Senior Center Easter Brunch By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford Senior Center held their monthly membership meeting last Tuesday and once again drew a good turnout. The meetings are now held in the "north" room at the Center. The

former meeting room (the south room) is now the exercise room. Secretary Bev Dunlap read the minutes and noted that 29 people had attended the membership meeting in February. The membership meeting is now combined with the monthly birthday party. A possible upcoming Senior Center trip would be to the Butterfly Garden in Elkton and visit to Arline's Restaurant.

Nancy Dowdy gave the Treasurer's Report. The Center spent about \$100 more than it took in for February and for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2003 is down \$964.56. But the bank accounts and the money market account total \$12,902.

Vice president Ed Dowdy gave the nutrition report. He said 70 people had been served at the Center breakfast in March. The breakfast in April will be a special Easter Brunch from 10:00am to 2:00pm

and feature a different menu than the regular breakfasts.

Dowdy said 34 people showed up for the corned beef and cabbage dinner and dance on March 20. He said the Center has started cooking classes. The first one was taught by Sella Libby and was how to make egg rolls. 15 people attended the class and got to eat what they made. The next cooking class will be on April 20 and be led by Ed Dowdy on low carb desserts. He will show people how to make low carb cheesecake and chocolate mousse. The cost of each class is \$10 per person.

The Center membership voted to buy a used dishwasher at the February meeting but has not found a good used one yet. President Owen Miller said the Center had been renting a dishwasher for years for \$139 per month plus paying for supplies. Miller spoke about the rummage room and said it had been spruced up including being cleaned and painted. Miller said there was now a much higher quality of rummage for sale.

Bev Dunlap talked about the Senior Center trip to the Wildlife Safari in Winston the previous Saturday. The bus was full with 14 people. Dunlap noted that the bus accommodates handicapped people who have gone along on the trips. She

said the next trip was to Coos Bay to see the play "Once Upon a Mattress" on April 18.

President Miller named a nominating committee for the upcoming election. He chose Rose Panozzo, Kathy O. Davis, and Roger McSharry. The committee will report back to the membership at the April meeting and the members (over 200 of us) will vote in May. Positions up for election include president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and board member at large.

Rusty Miller played several numbers on his different harmonicas and then it was time to start watching the movie before lunch was served and the birthday cake was brought out.

OPEC Cuts Production

Representative Peter DeFazio called on President Bush to take action against the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) for cutting production and keeping oil prices high. DeFazio sent a letter to the President asking him to file a case with the World Trade Organization (WTO) against OPEC for violating the trade regulations. The letter was signed by 32 members of the House of Representatives.

"OPEC is violating WTO rules by restricting production and colluding to raise oil prices," said DeFazio. "This administration is quick to use the WTO to protect multinational corporations and mega-conglomerates. American consumers and the American economy deserve the same."

"When he ran for election, the President promised to stand up against OPEC and demand that they 'open their spigots,'

continued DeFazio. "It's time to live up to his campaign promise and protect Americans from extortionate oil prices."

OPEC announced on March 31 in Vienna that the organization planned to continue with a one million barrel a day production cut, which could drive prices even higher, just as Americans set out on Spring and Summer vacations. According to the American Automobile Association (AAA), the average price for a gallon of regular gasoline in Oregon is \$1.825, much higher than the national average of \$1.752.

[Editor's note to Congressman DeFazio: If OPEC wants to reduce production of oil by one million barrels a day why don't people in this country just cut our use of gasoline by a million barrels a day.

In Curry County we have Curry Transit's Coastal Express, which will take us south to Brookings and north to Coos Bay/

North Bend for doctor's appointments, shopping, social situations, etc.

We can all think twice about our driving and look for opportunities to car-pool, buy things off the Internet or preferably for the health of our local economy do more local shopping.

There are a greater variety of goods and services available in Port Orford than people realize. Now would be an opportune time to visit your local business establishments to find out more about what they offer. I did a little research on Tuesday and talked with Lois at McNair True Value Hardware. They have over 11,000 different items for sale. Judy, the manager at Ray's Place Market estimated that store had over 13,000 different items for sale.

Another way to save gasoline is walk or ride your bicycle when you do your errands around town and get some exercise while you're at it. EK]

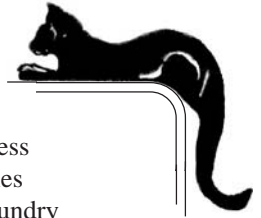

Dear Editors, I am submitting a letter regarding the CCEC's Board Meeting and my opinions. Thank You,

Changes are occurring at Coos Curry Electric Cooperative. The Board is working on the strategic planning issues that were identified in the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's Business Audit completed February 2004. Overview presentation now available to Owner/Members at district office. (Note: Communication a major issue.)

Board Members now required to have basic computer literacy and use e-mail. Several Board Members expressed concern and didn't want to receive e-mails from owner/members or from employees. The majority decision was that the Board would have a centralized CCEC e-mail address that would then transmit the e-mails to all Board Members, including e-mail addressed to one person. My concern: centralized also means control and access by the General Manager which allows no privacy at the Board level. Employees must follow the chain of command and if the chain is flawed?? Dale Thomas expressed his willingness to be available to owner/members but was out voted. Looks like the Board's Old Guard is carefully closing the doors to communication, again.

The By-Law/Policy Committee presented their suggested By-Law changes. Term

Limits of 3 terms (9 years total) were pre-submitted by a group of Owner/Members. The Committee discussed it and decided against it, Kolan and Combs stating that it didn't make sense. The committee consisted of Dale Thomas (1 year and counting), Vern Kolan (48 years and counting), and Grant Combs (24 years and counting). Hmmm.

Board Decision: Owner/Members restricted to voting on Board approved By-law changes only.

Letter to the Editor,

Predicted effects of Measure 30's defeat are occurring. Needed services are disappearing. Schools are cutting days, classes are too big for effective instruction. Some of the worst things about the campaign and defeat of 30:

The drive to get it on the ballot was led by out-of-state interests.

A talk show host spread a rumor, just before the election, that a large amount of money in the governor's office could be used. He encouraged listeners to call that office. Rumors do great damage, especially if they are lies.

The Republican-controlled legislature has borrowed more than \$1.3 billion in unse-

cured loans over the past several years. After the defeat of Measure 28 in 2003, the State Economist told the legislature it did not have enough cash to pay bills through the end of the budget period (June 2003). Republican "leaders" ordered the State Treasurer to issue \$450 million in "Oregon Appropriation Bonds" to pay for operating expenses, with a promise to repay them from future income tax revenues. Interest alone amounts to \$120 million over the next decade.

During the same period, the legislature pretended there was a budget surplus and refunded "kicker" checks. Since Republicans have been in charge, they have refunded \$1.1 billion in personal income taxes and \$370 million in corporate income taxes. Interest is more than \$300 million.

Without the refunds, the state budget would be nearly balanced.

Three bond rating agencies have reduced Oregon's credit rating.

Consider these things when you vote this year.

Voter Registration Deadline

Curry County Clerk Renee Kolen reminds Curry residents that the deadline to register to vote in the May 18 Primary Election is April 27, 2004.

"If you wish to vote in the May Primary Election and you are not currently registered or if you are not affiliated with a major political party and you wish to participate in the nomination of a Republican or a Democratic candidate in the primary, your registration must reach the county elections office by April 27", said Kolen.

Ballot packets for the May 18, 2004 Primary Election will be mailed between April 30 and May 4, 2004. Kolen recommends contacting the elections office if you have not received your ballot packet my Monday May 10.

"Please do not wait until the polls have closed and election results are released to notify us of your voting concerns", Kolen said. "We must update your registration and issue your ballot before 8:00pm election night."

Voter registration cards are available at your elections office, post offices, banks, libraries, the Department of Motor Vehicles, or on line at www.sos.state.or.us. Kolen said "Our goal is to make it as convenient as possible for people who wish to register in order to participate in the electoral process. Please call us at (541) 247-3297 or toll free (877) 739-4218 if you have any concerns regarding your voter registration."

Fair Board Meeting

The Curry County Fair Board met in a special meeting on Friday, April 2. The topic of the meeting was to open bids submitted for labor and materials required to repair the roof livestock pavilion. The board moved, with one board member abstaining, to accept a bid from R. E. Noah and Company to provide the materials needed to repair the roof at a cost of \$75,561.00.

Additionally, the board requested that a quote be obtained for an additional 1363 linear feet of additional purlins (which

could be used for future wall repairs), and 400 linear feet of wall girts. This decision was based on the escalating cost of steel.

The board then made a motion, with two board members opposed, to accept a bid for the labor to replace the pavilion roof submitted by O & S Contractors at a cost of \$73,440.00.

The meeting adjourned at 9:15p.m.

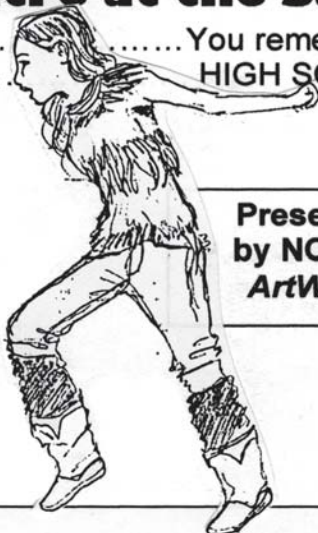

High Speed Internet Update

High speed wireless internet is up and running and the first customers tell me they are thrilled with it. Carroll's Web has posted some pricing information on their web site but unfortunately, as of press time, the information is not well explained and gives an unpleasant impression.

The original 1 year residential contracts cost \$199.99 installation and \$39.99 or \$49.99 per month for 768kbps or 1Mbps service. In order to make this more affordable, Carroll's Web decided to offer an additional slower wireless service at a lower price.

The new service is 384kbps (1/2 of 768kbps, but still nearly 7 times faster than 56k and probably faster than many people will really need. No matter what your connection speed is, the data will only pass at the speed of the slowest link. Many web sites can't keep up with even a 384kbps link.) The \$199.99 installation fee is still the same but the monthly cost drops to \$29.99/month.

So far, so good. The confusion arises because they show a \$210 charge for equipment. This fee (about half the actual cost of the equipment) is waived for those signing a 1 year contract. 768kbps service is shown for \$49.99/month. 1Mbps service is not shown but can be arranged.

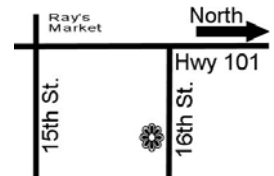
