Mediation Discontinued

The Port Orford City Council met Monday and discontinued the mediation process with John Mayea in front of a standing room only crowd.

All members of the council, mayor and city attorney Randall Tosh were present as public works director Jerry McNurlin led the evening off with his report. McNurlin reported a break in the raw water line over the Labor Day Weekend where it crosses Gold Run Creek. The crew fixed that problem. He said the test water well that had been dug at the Rural Fire Department leased property in Cedar Terraces didn't turn up any water. He said at next month's council meeting he was going to present them with a letter from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT). That state agency is asking the city consider taking over Coast Guard Hill Road. McNurlin spoke about a potential problem with the Paradise Terrace subdivision. He said the ground has been cleared and there is a lot dust. He said the owners of the subdivision need erosion control put in now, not after the first rains. McNurlin said the first stage of the water improvement project might begin later this week with the water intake

pipe at Garrison Lake. He said the Department of Environmental Quality had inspected the wastewater treatment plant and it had come out okay.

The Port Orford Fire Department responded to two house fires, one vehicle accident involving use of the Jaws of Life and one brush fire. The also have two new fire fighters.

Mayor Gary Doran introduced new city administrator Johnny Alexander who received a round of applause. The next topic on the agenda was public comments. First the mayor read from the Oregon Attorney General's Public Records and Meetings Manual. He quoted section 192.30 of the public meetings law that it is not a public participation law except under a few limited situations. Doran said the council had received a lot comment from the public. He said he was getting tired of negative comments. He then read a brief letter from the North Curry Families' and Children's Center thanking the City for letting them use the Community Building for the Summer Youth Program. Doran then said he preferred there not be citizen comments and he didn't want comments about private citizens.

City Parks Commission chairman Ernie Gordon took the microphone next and

gave a brief overview of the two historical signs for Battle Rock City Park. He emphasized that there were two different signs; one being the historical sign to replace the wooden one and the second being the historical marker sign. Gordon said the four-person sign committee had approved the wording for both signs. The wording for the historical marker sign which will go in the wayfinder site plaza area needs to be forwarded to the state historical commission for approval after the council approves it. Gordon asked for council action. Councilor Robert Warring said the historical beaverboard sign would block the view of three parking positions. He said he found the wording prejudicial and was uncomfortable sending it the historical commission. Councilor Ralph Donaldson jumped in with a motion that the council accept the working for the **historical marker sign** at the wayfinder and forward it to the historical commission. The vote was 5-1 with Warring voting no. The historical beaverboard sign was part of the mediation agreement and was not voted on during this segment of the meeting or later during the mediation discussion.

Doran noted the search for a city treasurer/recorder would be discussed in an executive session.

Mediation Agreement

There was a reason for the SRO crowd Monday night and the council finally came to that point in the agenda when they moved into the mediation agreement with John Mayea. Doran said the council had come to a tentative agreement by consensus of the council at the mediation held on August 21 regarding the wayfinder site at Battle Rock Park. He read a letter from a person who wasn't named saying the wayfinder was a real asset to our community. No other public comment was read or given.

Doran said he needed a motion to accept the mediation agreement. None of the six councilors made a motion to accept the agreement. Then councilor Robert Warring made a motion that the "council recognize the failure of the Port Orford Wayfinder mediation effort and discon-

tinue the mediation process." Councilor Carl Eskelson seconded the motion and the council voted unanimously in favor of Warring's motion. The vote was greeted by prolonged applause from the audience.

Other Business

Council Warring made a motion for the city to waive the rental fees for the League of Women Voters use of the Port Orford Community building for their fall voter forum. The motion also required them to post a refundable \$45 deposit which they will get back if the building meets the public works department standard of cleanliness after the meeting. The motion carried 6-0.

Councilor Warring made a motion removing Jim Poland from the two bank signature cards and replaced him with Johnny Alexander. The council agreed 6-0.

The council considered the contract for the new police Chief Bill Rush. Councilor Jim Campbell said Rush would be here to start work on October 1.

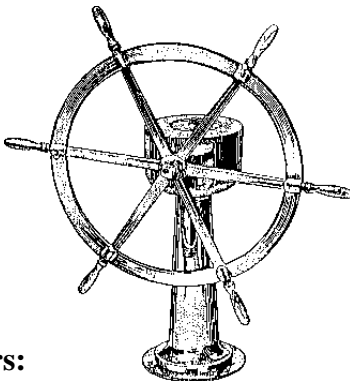
Councilor Warring gave a liaison report regarding ODOT activities. He had attended the ODOT commission meeting in Brookings and accompanied them on their bus tour south from Port Orford to Brookings. Warring spoke about mobility and accessibility regarding Highway 101. He said Highway 101 below Florence is considered a direct transportation route. He said ODOT doesn't want to slow freight traffic. He said they will pay cities to conduct studies that want to develop core business centers and they will pay for aesthetic enhancements like the new Brush Creek Bridge. He said at the ODOT dinner the mayor of Brookings had thanked ODOT officials for respecting the requests of Brookings people to

with Johnny Alexander, he said he was authorized by the Council to pay me \$600.74 instead of the \$779.67 I had actually paid. When I pointed out to Johnny that I had paid almost \$179 more than the Council was attempting to reimburse me he said it was the best he could do. The Council was following the recommendation of their attorney. He expected me to accept \$178.92 less than I had paid. I refused. I am deeply disappointed that the Council chooses to continue to avoid their responsibility in returning the money I paid. Thanks guys. I thought I would finally be able to put this problem behind me. Further, the Council has not made any attempt to reimburse the previous owner of my Washington Street cottage even though sewer fees were paid on that property from 1980 to the date I purchased it in 1989. What a way to run a city.

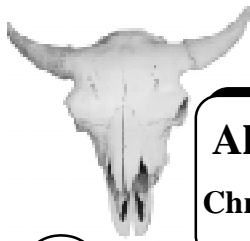

Is Silence Golden?

The Translator building which is located atop Coast Guard Hill in Port Orford brings to you *KSOR-FM, OPB Broadcasting, KOB-TV, KVAL-TV and KDRA..* A group known as North Curry County Translators, Inc. of Port Orford has been responsible for both the payment of the monthly utility bills and site landscape or structural maintenance of this facility which OPB is the owner.

North Curry Translators, Inc. is in the process of dissolution and has sent a request to OPB asking them to assume all subsequent electricity costs. If this issue is not resolved by the September 29, 1998 services will be interrupted and these channels will go off the air in Port Orford. As of Tuesday September 15, OPB had not contacted Coos Curry Electric regarding this issue.

This comes as somewhat of a surprise to me. So I decided to do a little research. What I found was surprising. The tower is located on the private property where the Tichenor Pioneer Cemetery is located. The Carriage Road that leads to the cemetery is on private property and there has been no legal permission to be on this property from the family. The North Curry Translators, Inc. has been funding the operation for the past twenty-five years and now feels that the operational costs should be paid for by those who reap the benefits of the broadcasting. In order for this to happen a piece of property needs to be purchased and a proper tower put in place to service this area. The tower will

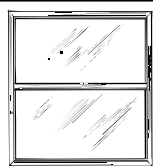

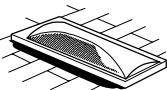

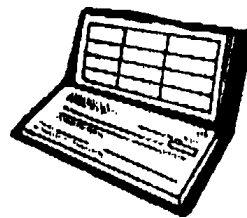

Site Council

Cedar Pointe Cottages are out to remake the image of rentals. Not only are they geared for low-income families, but they are a whole new approach to rentals. "Apartments are usually stacked like bricks," explained builder/developer John Zia. "In designing Cedar Pointe, we took the individual units and scattered them in a natural, wooded setting. Then we added a conference room. Tot-sand-lot, playground, gazebo/barbecue area, nature trails and a private street to give it that cozy neighborhood feel."

"No one wakes up thinking how much they want to live in an apartment!" points out Betty Tam; "we all want our own space and ideally our own home." "Our design is to provide in rentals, the closest thing to living in your own home, nestled in a wooded site, in a nice neighborhood." There will be eight 3-bedroom cottages, and two 2-bedroom units available when completed next April. Zia feels that this approach could help change the way most people now look at low-income rentals. "This is a unique approach—a way to have your own home, with safe areas for the kids, yet have it at an affordable rental rate."

Tamm said that funding has been approved, city approvals are in place and the site is being cleared with construction set to begin soon. Tamm is a director of Umpqua Community Development Corporation, the organization that will own the completed cottages. Tamm said Umpqua CDC is still working with the construction associates, all of whom will be local. The other day, my wife and I had a conversation with a lady who is well acquainted with the Coast. It was our first meeting; the discussion had been lively and thoughtful. We talked of the qualities which attracted us to Port Orford with its customized climate, its extraordinary natural beauty and its pace of life. The parameters of daily living are different here. We don't watch TV, we listen to a little Jefferson Public Radio, the newspaper headlines at Buck's Sentry keep us current and remind us that there is little point in reading the rest of the paper, but we do consult the tide tables frequently, we know what the moon is up to and at what minute the sun settles into the ocean. Chickens are kept in or not depending on whether the local bobcat has babies or not. Clothing for the day is selected by intuition rather than the smooth assurances of a

weather guru. It matters that the wind blows from the north or the south. Driving on our dirt roads, we watch out for the families of quail to be sure that we don't separate the youngsters from the adults. I know they can sort themselves out perfectly well, it just seems important to give them time to all go off in one direction. Talk to city folk about this and you can see them mentally reach for the remote to find another channel. We have a secret that they can't grasp, and we don't want them to get it.

Then we spoke of a very curious thing—we don't seem to do very much but we're very, very busy. The days and nights aren't long enough to fill everything in. There are so many things needing our attention — a new rose to be imbibed, another ripe tomato to float over, a beach that must be walked, hummingbirds to be fed, blackberries that beg to be made into jam, letters to write, gemstones to cut,

beans to be picked, a greenhouse to be built — there never seems to be enough time.

Our new friend knew all about it. She said that this shortage of time had become so pronounced, that one day, she and her husband realized that they had become so busy that they had forgotten all about romance and being in love. So they set aside their Saturday nights and started to date all over again. Dress up a little, do something special, a dinner for two in town and then home to thoroughly enjoying each other as only lovers can do. Yes — it felt contrived at first, but with a little practice it had become very important to them.

Life on this part of the Coast can be simple, there can be a kind of purity to it. How perfectly natural in such a space to remember and recapture something so beautiful.

Re: Leach field

Here is how we came to have a leach field in the dunes. Originally as the sewer plant expansion got under way it was proposed to have an ocean out fall, but it was one of the most expensive options. It was also not in much favor with the public. First it cost about \$500,000 more than the leach field. Second there was the question on where to put it. Tichenor Cove was the first choice, with Kloogouh rock the second. Tichenor Cove was just becoming popular with the divers who we were trying to encourage as a tourist trade, which by the way we have done.

The second choice of Kloogouh rock was considered to be in an area of seas that were too rough in the winter to maintain the outfall and the thought was that it would have to be replaced quite often, at great expense. The cost of either of the two above options was over 1.2 million dollars, and way above what the city

could afford then or now. The bond for the outfall proposal was turned down at the polls twice in one year. It was then that the council started to look at other options. I was on the planning commission at the time and some of what we discussed were new technologies at the time. One thing discussed was a wet land such as those at Cannon Beach, Oregon and Arcata, California. Also discussed was pumping the treated effluent out to Knapp ranch, and into a pond from where the Knapps would pump it on to their fields for sheep grazing.

To our amazement the Department of Environmental Quality (D.E.Q.) told us that it was too wet here to do the ponds. I'm not quite sure what the problem with Knapp ranch was. If it is too wet here how come the ponds are working just great in Cannon Beach and Arcata?

It really has nothing to do with John Maya or Hans Von Spath, it has a lot to do about what the public told us to do at the time,

which was that they did not want an ocean outfall. The leach field was the only thing that D.E.Q. would let us do as they were threatening us with massive fines. Just as they are doing now, and telling us that we have got to have a solution by the fall of 1998 or else! Or else what, we all have a tax lien on our property. So what, do you think that the state wants to own the city of Port Orford.

We need to stand up for what is right, not to be pointing fingers, or blame at each other. The ponds were the right thing to do at the time, and are still the right thing to do now. Their low technology is easy to maintain, they produce a product that all can use, compost for the community and fish to be put back into the streams and rivers. Also in Arcata they are a great tourist attraction, which would fit in with what the town is trying to do, attract tourists.

Wetlands Interpretive Center

There will be a public information/input meeting about the proposed Wetlands Interpretive Center at 7pm on Thursday, September 17th, at the American Legion Hall. The Interpretive Center, comprised of viewing decks, a boardwalk, and informational signs, is to be built along Highway 101 between the city rights-of-way for 16th and 7th Streets, using a Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) "Scenic Byway" grant recently awarded to the City. Local residents interested in becoming involved in refining the proposed design, or who are just interested, are invited to attend. There will be a brief review of the project's inception, the FHWA grant process, and the project as now envisioned, followed by a question/answer period.

An architect's rendering of the proposed facility is displayed at City Hall near the Idaho Street entrance. This drawing is not

the final design, but will give the viewer a good idea of the 'concept plan', which was approved for funding. If the City decides to proceed with the project, this fall and winter will be spent refining the final design and engineering, with construction to occur next spring and summer. Numerous public meetings are planned throughout the next twelve months, with comments and suggestions from the public as a high priority.

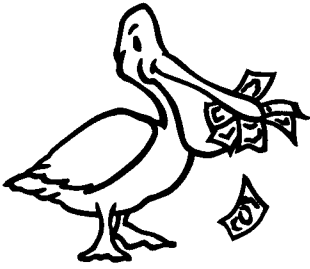
