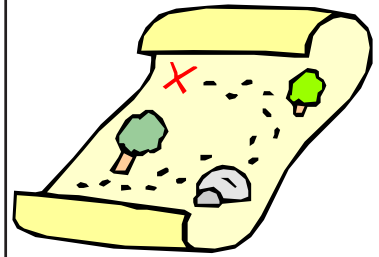

Students to Write and Publish Hiking Guidebook

Chamber News By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce met on Monday afternoon at the Port and Starboard Restaurant and took care of a lot of business.

Chamber president Ronn Kerr reported that at the Transient Lodging Tax meeting the committee recommended the Chamber receive \$3,600 in bed tax funds. The Chamber had requested \$5,000 for tourism promotion.

Kerr recently resigned from the America's Wild Rivers Coast board of directors. The Chamber board voted to name Emily Francona as the Chamber replacement for Kerr on the AWRC board.

Port Orford Public Library librarian Tobe Porter attended the meeting and spoke about the second annual Port Orford Bargain Holiday on Saturday, December 6. The first one held last year and promoted by the library and Chamber of Commerce was a rousing success. It raised \$7,000 for the new library building fund. This year businesses will be asked to pledge up to 5% of their sales on December 6 to the construction of the new library. The Friends of the Library and Port Orford Public Library Founda-

tion will promote this day as a day to shop in Port Orford. Last year they spent \$600 advertising this event up and down the coast. December 6 is the day of the E.S.A Christmas Bazaar at the Community Building and Port Orford will also host four other holiday bazaars. The Chamber board passed a motion to support the event and provide \$200 in printing costs for the brochures and flyers for the bargain holiday.

The Chamber of Commerce Christmas party and social mixer will be held on Friday night, December 5, starting at 6:00pm, at the Joan of Arc Vacation Home. Grace Bonnell owns the Joan of Arc and is hosting this mixer. She is looking for someone to play the piano at the event. Bonnell said the children's Christmas party would be held on Sunday, December 14 in the late afternoon. It is annually held in front of Driftwood Elementary School.

Board member Marilyn Oberbeck said the Chamber should encourage businesses and homes along Highway 101 to decorate their places for the holidays and that they be judged and prizes awarded. Chamber board members enthusiastically supported the idea.

Kathleen Sandlin told the board next year's Wind Fest will be held on June 5 and 6.

The Chamber hosts ODOT project engineer Ray Cranston at its membership meeting on October 27, 1:00pm, at the Port and Starboard Restaurant. Everyone is invited.


Outfall Project Update

No one can say the Port Orford City Council doesn't put in the effort and work it takes after Monday night's meeting. They met with Steve Donovan and Roland Young from SHN Engineers, the company handling the engineering work for the sewer outfall project, for two hours.

Steve Donovan did most of the speaking for SHN and updated the council on where the project was as of Monday night. He said the pipe pulling went very well but then the contractor found an "irregular bottom" on the ocean floor, which has caused the contractor to ask for change conditions. The contractor had done a 200 foot by 100 foot bathymetric study of the area in addition to a video. The video showed a flat surface. Because of the irregular bottom conditions where the pipe came out of the rock into the ocean several changes have had to be made. The contractor has to fill in the troughs with concrete placed in woven nylon bags. They will then pack

Quilt of Hearts

Quilters and friends packed the educational room at the Quilter's Corner, in Port Orford, Tuesday, Oct. 7, when the Curry General Hospital's Breast Health Network hosted a luncheon to honor those involved in Port Orford's *Quilt of Hearts* project.

Elaine Pendleton, quilter and coordinator of the project, presided over a moving ceremony where quilt block donors described the friends and loved ones for whom their blocks were created. Each block represented a person who has survived breast cancer or who died of it. Quilters named mothers, aunts, sisters, co-workers, in-laws, grade school buddies, cousins, walking partners, fellow quilters and bridge partners.

Shelly Vogel of Langlois spoke in memory of her seventh grade teacher, Mary Smith Cutshaw.

Another quilter honored her husband, a survivor, adding that there is "little publicity concerning breast cancer among men ... and he's all man, not effeminate at all."

The quilt is comprised of 40 blocks made by 32 quilters. The event also included a delicious buffet lunch catered by Ruth Jamieson of Port Orford, and an informative talk on

breast cancer and early detection by Carol Milne, FNP, of Curry Family Medical.

The Quilt of Hearts was made possible by support from the Curry Breast Health Network and generous funding from the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, Oregon & SW Washington Affiliate.

The piece will tour around Port Orford for the next year. Currently it is on display in the Curry Family Medical clinic, 525 Madrona. In November, it will move to the Port Orford Senior Center. During December, it will hang in the Historic Hughes House near Cape Blanco.

Forest Service Road Closed

During a recent inspection of the Upper Bald Mountain Bridge located in the NW one quarter of Section 20, T332, R14W, at milepost 0.9 on Forest Service Road 5502020 considerable rot was found to many of the support members. This rot was serious enough that immediate action was required. Road 5502020 has been posted at both ends with "Road Closure Ahead" signs; "Road Closed" signs and barricades have been placed at both ends of the bridge. Soon earthen mounds will be placed at each end of the bridge to assure that the public is safe. In addition, Cedar Swamp Bridge No. 3358 milepost 14.9 and Lower Rock Creek Bridge No. 3347 milepost 1.0 are scheduled for repairs during the month of October.

This press release was issued the Powers Ranger District, Siskiyou National Forest. Upper Bald Mountain Bridge is not scheduled to be repaired. Forest Service Road 5502020 is permanently closed at Upper Bald Mountain Bridge.

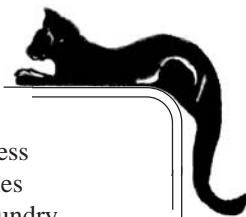

Students to Write Guidebook

North Curry Family and Children's Center, through the R.A.D. Outdoor Club, has been awarded a federal grant to produce and publish a hiking guidebook to Curry County. The project was the idea of Cathy Boden, veteran leader of the R.A.D. Outdoor club and the Exploring our Backyard series of hikes. According to Boden, "People are always asking me for tips about where to hike, and I thought it would be a great project for Outdoor Club students, to research and write a guidebook that could help local residents and tourists figure out good places to go."

When author and former guide Ann Vileisis moved to town last year, Boden realized she had found a good co-leader to help with the writing and publication aspects of the project. The two applied for and received the needed grant monies. The project will get underway in the first part of November. R.A.D. Outdoor Club members, Megan Hughes, Kelsey McKenzie, Shari Odson, Alyssa Rush, and Lacy Weinblatt, have already signed on as student coordinators. Other North Curry students interested in committing to the project are welcome to apply.

The dedicated students will spend weekends hiking, mapping, and collecting information for 15 hikes in north, central, and south Curry County. They will also do research and writing on topics such as local geology, history, weather,

It is with great pleasure and much enthusiasm that I announce the Port Orford Public Library Foundation received a \$15,000 construction grant from The Autzen Foundation in Portland. There is just nothing quite as fine as the very first grant; it clearly says to all concerned, "we're on our way!" What is especially amazing is that the grant request was written by committee. Not just any committee mind you, the best grant writing committee. Nancy Angelesco, Paulianne Balch-Rancourt, Nancy Broadhead, Carrie Carr, Elaine Owen, Carrie Rogers, and I researched foundations, obtained funding guidelines, participated in a grant writing workshop, penned sample grant applications, and pulled it all together into one excellent project description (if I do say so myself). Congratulations to all!

I called Robin Stewart, Administrator of The Autzen Foundation, to express our excitement about this first grant, and she told me a little more about the foundation. It is a family foundation that has

been around since the early '50s. It is the third generation that now sits on the foundation board—sisters, brothers, cousins—and they are very proud of the grants they make. I think it is most fitting that a small, family-run foundation be the first to support construction of our new library. \$215,000 and counting. . . won't be long now, only \$1.2 million more to go.

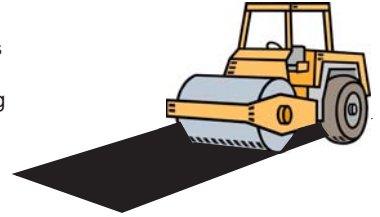

fiberglass rebar through the concrete. This will then make a stable platform for the concrete mats, which are to be placed

over the 54-foot long diffuser unit. Each of the concrete mats weights 8,000 pounds.

Councilor Jim Auburn asked Donovan who's going to pay. Auburn asked, “doesn't the contractor share some of the risk with us?” Donovan replied that this contractor “will take the matter to court.”

Donovan cleared up a misstatement in last week's paper concerning the placement of the concrete. He said so far 200 bags of concrete have been filled in the troughs. Jim Auburn asked how much money we were talking about. Donovan said an extra \$100,000 in work and \$100,000 in weather days, also known as stand-by days. Donovan asked the question whether or not the project should be finished next spring.

Donovan said the contractor needs 5-7 good weather days to finish this part of the project (placement of the diffuser, concrete mats, and concrete bags.) He said there was \$400,000 available in contingency funds. Donovan said the stand-by time was adding up to \$5,000 a day. He presented an offshore weather forecast through Saturday, which showed increasingly high seas starting Thursday.

Donovan said we have until November 15 to complete the project, which he described as “half way” done (the ocean part). He suggested the contractor use a tug rather than the barge for the concrete bag work. The barge returned to Coos Bay last week because of the high swells. Donovan said it was possible to use local divers for the concrete work. Donovan asked the city council if they were going to acknowledge a change of conditions tonight. He said the contractor had a legitimate claim for a change of conditions because of the ocean bottom. He said the extra work and weather days have already added up to \$122,000.

Councilor Auburn said he wanted the contractor to get as much work done by October 31 before the council decided whether or not to pull the plug on the project (until next spring). He noted that a couple of weekends ago when we had perfect weather no work was done by the contractor. He said that much work could be done independent of the barge. Donovan will present a report to the council at their Monday, October 20 meeting and have the change order ready for the council to vote on. The council decided to go for it and see if they can get this part of the outfall finished this year.
