Highway 101 Master Plan By Evan Kramer



A workshop meeting was held at the Port Orford Senior Center on Thursday night concerning the Main Street Highway 101 Master

Plan. The Community Resource Team held the meeting, which was well attended

Joan Geiser, the community project manager, spoke first and said a timeline has been developed for the project with a goal of finishing by May 6, 1998. SMH Architecture firm has been hired to develop the Master Plan through a grant from the U.S. Forest Service. Geiser said they weren't interested in a theme park look but instead would like to see Highway 101 a more people friendly thoroughfare.

Three representatives from SMH Architecture were present at the meeting including David Sluzerinko, John Warner and Karen Hennings. SMH is located in Portland. They have been involved in community planning, urban design and worked with heritage tourism. Sluzerinko mentioned one of their projects as the nature based planning for the South Slough estuarine area. He said he and his two associates had spent the day in Port Orford looking at "Main Street".

He then turned the lights down and presented a slide show of different downtown scenes. The downtowns were not identified but they bore little resemblance to Port Orford. The buildings were three and four stories built cheek to jowl and right up to the sidewalk. Some of the slides showed examples of "good" and "bad" signage. Sluzerinko said the plan would not work unless the community supports it.

Many citizens spoke including Flo Lichtig who asked the group not write up a bunch of city ordinances and codes for signs. She said the city doesn't deal very well with its ordinances right now. A suggestion from Jane Cramer was for slowing down traffic on Highway 101 by making the place more interesting for people. She suggested the need for getting people to stop their cars and walk around town. Ron Leitch pointed out one of our biggest assets is the ease for truck drivers to park here. Flo Lichtig said regarding potential sidewalk planters that we need to think about the rain and wind and not have them as obstructions between people's cars and the business their heading into. Al Geiser said he didn't want Port Orford to go the route of Brookings.

One of the more controversial elements was a suggestion in the vision statement for curb extensions or bump-outs. They

would extend outward from the yellow areas along 101. These bump-outs would take up part of the first lane of traffic making the street look narrower and thus encouraging people to drive slower. Joan Geiser made it clear that the bump-outs are just ideas. David Sluzerinko said the group needs to come to a consensus or majority consent on these and other issues.

Highway 101 in Port Orford as it looks at night was another subject. John Warner, the landscape architect with SMH, said the street lighting was set up for 35-mph speeds and that the lighting does not "play" to pedestrians because of the height of the light poles.

Joanne Ruoff spoke in favor of the traffic bump-outs and said it would make 101 more pedestrian friendly. Paula Dearing spoke against the bump-outs because it would force people to parallel park as opposed to the ease of parking now.



What's Right About Port Orford By Evan Kramer

The Thursday night meeting of the Community Resource Team concerning the Highway 101 Master Plan got me thinking about what's right with Port Orford.

New owners have purchased many businesses and properties along Highway 101 in the last few years. They have put their money and considerable time into remodeling and improving their buildings. Some examples include Coast Candle in the former Orford's Restaurant building, the building occupied by the Lichtig Law Office owned by the Gilmans, the Sea Crest Motel, Shoreline Motel and Port Orford Inn (formerly Port Orford Motel) and Port Orford Family Dentistry. Other examples of businesses and owners who have greatly improved their properties include Grumpy's, Spaghetti West, Crazy Norwegians, Ouilter's Corners. Grantland-Mayfield Gallery, Sea Breeze Florist, Downtown Fun Zone, Port Orford Pottery, The Chevron and Texaco stations, Paradise Café, Sentry Market, the Laundromat and the Port and Starboard Restaurant. Many other businesses have been painted and made other improvements.

The Community Resource Team worked on and received a grant from the U.S. Forest Service for \$12,000 to develop a Main Street Highway 101 Master Plan. The Forest Service has also committed \$18,000 for the entrance signs to town with the City of Port Orford providing an additional \$8,000. A company headquartered in Portland named SMH Architecture received the contract for developing the plan with the recommendation of the CRT and City Council approval.

SMH planner David Sluzerinko presented a slide show of downtowns including examples of, in his opinion, good and bad signage and color coordination. I had a big problem with his slide show. The city or cities depicted in the slides have very little in common with Port Orford other being in the United States. I'm also against new city ordinances to deal with sign regulation or color coordination. Till now the City of Port Orford has dealt poorly with their collection of ordinances . . . when they can find them.

Port Orford's ship of state along Highway 101 has sailed forward. The momentum is on our side. The best SMH can do is grab a hold and come along for the ride.

I congratulate the many business owners

along Highway 101 for the improvements to their properties. They did it with their own hard earned money and not with yet another government grant. I can tell you from personal experience that banks and other lending institutions are not in business to loan money to start-up businesses. In our case it was financial assistance from my mother and Valerie's parents who helped our business get off the ground.

By the way grant money isn't "free money". It often requires matching grants or in-kind labor. It is also money in the case of the Forest Service coming from an agency that could spend these funds repairing the roads in the National Forests and developing recreational opportunities.

I believe the local people involved with developing the Highway 101 Master Plan are very well meaning and have only good intentions in mind. I strongly support two of the Community Resource Team projects, those being the new entrance signs and the wayfinder site at Battle Rock Park. The CRT has done an excellent job of publicizing their meetings and issuing frequent and timely press releases about their activities.

Port Orford has a nice frontier, entrepreneurial spirit set in a magnificent physical setting. People do their thing here and most of the time we work things out between ourselves. It really is the last, best, unspoiled place on the Oregon Coast.



Book Review By Dan Hill

The following is a book review of **Bandon By-The-Sea** by Dow Beckham, Arago Books, 1997.

"It was a gloomy place...". This was the description of Bandon according to George A. Bennett in 1873 at the mouth of the Coquille River. He is the one who introduced gorse (Irish furze) into the area which is now considered, by some, to be the curse of Coos and Curry Counties.

Bandon's first white immigrants were the Lowes who settled on Beaver Slough in 1853. By 1860, Irish, English, Swedes,

Fur traders and trappers had a mutual interest in the land and usually accorded good relationships with the Indians beginning in 1826. In contrast, brutality of Indians by gold miners was common starting around 1850.

Development of the harbor and commerce rapidly expanded Bandon up to the depression years of the 1930s. The fire of 1936 devastated most of the town leaving a handful of structures, but the town rebuilt itself despite its enormous debt. It is unusual that even the beaches were not safe from the fire when driftwood burst into flames and grass on an offshore island caught fire.

Bandon has rebuilt, devoting itself to fishing and tourism with docks and shops close by in Old Town. On Highway 101 in town you can find the Bandon Cheese factory just one block from the Bandon Historical Society Museum. Both are well worth a visit.

Master Gardener Course

Oregon State University Extension Service Curry County is offering the 1998 Master Gardener Training Course. The classes will be held at the OSU Extension Building on the fairgrounds in Gold Beach, beginning January 26, 1998 and running through March 23, 1998. The classes will be held each Monday from 9:00am until 4:00pm with an hour break for lunch.

The eight week course will cover Botany Basics, Soil Science, Fertilizer and Pesticide Handling, Entomology, Integrated Pest Management, Weed Control, Ornamentals, Vegetables, Small Fruits, Tree Fruits and Pruning, Ornamental Tree and Woodlot Management, Landscaping, Grasses-Lawn, and Ornamental, Container Gardening, Composting, Plant Identification, and Plant Pathology. This course is designed to prepare the student with the basic knowledge needed to assist Curry County residents with their home gardening questions. They will be taught to use OSU Extension resources and upon graduation earn OSU Master Gardening Certification.

The cost of the class is \$50.00 per student, with \$20.00 refundable if the graduate completes 50 hours of "Pay Back Hours". These hours can be completed in a variety of ways by helping to educate Curry





Other ideas included better signage letting people know what is here in Port Orford. Joanne Ruoff suggested a park at the north end of Port Orford where the two empty lots are located on the east side of the street.

Al Geiser said the entrance signs for both ends of Port Orford were being worked on. Another idea was for use of native plants and wildflowers as well as planters at the north end of town.

Carol Malley suggested planting trees in front of Driftwood Elementary School as well as cutting out small squares in the sidewalk for tree plantings on 101.

Sluzerinko suggested that a "downtown association" work on signage cohesion and set up guidelines for color schemes and size (in his words not prescriptive in nature). He reiterated his company would be through with their work on May 1, 1998.

The next public meeting regarding the Highway 101 Master Plan is scheduled for February 12, 1998, at the Port Orford Senior Center. The time was not set. I would advise all interested persons to attend these meetings and be part of this debate.
