The Year in Review By Evan Kramer



Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers opened at the Savoy Theater of Friday, January 10, 2003. The big question on everybody's mind lately was, "When will Lord of the Rings: The

Return of the King open at the Savoy Theater?" The answer is "This Friday!"

Three new Port Orford city councilors were sworn in on Friday, January 3. They are Ed Beck, Jim Auborn and Jerry Steinhorst. The City of Port Orford opened Garrison Lake on January 7 by recreating the old lake channel and it worked out without causing much erosion.

Three delightful outdoor murals were dedicated at Blanco Middle School in Langlois on January 17. The murals were designed and painted by the students with adult assistance.

Construction on the boathouse at Port Orford Heads State Park began on January 27. This building is now the home of the Coast Guard Lifesaving Boat #36498.

Mark Dennett was the guest speaker at the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce membership meeting on February 24. His turned out to be the most interesting and best-received speaker of the year as he critiqued the outside appearances of several local businesses.

The March 11 general obligation bond election results in Port Orford showed every voted counted. The general obligation bonds to pay for improvements in the sewer outfall went down to defeat by one vote with 208 people voting no and 207 voting yes.

Architect Rich Turi spoke to a gathering of over 55 people at the Port Orford Community Building on Thursday, March 20, about planning for the new Port Orford Public Library. Those in attendance were asked to tell Turi what they wanted in their new library and the people weren't bashful.

The three Curry County commissioners held a public meeting in Port Orford on Tuesday, March 18. Ralph Brown, Lucie LaBonte and Marlyn Schafer spoke and then answered questions from the small group that came to hear them.

Work on the Cape Blanco Lighthouse continued through April as the tower was framed in scaffolding. The 133 year old lighthouse was repainted; it got a new roof and the Fresnel lens were being renovated at Hardin Optical in Bandon.


Patty Reese wrote several articles about the Beachcomber's Square Dance Club including one in the April 10 about the history of the club, which began in January 1953.

Port Orford Volunteer Firefighter and training officer Jim Garwood died on April 12. He contributed a lot of time and effort to the department and is missed.

Garrison Lake was "mysteriously" opened on Sunday, May 4. The lake level dropped rapidly and the bluff at the Mouchawar property at Agate Beach suffered further erosion. The city referred to it as a "seemingly unnatural breeching". Arizona Street between Madrona and Geer Circle was severely damaged as the street sank and large cracks opened up in it. The street was closed and remains closed at the dawn of a new year.

Votes in the spring Special Districts election were counted on May 20. The City of Port Orford Revenue Bonds passed by a 330 to 79 majority. I discovered the secret of winning an election by getting elected to the Port of Port Orford Commission unopposed. Gary Anderson defeated Dale Thomas and kept his seat on the Curry Health District Board.

DeFazio Seeks Improvements

As a follow-up of their visit to Fort Hood, Texas, U.S. Representatives Peter DeFazio and Darlene Hooley sent letters on December 23 to General Peter Schoomaker, Chief of Staff of the Army and Donald Rumsfield, Secretary of Defense calling for improvements at the military base.

On December 10, DeFazio and Hooley conducted a congressional fact finding trip to Ft. Hood, Texas, where members of the Second Battalion of the One Hundred Sixty Second Infantry of the Oregon National Guard are preparing to deploy to Iraq in March. DeFazio and Hooley traveled to Ft. Hood to meet with members of the Oregon National Guard to discuss their training, equipment and needs. The trip to Ft. Hood was scheduled in response to concerns regarding living conditions and other issues related to training and deployment.

Representatives DeFazio and Hooley were incredibly impressed with the dedication and spirit of the Oregon troops and their officers. However, they were disturbed to learn about continuing short-

falls in equipment and training that are confronting the troops.

The Second Battalion is stationed in Cottage Grove, Oregon with units in Eugene, Coos Bay, Corvallis and Newport, Oregon. The Oregon National Guard 162 Infantry, Second Battalion, Cottage Grove was transferred to Fort Hood on October 29, 2003 to prepare for deployment to Iraq in March.

Currently there are 2,134 Oregon Guard members deployed throughout the world, including 640 serving in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Letter to the Editor,

I read with interest your article entitled "Different Set of Rules" in the December 25th edition of the Port Orford *Today!* about the Coos Curry Electric Cooperatives (CCEC) board meeting. You are correct, a cooperative is not subject to the Oregon Public Meeting s laws which apply only to municipal or public entities.

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CCEC is incorporated under Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) Chapter 62 which deals with corporations and partnerships and is not a public entity.

Unless the bylaws or policies adopted by the board of a cooperative specifically provide for member or press attendance at board meetings or providing them with copies of information regarding the business of the cooperative, they are not entitled to such privileges. ORS 62.440 sets forth the procedures that a member must follow in order to examine the books and records of a cooperative. In requesting this access, the member is required to set forth the purpose of the examination.

Remember, when dealing with any nonmunicipal corporation, the owners, whether shareholders or members, have limited rights to participate in the operations of the organization or to have access to its books and records. Their participation is generally restricted to the election of the organization's board of directors. That's the law!

In order for the membership to be assured their business is being properly managed they must elect directors who have business experience, who can understand complex financial and legal matters that come before the board and deal with them using common sense.

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Bill of Rights Question

The following is the text of the Bill of Rights Question submitted to the City of Port Orford.

Caption: Reaffirms citizen's civil rights; may prohibit cooperation with Patriot Act.

Question: Shall the municipal code be amended to reaffirm rights and prohibit city cooperation with agencies acting under the Patriot Act?

Summary: This amendment does not contain a specific reference to any federal statutory law. However, the amend-



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ment may prohibit city employees from cooperating with federal agencies charged with the enforcement of federal law such as the USA Patriot Act.

The amendment to the Port Orford Municipal Code reaffirms citizens' rights as guaranteed by the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution, the Oregon State Constitution and certain Oregon

state statutes. It prohibits City employees from violating citizens' rights and provides that the City shall expend no funds or resources for activities to be performed by City employees which violate citizens' rights.

The amendment mandates the City Administrator to regularly advise the City Council and the public of any attempts by federal agencies to require the City to violate any citizen's rights. It further requires that the City provide a legal defense to any employee who is criminally charged based on his or her actions in compliance with the amendment and provides for a fine not to exceed \$50 based upon a violation of the amendment.

Animal Shelter News

The Curry County Animal Shelter can now be classed as a no-kill shelter with the dogs now being taken to the Portland Humane Society to be placed for adoption there. After keeping the dogs in the county shelter for several months or when it becomes over populated, the shelter now has volunteers that will take the dogs to Portland, so that the shelter will never have to put down a healthy dog again. The Shelter feels that all their efforts have been well worth it to be able to see this come to life.

The Shelters Advisory Board have been such a great help with all their effort of fundraising and with all funds being divided between the spay and neuter program and the new puppy nursery that is in the works to be built. The shelter now gives to each dog that is adopted a free spay or neuter certificate, all provided with funds from the board's fundraising efforts. This board runs a one-day garage sale every Saturday from 10am to 2pm to help with all its efforts and projects.

The next project is to start a building fund drive to try and raise money to add ten new kennels to the shelter. At this time the shelter is over populated with thirty-six dogs in the kennels. Elk River Road Landslide

Elk River Road (Forest Service Road 5325) is closed at milepost 6 above the Elk River Fish Hatchery because of a large landslide. Elk River Road was just reopened to public access after being closed from mid July to November 21 because of road repairs from Forest Service Road 5502 (Panther Creek Road) to just downstream from Sunshine Bar.

The massive landslide occurred the weekend of December 12-14 during heavy rains. A mixture of large and small trees, rock and mud slid down the steep hillside completely covering the road. Some material sloughed of the embankment towards the river. The US Forest Service Powers Ranger District, which has jurisdiction in the Siskiyou National Forest, had not as of Christmas day posted any

signs warning motorists that the road is closed at the landslide. Turning around in a recreational vehicle at that point in the road would be difficult. A representative of the Powers Ranger District said on Monday morning that bids had been sent out for cleaning up the landslide but they didn't anticipate the work getting done for a couple more weeks. The people knowledgeable about the bidding process and timetable were out of the office until Monday, January 5.

Suggested CCEC New Year's Resolutions:

- 1. Keep working together and focus on Due Diligence and Fiscal Responsibility.
- 2. Hire a certified in-house accountant for CCEC.
- 3. Communicate Information to District Wide Owner/Members such as new rule/law of not working within 10 feet of a transmission/distribution lines without turning off the power,
- 4. Increase communication openness by having the owner/members speak prior to Board leaving for lunch.
- 5. Tape Record every meeting and hire Secretary to monitor recorder and transcribe the tape. Will save attorney fees for doing this work.
- 6. Get second opinions: Jim Arntz stated that CCEC gave 4.9 Million to SCSC. 4.5 Million is to pay off taxes and the rest is to pay for tax preparation. Mr. Arntz stated that he was told not to pay the penalties and then when the IRS starts proceedings to collect on the penalties, the tax advisors will work to appeal the penalties. Does this sound logical? Won't

- 7. Create a legal Line-of-Credit Loan Document between CCEC and So. Coast Satellite.
- 8. Make a resolution to receive accurate, up-to-date monthly budget documents. Accrual accounting methods? Or have the budget document cover the 18th through the 17th of the month?
- 9. Make a Resolution requiring preapproval of any money going to SCSC at CCEC Board meetings. This way we don¹t get surprised with a .4 Million "loan"- that we don¹t know about until 3-7 weeks after it happened. (They looked at October's budget at the December meeting.)

10. Notify Owner/Members as to their Capital Credits totals. CCEC Owner/Members have not received information or value for the year 1971 up to present contrary to what is done in other cooperatives. (Have you seen a check in the mail or a discount on your electric bill?) Note that on the annual audit summary that the Patron's Capitol lost \$2,138,445 in

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
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Master Gardener Class

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Christmas Trees

Christmas trees are an important part of Oregon's economy. According to the Oregon Employment Department the state is a leading producer of Christmas trees nationally. In 2001, 8.5 million trees were harvested and sold with a production value of \$151 million, according to the Oregon State University Extension Service.

The most popular Christmas trees are Douglas Firs of which 3,465,000 were sold in 2001. The second most popular Christmas is the Noble Fir of which 2,165,000 in 2001. Other less popular Christmas trees are the Grand Fir, Nordman Fir, and Scotch Pine. Oregon had almost 51,000 acres planted in Christmas trees in 2001. Clackamas County is the top producer of Christmas trees with 15,200 acres planted. 46% of Oregon's Christmas trees are sold in California and 9% in Mexico.

Port Orford was hit with motorcycle mania as Stan Dishong's Antique Motorcycle & Auto Museum opened on August 14 in the building formerly occupied by the Battle Rock Garage.

The City of Port Orford held a ground-breaking ceremony for the new sewer ocean outfall project at Agate Beach. The US Department of Agriculture presented the City with two ceremonial checks; one a grant for \$1,000,000 and the second a loan for \$2,542,000 at 4.25% interest for 40 years to build the project and make improvements at the sewer treatment plant.

The city council met on Monday, August 18 and voted no on one Bill of Rights Resolution. A previous but different motion to support the Resolution died for lack of a second.

Oregon Crab Commission director Nick Furman reported that the 2002-03 Oregon Dungeness Crab harvest was the third best in the 100-year plus history of the fishery. The crab harvest in Port Orford totaled 366,918 pounds.

The Port Orford Arts and Seafood Festival was held on Labor Day weekend and one of the highlights was mandolinist Evan Marshall playing at the Community Building. The Sunset Garden Club held a Labor Day garden tour of five area gardens and it was lots of fun.

Port Orford Langlois 2CJ School District welcomed students back to classes on September 2.

The Pacific International Trap Association held a competition at the Cape Blanco Gun Club on September 12-14.

The Port Orford City Council voted 6-0 at their September 15 meeting to accept the conservation easement on the 140 acres of North Fork Hubbard creek property in the city watershed.

The Curry Health District board met at the Senior Center at the end of September and discussed plans for an automated drug distribution system (pharmacy) at the Curry Family Medical Clinic. The proposal has not come to fruition yet.

The Friends of the Port Orford Public Library held their semi-annual book sale at the Community Building on October 7 and it was their biggest and best sale and raised nearly \$2,500.

North Curry Families and Children's Center working through the R.A.D. Outdoor Club was awarded a federal grant to publish a hiking guide to Curry County.

The Port of Port Orford Commission by a 3-2 vote approved a request from the Port Orford Bill of Rights Defense Committee approving a resolution where the Port of Port Orford defends the Bill of Rights and the civil liberties of its district residents.

Architect Rich Turi unveiled plans for the new Port Orford Public Library on November 6 before an appreciative audience in the council chambers. The plan was met with much approval and recommendations.

The Port Orford Liquor Store changed hands on November 14. The Oregon Liquor Control Commission had contracted with Viola Cuatt to run it for the past 25 years. Milton Finch and Dee Farris now operate the liquor store in a new location.

The 2003-04 Oregon Dungeness Crab season opened on time on Monday, December 1. Opening day was incredible with 100,000 pounds of crab being brought in to the dock. However, problems with the quality have caused a voluntary closure of the Port Orford crabbing season.

Port Orford residents and visitors enjoyed the biggest shopping day of the year on December 6, also known as Port

Orford's Bargain Holiday and the four shopping bazaars were packed.

Members of the Port Orford Senior Center held a going away party for Henry and Bobbetta Kron and Betty Berger. All three were active members of the Senior Center.

The Port Orford Chamber of Commerce overwhelmingly supported the Copper Salmon Wilderness proposal in their vote by mail election by a 26-3 margin.

The Elk River rose to 15 feet at the Hatchery on December 13, the highest level since the flood of November 1996. However, this time the three bridges on Elk River remained intact.

The City of Port Orford opened Garrison Lake on December 15 and as a result more erosion occurred at the bluff at Agate Beach State Park.

The Port Orford Common Good distributed holiday boxes to 72 families and a total of 1035 boxes of food during the year. They did an excellent job this year.

Minimum Wage Goes Up

The minimum wage in the State of Oregon goes from \$6.90 an hour to \$7.05 per hour on January 1, 2004. This adjustment for inflation, based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index, is required because of the passage of Ballot Measure 25 in November of 2002.

The federal minimum wage for covered, nonexempt employees is \$5.15 per hour. In cases where an employee is subject to both federal and state minimum wage laws, the employee is entitled to the higher of the two minimum wages.
