Wyden Keeps Promise By Evan Kramer



Senator Ron Wyden visited Port Orford on Saturday, January 17 and held a well-attended town hall meeting. He was introduced by Mayor Gary Doran. Wyden noted that he had made

a pledge when he was first running for Senate in 1995 that he would hold an open meeting in every Oregon county every year and that he has held to that promise.

The first question for Senator Wyden concerned whether he would support a Congressional investigation into the Halliburton Corporation overcharging the government \$61 million on fuel sold and he answered yes, definitely. Wyden said he had written legislation regarding over-bidding of contracts and wrote the amendment in the Iraq reconstruction bill cutting \$2 billion.

Wyden was asked if the implementation of voting machines would lead to elections being stolen. He said he would work for voters to be given paper trails of how they voted and that he had stood up for Oregon continuing its system of vote by mail, not machine.

Wyden was asked about supporting the Copper Salmon Wilderness proposal. He said the chances are it would go through if there was a consensus for it. When told the Port Orford Chamber of Commerce had recently voted 28-3 to support the wilderness proposal he said he would get on it quickly.

One person in the audience told Wyden about Verizon not supporting high speed Internet access in Port Orford and asked what he would he do to help. Wyden said to get him the information and he would work on it. He said when the telecommunication companies got deregulation they promised Internet service but didn't deliver. He said he felt very strongly about companies walking away from their obligations.

Curry County Commissioner Lucie La Bonte gave Wyden a packet containing a list of success stories from the Title I and II programs which the federal government funds. She gave Wyden credit for getting those funds for our area.

Wyden was asked about why he voted for the Bush administration's Medicare Bill. He responded he never had a tougher time with a bill. He said he received a copy of the bill on a Friday and the Senate voted on it on the following Monday. He stated three reasons for voting for the bill including that under the legislation 100,000 Oregon seniors will get a huge amount of relief; the legislation makes access to generic drugs easier and the Federal government will look at the effectiveness of different drugs, and people in the Fee for Services areas (rural) will have more bargaining power. He said the legislation makes \$80 billion available to companies who don't drop health coverage for their employees. Wyden continued that he voted on the right to re-import drugs and that he wants Medicare to be able to negotiate fair drug prices.

Wyden said Congress needed to get its foot in the door with the Medicare bill and reiterated that voting on it was a tough call for him. He said he wanted the same drug plan for Congress as for seniors and that rural communities are going to get a tremendous amount of help from the bill. He called Medicare a "defined benefit program" that the privatizing crowd wanted to get it away from being. He said the privateers wanted people to get a check and then pay any overage themselves.

Wyden was thanked for his help in getting rid of the Total Information Act. He took credit for exposing and shutting down John Poindexter's plan for betting

Snow Foils Hike

Despite a thick blanket of snow smothering the ground, trees and road, at least two Brookings "sole mates" drove toward Bosley Butte to join Curry General Hospital's Sole Pursuits hike leaders, Saturday, Jan. 3, northeast of Brookings. Ted Fitzgerald was scheduled to lead hikers toward Bosley Butte that morning. But Fitzgerald, who lives about a mile below the trailhead, convinced organizers to call off the hike because it had been snowing all morning with no sign of clearing.

Carl Durham and Al Collinet, two Brookings hiking fans, didn't hear the cancellation announcement on KURY radio that morning. Among the most intrepid of Sole Pursuits' 130 hiking fans, they set out separately to join Fitzgerald on the trail.

Durham drove his four-wheeler up Carpenterville Road, until he noticed a motorist in trouble.

"Where was everybody?" Durham asked, in a later email to Curry General Hospital. "I drove up and found snow about half way! I also found Al Collinet from our group stuck in the snow. A couple of young guys and I got him unstuck, but we thought it better if he didn't try to drive back down. He parked his truck off the road and I gave him a ride to Brookings and home.

"I have a suggestion ..." Durham continued. "Plan the beach hikes for winter, Nov., Dec, Jan. & Feb. and the high altitude hikes for spring, summer and fall!! What do you think??"

Sharon Fitzgerald, Ted's wife, says she was disappointed. But she enjoyed staying home. "I made snowmen with the kids."

Meanwhile, a group of five hikers from as far off as Port Orford assembled at the hospital parking lot to carpool to the Bosley Butte gate. They opted instead to trek down Cape Sebastian. They saw rainbows, but no snow and no whales.

Sole Pursuits is an incentive walking and fitness program featuring free guided hikes monthly and prize drawings for walkers who turn in their "time" cards.

The next walking card drawing will be held March 13. The winning cardholder will receive \$50 contributed by the Chetco Federal Credit Union.

Saturday, Feb. 21, the group will follow Walt Schroeder past a hidden lake, through the forested sand dunes of Pistol River, toward Crook Point.

It's also time to thank the many people who have contributed to the Program over the past year. To the gentleman who came into Chetco with a check for \$500.00, I want to say a special thankyou to you for your generosity. I'm only sorry that I didn't get your name so that I could have written you a personal "thank-you" note. To those special people who are still contributing on a monthly basis to support a person on the program, please accept my thanks and gratitude for your generosity and for your constancy. At this time, we have 6 people on the program who are unable to pay. Because of you, we're able to continue providing meals for them.

Yes, the program is financially stable. But we can't sit back and rest on what we have, as we spend approximately \$250 - \$300 each month to support our scholarship people. And because we have no funding, the money disappears quickly.

School Board News

The School District 2CJ Board met on Monday and Tuesday, January 12 and 13, to appoint citizen volunteers to the committee to screen applications for the position of superintendent, to review the middle third of the updated policy manual, and to hold its regular monthly meeting.

Twelve members of the community, including several parents and teachers, were appointed to join members of the Board on the screening committee to review applications for the position of superintendent, which will be vacated at the end of this school year. The application deadline is January 15. The committee will commence screening the applications on January 21. The highest-ranking candidates will be invited for interviews shortly thereafter.

In the regular Board meeting on Tuesday, the budget calendar, scheduling the first budget committee meeting on April 27, was approved. Three evening meetings of the committee are scheduled, although two may suffice. For most local government bodies, including school boards, State law establishes stan-

dard procedures for preparing the budget and requires citizen involvement and public disclosure before the budget is adopted. The 2CJ budget committee consists of the elected board and an equal number (seven) of citizens serving staggered three-year terms. There are currently six (yes, six) vacant public positions on the budget committee, and community members are requested to volunteer by calling the district office at 348-2337. Serving on the budget committee is an excellent way to help out, to learn what's going on, and to have an impact as the district struggles to operate with diminishing revenues.

The superintendent reported on several projects. The high school gymnasium bleacher repair is scheduled to begin on January 26. The contractor will work nights on ten-hour shifts. Several home basketball games have been rescheduled to avoid use of the bleachers before repairs have been completed. The contractor for the wastewater project at the high school has shut down until dry weather with the project completion date rescheduled to July 1.

At the Monday workshop meeting, the Board reviewed the middle third of the new policy manual, which is being updated by contract with the Oregon School Boards Association (OSBA). The last third will be reviewed in March, followed by a final review of the entire document a few weeks later. This will bring the policy manual up to date with

current requirements. This is the first time the manual has been updated in over ten years.

Roadside Attractions By Evan Kramer

There is a business in downtown Cave Junction that deserves a second look and even a visit. It is a Chevron Station at the intersection of US Highway 199 and Oregon 46, the road to the Oregon Caves National Monument. No big deal you say. But what makes this Chevron Station so different is it is a "service station" in the old fashioned sense. It is both a gasoline station and a service station with three service bays. You can buy tires at this Chevron or have them repaired, have your brakes worked on, fan belts installed and get an oil, lube and filter job. The station even has a very mini-mini market with just a few items from soda to water to candy. Now sit down and think how many other "service stations" you've seen lately. The trend now is large gasoline stations joined



together with larger mini-marts but try and get an oil change or a brake job at one of them and you might as well keep on dreaming.

In Port Orford our local Chevron station will change tires for people, which is much appreciated. When Valerie and I moved to Port Orford in 1990 there were two service stations in town. One was the BP station where the Chevron is now located. They offered some of the less complicated work like tire changing and oil and lube jobs. The old BP station was demolished and the neighboring lot cleared of trees to make way for the Chevron station. Down the street the Union 76 service station had a couple of service bays and a very busy mechanic named Ed Minor who kept a lot of cars and trucks running in this town. A Texaco distributor bought the station several years ago and the "service" part of the station building was demolished. Since then both Hogard's Garage and the Battle Rock Garage closed down leaving Joe Culley as the sole auto mechanic on Highway 101 in Port Orford. When he quit the business in September of 2003 that left none. But recently Gary Culley opened the Port Orford Garage (where Joe had his shop) with Jeremy Dahrens handling the mechanical work, which includes tune-ups, oil changes, brake work and replacing belts and water pumps. There's still plenty of service left in America, just not service stations.

place temporary supports with a permanent repair.

"This repair should only take about four hours if no complications arise," said District Operations Coordinator Jim Rislev.

Emergency vehicles will be able to proceed through the work zone, coordinating with an on-site supervisor. ODOT has already contacted the city of Bandon as well as emergency response agencies in Coos County.

Following the four-hour closure, Bullards Bridge will return to one-way traffic with flaggers providing traffic control as crews complete additional work. The bridge was struck by a truck on September 17, damaging several beams and snapping a vertical support.

Remember that when driving in a work zone orange is your clue to slow down. When you see orange barrels, cones and signs – even when no work is visible – hazards may still exist. Realize that it's not business as usual in a work zone. Expect the unexpected. The roadway may have changed. There may be fewer lanes. There may be a detour or a flagger. Maintain extra space between your vehicle and the one ahead. Extra space provides you additional reaction time in case of a problem.

Wyden Keeps Promise Continued from Front Cover

on terrorist acts. Wyden, who sits on the Senate Intelligence Committee, said he thought we could fight terrorism without gutting civil liberties.

Wyden was told that companies are collecting information online about everyone. He responded by saying the only privacy protection for citizens is video records, not medical or social security records as many believed. He said this came about because of the Robert Bork case where his video records were brought up during the campaign to keep him off the Supreme Court.

Wyden was asked if the 911 investigation was ever going to get aired and he answered yes. He said he was real hopeful Congress would get at the roots and real facts of what happened on September 11, 2001. He said the committee looking into it has quality people on it including new member and former Senator, Bob Kerrey of Nebraska.

Wyden was given more information about the importance of Copper-Salmon to the Elk River fishery and the economic benefits to the Port Orford area. He again promised to get on it "right away".

Councilor Jim Auborn told Wyden how residents of the City of Port Orford are putting in a new sewer outfall project while still paying for the old one, which was wiped out in the El Nino of 1998 and

asked if he could help. He replied that he would go after it and see what he can do. Wyden spoke of the importance of infrastructure and said he supported a \$50 billion bond project to rebuild America.

Wyden said he felt like the political pendulum has a wrecking ball on the end of it. He said he is seeing a far right radical effort now where there used to be a bipartisan effort in Oregon working for the environment.

Wyden spoke about the Biscuit Fire and said we needed to salvage logging there but the administration didn't want to be reasonable citing their support for a "rider" in the Forest Health Bill.

Wyden spoke for over an hour an a quarter and then stayed briefly to continue talking to people before heading up to Coos Bay for his next meeting in one of Oregon's 35 other counties.

Water Quality Management

An agricultural water quality management area plan and proposed new rules were developed over the past year by the Oregon Department of Agriculture with the assistance of a local advisory committee. Hearings will begin with an informational session on the Curry County Agricultural Water Quality Management Area Plan. The formal public comment period will immediately follow. Interested persons may present oral and written comments at the meeting. Written comments received by the department by 5:00pm on February 17, 2004, will also be considered.
