Gordon Smith Visits By Evan Kramer



United States Senator Gordon Smith will hold a public meeting during his visit to Port Orford on Tuesday, October 13. The meeting will be held at the city hall council chambers starting at 2:30pm. Senator Smith will update citizens on Washington activities and address local fishing and port issues, the Copper Salmon Wilderness and the City of Port Orford sewer drain field problems. Smith wants to hear from the public while he is here in our town. Smith is Oregon's junior senator having been elected to a six-year term in November 1996. Oregon's other Senator is Ron Wyden who is seeking re-election on November 3.

Chief Gehrke Resigns

Long time fire Chief George Gehrke resigned as Port Orford Fire Chief on September 30 after serving over six and a half years as chief and over 38 years with the department. Fire department members elected Frank Barrows the new Port Orford Fire Department fire chief. Barrows has been serving as the department's training officer. The city council will consider the fire department's choice of Barrows at

their October 12 meeting. Chief Gehrke deserves the thanks of the entire community for the work he has done on behalf of our fire department and city. Thank you George!

Port Orford once again has an active police department. New police chief Bill Rush started work on October 1. He is the third person to serve as Port Orford police chief in the last two and a half years. Welcome to Port Orford chief Rush and watch those speeders.

That was a Coast Guard helicopter you heard or saw on Tuesday morning at Battle Rock Park. The Coast Guard put on quite a show for over half an hour between circling the bay and flying over the park including at least two landings in the parking lot. Their purpose was to remove the marker light off the end of the jetty. They then flew the marker over to the park and let it down in the park on the ocean side of the park's wayfinder site rock wall. Then a crew and truck showed up to remove it.

New Again

Everything old is new again in San Diego as the trolley system continues to expand. Ron Cohen and I spent one day riding the rails at Orange Empire Railroad Museum and the next day we drove to Santee where we boarded the last stop on the San

Diego Trolley Orange Line for an enjoyable trip to the American Plaza downtown trolley station. I inadvertently created a small commotion on the train. I had struck up a friendly conversation with the motorman at the Santee trolley station platform. When he got into the motormen's compartment he rolled the window down and encouraged me to continue our conversation. We spoke the entire length of the fifty three-minute trip despite several of the other patrons muttering that we were breaking the rule about speaking to the operator. Ron and I were scheduled to meet Larry Thomas at the Santa Fe station across Kettner Avenue from American Plaza. Larry arrived on Amtrak's San Diego train and we took off on a walk through downtown and the Gaslamp Quarter and then over to Seaport Village. The San Diego Trolley Orange Line serves Seaport Village as well as the convention center. The blue line runs south to the to the border at San Ysidro/Tijuana and was the first line built when San Diegans came back to their senses and started building a new trolley system after abandoning their old one in 1949. The blue line originally went from the Santa Fe station to San Ysidro but has been extended both north to Old Town and then east through Mission Valley. The blue line ends at Mission San Diego

Candidate Questions

Through no fault of their own, some responses were left out of last week's paper. Here are those additional responses to the first question, measure 10, "Shall the City of Port Orford create a 'Master Plan' for the beautification of Highway 101?"

"Yes, if the citizens want it, because planning is fundamental to efficient resource use. This plan does not mandate expenditure of any funds, establishes public meetings for citizen input before plan doption and emphasizes natural beauty, historical significance and community pride as the basis for any projects to be considered."

"Yes, the measure calls for a plan, not any particular plan. We need a plan to express what we don't want as well as what we want. A plan can help prevent unwanted

changes from being forced on us by outside parties, such as ODOT is doing in Humbug Canyon."

No response was received from the following candidates: Robert Warring, Carl Eskelson, Sandy Sandholm, David Darnell, and Gordon Corbett.

The second question, ballot measure 9, asked if a 2 year tax should be levied to fund the Port Orford Police Department.

"I will vote NO. I was a victim of a witnessed hit and run on July 4, 1996 and was given false insurance information. The City Police Chief said "I don't have time to fool with you, I have more important things to do."

Do we want more of this? Not me."

Thomas T. Smith

"Yes, because public safety should be one of the guarantees by our city and this

levy is minimal and for only two years. One police officer for Port Orford cannot be expected to handle all the paperwork and spend any appreciable time "on the street" or investigating and preventing crime. Thank you,"

Norm Leeling

"I haven't reached a decision yet. I am still researching the needs of this community and the county's ability to respond to these needs in order to make an informed decision. Each citizen must balance the needs against the increased tax cost to determine his or her own priorities."

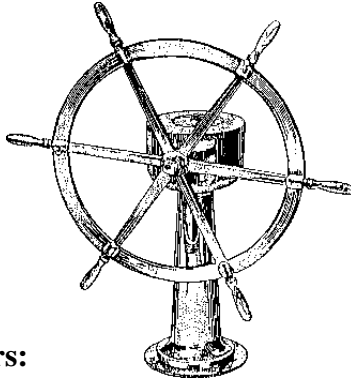
"I'm told we can afford two or three years of police services from the COPS grant. The grant requires the city contribute additional funds, but I am unwilling to increase taxes for this purpose without a

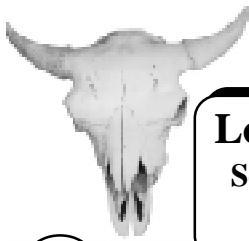

Letter to the Editor,

Our City Council needs an “Open Ear” policy. Back in April’s Council meeting, the Councillors listened to speakers’ comments, even when they disagreed. They listened to speakers’ questions, even when they intended not to answer.

In subsequent meetings, the Council heard more speakers from both sides of our local controversies.

Nevertheless, at 14 September’s meeting, the Councillors brooked no public comments about their refusal to honor the agreement mediated between Mr. John Mayea and Miss Gayle Wilcox, on the one side, and themselves on the other.

They simply declared the mediation to be ended.

That, as “Mr. Spock” would say, is fascinating. The municipal level of government is the one closest to the people. A city councillor or a mayor is more likely to hear a constituent’s ideas, and is far more likely to heed them, than is any state or Federal legislator. And, usually, a local lawmaker is willing to listen. Disrespect to constituents, especially while he runs for re-election, squeezes the trigger on his ejection seat.

So, why did our City Council refuse to hear critical speakers?

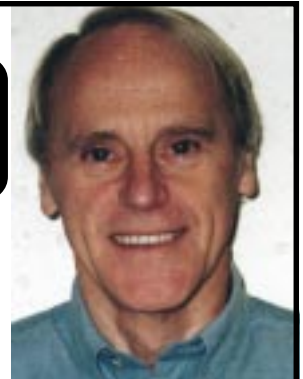

Candidate's Statement By Norm Leeling

Hello fellow citizens of Port Orford. Here's some background to help you better understand me and, therefore, my approach to and position on issues.

I was raised on 80 acres in Greenacres, about 10 miles south of Coos Bay. My father worked in a lumber mill and my mother was a homemaker. We raised cows, pigs, chickens, rabbits and had a large garden and an orchard. Farm chores were learned early in life, as was responsibility. Animals need regular care, gardens likewise and excuses don't get the job done. My chores started as soon as I could feed chickens, gather eggs, round up cows at milking time and progressed through gardening, milking, butchering and canning.

I attended a one-room country grade school and then Marshfield Junior and

Senior High Schools in Coos Bay. I met my future (and present) wife at Marshfield High. After high school, I attended Oregon State and earned a BS degree in General Science (Chemistry emphasis). We married after my junior year. After graduation, I stayed at Oregon State to earn an MS in Zoology (major in Cell Biology, minor in Biochemistry). Then we moved with our two young boys to Madison, Wisconsin to attend the university and earn a PhD in Entomology (major in Toxicology, minor in Zoology). Our daughter was born in Madison.

Michigan State University offered me a position to head up their newly created Pesticide Analytical Laboratory. This research position involved studying how pesticides work and what they are changed into in plants, animals and the environment, as well as where they go and where they concentrate. technicians, part-time student workers and a post-doctoral person working on a variety of agricultural and environmental issues. I taught a graduate toxicology course every-other year and helped teach an undergraduate course on Chemicals in the Environment. The teaching part of my position was more rewarding than the research so, after eight years, I accepted an undergraduate teaching position in the Biology Department of Grand Valley State College near Grand Rapids, Michigan. Grand Valley was a small (about 3000 students) liberal arts college at that time, but has since grown to about 17,000 students and is now a university.

After 24 years there, we retired early to move back to the West Coast. After looking from Gold Beach to Lincoln City,, we bought a lot in Port Orford, moving here in 1996. I was soon appointed to the Watershed Council and joined the Sunset

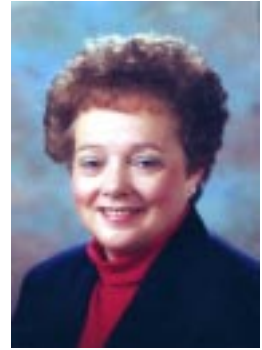
Prostate Cancer Tests

Thirty-nine Curry County men received letters last week detailing the results of their prostate cancer screening blood tests performed by Curry General Hospital earlier this month. The tests were done at low-cost community outreach clinics held in the Chetco Senior Center, Gold Beach Senior Center and the Port Orford Senior Center.

The clinics were held to mark National Prostate Cancer Awareness Month, according to Ginny Hochberg, R.N., M.S.N., education coordinator for Curry General Hospital.

The results from six of the 39 tests were found to be abnormal and were sent to the patients' family physicians, Hochberg reports.

In addition to the blood tests, free blood pressure readings were done by Curry General Hospital volunteers in Bookings and Gold Beach and by members of the Port Orford Community Ambulance in Port Orford.

To help increase the importance of early prostate cancer detection, participants in Gold Beach heard a talk by Dr. John Muenchrath, a Coos Bay – based urologist, and participants in Port Orford heard a talk by Reg Williams, family practice

physician in Gold Beach and the hospital's chief-of-staff.

Dr. Muenchrath is scheduled to talk about prostate cancer again, Dec. 9, in Brookings, during the hospital's Wellness Wednesday Health Education Series. His talk will begin at 12:30pm, in the Chetco Senior Center.

one stop past Jack Murphy Stadium (now called Qualcomm Stadium) which is home of the Chargers, Padres and University of San Diego Aztecs.

Footprints

There is something quite wonderful to walk on sand that shows no sign that anyone ever walked there before. I get the same feeling looking out on a mantle of newly fallen snow before I change it with my footsteps. The beach has tidied itself up with wind and tide to leave a fresh canvas just for me. I can take a stick and draw wild doodles or just plod my steps across it.

In Japan there is a Zen garden without plants. Rocks have been artfully placed in a sea of gravel in such a way that a visitor can touch a feeling of tranquility, just by viewing it. The gravel is raked daily by monks into a patterned texture that invites the mind to tread subtle pathways of simplicity and beauty. The sea rakes the beach like a Zen monk, preparing the sand for my journey and then when I am done, it returns to do the same for the next person.

When I find the footprints my mind gets caught up telling me all about who made them. Was it a man or woman, their age, were they talking or separate or what kind of dog they had. I think it is better to ask the mind to pay attention to what is happening to me now than to let it engage itself with guessing what has been and is no more. The clean slate of the beach encourages me to see what is there today – it gives a fresh perspective every time.

I find a great lesson in this, one I have made good use of in what has been the most challenging area of my life – human relationships. After an encounter with another person, I would realize what I really wanted to say or what I now wished I hadn't said. The distance between such

meetings could grow into years and there would still be this unfinished business, like footprints that wouldn't wash away. Or after a friend died, I would have so much to say that I wished I had said before it was too late.

So I began to clear up my beach. I told my aging parents what I loved about them, I wrote to my father-in-law to tell him what I appreciated most about him and acknowledged our differences, I thanked my first wife for all the wonderful things she had been to me. I expected nothing in return for I was only attending to unfinished business and it left me feeling cleaner and lighter every time I did. Sometimes the footprints were difficulties, I would speak evenly about them, never with blame and always find something positive to stress. At times it was too painful to approach the person or too late, so I would write a letter to them, telling in detail of my torment. When it was done, it was carefully folded and burned with reverence in a little fire to release all that pain into the wind.

Clearing my beach of old imprints, words unspoken, imagined fears and opinions gives me the best chance to do what I like to do – walk where there are no footprints.
