This Saturday and Sunday enjoy the Port Orford Arts and Seafood Festival. The two focal points of this year's Festival are the Port of Orford Dock and boneyard area as well as the Community Building. Besides these two locations there are festival events and shows in sixteen other locations from Port Orford to Sixes to Langlois.

Things will be going on at the dock both days including a dock walk on Saturday morning led by one of the local fisherman. Right after the dock walk ends Dave Barnes is going to give a demonstration of fish filleting. Dave got a lot of experience recently when he filleted dozens of freshly caught tuna. Sunday at Dock Beach the big event is the barbecue featuring fresh albacore and halibut. One thing that has been added to the Sunday schedule at the dock is live music featuring The Tuna Tunes Band. They will be playing jazz, country and rock'n'roll for your pleasure.

This may be the last year for the wooden dock at the Port of Port Orford. The Port is scheduled to tear down this structure and replace it with a new one of a much

different design next year. So this year would be a good time to bring your camera and get some photos of the wood pilings and the ocean waves rolling under the dock before you blink and a new picture takes its place.

The Community Building will be home to the increasingly popular Junk Art Exhibit. I've seen several entries already and they're all very creative. This event has grown in popularity and participation every year since the Arts Council initiated it. Saturday evening at the Community Building the Arts Festival hosts "The Whole Package"- a combination of theater, art, fine food and live music. Part of the package is the Port Orford Theater Works presentation of "**The Tube**" at 7:00pm. Carol Malley and Tere Tronson are directing this short, humorous play about television. There are 20 young people participating in the play. Carol Malley told me the young people wrote some of the play and other parts are from Shakespeare. She described the play as "from soap opera to Shakespeare." They have been rehearsing this play for eight weeks now and are ready to perform it for you.

At 4:00pm on Sunday the Festival caps off with a second performance of the play "**The Tube**". This will be followed by

the announcement of the winners of the Junk Art Exhibit. The Driftwood Boosters club will be serving popcorn, cotton candy and Italian sodas at the Community Building from noon until 3:00pm.

There are several additions to the printed schedule. Three more events at the Dock for Saturday include fish prints for kids with kids creating their own fish prints, the US Coast Guard will answer questions about safety and the Master Food Preservers will provide information on freezing, canning and cooking seafood. Patricia Finch will be giving a demonstration of oil painting at the Ace of Gems from 11:00am-5:00pm both days.

A lot of cooperative effort is going into this year's Arts and Seafood Festival. There are several partners including the Port Orford Arts Council, Port Orford Women's Fishery Network, the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce, the Fishermen's Association, and the North Curry Families' and Children's Center. Not only are they working together to put on a great Festival but thirty one area businesses are sponsors of this year's Festival. They are all listed on the festival schedule in this paper. This is a fine example of people and organizations working together. Now let's get out there and make it all worth their time and effort.

Commissioners Vote No

The Curry County Commissioners met on Wednesday afternoon at the Courthouse Annex before a room filled with north county residents. The purpose of their special meeting was to consider a letter of support for the Empowerment Zone application for Census Tract 9501. This area includes Agness, Port Orford, Sixes and Langlois. Commissioner Lloyd Olds made a motion to not write a letter of support for the Empowerment Zone. Commissioner Bill Roberts joined Olds in voting for the motion with Commissioner T.V. Skinner voting against it.

I didn't attend the meeting so you won't be getting a blow by blow description in this article. I called Commissioner Roberts on Thursday, the day after the meeting and asked him about the vote. He described the Empowerment Zone as a very good program and said we could

"use the money up there." He said he had tried every trick in the book to get the issue on the November ballot. He also noted the three fire departments in North Curry County were against it. Roberts told me he thinks we have a silent majority in favor of the Empowerment Zone program but was impressed by the amount of divisiveness the issue has caused in North Curry County. I invited either him or Lloyd Olds or both of them working together to write a letter to this paper better educating those of us who weren't at the meeting why they voted against the program.

Where does the Empowerment Zone application stand as of now? The best person to ask that question of is Ed McQuade who really carried the ball on this issue for the Empowerment Program committee. I spoke with him on Saturday and he summed up the situation by saying, "we're out of it." He said the Port Orford City Council couldn't be the lead

agency in the sector or census tract. He said we had to have the commissioner's endorsement of support to proceed with the application. He said Klamath and Josephine Counties will continue their application but it will be less competitive with North Curry County not involved.

Now for a little editorial opinion. I'm disappointed with the commissioner's vote and didn't believe they would go against the unanimous vote of support from the Port Orford City Council and the 65% of the people who supported the program in the mail-in survey. I believe that the people had chosen many worthwhile priorities as part of the survey to spend the money on if we had been accepted as part of an empowerment zone. Now who's going to pay for the basics? We've already voted ourselves two property tax increases in less than a year with a third one on the ballot this November.

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A New Trail

If you haven't been to the Head's lately you are in for a wonderful surprise. There is now a new trail that covers the northern portion of this historic State Park.

In the small parking area take the western most trail. The trail will lead you through some dense forest with a couple of switchbacks and deposit you on a bluff below the main trail. You have a choice here of turning north or south. Take the north branch first as this will give you an opportunity to see the other side of the big rock at Agate Beach. The change to the dunes brought on by the past winter storms is obvious from this vantage point. You can see the Lighthouse at Cape Blanco - weather permitting. The cliffs drop off steeply to the ocean from here so children and animals should be closely supervised.

Head back south on the trail you just walked - this time looking west. Whales

can be seen from this area especially in the mornings. If you look carefully you will spot the rock just off shore where the Sea Lions sleep in the sun. Take your binoculars and you will notice that they are resting on sharp crustacean buildup.

Continue to follow this trail south past the junction for your original trail and you will find yourself on the second bluff. There is another trail here although not as obvious or well taken care of. Check out the two caves visible at low tide in the cove below. If you go out to the edge there are a couple of secluded picnic spots. Deer and other small animals can sometimes be seen in this area.

Looking south on a clear day affords you a beautiful view of the coastline to Gold Beach. Retrace your steps and this time follow the path back to the main trail. From here you can return to the parking lot or continue on the trail which covers the south side of the Heads. Total distance either direction is about one mile.

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If you are interested in bird watching, migrating whales, photography or a quiet picnic lunch - this is quite a perch. The winds are gusty so bring something warm to wear.

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
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Senior News By Mary Yoder

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**On Heros

You can tell that Maurice Messegue is on of my heros. No one remembers the names of the doctors who tried to suppress him. By steadfasting himself in the simple but profound wisdom of his father, coupled with an absolute trust in the power of his plants to heal, be outlasted the pettiness of physicians who had the backing of the law. Though his work gave him entry to the world of the rich and famous, he always kept his feet on the ground. He bought land in his beloved Gers, a rural corner of France, realizing that the nourishment for his inner strength came not from what he had achieved, but



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
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from his roots, the coaching of his father in the ways of nature and of common people. His father was a brilliant philosopher and healer but as he never actually did anything to earn money, the family was always short of money, young Maurice wore wooden clogs, went to be by candlelight and never saw a radio. The qualities that make Messegue my hero were developed from very humble beginnings. Which made me think of my other heroes.

I never realized how wonderfully nourishing my father was until after I left home to become a cow-boy-No, not a Western cowboy, a New Zealand cow-boy. Until his death at 83, I watched, sometimes amazed as my father grew wiser, more fun and unlimited. He never stopped learning, growing or giving-I owe him so much.

But there were other heroes who I saw more clearly when I was a child. New Zealand was the stepping off point to the Great Southern Continent-Antarctica. From our ports and later our aerodomes, the expeditions of explorers and scientists left for this unknown desolation of ice. The Race to the Pole was a recent memory, the names of Scott, Oates,

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Shackleton, Amundsen and scores of others spoke of raw courage, perseverance and gentlemanly honour-to the point of death.

The World was at war. I was in awe at the example set by recipients of the Victoria Cross, stories of gallantry, displays of compassion and respect, officers who cared for their men, soldiers who honored their officers, people caring for people. It was never about how many planes were shot down by one pilot-that didn't make a hero, it wasn't about how many enemy dead, or what objective was achieved, it was about big-heartedness and common decency that men and women showed when everyone around them was busy saving their own skins. My list of heroes included the women, mothers, teachers, nurses, drivers, pilots, who not only excelled, but did so in the face or scorn or interference from idiots posing as men.

I find heroes everywhere today, seen by few, unrecognized by society, for the criteria have changed-only winners are allowed on those who acquire the greatest wealth as power. Impressive, I suppose, but the people who make me feel good are the ones whose heart-warmth warms my heart. Who are your heroes?

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School Registration

Registration for students attending schools in Port Orford-Langlois School District is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, August 27 and 28 from 9:00am to noon and 1:00-3:00pm. Students who reside south of the Elk River and are entering pre-school through grade five should register at Driftwood Elementary School in Port Orford. Students residing north of the Elk River entering pre-school through grade five should register at Blanco School in Langlois. Students entering in grades six through eight should register at Blanco School. Students in grades nine through twelve will be registered at Pacific High School.

Students registering with the district for the first time should bring immunization records with them at the time of registration, and pre-school and kindergarten students will also need to present proof of birth. The first day of school for all 2CJ students is Tuesday, September 8.

School activity fees for students are as follows: Sixth, seventh and eighth grades - \$10.00, ninth through twelfth - \$10.00 for student body and \$7.00 for towels.

The School District participates in the national school lunch and breakfast programs. Free and reduced-priced meals are available for students unable to pay the full price for meals. Eligibility is determined by the household size and income. Application forms and a letter explaining the program will be sent home with all students registering in the district. No child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap.

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Crab Season Over

The 1997-98 Dungeness crab harvest along the Oregon coast drew to a close on Friday, August 14, when the season which began in December, was officially over. According to preliminary landing figures, this year's "crop" of the tasty crustaceans was very close to last season's 7.1 million-pound harvest. The final tally won't be available until after the last deliveries are made and all remaining fish tickets are accounted for.

The two back to back sub-average harvests follow in the wake of the second best crab harvest during the 1995-96 season. The Oregon fishery annually produces, on average, nearly 10 million pounds of Dungeness crab, with the catch value ranging from \$13 million-\$24 million dollars depending on pounds landed and prevailing market conditions. Landing records accumulated over the past 50 years document the cyclical nature of the crab fishery coast wide, and serve as

reminders during the "down" periods that "better times are coming." Although it is too early to make any predictions about the next season which starts in December, fishermen along the coast are optimistic.

On-going fisheries in Washington State, British Columbia and Alaska will continue to provide fresh Dungeness for the seafood markets and restaurants that count on crab during the remainder of the summer tourist season.

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Historic Property Program

The Historic Assessment Review Committee will meet Tuesday, August 25, in Salem to review applications from property owners who seek property tax freezes from the Special Assessment of Historic Property Program for properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The meeting will begin at 9am in the Yaquina Bay Conference room of the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department office at 1115 Commercial NE. The building is accessible to persons of all abilities.

The committee will review 8 new applications for properties located in Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Linn and Multnomah and Polk counties, and 5 reapplications located in Baker, Jackson, Linn and Multnomah counties.

The Historic Assessment Review Committee is a three-member body appointed by the State Historic Preservation Officer

to review all applications for special assessment and recommend approval, approval with conditions, deferral or denial.

Under the special assessment program, a property's assessed value is frozen for 15 years for purposes of local property taxes. Owners of commercial properties who have completed the first period of benefit may re-apply for an additional 15 years. In return for this benefit, owners are required to rehabilitate and preserve their buildings.

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
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Stamp Cancellation
