Heroic Efforts at Port By Evan Kramer



You have to see it to believe it. One of the most interesting things around here lately has been the heroic efforts at the Port of Port Orford to dredge the sand from this winter's newly created beach under the boat hoist. Fortunately for me Lyle Keeler called me from the dock on Monday morning and told me to come down to the Port with my camera as soon as possible. It was well worth leaving the Fun Zone in a hurry. There were two major efforts ongoing to clear the sand from the area adjacent to the boat hoist. To the east of the boat hoist a huge Cat-T Rack Excavator Hoe was busy gulping up several yards of sand at a time and loading it into a 22 yard Terex truck which looks like something out of Jurassic Park. The truck when loaded then hauled the sand back on to the far beach and came back for another load. They were doing this work in the ocean but of course it was low tide. At the same time this operation was attracting the attention of several fishermen and other interested people, a drag line operation was working. It scoops up 2 cubic yards of sand per bucket and hauls it up to the beach in a continuous process. The dragline has been in operation since March

16. These efforts are expensive and being handled by private contractors. They are being paid for by the Army Corps of Engineers. Dick Cato, a Corps of Engineers employee, was at the Port office on Tuesday morning. He told me the Corps was spending \$50,000 on what he described as emergency relief for the Port. He said the contractor's work would be done by the end of this week. He estimated 60,000 cubic yards of sand have infilled the Port from last year's winter dredging to this year's. Port manager Gayle Paige said the dredging barge Sandwick was scheduled to arrive and begin work at the Port this Friday.

Paige gave me an interesting group of numbers that illustrated the economic devastation of this winter's storms. The dollar value of the commercial fish harvest (including shellfish) at the Port of Port Orford was as follows:

Paige noted that 1996 was a very good year for the crab harvest.

Council Reverses Decision

The Port Orford City Council met in special session on Wednesday, March 25

and started with a supplemental 1997-98 budget hearing in a workshop session.

The first item on the regular agenda was the inspector for the City water system improvement project. The council had at a previous meeting voted to hire the inspector themselves rather than let engineering firm H.G.E. hire the inspector. Councilor Ralph Donaldson spoke about repealing the original motion and letting H.G.E. hire the inspector. Donaldson said if the city hired their own inspector they would not be able to sue if problems cropped up whereas if H.G.E. hired the inspector we could sue if necessary. Donaldson said that both Sondra Jackson from Umpqua C.D.C. and city attorney Randal Tosh recommended H.G.E. hire the inspector. Councilor Robert Warring expressed discomfort with H.G.E. hiring the inspector. Donaldson offered a motion to repeal the former motion for the city to hire the inspector and permit H.G.E. to hire their own inspector. The motion passed 5-1 with Warring dissenting.

The council then unanimously approved Resolution 98-08 adopting a supplemental budget for the 1997-98 fiscal year as presented.

On Friday evening, the contests, events and tasting will be from 6:00-11:00pm with admission at \$6.

On Saturday, activities begin at 3:00pm with admission at \$6 until 6:00pm. In preparation for the live music and the dance, the admission is \$8.00 after

6:00pm. Festivities continue until midnight and the reminders of the seaside setting, with boatmen's nets and floats and other artifacts of a wharf scene.


CRT Meets April 16

Essential Oil of Rose By Graeme Graydon



There is no oil more highly regarded than Rose. All recorded history reveals veneration for the flowers and its intoxicating fragrance.

There are 230 different species of rose, but of the 30 sub-species named *Odorata*, only 3 are cultivated for their exquisite perfume. *R. gallica* (Caucasus), *R. centifolia* (Persia), and *R. damascena* (Syria). The damask rose is now grown in Bulgaria to produce the worlds most expensive and most therapeutic oil, known as Bulgarian Rose Otto. These old "parent" roses dominated until the first hybrid appeared in 1816.

Steam distillation of Roses may have started near the Persian Gulf, yielding a condensate, which divided into Rose oil & Rose water. The Rose water was and is used widely in the Middle East and Europe as a beauty treatment, a condiment and in ceremonies of welcome and celebration. It is so expensive that not one of the big perfumiers could use more than

5%-8% addition to their most expensive brands. One million blooms are carefully harvested by an army of workers on a May evening to produce just 1 pound of oil by the next day.

As a medicinal, Rose has a reputation of success more for women than for men. Anything to do with reproduction, circulation and digestion, highly anti-septic, skin rejuvenator, anti-depressant, eye and eye lid problems, frigidity and nervousness.

In 1992, two U.S. researchers, Bruce Tainio – Dr. Gary Young discovered that oils have an electrical frequency measurable in Hertz. They also tested and measured the frequencies of foods. The daily average frequency of a healthy man is 62Hz. To 68Hz, processed/canned foods were 0Hz, fresh produce 15Hz, dried herbs 12Hz to 22Hz and fresh herbs 20Hz to 27Hz. Essential oils started at 62Hz and with Rose oil reached 320Hz, the highest frequency of any natural substance known.

Perhaps the extraordinary healing powers of pure essential oils may be due to their innate energy which lifts the lowered frequencies of disease into a vibra-

One of the many pieces of news I discovered upon returning from my trip to Southern California was the resignation of Port of Port Orford Commissioner Bill Oleson. He served as chairman of the Port Commission and despite his resignation will continue to serve on the Port budget committee.

I did not support Bill Oleson when he ran for reelection to the Port Commission last year. I was actively involved in the campaign against him and wrote an editorial article against him.

But then I started attending Port Commission meetings at the end of last year and grew to appreciate Oleson's contributions. My appreciation grew to the point that when I read his resignation letter I was deeply disappointed for him and for the Port District. He had only the best interests of the Port in mind. He ran the meetings in a timely and efficient man-

ner. He spent countless hours down at the Port office assisting port manager Gayle Paige. He was the only Port commissioner not involved in the fishing business. I know he wanted to see another "civilian" appointed to the Port Commission to fill the vacancy created when John Spurgeon resigned. We had talked about it and I know he felt strongly that since the voters had decisively voted in favor of the 1.5 million-dollar Port bond issue last November in a sense we had become partners with the Port. I hope the four remaining port commissioners heed Bill Oleson's words in his resignation letter and "make every effort to insure that the Port District is equally represented by a cross-section of the voters within the District".

Thank you Bill Oleson for your contributions and the efforts you will continue to make on behalf of the Port District.

Letter to the Editor,

We were rather disappointed with the incomplete reportage Curry County newspapers gave on the Commissioner's actions regarding the Canopy project.

To start with: the Commissioners did not give the project the "green light". They merely okayed to go on with one more small step of "scoping session" – a euphemism to extending an invitation to a bunch of world-class experts in the Canopy field to travel (guess at whose expense) to Curry, be wined and dined and bestow on us their expertise, tentatively scheduled for April 1998.

The Commissioners have included, at my behest, a clause in their motion declaring that these sessions shall be open to the public. Against the expressed desires of deposed Commissioner Hanscam, the Canopy board chair, who had the chutzpa to insist they are a "private" entity and thus not covered by Oregon's "Open Meeting" statutes.

The most important information that needs to be conveyed to the citizens, as I doubt many had the inclination to peruse the lengthy report, is that Eco Tourism International, retained to assess the project, came out most strongly against the extravaganza of a massive multi-component project and a transportation fleet to

hustle the poor trapped tourists between them. The egrets are still limping along but their wings are clipped!

We call on everybody to assure that the Commissioners decree is heeded and, with the help of the press, us citizens shall be given timely notice about the "scoping sessions" and all other forthcoming meetings.

Letter to the Editor,

In Spring of 1995, this community made its feelings regarding Battle Rock Park very clear. 474 people signed a petition supporting the incomparable unobstructed view of the beach and ocean.

Now it is 1998. The view is very obstructed. We "whiners and crybabies" were "assured the wall would be no higher than 16"-18" tall and a person sitting in a car would be able to park at Battle Rock and have an unobstructed view of the beach and ocean". (Port Orford Today, 3/26/98).

I'm sorry some people feel we shouldn't complain. Though we didn't mount an all out "anti-wall" campaign when this was proposed, many had objections. Some proposed "the wall" for Rocky Point or Dock Overlook - neither spot as obtrusive or controversial as Battle Rock. We were told "we're very aware of the previous problems and the community's feelings.

We will not obstruct the view." Rather than create another uproar, we trusted those in charge. We were certain they would protect Battle Rock Park, its view and the community's wishes. Being conciliatory rather than inflammatory many didn't persist with our desire to have Battle Rock left alone.

The "City of Port Orford and ODOT have agreed on the height". What about the community that made itself heard loud

and clear in 1995? Doesn't the park belong to everyone? Many care deeply for our unobstructed panoramic view. That ODOT, CRT and the City don't care about the view or the community's wishes doesn't make the current height acceptable.

The area near Battle Rock was one of the first parts of Port Orford to be settled and still attracts visitors today. Coast Candle, owned by Michael Kohout and Marlena Sensale is a popular place to shop.

Michael and Marlena came here from Tannersville, Pennsylvania, a small town in the Pocono Mountains. Port Orford reminds them of Tannersville in the days before it was invaded by people from New York City looking for affordable housing.

Disturbed by the changes to their small town, Marlena began to research other areas of the country to find a place far from big cities. She narrowed the search to Brookings, Gold Beach or Port Orford and they flew to Oregon in June, 1996 for a closer look at the three towns. When they arrived in Port Orford it was love at first sight; they felt like they had just come home. Since they arrived early last year, they've found they love the town even more in spite of windy summers and a rainy El Nino Winter.

Marlena and Michael are here for the community, not the tourist trade, and this is reflected in the quality merchandise and fair prices they offer. The community has repaid this commitment by being extremely complimentary and supportive of their business. In addition to a wide variety of merchandise and attractive displays, the store offers over 100 different scents in candles and incense, a Greeting Card Club where the 11th card is free and holiday giveaways such as 12 days of drawings for free gifts during the Christmas season.

Originally the two buildings were separate, vigorous businesses. The building to the east where the Candle Shop is now located was owned for many years by the Leutwyler family, first as a blacksmith shop, then as Battle Rock Garage. building. The other building was best known as C.A. Long's Mercantile store with the Long's apartment upstairs. Later it became a variety store and then a tavern.

For years Aden Chapman and Elton Miller operated The Orfords there. It was a popular meeting place for townspeople looking for good food and company. Many folks had regular stools at the front counter.

The Hall family remodeled and connected the two buildings and operated The Orfords as a restaurant and lounge until the early 90's. Since then the buildings have been vacant except for memories of good times. It's nice to see empty windows come to life with lights and colorful displays to bring new vitality to this section of town.

Letter to the Editor,

On March 23, the US Coast Guard brought the Illinois River rafting victims to Curry General Hospital (CGH). They could have taken them to Rogue Valley, Bay Area or Roseburg hospitals, but they didn't. They brought them here because when you have a life threatening incident time counts.

Even traveling by helicopter when going to a large hospital was only a matter of a few minutes more, the Coast Guard brought the victims to Curry General. They didn't worry about whether a small hospital with on-call ER doctors could handle the situation. They know we are capable and up to the task; they've been here before; time counts.

If there is no hospital or ER in Gold Beach you will travel one and one-half hours North or one hour South when you have your crushing chest pain, head injury, hemorrhage, stroke or other emergencies. Your child or grandchild will travel that same endless distance when he is hit by a car, has an overwhelming asthma attack or major seizure. Time counts.



Heroic Efforts at Port Continued from front cover

The council considered a Mutual Agreement and Order (MAO) between the City of Port Orford and the Department of Environmental Quality relating to replacement of the drain field at Agate Beach. The M.A.O. provides "timelines for design, financing and construction" involved with replacing the drain field. The DEQ is giving the City until September 1, 1999 to have the project complete. Lawyer Tosh recommended the City approve the M.A.O. in a memorandum he sent them. Donaldson mentioned Tosh doesn't like the DEQ. Donaldson further recommended that the council not send Tosh's letter to the DEQ with the M.A.O. This letter was not made available to the public. Councilor Carl Eskelson was concerned about the potential fines outlined by DEQ.

Ralph Donaldson said before the former drain field was constructed, two former city council members had driven to Salem and talked DEQ into allowing the drain fields be constructed in the dunes. Councilor Ruth Jamieson wanted to know which two and Donaldson said John Mayea and Hans Von Spaeth. Donaldson

said the DEQ had been against placing the drain fields in the dunes. Donaldson made a motion for the City to sign the M.A.O. but not include the letter from Tosh. The motion passed 6-0.

Dear Port Orford Community,
