Council Names Poland Temporary City Manager By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council was in a good mood when they met on Monday night. Mayor Gary Doran mentioned that he enjoyed the newspapers last week and the positive articles and letters that appeared in them.

Public Works Director Jerry McNurlin told the council everything had been going really well in his department. He spoke about the weir at the Garrison Lake outlet. He said the lake has always been a lake and never classified a reservoir. A State of Oregon official told him there is nothing in writing to permit a weir at the Garrison Lake outlet. He said there is a possibility of installing a fish friendly "habitat log" at the outlet instead of a weir.

Councilor Jim Campbell introduced Port Orford's new police chief Russell Hunt to the council and public. Campbell announced the council would host a reception for Hunt on Thursday, July 17, from 4-6:00pm in the council chambers.

Nancy Dowdy, co-chair of the Community Resource Team, presented the council with the group's first annual report.

There have been many accomplishments including development of the Wayfinder Site at Battle Rock Park which will begin construction in September and the entrance signs to Port Orford which are coming closer to a reality. Other accomplishments include the new planter on the east side of city hall, help with installing the new benches and tables at Battle Rock Park, assistance in getting an additional Public Radio station, 89.3, on the air in Port Orford and work that led to the Port Orford Enterprise Zone being renewed.

Carol Malley, representing the North Curry Family and Children's Center, asked the council if they would waive the fees on use of the Community Building. She is directing a play entitled The Boy Who Talked to Whales with 10 young people for the summer theater program. They are using the building for rehearsals on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 10:00am to noon. They will perform the play on July 27 at the Curry County Fair and again on August 10 during the Port Orford Arts Festival. The council unanimously passed a motion waiving the fee on the building but required it be left clean.

The council considered a contract with Howard Lichtig for his employment as municipal court judge. Lichtig saw no problems with contract. Councilor Tim

Sparks was concerned about how many sessions a month the court would operate. The contract calls for paying Lichtig \$200 per session. The contract was modified to include no more than two court sessions a month. Mayor Doran appointed Lichtig municipal court judge and the council approved his appointment unanimously. Judge Lichtig then requested the council that court be held on the second Wednesday of the month rather than the second Tuesday because it conflicted with his Cub Scout master responsibilities. The council approved this request. Lichtig informed them he was working on a bail schedule for their consideration and approval.

Jason Seivers, the city parks and recreation planner, spoke to the council about the miniature golf course in Buffington Park. The parks commission had recommended the council look at the future of the golf course which is in need of new turf and many repairs. At the August 1996 Community Resource Team meeting seven members representing either their businesses or themselves donated a total of \$500 for new turf. Each business or person adopted one of the seven holes. Parks commission member Jane Cramer said she and her husband Frank and other family members use the golf course. She

suggested a voluntary system of support to keep the course maintained. Ed Dowdy, co-chair of the CRT, volunteered the CRT to refurbish and take over maintenance of the miniature golf course. Council members and the public were happy with this offer. Three cheers for Ed.

Jason Seivers announced the City had received grants from the Oregon Marine Board and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife totaling \$35,000 for a new boat launch and ramp at the 12th Street Boat Ramp.

The council settled into new business and accepted a dedication deed from Robert McKenzie for a 10-foot easement on the east side of Deady St. approximately four hundred feet long. This will enable the developer of the Paradise Terrace Subdivision to widen Deady Street to the required 50 feet width. City Planning Director Butch Parker notified the council a

public hearing would be held on August 11, 7:00pm, regarding an appeal of a conditional use application for a cell phone tower on Deady Street. Previously, the city planning commission had turned down the conditional use application for the tower.

Temporary Personnel Changes at City Hall

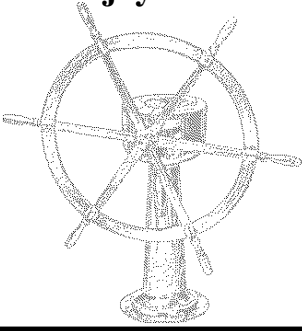
Councilor Ralph Donaldson told the public city manager Dotti Myers would be having surgery on her back on July 15 and that she would be off work for an indefinite period of time. He said acting city administrator Norma House's husband is ill and that she is resigning that position as of August 15. The council personnel committee (Donaldson and Tim Sparks) recommended several changes in the front office due to these circumstances. Donaldson made them in the form of a motion. The motion appointed city clerk Jim Poland as temporary city manager at

a salary of \$24,000 a year and stated he would exercise no management authority over the department heads, Dan Georgeson was named city clerk at a salary of \$8.50 per hour and Norma House will serve as city treasurer working 20 hours a week at a salary of \$13.00 an hour. The council unanimously passed these temporary changes.

The city recorder job which had been posted in the newspapers will not be filled but instead will go back to the personnel committee for consideration.

Norma House told the council she had spoken to city attorney Randall Tosch on July 7 regarding the amount of time the office staff is spending making photocopies and doing research for members of the public. Attorney Tosch suggested the city needs to set up charges for making copies and doing research. Ralph Donaldson noted the public was entitled to raw data only. It was suggested the "raw data" be available at the Port Orford Library. Councilor Robert Warring said he wants the city user friendly and didn't like the suggestion of charging 25 cents

per copy. Jim Campbell said the city was at the point of unreasonable requests. A motion was made to charge 25 cents a copy for all copy work the city was required to do by law. City officials will suggest alternate sources for making copies.

Robert Warring told the council he would not be able to attend the July 17-18 SEAPAC coastal zone management meeting. He asked that Bonnie Allen represent the city in his absence and that she be a voting member of the conference. Mayor Doran signed a letter authorized Allen as the city's voting representative.

Ralph Donaldson referred to city sewer and water rates and said Tom Hamilton has prepared budget documents on the costs of the sewer and water systems. Donaldson said we need to look into separating the water charges from the sewer charges on the bill. He wanted a public sewer and water meeting on Friday but too many key people were unavailable.

Norma House recommended to the council that Kim Munden be fired from her job at the visitor center. A motion to sustain Munden's dismissal passed unanimously.

Livestock Entries Up

Livestock entries at the Curry County Fair are the highest that they have been for decades, possibly at an all time high in some departments, according to Fair Manager, Ron Crook.

Diane Dishner, superintendent of the Dairy Goat Department, who was at the fairgrounds to organize for the upcoming show, remarked to Crook "When that big livestock barn was built, did you think there would ever be more entries than it could hold?"

The Fair Manager shook his head in amazement and picked up the phone to call another fairgrounds to arrange for extra paneling for livestock pens.

During his manager's report at the Fair Board meeting on Thursday evening, Crook reported the impressive statistics to enthusiastic Fair Board members.

There are nearly six times more poultry entries this year than last: 90 pre-entered now compared with 14 last year, 76 more exhibits, an increase of 592%.

There is a 184% increase of entries in the rabbits and cavies department. The 37 pre-registered exhibits are up by 24 entries from the 13 of last year.

Goats will be predominate in the livestock pavilion this year. The 176 entries are up by 26% from the 139 goats exhibited last year. Sheep entries, 94 head, are up 44% from the 65 of 1996. Cattle entries are up from the 8 of last year to 11 now.

The livestock entries are to be delivered to the fairgrounds on Wednesday, July 23. All other entries are due at the fairground on entry day, Tuesday, July 22.

For those who are unable to deliver entries to the fairgrounds, there are drop off sites at both ends of the county, Mory's in

Brookings and Sea Breeze Florist in Port Orford. Entries should be prepared for transporting.

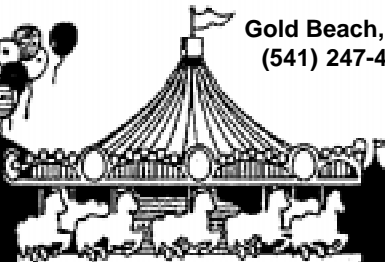

Sunset Garden Club & CRT

There's a handsome new addition at the Library/City Hall: a large planter, with built-in seating, has suddenly appeared near the flagpole.

The original idea came from Bonnie Allen, a member of the CRT Beautification Committee, who was inspired by the Sunset Garden Club's planter boxes along the highway. Why couldn't there be a planter at the City Hall/Library? The building is quite visible from 101 - it should be a part of the over-all "101 Beautification Plan". The members of the Sunset Garden Club enthusiastically agreed, and jointly the two Beautification Committees prepared a plan, which was Okayed by the City Council.

The design for the planter was Joan Geiser's and Jon Porter and Joan and Al Geiser provided the physical labor. (Joan and Al are co-chairs of the Quality of Life Committee of the CRT - the Beautification Committee is one part.) Funds for the materials came from bed-tax money granted to the Sunset Garden Club's Beautification Committee. (Ruth Bryant and

Lucille Burroughs made the application, and worked on the plan.) Rebar was donated by Western Builders Supply. Garden club member Barbara Breuer and her husband Rudy donated soil. Public Works leveled the area beforehand. The garden club will purchase plants. And the club will care for the plantings.
