Council Approves Removal By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met on Monday night. All six councilors and the mayor were present. Not in attendance were the city attorney John B. Trew and the new city admin-

istrator Kenneth Knight. He was attending an OCZMA meeting and will be back in the office on Thursday.

Mayor Gary Doran pointed out that Scott Halse was in attendance at the meeting and the recent graduate of the police academy was given a round of applause. Councilor Emily Francona asked if the situation on Eleventh Street was all straightened out. Chief Rush said it comes and goes. He was asked about the process. Rush said some are violations and some are not. Councilor Auborn pointedly told the Chief that we (the council) interpret it as something that needs to be done.

The council discussed the speed trailer the police department has talked about borrowing from Gold Beach and problems with it including liability if someone damages it. The consensus of the council was to look into getting a speed trailer built locally. Chief Rush will pursue having a speed trailer built locally. The estimated cost is \$2,800.

Jim Auborn is the council liaison to the parks commission. He spoke on the parks report and said the commission had received three letters from citizens and one from the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce all asking to have the ocean overlook building torn down. Auborn said there was a lot of interest in refurbishing and maintaining the miniature golf course in Buffington Park. He mentioned the volunteer efforts of the Shields family on behalf of the golf course.

The planning department report showed there had been thirteen Permit Clearance requests for building permits. These include twelve single-family houses and one mini-storage units development.

Councilor Carl Eskelson asked when Arizona Street would be reopened between Madrona and Geer Circle. Public works director Dave Pace told him Arizona would be reopened when the lake recedes.

SHN Engineering has made a video of the ocean outfall at the diffuser unit and the video shows no damage from winter storms. Councilor Jerry Steinhorst noting the good weather asked about finishing that project now. The only thing left to be done is placing the concrete mats on top of the diffuser unit. Councilor Ed Beck asked if anyone had looked into using a helicopter to drop the mats into place. He said it wouldn't take one week to mobilize the helicopter as it would a barge. Using a barge to place the concrete mats it will take two weeks to get the project done – one week to mobilize and one to do the work

The council proceeded into old business and dealt with an appeal of a tree removal decision by developer Siggi Hoffman. Hoffman had previously asked the City for permission to remove a shore pine from in front of a house at 355 Eighteenth Street and was turned down. He has built a duplex next door and if the tree was removed he could have Coos-Curry Electric bring power to the property with overhead, not underground electric wires. This would result in a considerable cost savings. The tree in question is on the city right of way and diseased. Councilor Jim Campbell made a motion to reverse the original vote and have the city go ahead and remove the tree with the developer paying the actual cost of removing the tree. The motion passed 6-0.

New School Superintendent

At its regular meeting on March 9, the 2CJ Board approved a contract with Marvin Ott, currently Principal at Harrisburg Middle School near Eugene, to be the new 2CJ Superintendent. He will begin work on July 1, when the current Superintendent, Phil Sword, retires.

The Board accepted employment of the following probationary teachers for the 2004-2005 school year: Joseph Culley, Thomas Dill, Christopher Eidemiller, Millie Geller, Cheryl Kuehn, Elaine Nickerson, Gareth Pooleon, Kristiaan Stuart, and Georgia Weinblatt. Contracts were extended for another 3 years for the following contract teachers: Dixi Allison, Fred Betz, Amy Brown, Diane Cassel, Kathryn Cowan, Catherine Foster, Anne Guerin, William Jarvis, Robert Lemerande, Penny McLeod, Charles Mitchell, Elizabeth Mitchell, Earlyene Pendergrass, Michael Ringo, and Lucinda Sheeran.

The Superintendent reviewed the financial picture. The budget was developed incorporating stringent cutbacks, including the 12 furlough days in this year's calendar, in anticipation that Measure 30

might not pass. District spending is still on target, and figures are holding up to provide a reasonable fund balance at the end of the fiscal year to offset partially the anticipated shortfall. After Board discussion of priorities for next year, Sword proposed to try to build the budget without resorting to furlough days and including a combined Title I Director/Middle School Counselor. He expects the budget to break out roughly as follows: 73% salaries and benefits, 14% purchased services, 4% supplies and materials, 2% other, and 7% indirect costs and reserves. The Board would like very much to bring back Home Economics and Art, but it is not likely that the budget can support that. Public input on the budget will be sought at an April 27 meeting of the Budget Committee.

The Superintendent reported that the water system at PHS is complete, and the waste water treatment system is still on hold awaiting favorable weather. A supplier who has not been paid by the contractor, Laskey-Clifton, has filed a lien against the District.

The District is seeking volunteers for a committee to advise the District on use of the vacant Blanco annex building and

Juston Potter, Transportation Supervisor, received two bids for a new school bus. The Board approved accepting the lower bid contingent upon inspection and approval by Potter. The fleet of school buses is being kept in excellent condition in part by an ongoing lease-purchase program funded by bus depreciation payments from the state.

The furlough day scheduled for April 30 was changed to June 2. May 28 is now the last day for students and will be a minimum day.

Parks and Recreation Department representative Mike Collins. In addition to those working on the boat at this initial session, other volunteers include Gary Anderson, John Suchy, Dee Latham, Al Morse, Dan Peckham (who served on MLB 36498), Bill Hawkins, and Roger Rieber.

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department recently completed the construction of the attractive boat display building and the cradle on which the boat was placed. The Point Orford Heritage Society agreed to restore the boat to suitable condition for its display. The restoration will proceed with the removal of the hardware, the stripping of the paint to reveal any damaged wooden sections, the remanufacture of damaged wood parts, the acquisition or manufacture of missing hardware components, repainting of the boat and the reattachment of the hardware.

The Heritage Society hopes to finish the restoration project by 2005. All of the work is being done by volunteers, and business establishments in Curry and Coos Counties are coming forward to assist in the acquisition of critical marine hardware.

The MLB 36498 served at the Port Orford Lifesaving Station since shortly after the boat's construction in 1946 until the Station closed in 1970. The boat then served in the Coast Guard Station in Bandon until 1972, was then transferred to the Coast Guard Station on the Umpqua River where she remained until removed from active service in December, 1979. In 1981 the boat was taken out of the water for the last time and placed in drydock in Coos Bay until it went on display in Bandon in 1989. The boat was brought to its home in Port Orford in 2000.


Chamber Meeting

CGH News

Kim Fletcher, R.N., and Kelly Lowther, M.D., recently returned from the Chadwick Child Abuse Summit in San Diego where they received specialized training for a Curry County program started last year. The training was funded by community contributions through the Curry Health Foundation.

Fletcher is a surgical and emergency room nurse at Curry General Hospital. She and Dr. Lowther, a family practice physician in Brookings, make themselves available, on-call, to treat young patients suspected of being physically or sexually abused. They examine their patients in a private, cheerfully appointed room located in the hospital's annex building.

The room and the non-invasive exam equipment were funded by the Curry Health District in partnership with the Curry County Child Advocacy Center, and an outpouring of community contributions received last year. Prior to the exam program at Curry General Hospital, patients and their families or caregivers had to travel three hours to the Medford area for specialized exams and continued treatment.

Garrison Lake Breached

Port Orford homeowner Dave Bassett received a permit to open Garrison Lake on Thursday, March 11, and on Saturday morning, March 13, work began opening a channel. Bassett hired Joe Marsh to do the work. He started at 7:00am on Saturday morning running the bulldozer while his assistant Garrett Heyl ran the excavator. They worked before a large crowd of onlookers including Mayor Doran, Don Ivey from the Coquille Indian Tribe and Frank Eckley from State Parks.

The lake breach was the "long way" from the lake to the old outlet channel. The breach began flowing at 1:00pm. David Bassett and Steve Newcomb, both professional engineers, donated the engineering work for this project. Bassett handed Marsh a check for \$965 once the excavation work was done and that was the total cost for the successful project. Water has been flowing out of the lake

Like a water heater the lake has "blown" and twice in the past three months. The goal of this lake opening was for it not to blow out and that was achieved.

Bassett deserves a lot of credit for this project. The City of Port Orford and Oregon State Parks and Recreation had no plans to do anything as of March 1.





Councilor Auborn made a motion that the city remove the ocean view overlook and leave the concrete pad and part of the walls for a bench and signage. The council voted unanimously in favor of the motion. Dave Pace estimated it would be removed in about two months.

Councilor Auborn made a motion to approve Resolution No. 2004-14 which increases the 2003-04 general fund planning budget by a total of \$3,900 and transfers an additional \$3,900 from existing line items to create the city match. It passed 6-0.

The council approved the consent calendar unanimously. This included appointment of Jim Rhoades and Kendrick Williams to the city budget committee; approval of Michael L. Piels as auditor for 2003-04; and the minutes for two meetings.

The council discussed the modular unit at Highway 101 and Sixteenth Street. They are planning a workshop with city planner Chuck Nordstrom to discuss this type of development.

Mayor Doran said that governor Ted Kulongoski would be visiting city hall on Thursday to meet and talk with the council.

The council will meet in workshop session the week of April 4 to discuss expectations for the new City Administrator. They will next meet in regular session on Monday, April 19.
