George Gehrke Elected Fire Chief By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Fire Department met on Monday night at 6:30pm to elect a fire chief for 1997. Twenty four members of the department showed up for the meeting. Fire fighter Brice Wagner began by speaking to fellow department members. He passed out current copies of the fire department policy manual. He referred to three new members of the department. He said they hadn't gone through the formality of joining as outlined in the policy manual and questioned their right to vote at the meeting because he felt policy had not been adhered to. Brice wanted the department to take a vote on whether they were going to adhere to policy as outlined in the manual. Instead the department moved into nominations for fire chief. The two nominees were current chief George Gehrke and fire fighter David Pace. Gehrke spoke of his 37 years with the department and the many fires he responded to over the years. Gehrke said he no longer fights fire but spends his time running the department. Pace spoke about his three years on the department. He charged the department has gone drastically downhill to a divided and non-functioning department in the last two months. He said there was no discipline nor leadership in the department.

Mayor Gary Doran and councilor Jim Campbell were in attendance at the meeting. Doran said it was important for the department to have policy and that he had the impression that Brice Wagner felt the votes for chief were being stacked. Brice agreed.

Blank slips of paper were handed out and voting commenced. Doran and Campbell counted the votes and by a 16-8 margin George Gehrke was elected fire chief. The department then moved into voting on assistant chief. First members voted to fill two assistant chief positions. Three members were nominated including Randy Foster, Jim Garwood and Clyde Gore. Fire fighters elected Foster with 20 votes and Garwood with 19 votes.

The department chose five members to serve on the committee which will rewrite the policy manual. The city council is expecting this revised manual to be on their desks by the March council meeting.

Culprit Not Found

The City of Port Orford has not found the culprit or culprits involved with running up \$387.00 worth of phone calls to various 1-900 phone sex services which were found on the city's November G.T.E. phone bill. The story broke in the Friday

addition of the World newspaper though many people including myself were aware of the story but had pledged not to write about it until a suspect had been identified.

I spoke with Port Orford City Manager Dotti Myers on Monday afternoon and she said no suspect has been found or charged in the crime. However, the investigation is continuing. Tapes of the 1-900 conversations are being sent to the city so it can be determined whose voice is on them. They have not received those tapes yet. All the phone calls were made during times when city hall was closed including after hours and on Saturday and Sunday.

Dotti said several changes have occurred as a result of this problem. The different city departments including fire and police will now have their own phone numbers and not share the 332-3681 phone number. A blocker has been placed on outgoing phone calls to prevent 1-900 numbers from being used.

The World reported the city as having 40 employees. In actuality there are eleven paid employees that I'm aware of with at least one being part time. Public works has five employees, the police department has two and there are four people

David Martin, student representative to the board was in attendance for his first meeting.


Board action:



More of the Picture By David Wilken, Chairman Port Orford Watershed Council

The overall health of the Garrison Lake Watershed is coming into a little clearer focus thanks to data now being analyzed by the Watershed Council. The Council's consultant, Margaret Forbes, presented a report on the preliminary findings of the "wetland water quality" monitoring project. Dale Bures, Pacific High science teacher, and coordinator of the high school portion of the effort, added insights for the group's benefit.

The Wednesday, January 15, presentation began appropriately with a recap of past studies of the lake by DEO and others, and a review of the expected benefits of moving the sewer discharge from the lake. The lake, as things now stand, is likely to remain over-fertilized for what could be several, and perhaps many, years. There is a chance, however, that natural processes can be used to reduce the lake's infestation of two water weeds. Elodea and Eurasian Water-Milfoil, by reducing the relatively high, though by no means harmful, phosphate levels in the lake. The Council decided to begin testing lake water immediately for possible fluctuations in phosphate levels. This could show,

for example, if there is an ideal time to temporarily flush the lake by increasing the discharge at the ocean end.

Margaret also addressed the Council's previous discussions of native wild fish in the Garrison Lake watershed, using graphic charts of the newly analyzed wetlands data. They showed that dissolved oxygen, temperature, nitrate, and ammonia levels are all at pretty healthy levels to sustain fish. The wetlands' water tends to have low turbidity, with some samples near drinkable at times. This spring the Council will begin collecting data and anecdotal information on fish in the lake and wetlands.

This necessary "base line data", now being added to and expanded, will give the community a better view of how things are with the lake. After Margaret's presentation, the Council turned its attention to another important view of the lake, its visual appeal, or lack of same. There is clearly a need to remove a lot of human debris from the lake, itself, and its shores. The Council will look into sponsoring and coordinating a volunteer clean up of the lake at the soonest appropriate time. If any groups or organizations, or individuals for that matter are interested in coop-
