishery jurisdiction to 200 miles offshore and established the current federal fisheries management regime. This act was revised this year and places even more emphasis on (1) protecting traditional small fishermen and (2) how to strengthen provisions for habitat restoration and protection of fish stocks.

Unfortunately, some fishermen are more concerned with making large profits than with protecting the future of the industry. In the past they had over-fished various kinds of fish. As the laws were being revised, they stepped in to "assist" the Pacific Fisheries Management Council. Their advice was that because of the volume of their prior catches (due to over-fishing) they should be allocated all the remaining fish.

Those few fishermen who took advantage of the abundance of our oceans have used the resources to build large fishing vessels (60-100+ ft) which are so expen-

sive to run that they must over-fish just to make expenses. These are the boats that use semi-truck loads of sablefish traps, thousands of crab pots and drag huge nets along the bottom of the ocean - even using large tires on the bottom of the trawl nets so they can drag the nets over the tops of the reefs that are the spawning grounds of the fish. We have seen the evidence of this as we look at our fishfinding instruments that show an outline of the sea floor. Where there once were pinnacles and well-defined reefs there are now "bumps". These practices go on almost continuously, giving the fish and habitat no chance of recovery. These vessels are as devastating to the ocean as a strip-mine is to land.

As a result of their influence on fisheries regulators, fishing seasons are arbitrarily arranged so these vessels can march up and down the coast systematically raping one fishery after another at the expense of the sea life and putting every small community on the coast at risk. When the fishery management councils admit that there are problems, they dismiss them as conflicts between large and small vessels and ignore obvious and fair solutions, allowing the unscrupulous fishing practices to continue indefinitely, ignoring the Magnuson Act and our pleas.

But there is hope. Some of the more dedicated small boat owners are writing letters and attending meetings to keep the fisheries management people honest. We have seen a turn-around of the lawmaking practices in the sablefish fishery which is so important to the fishers of the Southern Oregon Coast and gets more important every year. I now know that we can make a difference.

Unlike salmon, sablefish is still a basically healthy and sustainable fishery. A small group of 22 large vessel owners is trying to exclude the other 228 permitted vessels from the fishery so that instead of all of us making \$20-30,000 a year, they could make millions. Much to their dismay we are being saved by the Magnuson Act which now demands that the law makers "provide for more emphasis on social benefits that might better preserve traditional small fishers."

So, this is where you come in. We need the businesses and families of this community to express their concern in the form of letters. Tell them how, when we are allowed to fish, it helps the entire community to survive. If you'll simply describe your business and the size of your family and the increase of income you receive when fishing is good it will help the fishers who are your friends and neighbors to reform the fishing industry into a successful and sustainable situation which can benefit us, the fish, and future generations. I want to thank this community for all the support you have already given us. Together we can do anything!


