Vault Slides into Ocean by Evan Kramer



The wastewater siphon vault slid into the surf on Saturday afternoon. The vault is where the treated wastewater is pumped to from the sewer treatment plant. When the three-year old drain field was still working, water was distributed via four pipes into the leach or drain field. Now treated wastewater is intermittently flowing out of an eight-inch pipe onto the beach. I was at the scene on Sunday morning at high tide. Three things were distinctive. One was the smell of chlorine in the treated water flowing into the ocean. The second was the continued amount of erosion of the dunes. The third was the large number of seagulls flying about the area. 4 metal pipes sticking out of the sand mark the northern boundary of the drain field. They make up one of three monitoring wells. It was at water's edge on Sunday morning as waves surged over it.

The four white plastic leach field pipes hung forlornly from the collapsing dune just south of the vault and by the time the tide started receding one of the pipes was claimed by the ocean.

Let's go back in this evolving story to Tuesday, February 3. Forest Access be-

gan work on the road from the Mouchawar property at Agate Beach out to the drain field dunes. On Thursday work was halted as the two culvert pipes washed down the outlet creek. Work began again Friday and the rock bridge over the outlet creek was completed. Workers continued rocking the road out to the dunes through Saturday but stopped on that day after the vault slid into the ocean. Also during this period a large trench was dug in the dunes just to the north of the vault. The sand from this trench was placed in front of and on top of the vault in an attempt to protect it. This proved futile.

Many people visited the dunes on Sunday for a first hand look. High tide was 7.9 feet with a very strong surge. What's left of the dunes were pounded heavily during the morning hours.

The city public works department had a meeting on Monday morning at City Hall. Public works director Jerry McNurlin invited several agency representatives including Ruben Kretzschmar from the Department of Environmental Quality; Chuck Nordstrom, Curry County Planning Director; and John Philips and Cary Sutter from State Parks. McNurlin described the purpose of the gathering as a meeting of the minds (maintenance wise). Kretzschmar told McNurlin he needs to

post notices at points where people gain access to the beach warning them about the situation. McNurlin then showed a video taken Sunday afternoon showing the damage to the drain field and the dunes. He said we had lost 30-35 feet of dunes since Friday. He said probably within a few days the ocean would channel through the dunes and flow into the lake. I have asked around about the consequences of the ocean breaching the lake. I've been told the lake is anywhere from three to eleven feet higher than the ocean at median tide. I've also been told the ocean breached the lake in 1930 but haven't seen anything conclusive. One thing is for certain and that is with the lake higher than the ocean the lake level would dramatically lower.

Kretzschmar told the McNurlin he had prepared the order allowing the city to discharge treated wastewater into the ocean on an emergency basis. He did not have that order with him. Kretzschmar said a couple of options available are a wetland wastewater treatment system or an ocean outfall but the DEQ probably won't allow wastewater discharge into the lake.

Chuck Nordstrom suggested the city contact Jim Lusier of Lusier Hydrosience and have him look at the drainfield.

Commission Continues Hearing by Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Planning Commission met on Tuesday night and considered a conditional use application for a ten unit affordable housing complex on Arizona Street.

John Zia, the agent for the development gave a presentation to the commission about the development. The property is located in an R-1 zone though Zia stated the PUD allows this development if it has three or more acres.

Commission member Ellen Warring asked if the application material had been placed in the library six days prior to the meeting

and was told it hadn't been.

Zia described the development as providing affordable housing. He said he built his first affordable house in 1990 and that good quality people need housing they can afford. He said 65% of the residents of Port Orford would qualify to live in the new development if built. Zia said the quality of his construction exceeds most of the existing rental units in Port Orford. He said the housing is targeted for working class people and families.

The development will consist of ten cottages (small homes) in a wooded three-acre site. C&K Market, Employees' Pension Trust Fund currently owns the property but ownership of the development

will be with the Umpqua Community Development Corporation of Roseburg. Zia said there would be no public streets in the development, there would be 20 parking places plus 2 handicap parking spaces. He said no tax abatements would be sought from the City. He said a one-time grant from the Federal government buys down the payment making the development pencil out. He said the soonest the development could start construction would be June 1998, if approved by the planning commission.

Planning Commission chairperson Viola Cuatt read two letters of support for the development including one from Frank and Jane Cramer and another from the president of the Community Resource Team, Martha Weaver-Britell, written on behalf of that group.

Ed McQuade, Enterprise Zone Chairman, spoke in favor of the development. Jim Britell spoke against it. He recommended

looking at the big picture and considering the C & K connection. The pension trust fund owns several other properties in the area including some north of Paradise Point Road. He said this could lead to development leap frogging Paradise Point Road to the north. He said Hubbard Creek water is limited and ask for a continuance of this hearing. He said the Umpqua CDC will get a huge amount of grant money to extend the water and sewer lines. Dorothy Schweitz spoke in opposition to the development. Her mother owns the house and property just north of the proposed development on Arizona Street. She told the commission she has a petition signed by 14 neighbors in opposition. She called the development a good proposal but this is not the area for it. David Lunsford asked that the developer pay the same sewer and water hook up fees as other developments.

John Zia responded to some of the questions and statements made by the public. He said rent for a two bedroom cottage would be \$349 a month and \$403 for a three bedroom. This would include utilities. Zia said the C & K pension fund

wants to get out of its land holdings without being hurt. He said he was looking at a compromise on the sewer and water hook up fees and thinking of treating the development as five duplexes, thus five hook-up fees. He said the cottages would not have garages but each would have a storage unit.

Dorothy Schweitz asked for a continuance of the hearing. Ellen Warring made a motion to continue the hearing until March.

Commission member Justin Baumann said the application was not filled out correctly including not being signed by the property owner and is invalid. He

went on to discuss the problems with the application. Tom Hamilton made a motion to continue the hearing until the March meeting and the commission unanimously approved.

enne and normalized his pressure. His startled doctor said –"whatever you're doing, keep doing it." Now don't suddenly stop your medication to switch to Cayenne. 

Public Notice Re: Water Quality

Due to a mass of rumors that have set in on this City, we feel it necessary to give the citizens of Port Orford an official statement on the water quality, and situation of the affluent holding tank on the dunes of Agate Beach.

The rumors of raw sewage seeping, running, or in any other way entering our

water source of Garrison Lake are 100% false. No raw sewage or effluent (twice treated sewage) has entered our water supply. If a tragedy like this or any risk factor was present, threatening our water supply, our number one objective would be to inform the users of this water. But this is not the case. The health and safety of the people of Port Orford is and always will be our number one priority. The water in Port Orford is safe to drink. We do not see this situation changing due to

the emergency condition at the Agate Beach Dunes.

Due to un-seasonal high waves (El Nino) the dunes and fore dunes that once protected our effluent distribution vault have been compromised and dunes have eroded over 50 yards inland exposing this tank. Effluent in this case is sewage that has been treated twice to D.E.Q. specifications. The threat we face is that if this effluent vault is washed out, effluents will then be discharged directly into the Pacific Ocean. This is what we are trying to avoid by building a protective boarder in front of this vault as to stop the erosion. But even in the event that this holding vault is lost, it still does not threaten this City's water supply.

When you're in a face-to-face with your cat, slowly close your eyes and re-open them. It's a sign of submission and defuses any tension.



Council Sets Record Straight by Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council met Monday night with Mayor Gary Doran giving an overview of the situation at the sewer system drain field. Doran spoke about the misinformation going on concerning the emergency. He said there is no health hazard at the drain field even with the effluent water siphon vault having sloughed off into the surf zone. The effluent water is flowing onto the sand and into the ocean.

Councilor Ralph Donaldson said experts think within two week nothing will be left of the dunes.

The council will contact Dr. Curt Peterson and Dr. Paul Komar; both ocean related scientists for their advice.

Jerry McNurlin stated no more heroic measures would be taken to save the dunes and drain field. Work has ceased

on the rock road out to the dunes from Agate Beach Trailer Park. No rock riprap was ever placed in front of the siphon vault though it had been planned. McNurlin estimated Forest Access had completed \$9,000 worth of emergency work for city before the job was suspended.

The council considered a motion by Jim Campbell to bring city attorney Randall Tosh down to the city and hold a training session/seminar with the planning commission. Councilor Robert Warring offered a counter proposal. He has the name of a group of planning consultants/teachers who would be willing to give a free all day seminar to the planning commission if two other city planning commissions would participate. The council was not interested in Warring's proposal and voted 5-1 for Campbell's motion. Campbell said Tosh would conduct his training session at no cost to the city.

The council voted unanimously to accept ordinance 98-01. The ordinance "provides a procedure for issuance of citations and for certain court procedures; and repealing ordinance No. 325-87, codified as Port Orford Municipal Code Chapter 1.08." The motion establishes the chief administrative officer as the codes enforcement officer for the city.

The council unanimously approved Ordinance 98-02, a franchise agreement with G.T.E. for 20 years with a 4% franchise fee which is passed on to the consumer.

The council agreed the fire department could use the old public work's office.

The council chose Norma House as the city budget officer for 1998-99. Norma told the council they need to advertise for budget committee members.

The council unanimously agreed on a motion for the city to hire an independent inspector for the water system improvement project.

The council voted 6-0 to use the CPA firm of Wall and Wall for their 1997-98 audit with a basic contract of \$7,950.

The council approved Mayor Doran's selection of Martin Myrhe to serve on the bed tax committee.







Vault Slides into Ocean Continued from front cover

Nordstrom explained that the area constitutes complex geological problem. He recommended the city contact two other consultants involved with ocean hydrology including Curt Peterson and Paul Komar.

Ralph Donaldson asked why we couldn't use the lake outlet creek for the treated water outfall. Kretschmar answered he was concerned with the creek having enough water in it in summer to get an adequate dispersion of the wastewater.

So far no one from the city has contacted Curry County Emergency Services about the situation but McNurlin will contact them. He said the mayor needs to write a letter to the governor stating our emergency.

John Philips from State Parks made it clear the vault will have to be removed from the shoreline.

The group moved into a discussion about the drinking water situation. Kretschmar said if the ocean breeches the lake the city will be forced to go to its Hubbard Creek water source. Public works assistant manager Allan Wagner said the water

would be turbid but it can be treated. He said the current water treatment plant was designed for Garrison Lake water.

Chuck Nordstrom said if the City tries going with a permanent riprap solution at the dunes they would meet possible resistance from the State.

The meeting ended with a little fingerpointing.

Step 1 in the solution will be contacting ocean hydrologist Paul Komar and have him visit the site.

Tuesday, February 10, 1998

Curry County Commissioners Lloyd Olds and T.V. Skinner arrived in Port Orford in the afternoon. They were going for a first hand look at the situation at the dunes with Jerry McNurlin and Ralph Donaldson. The commissioners may possibly hold a meeting as early as Wednesday and draft a letter asking the Governor Kitzhaber for emergency assistance for the area. This can also lead to emergency funds from the Federal Emergency Management Authority (FEMA).

Meanwhile, as we go to press, rain is forecast for the next five days and the waves roll on.

Letter to the Editor,

I want to clarify the 2/5 Port Orford Today report about what I said at the 2/2 city council meeting.

I did not say I was against riprapping the drain field. I said that riprap may solve one problem, but cause another. I said we have three serious problems: the drain field; the overtopping of the ocean into Garrison Lake approximately 100 yards north of the drain field which is injecting salt water into our current drinking water supply; and the need to keep the outflow of Garrison lake open south of the drain field because if the lake rises too high it could flood a pump station and cause problems to our sewage treatment plant.

I recommended the city consider the effect of riprapping the drain field vault on all three of our problems and get an expert on dunes and ocean hydrology to give them advice. I offered to help locate an expert, and to help in any other way I could. In this difficult time all citizens need to give the city officials any help we can possibly furnish.
