Ocean Calms Down By Evan Kramer



A decided change in the weather has slowed the erosion of the dunes at Agate Beach. The first couple rows of the leech field were ex-

posed by dune erosion last week but that area is now in a holding pattern.

Friday afternoon erosion had worked its way to the edge of the temporary road to the drain field. At this point three trucks loaded with rock showed up at Agate Beach. I had just seen public works director Jerry McNurlin and councilor Ralph Donaldson leaving the beach. They told me rock was being brought in to keep the ocean from breaching the lake. They said they were following the advice found in the letter Paul Komar and William McDougal had written the city after their visit here on Sunday, February 14. Their six-page letter is too long to print in its entirety but well worth reading. The following is one of the most important paragraphs.

"Mitigation Measures – With the continued rapid rate of erosion at the site, there is little that can be done to protect the remnants of the drain field. Of immediate concern is that the beach/dune barrier will breach, forming a channel or inlet connecting the ocean with Garrison Lake. As discussed above, the consequences of this would be the loss (at least for an extended period of time) of the lake as a source of fresh water for the community of Port Orford, and perhaps would also cause some erosion of the lake shoreline. Once the breach has occurred, it would be difficult and expensive to repair." They go on to discuss mitigation measures including one they refer to as a beach nourishment project. They recommend not nourishing the beach with pebbles through cobbles but instead "to temporarily dike low areas in the beach/dune barrier where a breach is likely" using the "pebbles through cobbles."

At the same time the dump trucks loaded with rock were arriving at Agate Beach, John Phillips from State Parks, was out on the drain field taking a walk to see the erosion with Jim Britell. Phillips came back to the area the trucks were parked and asked them to hold off their work until he could make a few phone calls. Among other agencies he contacted was the Division of State Lands who have jurisdiction over the area the road is located. They told him the rock could only be placed on the temporary road surface and none was to be dumped along the shoreline as a riprap. Once Phillips gave them the go ahead a procession of 40 dump truck loads of rock were brought out to Agate Beach over the course of the afternoon. Each one carried approximately 10 cubic yards of rock for a total of 400 cubic yards. The new 5 – 6 foot high dike on top of the temporary road starts at the twin culverts that drain Garrison Lake and goes to where the road is on the edge where no dune protects it from the beach.

I asked public works director Jerry McNurlin to clear up a few things regarding the temporary dike. He told me the city's intent is to have Forest Access come back and smooth out the rocks and make the road usable again. Extra rock would be pushed towards the lake not the shoreline. McNurlin said the salinity in the lake has dropped since last week. It never got high enough that the water became unusable for drinking. He said the temporary road is on Mouchawar property and the city has permission to place the rock on the road. He also said the city would soon be putting out for bid the drilling of a well for drinking water in Buffington Park near the water treatment plant.

I spoke with County Commissioners Lloyd Olds and T.V. Skinner on Monday morning about the state declaration of emergency for both the Port District and



Alumni Scholarship Fund

There is an effort currently underway in Port Orford-Langlois to establish a "Pacific High Alumni Scholarship Fund" to enable graduating seniors to continue their education. Representative alumni in each graduating class from Port Orford High School, Langlois High School and Pacific High School prior to 1994 have been notified and are being asked to contact as many of their classmates as possible to explain the desperate need for financial assistance for graduating seniors from Pacific High School. Many colleges in Oregon carry annual price tags of \$20,000 or more! State universities cost in excess of \$11,000 per year. Even community colleges cost close to \$2,000, not counting room/board and travel expenses. Pacific High School students are finding it difficult to accumulate the resources they need to attend college or trade schools and the problem is escalating. Presently, over one-half of the class of 1998 aspires to attend school beyond high school after graduation. Lack of financing will make it difficult for some, impossible for others to attain this goal.

The alumni of Port Orford-Langlois represent a powerful force that has the capability of doing a great deal to solve this dilemma. If the hundreds who have already graduated financially assisted those who are about to graduate each year, a wonderful tradition could be set in motion and the payoffs would be enormous.

The "Pacific High Alumni Scholarship Fund" will be guided by the following principles:

All money contributed each year will be dispensed in the form of scholarships and grants to qualified Pacific High graduates.

Each year new funds will be solicited to make the scholarship program an annual tradition...

Why Frankincense and Myrrh? By Graeme Graydon

Frankincense is mentioned 52 times in the Bible as a Holy anointing oil, if you count the Greek/Hebrew translations. Extensive university research overseas shows why Frankincense was used by kinds and anyone else who could afford it.

Housing Project Approved Article By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Planning Commission met Tuesday night and after a lengthy hearing approved a conditional use application for a 10 unit affordable housing development on Arizona Street, legally known as a "planned unit development."

The commission first heard from members of the public. Planning commission chairperson Viola Cuatt read a petition with 41 signatures from a group of citizens adamantly opposed to the development. They stated it would lower the current values of homes in the area, cause traffic problems and pet problems, that fences would be needed, the peace and quiet of the neighborhood would be disturbed, and a study of the sewer and water system was needed first.

Marilyn Green said she was really in favor of the units being built. She added she would like to see all ten units be built with the universal design for handicap accessibility.

Dorothy Settle spoke against the development and said we needed businesses more than houses.

Bonnie Allen asked the commission if the needs assessment for the project had been done.

Jim Britell spoke against the development. One of his problems with it is the current water situation in Port Orford. He brought up the threat to Garrison Lake water caused by this winter's heavy storms and dune erosion as well as the fact Hubbard Creek water improvements have been stopped. He referred to the development as a Gateway project and that it may make all the property around it developable.

Paul Prosch-Jensen said he supported the project but opposed siting it on Arizona Street.

Nathaniel Wander said the application left too many unanswered questions and should not be presently approved.

Irene Schweitz said the original petition had 41 signatures on it and she presented the commission with an additional six signatures. She spoke of the real concern of people that the project is not good. She suggested a moratorium on building until the sewer and water issues are resolved.

Developer John Zia responded to some of the comments. He said the development would increase property values. Referring to the sewer and water problems he said he would use septic tanks and a community water system if necessary. He said the only way the development would become a Gateway project is if the city council annexes the other properties owned by C & K employee pension trust into the city. Zia responded to a question from Leo Langner and said that the development would be complete by the end of this year if the commission approved the

application tonight. Zia stated he wanted to build a showcase project.

Planning commission members made a total of seven motions that placed different conditions on the developer. They are as follows:

- The commission would apply a condition that the existing water supply system be upgraded by the applicant if deemed necessary by the city at no cost to the city.
- The applicant must provide a legal opinion if the ten units have to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements for accessibility.
- The three-acre development site be legally converted to one lot as per the city attorney.
- The developer see to it that a landscaping and grading plan be submitted prior to final plat approval.
- 5. The developer see that a management plan from Umpqua Community Development Corporation (the future owner of the development) be submitted prior to final plat approval.
- All drainage from the site shall be subject to the NPDES permit process.

The planning commission be provided with a "needs assessment" for the development.

The commission voted on each condition separately and approved each one. They then voted on a motion by member Russel Ucolano to approve the application based on the seven conditions. Tom Hamilton, Leo Langner and Ucolano voted for the motion and Justin Bauman opposed. The motion carried 3-1. The developer will still have to appear before the commission for final plat approval in a public meeting.

He advised using color film with a speed of not more than 200 to reduce the graininess so the copy can be printed in larger sizes. He recommended having your film processed by a one-hour processor such as Wal-Mart when you are on a research trip so that if the photos didn't come out, you can still take them over again without making another long trip. Tim came well-equipped with camera gear and example photos and his presentation was well received and greatly appreciated.

DeBoyd Smith added to what Tim said and showed an example of an old group photo he had photographed where he had focused in on single faces and enlarged them to about 8x10" with excellent results

Valerie Kramer showed two booklets of photos she has recently produced on the computer based on photos she borrowed from her aunts, scanned, and organized with her desktop publishing software. She described her experiences with copying the photos using a camera, a color laser copier, and a computer scanner.
