City Receives \$655,000 Grant By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council rolled up their sleeves

and tackled a variety of work Monday night.

Police Lieutenant Lew Ball presented the council with the monthly police log. Highlights from April included 37 traffic tickets sited to municipal court and 44 verbal traffic warnings. Lt. Ball responded to among other things 3 thefts, 2 break and entries, 1 animal abuse call, 21 public inquiries and 28 agency calls. There were a total of 185 activities for the month of April.

Community Resource Team co-chair Nancy Dowdy presented Mayor Doran with a letter drafted by the CRT on behalf of the City of Port Orford expressing support to the Oregon Department of Transportation for the Wayfinding Point at Battle Rock Park. The letter states that the City will be responsible for maintenance of the Wayfinding Point. Doran accepted the letter and it will be sent to ODOT.

Garrison Lake resident Alice Pfand gave the council a letter stating her concerns about the water level and quality of water in Garrison Lake. Apparently the boards for the weir at the outlet of the lake have either been removed or deteriorated causing the lake level to shrink. The weir is on private not city owned property. Ralph Donaldson asked city manager Dotti Myers to contact the owners of the property about making adjustments to the weir. Public Works Director Jerry McNurlin mentioned the city is switching from lake water to Hubbard Creek water this week

The council moved into hiring procedures and considered an employee for the visitor center at Battle Rock Park. The council passed a motion authorizing the city manager to sign a contract with South Coast Business Economic Opportunities hiring Kim Munden to work at the visitor center 32 hours a week. Councilor Ruth Jamieson then presented a motion that the council be given the employment history, relationship to staff and reasons why a supervisor wants to hire the person for all potential employees. It passed.

Chamber of Commerce secretary John Philips presented the council with a request on the Chamber's behalf for \$2,000 out of last year's bed tax funds. The council passed a motion to pay this money.

The council considered appointment of an interim municipal court judge. Councilor Carl Eskelson made a motion to appoint Robert King interim court judge until a permanent judge is appointed. The city has three applications on file for the permanent position. The candidates will be interviewed at a special session of the council on Monday, May 19, at 7:30pm.

The council agreed to pay CoastWatch Legal Services \$557.95 for their work conducting the background check on Lt. Lew Ball,-one of the conditions a candidate must meet before being accepted into the police academy.

The council was presented with the recommendations of the bed tax committee. Councilor Robert Warring referring to legal standards stated there were conflicts of interest on the committee and questioned the legality of the vote and the recommendations. Warring suggested sending the information to the state attorney general's office for their advice. Bed tax chairman Ron Culbertson told the council there had been no voting by the committee but instead all decisions had been arrived at by consensus. Councilor Ralph Donaldson recommended contacting city attorney Randall Tosch about the legality of the bed tax committee recommendations. Councilor Jim Campbell offered a motion to approve the bed tax

Fear of A-Bombs By Valerie Jean Kramer

I just saw a medical news article that made me think. It reported that people who were within about a half mile of the Hiroshima or Nagasaki atomic bomb blasts are six times more likely to get certain kinds of brain cancer.

I grew up with America's hysterical fear of atomic bombs. In school I learned to "duck and cover". I doodled away idle time designing bomb shelters on scraps of paper and calculating how much concrete, dirt, or water I'd have to have to shield me from the deadly rays. I was in Social Studies class with Mrs. Vodenoff when Kennedy got shot and I expected to see the bright bomb flashes out the windows any second. I guess, like most of my generation, I figured if you were in the same state when a bomb hit, you were instantly dead, do not pass go, do not collect two hundred dollars.

The medical article seems to be saying that if a bomb hit the north end of Port orford, folks at the south end might have to worry about having six chances in a million of getting one kind of brain cancer fifty years later instead of having only one chance in a million.

Granted, today's bombs are a lot more powerful than the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombs. Still it seems like my fears were badly overdone. In retrospect it seems odd that for such an earthshaking event, I have seen so little real information about the degree of destruction and the fate of survivors. I've seen a fair amount on the development of the bomb, the delivery of the bomb, how powerful it is, how much more powerful newer bombs are, how many bombs our current enemies have, etc. It's almost as if the powers-that-be want us to be afraid.

There have always been dangers to fear-wild animals, volcanoes and earthquakes, storms, swords, arrows, guns, etc. The

Public Supports Wayfinder Plans By Evan Kramer

Members of the Port Orford Community Resource Team and the public met last Thursday night at the Senior Center. People were there to see the revised plot plans for the Wayfinder Point at Battle Rock Park and begin planning the signage. Oregon Department of Transportation representative Joe Paiva led the discussion. He presented the group with a new rendering of how the Wayfinder Point will look. There were differences in this one over the one he presented last month. The bump-outs were removed to provide more parking. There was concerned expressed about the rock wall. The public was told it will be knee high and is designed so someone whether standing, sitting in a car or a wheelchair will be able to see the beach and ocean with an unimpaired view.

Port Orford City Planner Butch Parker spoke about the option of having RVs and vehicles towing trailers parking on Jefferson street between the Shoreline Motel and the Whale Cove. One option would be to turn it into a one way northbound street.

People expressed concerns about the parking, which they were told would be decreased by 10-15 spots. Most of those that would be lost would be in the area of the visitor's center.

Leesa Wagner, representing the Port Orford Fishermen's Wives Association made a presentation of behalf of putting a Fishermen's Memorial in the plaza part of the Wayfinder Point. She displayed a proposed memorial that was drawn by Sandy Eisman. The public overwhelmingly favored having a Fishermen's Memorial at the wayfinding point with only one person objecting. Some of the fishermen's wives will work as a subgroup with the design team and are seeking additional designs.

The question was put to the public if they were in support of the current wayfinder point design displayed by Joe Paiva. A large majority raised their hands. Those who didn't like the current plans or who have problems with it were invited to speak with Paiva and iron them out.

Next to speak were Brian and Susan from the Sea Reach Company. Their company is an interpretive design firm that will work with ODOT to design the template for the wayfinding point signs. These signs will be placed in embedded fiberglass and mounted in a pedestal fashion. They asked for help from the public in gathering information for the signs. Information should be turned in by May 20.

CoastWatch Program

Sea-kayakers, surfers, horse-riders and other outdoor recreationists are needed for a program that helps to protect the Oregon coast.

Under the CoastWatch program, volunteers adopt a mile of shoreline. They watch out for immediate problems, and also for a long-range management concerns. They also gather information on the area's natural history and share it with the community.

Volunteers have already adopted a good deal of Oregon coastline. But many hard-to-reach places need adopters. This is where the outdoor recreationists come in. People whose favorite sports take them to remote stretches of the shore can help to complete the chain. Help is needed in the Oregon dunes, on rugged headlands, and along other rocky shores.

Roadside Spray Program

The County Spring Roadside Spray program will occur during May (weather permitting).

County Roadmaster, Daniel Crumley has notified the Port Orford Watershed Council that the County will not be treating the Garrison Lake Watershed this year. They will evaluate the vegetation needs in this watershed in one year to determine future vegetation management strategies.

The roads that will not be treated are: Knapp Road, Port Orford Loop Rd, Paradise Point Road, Silver Butte Road, Hensley Hill Road, and Arizona Street.

The County Road Department will be treating the Hubbard Creek Watershed roads this spring with Roundup Pro. The roads that will be treated are: Vista Drive, Cedar Hollow Drive, Blanchard Drive, Cemetery Loop Road, Novel Drive, Old Mill Road, Humbug Way, Park Road, Hubbard Creek Road.

If you do not wish to have the edge of your property treated by the road spray program, you can call the County Road Department and sign up for their No Spray Program. The County Road Department can be reached at (541) 247-7097.

The Port Orford Watershed Council urges you to control your own roadside vegetation by manual means (mowing, pulling, pruning) to help protect the water quality of these watersheds.

No library due dates, no worries if the dog chews the corners. The book you take will belong to your child.





committee recommendations **subject to approval of attorney Tosch**. The motion passed 5-1 with Warring voting no. It was then brought up that the Jubilee Committee had not gotten their request in and wanted \$1,200. Ruth Jamieson make a motion that the bed tax committee reconvene when Dotti Myers has the figures on the amount of cash carryover in the bed tax fund and then make additional recommendations, subject to the ordinance being reviewed by the city attorney and city manager. It passed 5-1.

The council considered 4 requests for liquor license renewals and new applications. Councilor Ruth Jamieson spoke and said she would have to vote her convictions and vote no on the applications because she has personal problems with liquor licenses. Jim Campbell made a motion to approve the renewal applications from Circle K, Luis Foods (Sentry Market), Port & Starboard and new application from the Whale Cove. It passed 5-1 with Jamieson voting no.

City Manager Dotti Myers told the council the city has received a \$655,000 block

grant from the Oregon Economic Development Department for the water system improvement plan. She said the city's financial participation is paying for a bond in the amount of \$462,181 for their share of the improvements. The bond would have a 20-year pay back period. Part of the requirements of the block grant is the city review its water rate structure. Consider this a free public announcement on behalf of this paper. On Monday, June 9, 1997 the city will convene a public meeting to explain the grant to the public and hear recommendations from the public about water rates. The time was not announced.

City Manager Myers spoke to the council about applying for a grant from the State Marine Board for a 3 phase improvement plan at the 12th Street Boat Ramp. The three phases are redo the boat launch pad, build bathrooms and pave the parking area. Alice Pfand reminded the council about the Pinehurst Dock, which has been closed since December 1993, and asked when it would be reopened. Jerry McNurlin said it might be possible to reopen it by September. The water intake pipe resting on the top of the dock is the cause of the closure. A motion was made and passed to apply for phase one of the

grant to rebuild the launch pad. McNurlin told the council his department needs a new lawnmower for the city parks. The council approved purchase of the mower. McNurlin will get bids for the new mower.

The council will hold a workshop session on Monday, May 19, at 7:00pm. They will follow this with a special council session at 7:30pm.
