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Wetland Greenbelt Trail By Evan Kramer



Mayor Gary Doran announced the council would hold a goal setting meeting towards the end of this month but didn't name a specific date.

City auditor Rob Wall presented the council with the 1996-97 city audit. He told them documentation for their travel expenses was important. He also stated the sewer use fees need to be correctly allocated to the proper funds.

Public Works Director Jerry McNurlin gave a brief report. It was stated that in the future the department heads would submit written monthly reports to the council, which will also be available to the public.

Fire Chief George Gehrke told the council he had been reelected fire chief for 1998 by the fire department members. The council unanimously approved.

Police Chief Russ Hunt said his department had received 85 calls for service, handled 10 misdemeanor arrests, given out 114 traffic citations and 43 written warnings.

Community Resource Team member Al Geiser said permission had been received

from Oregon Department of Transportation for construction to begin on the city's two new entrance signs. They need a letter from the city asking for a permit for the signs.

Jane Cramer spoke on the agenda under citizen's concerns. She talked about the new group that has formed called "Friends of Port Orford Parks". They have chosen to work on three initial projects for the city parks including repairing the gazebos at Buffington Park and the 12th Street Dock. The third project involves putting a planter and bench at the city's 18th and Arizona Streets property as well as removing the fence that currently keeps people off the property. Councilor Robert Warring asked these issues be placed on the February council agenda and that was the desire of the rest of the council.

The council approved a motion to let Jerry McNurlin interview candidates for a new front office employee funded by South Coast Business. The council will consider his recommendation at their February meeting.

The city had received four applications for the vacancy on the planning commission. Mayor Doran recommended Leo Langner to fill the position and the council unanimously approved his recommendation. Ralph Donaldson was pleased

that four qualified and acceptable candidates had applied for the vacancy.

Joan Geiser presented a request concerning the Pacific Coast Scenic Byway for Highway 101 This concerns development of grant fund applications for the Highway 101 National Scenic Byway. The Port Orford project group recommended the wetland greenbelt trail as the top priority for the city for project funding. The greenbelt trail has already been approved for planing and design assistance from the National Park Service's River Trails and Conservation program. Geiser said 80% of the funding would be provided by O.D.O.T. with 20% matching funds required and those could be gotten from sources other than the city. Robert Warring offered a motion going ahead with the wetland greenbelt trail project as our scenic byway selection at no monetary cost to the city. The motion passed 6-0.

The wetland greenbelt stretches from its beginning at 12th and Washington Streets northwest to 16th and Highway 101. It passes in back of Driftwood Elementary School and the Masonic Temple as well as the Texaco Station. It flows under Highway 101 at 16th Street into a large wetland located between 16th and 17th Streets, neither of which exist except on


Again, thank you for the blessed peace and quiet during the last two weeks. Lets hope it continues.

Just Look At Me Now By Jane Cramer for the CRT

When she was a little girl, Gayle Wilcox's family came to Port Orford regularly for vacations. Pleasant memories of those visits encouraged her folks to make Port Orford their retirement home. Later Gayle visited them as she traveled around the country looking for a place to relocate. Deciding finally on Port Orford she was attracted to property at Sixth and Jackson because of its history and excellent location for a business.

William Winsor began his 40 year stay in Port Orford when he arrived with the Oregon Volunteers in 1854. He acquired the property, part of Captain Tichenor's Donation Land Claim, and operated the Winsor Hotel which was later known as the Bill Bennett Hotel. Gayle has an early picture of the hotel which shows a cow walking along Sixth Street.

The gas station, built on the site after the hotel was razed, was a source of employment for many local high school boys. Later the building became a fish market although the pumps and other station fixtures had not been removed.

When Gayle bought it the building was

empty and in disrepair. First chore was to replace broken glass and remove the gas pumps. With no formal training but an interest and willingness to learn, she began her florist business at Thanksgiving. Christmas wreaths made by a local artisan were sold on consignment. Later she learned to make her own wreaths and create arrangements.

The holiday season opening went pretty well, but when it was over the struggle to survive as a new business began. And it was a struggle! Gayle gives credit to people who have gone out of the way to support her business. For example, Premium Pacific Seafood was the first to open an account with a standing order for flowers each week. Without that business Sea Breeze Florist, which ships hand-tied wreaths, garlands and swags across the country, might not exist today. If you visit you'll find house plants, silk plants, hand made chocolates and a small assortment of cards and gift items in addition to cut flowers and wreaths.

At first Gayle worked out of the gas station office because the two full service repair bays were dark and dreary with heavy metal overhead doors. Eventually she and Frank installed windows across

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the back of the bays, replaced the overhead doors with large glass windows and created the current cheerful work area.

As the business grew she was able to effect more and more changes. Recently she repainted the building and Jim Hogard and Bill Foster helped remove the canopy and old Franko sign, giving the shop more visibility to passing motorists. She plans landscaping projects as time and finances permit.

Gayle says in reality the business hasn't changed just because she has been able to do some cosmetic work. It is still a flower shop specializing in high quality and personal service.

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Social Security Resolution By Louis Mincer

The drive to privatize Social Security never ceases. Our August legislators quietly drafted a Resolution to Congress requesting that the State of Oregon be exempted from participating in the Social Security Program. In effect the State would be empowered to distribute Social Security Compensation to beneficiaries. Last year 347 million dollars was paid to 533,000 recipients in Oregon alone out of the Social Security Trust Fund. How does the State intend to consistently raise such a vast amount of money to cover this huge expenditure?

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Located across Hwy 101 from The Downtown Fun Zone in Port Orford The Cato Institute in collaboration with the Oregon Cascade Policy Institute has been instrumental in persuading the Oregon State Legislature to petition the U.S. Congress to opt Oregon out of the Social Security System. The Legislative body was remiss in arbitrarily excluding seniors and other recipients from voicing their opinions about the advisability of the Resolution. Legislative officials have made a serious blunder excluding seniors from their deliberations. If privatization backfires many recipients can be severely impacted.

Most Social Security beneficiaries are unaware of this Resolution urging Congress to enact an amendment to the Social Security Act. It behooves seniors to familiarize themselves with the catastrophic consequences this Resolution can trigger and act accordingly.

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Affordable Housing By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Community Resource Team discussed affordable housing at their Thursday night meeting. Betty Tam and Rene Oman from the Umpqua Community Development Corporation attended the meeting and outlined the plan for a ten unit affordable housing development in Port Orford. Tam did the talking and said one of the main missions of the Umpqua CDC is to build affordable housing. She said they help cities in grant writing projects including helping the cities of Powers and Glendale develop the Powers-Glendale bike route.

Tam said Brookings developer John Zia had approached the Umpqua CDC about help with 10 unit separate 2 and 3 bedroom rental cottages. The site for the development is off the southeast corner of Paradise Point Road and Arizona Street. The site is within the city limits. There would be 3 houses per acre and lots of the natural landscaping would be maintained. Tam talked about a nature trail on the property as well as a small community building with a Laundromat. Tam explained the rental structure. The rents would be restricted and limited to people

earning 50% or less of the Curry County median income (depending on family size). She said there would be one of the cottages designed specifically for handicap accessibility.

Tam said the funding for the development would come from the Oregon Community and Housing Services. She said Umpqua CDC would own the development for 51 years with a goal of paying it off in 30 years. Tam described the development as consisting of eight 3 bedroom cottages at 1,000 square feet per unit and 2-2 bedroom cottages at 800 square feet per unit. She said the 3 bedrooms would rent for around \$400 a month and include water and sewer.

Tam said her organization would not ask for tax breaks from the City. The CRT members and guests voted by a margin of 14-3 to support the CDC affordable housing project. The board of the CRT will now write a letter in support of the project.

In other business beautification committee member Al Geiser said work would begin on the Wayfinder Site at Battle Rock Park in February. Business committee chairman Ed McQuade told the group the March CRT meeting would be



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devoted to the topic of business and he would be arranging a group of guest speakers.

I called the State of Oregon Employment Division and spoke to John Anderson in Medford. He said the median family income in Curry County was \$24,064 a year in 1993. The information is from a County census update done that year.

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Sage – Salvia Oficinalis By Graeme Graydon

The Roman armies brought sage to Britain. They named it from the Latin salvere – to save, it was that good. All the great healers of antiquity valued sage because their patients often benefited, which is what all good physicians want. For centuries sage has been used for an increasing number of complaints, carefully recorded by the healers who had good results.

Sage is an effective dressing for wounds. It was often the only treatment for the saber wounds and damage from musket balls in the early days of this country. It contains strong antiseptic qualities along with a remarkable restorative effect on the whole body in many kinds of illnesses. Sage helps most respiratory problems, all the digestive organs, and especially the liver. It is also very useful for skin problems, anything to do with the hair and many conditions in the mouth, such as sore throats.

Sage is frequently combined with other herbs to make very fine remedies. A useful family remedy to clear a stuffy, congested head is to inhale the vapors of hot brew of sage leaves, ginger and if you can get it, Linden blossom.

We humans have inherited many simple herbs for use in our diet, not realizing that when taken on a daily basis, will contribute a silent measure of protection to our intricate bodies. Sage is one of these. It is the antidote for over-indulgence in rich meals like pork and goose, hence, sage and onion stuffing.

Look for recipes that include lots of herbs in your sauces, stuffing's, gravies and soups, sprinkled on top or chopped fine in sandwiches.

It's a fun way to deliver better nutrition and a good dose of preventive medicine without having to convince anyone that it's "good for them."

Missing Guns Returned

The Port Orford Police Department and Curry County District Attorney's Office recently resolved an investigation involving former police chief Barney Issel.

When former Port Orford Police Chief Barney Issel ended his employment with the City he kept in his possession two S&W model 19 revolvers allegedly owned by the city and valued at over \$800.

Police Chief Russ Hunt received a memo on Dec. 2, 1997 from Curry County Deputy District Attorney Charlie Steak. It reads: "Dear Chief Hunt: I have discussed the matter of the two missing guns with Mr. Issel. Mr. Issel maintains that the guns belonged to him but has agreed to donate them to the City of Port Orford Police Department to resolve this matter. The guns have been given to the Lt. Andall at the Sheriff's Office for safe-keeping until you can pick them up.

The case has been cleared.

Sunset Garden Club By Dot Mathews

The January meeting of Sunset Garden Club was held at the Senior Center on the 9th. Hosts were Kirk Johnson, Peigi Stahl, and Kay Neal. Vice-President Nancy Dowdy's resignation was accepted with regret and Paula Dearing was elected to serve the remainder of the term. Steve Thiessen, OSU Extension Service, gave a clear and useful talk on why and how to prune. He handed out pamphlets on the subject and gave the Extension phone number for further help (1-800-356-3986). He said by-pass loppers and shears are best and that you need a pruning saw. Keep your tools sharp, clean and oiled. Painting the pruned wound is no longer recommended. Since plants in our climate won't always go dormant, pruning is done all year. Remove the dead, the dying, the diseased and branches that cross. Fruit and nut trees get pruned for production. Your thumbnail is the best pruning tool of all, because an unwanted limb is not going to grow in the summer when, in the spring, you have removed the bud.

paper. It continues west under Arizona Street in a culvert into the millpond and then empties into Garrison Lake.

The council considered their franchise agreement with General Telephone, which expired in 1995. The council had wanted G.T.E. to install 2 new pay phones, one at City Hall and one at Buffington Park as part of the new agreement. City lawyer Randall Tosh sent them a letter saying they couldn't require GTE to provide these phones as part of a franchise agreement. Norma House told the council the G.T.E. franchise had brought \$4,049 into the city coffers during the 1996-97 fiscal year. The consensus of the council was to leave the franchise fee at its current 4% since the increase allowable to 7% would just be passed on to the consumer.

The council voted by a 5-1 margin to put on their February agenda consideration of allowing the chairperson of the planning commission to be a voting member.

Matt Grey, representing the engineering firm of H.G.E. updated the council on the water system improvement project. Ralph Donaldson said H.G.E. had used \$122,000

of the initial grant of \$149,000 for the initial engineering study and plans. H.G.E. was requesting an additional \$10,000 for changes in the project plans which Donaldson rattled off. Donaldson made a motion authorizing H.G.E. a sum of money not to exceed \$10,000 to cover engineering changes. Matt Grey said his company was eager to move from the design phase to the construction phase and the plan would be ready to go for bids within 30-45 days.

Ralph Donaldson made a motion to accept the 1996-97 city audit as prepared by Rob Wall which was passed unanimously.

The council approved a bail schedule worked out by municipal judge Howard Lichtig and Police Chief Russ Hunt.

The council considered Ordinance 98-01 which "provides a procedure for issuance of citations and for certain court procedures". The ordinance is worded such that the codes enforcement officer is the chief administrative officer of the City. Judge Lichtig and Chief Hunt will review this proposed ordinance with attorney Tosh for possible rewrites and bring it back to the council.

Elk River Hatchery By Robin Crisler, Manager

The fall chinook salmon season is winding down, and we will end the chinook spawning season sometime around the end of January. It is good to look back over the past three months and reflect on the success of the adult returns to the hatchery. Although the river was quite low and the necessary rainfall came late, we collected a good number of fish from all segments of the run to make an excellent brood this summer. We are very happy with the quality of the eggs and the diversity of the genetic composition, so the smolts that we release to the Elk River this coming September at twelve fish per pound will be healthy and vigorous.

Over the last couple of weeks we have started collecting adult winter steelhead from the Chetco River. These fish will be spawned from mid January to early March. The eggs will be used to establish our annual production of 50,000 smolts to be released to the Chetco in April of 1999. The fingering steelhead we have on hand right now are from adults spawned last spring, and the smolts will be released this coming April. At release, the steelhead smolts are about six fish per pound.

We would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to Spike and Judy Cochran for all their help during November, December and into January. They were here at the hatchery as our volunteer hosts and did an outstanding job. While they worked on many maintenance and repair projects, their help was especially appreciated on spawning days when we were typically short handed.

As spring approaches, we look forward to ponding and feeding fry. It is a fun time of the year and we hope everyone will stop in for a visit to see how the hatchery operates at the beginning of the rearing season.
