# Elk River Road Re-Opens

#### Help Wanted By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met on Monday night and began with Mayor Gary Doran recognizing Norm and Barbara Leeling for their efforts in the community. Doran gave credit to

Norm for his work on behalf of the Port Orford wetland walkway.

Councilor Carl Eskelson spoke under liaison reports and said when he had been down at Battle Rock Park he noticed a lot of gorse growing on Fifth Street. Mayor Doran recommended the city watershed council look into the situation.

Mayor Doran said he had attended an Oregon Coastal Zone Management Association meeting and spoke to Brookings Port Manager Russ Crabtree. Doran said he is recommending our Port commission have Crabtree speak at a Port planning meeting. Doran spoke about a company making cables in Bandon and said he "always has his ears out for job opportunities" for Port Orford.

The council was given a written report from SHN Engineers on the sewer outfall project. Councilor Jim Auborn asked how many concrete mats have been installed. Resident project inspector Steve Roemen said three had been placed but one pulled up. City Administrator Erna Barnett said there were eleven mats left to be placed. Roeman said each mat weighs up to 8,000 pounds. Councilor Jerry Steinhorst asked how much time it would take to complete placing the mats and Barnett told him five days with good weather needed.

Frank Cramer spoke under citizen's concerns. He told the council that last February he had brought to their attention there were 1,000,000 gallons of water produced but not billed for. He asked what was being done about it. Public Works Administrator Dave Pace said he had spoken to other districts, which produce water like Gold Beach and Bandon. He said they also came up with similar discrepancies between the amount of water produced and the amount of wastewater treated. Pace outlined several steps his department will take to correct the situation. They include doing leak detection on the water lines, replacing old water meters and metering the main water distribution system. Pace described Port Orford's water system as an old one with many leaking valves and fittings. Jim Auborn said that this was covered in the new water master plan.

Steward Parmele, a CPA with Michael L. Piels CPA's, spoke to the council about the recently completed 2001-2002 audit. He discussed a few problems his firm found including the council not receiving adequate information. He told the council that some fixed payments were not being paid back correctly. Parmele said his firm started work on the 2002-2003 audit on Monday and they were hoping to have it done by Wednesday of this week. Parmele said the city staff was extremely cooperative. Mayor Doran said he appreciated the audit being done in a timely fashion. Auborn made a motion to accept the 2001-2002 audit and it passed 6-0.

The council next approved a motion by Jim Auborn to approve Resolution 2004-08 making adjustments to the 2002-03 budget reducing the total budget by \$98,010. This large amount reflects the fact that the sewer construction fund

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# Copper Salmon Meeting By Evan Kramer

The Chamber of Commerce of Port Orford and North Curry County hosts Jerry Becker and Jim Rogers at their Monday, November 24, membership meeting. The luncheon starts at 1:00pm and is at the Wheelhouse Restaurant.

Rogers and Becker are board members of the Friends of Elk River. This group has been working for several years on the Copper Salmon Wilderness proposal. The proposed Copper Salmon wilderness 'area totals 11,000 acres and is part of the 1.1 million acre Siskiyou National Forest. Copper Salmon includes the North Fork of the Elk River, part of the South Fork of the Elk River and part of the Middle Fork of the Sixes River.

Forest Service scientists have called the Elk River the most productive salmon fishery per square meter in the lower 48 states. The Elk River is home to large

runs of Chinook and Coho salmon and steelhead and rainbow trout. More salmon return to spawn up the North Fork of the Elk River than any of the other tributaries.

Wilderness designation for Copper Salmon would protect the fishery and old growth stands of Port Orford Cedar remaining in the area according to Jim Rogers.

The Friends of Elk River are asking for a letter of support from the Chamber of Commerce for the Copper Salmon Wilderness. The United States Senate and House of Representatives will have to pass a bill to make this Wilderness proposal a law and it will need to be signed by the President.

Chamber and non-Chamber members are welcome at Monday's meeting. Rogers and Becker will begin their presentation with an 11-minute video entitled Copper Salmon – A Call for Wildness.

Jim Rogers has been a Port Orford resident since 1968. He was the timber manager for Western States Plywood on Elk River Road from 1968 to 1974. He has worked as a timber consultant for South Coast Lumber and contracted with the US Forest Service to do timber cruising. Rogers is an avid bird watcher and is considered one of the top five birders in Curry County. Jerry Becker does consulting for private forest landowners. His Eco-Forestry Associates Company is involved in the SmartWood Program. Becker sells SmartWood cut on his acreage adjoining the lower portion of the Elk River.


#### **Stay in Control**



We are very pleased with the early support from the community about Port Orford's Bargain Holiday, Saturday, December 6.



#### **Snowy Plover Success**

The nesting rate success rate of western snowy plovers on Oregon beaches was better in 2003 than in any year since the bird was listed a decade ago for protection under the Endangered Species Act, according to state and federal agencies.

Biologists attribute the higher number of fledglings this year to good weather, habitat improvement projects, and cooperation from the public in avoiding nesting areas and better chick survival. Biologists add that the key to recovery of the species, however is to get the population trend to increase over a much longer period of time.

Dave Lauten, a biologist with the Oregon Natural Heritage Information Center who has been monitoring plovers on the Oregon coast since 1997, said 59 chicks successfully left their nests this year. That's a success rate of 46%, which is nearly 10% better than average.

Oregon's plover population went from 72 in 1993, when it was listed as threatened, to 141 in 1997, but the effects of El Nino weather patterns in the winters of 1997 and 1998 caused plover numbers to decline on the Pacific Coast.

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#### **Writing Guidelines** By Valerie Jean Kramer

I was just working on an article that was submitted to the paper and it occurred to me that our readers, you, might like to know a bit about what goes on after people submit a press release or letter for submission. It's more work than you might imagine. Here are some of the common tasks I perform before the article is ready to put in the paper. These are not listed in any particular order and not all submissions need all changes.

First, of course, we have to get it into the computer - either type it in or scan it and use OCR (Optical Character Recognition.)

Remove extraneous text. (Many press releases arrive with extra comments, contact information, information about when to publish it, photos, etc.) Signatures on letters are usually reduced to just the name, name and city, or name and title (if relevant.)

Check length. Submissions are limited to 250 words. Longer submissions may be published (at our discretion) if the submitter is willing to pay for the excess (at \$3.50 per column inch.)

Change Fonts: All letters begin with the header "Letter to the Editor," in 10pt Arial bold, left justified.

Articles begin with a 10pt Arial bold, centered, headline. I often have to abbre-

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viate or re-word the submitted headlines as our columns are quite narrow. If there is a byline, it is in 9pt Arial bold centered and there is no vertical white space (extra leading) between the headline and byline. In rare cases a third line containing the person's title is added to this block in 9pt Arial regular weight centered. Six points (.083") of space is added after the last line in the header block.

All body text is 9pt Times New Roman.

Remove all spaces and tabs from the beginnings and ends of paragraphs. Remove any extra tabs and adjust those that remain (if any) as needed.

Replace straight quotes and apostrophes with curly ones.

Correct spelling, and occasionally fix minor grammatical errors. Note: I don't like to tinker with anything but cosmetics when dealing with letters to the editor and I'm a bit cautious in making changes to articles with a byline other than mine or Evan's. If you want such things fixed, be sure to tell us when you submit.

Correct peculiarities that arise when documents are sent as email (and not as an attached file.) This includes something strange that happens to spaces that I don't understand but which can be fixed by running a global replace from space to space. (Yes that's weird but it works.)

Fix oddities that arise when documents are sent from a Macintosh. Quotes and apostrophes appear as superscript numerals instead of the intended symbols. This has to be done manually.

Change dates from things like Jan. 1st, Feb. 2nd, to Jan. 1, Feb. 2, etc. I usually also remove the year if it is present unless it is necessary to avoid confusion.

Change "soft returns" (Shift+Enter in Microsoft Word) to "hard returns" (just plain Enter).

Change superscripts to normal text (ie. "7th Annual" instead of "7th Annual".) (superscripts are too small to read well in our paper.)

Change capitalized AM and PM to lower case am and pm. Times should be like "9:00 am." "9am." or "9:00 a.m."

Remove extra hard returns at the end of each line. (only the end of the paragraph should have a return after it.) They often appear when the document is sent as an email.

Reduce spaces between sentences. There should only be one space between them, not two as was done on typewriters.

Set paragraphs to have 6 points of space after each paragraph (except between the headline and byline, if any) and remove any extra blank paragraphs.

Remove most italics and bolding. Remove almost all instances of "all upper-

case" text. Your words, and not their appearance, should convey your meaning and feelings. Italics may be used for titles of books or movies, etc.

Sometimes material needs special formatting such as bullets or indentations. This almost always has to be added or adjusted by yours truly.

Articles (but never letters) may have to be shortened to fit in the available space. Sometimes this can be rather extreme!

The last thing I do when I receive a submission via email (to <u>Valerie@mydfz.com</u>) is to send a reply back ac-



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knowledging that it's been received and processed. Occasionally I will mention corrections I've made, extra payment that will be required or other such notes. I do not send acknowledgments back to items that were submitted to <a href="evan@mydfz.com">evan@mydfz.com</a> (That's Evan's responsibility and I'm lazy. . . I can't just click "reply" on those!) Nor do I send them to agencies who send frequent press releases out to a long list of papers. (They don't usually want to be inundated by many such acknowledgments.)

Whew! Makes me tired just reading all that! And that didn't even cover placing the formatted article in Pagemaker! But don't let that keep you from submitting

received a construction loan in a lower amount than previously budgeted.

The council considered Ordinance 2004-02 (breaking ground permits for opening land) and Resolution 2004-09 (breaking ground permit fees of \$15.00). The Ordinance establishes the requirement for a permit before groundbreaking activities can take place within the city. The impetus for this proposed ordinance came from three examples of out of town contractors breaking ground on property with either geological or archaeological concerns.

Local contractors Rudi Breuer and John Jarboe both spoke to the council about the ordinance and resolution. Breuer said he was really concerned about the ordinance. He said he attended a workshop meeting on this issue but no one had listened to what he said. He asked who had final approval on issuing the permits. Erna Barnett said the ordinance was to make the City and property owners aware of any problems that may occur in ground breaking. Breuer said the local construction community was not really aware of this and the council was rushing this ordinance. John Jarboe said he had been in the construction business for 35 vears. He recommended the council delay this ordinance and get more input. Barnett said the ordinance was not to stop someone breaking ground but to notify the city ground will be broken. Jim Auborn said the ordinance needed to be rewritten. Mayor Doran said the ordinance and resolution would be tabled and that more information would be gathered.

Jim Auborn made a motion to approve the consent calendar and it passed 6-0. It includes the mayor's appointment of Joanne Ruoff to the Parks Commission and minutes for four meetings plus approval of a request by Viola Cuatt on behalf of the Cedar Ladies to repaint the Ocean View sign on Oregon Street leading to the Port overlook. They will pay for the materials and do the labor themselves.

Several council members and Erna Barnett recently attended a League of Oregon Cities meeting. Erna Barnett told the council the job opportunity for city administrator had been posted for the first time. It was listed at a salary of \$36,000 but she wanted council direction to up the salary to \$40,000-42,000 per year. Barnett is leaving her job as city administrator next February. She recommended the council institute a street fee of \$2.00 per month on each utility bill to pay for the additional salary. Barnett said the city was going to have to come up with bigger bucks. Jim Auborn said people aren't going to like the street fee. He later said, "We're really beating up on our citizenry" having noted the sewer bills had recently been raised and we're facing increased water rates with the new water master plan. Councilor Jim Campbell recommended the job be advertised with a salary range from \$36,000 to \$44,500.

No mention was made of it at the meeting but City Finance Director Robert Ewalt resigned from his position effective November 10.

#### **Elk River Road Reopens**

Elk River Road (Forest Service #53250 will be opened to public access on Friday, November 21, 2003, upstream from Forest Service Road 5502 (Panther Creek Road) to just downstream from Sunshine Bar Campground. This road has been closed since mid-July.

The Elk River Road has been reconstructed in areas damaged during the 1996 and 1997 flood events. A contract was awarded to Stimpel Wiebelhause Associates located in Redding, California earlier this spring. The contractor has been working 7 days a week since mid-July in order to complete the project.
