Owen Miller Elected President By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford Senior Center held their membership meeting on Tuesday, March 25, and elected their new slate of officers. They will serve from July 1, 2004 to June 30, 2005.

The only contested race was for president and incumbent president Owen Miller won by a large margin over Kay Neal. The other officers elected were Bev Dunlap vice president; Jackie Sellon secretary; Bill Nelson treasurer, and Betty Keeler member at large. Sonja Mason is now the nutrition coordinator for the center. Delores Care is taking over from Donna Olson as office manager.

The meeting began with Bev Dunlap reading the minutes of the May board meeting. The center brought in \$460 at their Mother's Day breakfast and served 124 people. The center will hold a brunch on Sunday, June 13 and feature Denver omelets. The following week the center will host a Father's Day dinner on Saturday, June 19 from 5:00-7:00pm. They will ask for a \$6.50 donation for this special dinner. There will be a spaghetti

lunch at the center on July 4 as part of the Jubilee festivities.

The meeting was brightly interrupted by a presentation of flowers by Gayle Wilcox to outgoing member at large and office manager Donna Olsen.

Paula Cracas gave a treasurer's report. She reported the center had a \$16.35 loss for April. She pledged to work on reducing expenses. She said last April the center had made \$800 over expenses. Later on in the meeting Cracas reported that the center has \$11,000 in the bank.

Donna Olsen gave a report on the state of the office. She said the center had been rented out 15 times last year (special events) in addition to the regular renters like ESA, the garden club and the rural fire board. She said the center had 225 members and that nine had already paid their dues for 2004-05.

Olsen said the center had crutches and wheelchairs available to loan people who need them. Please contact the center if you would like to borrow any of these items at 332-5771. They are at the center for your use.

George Martinez gave a report on the Puerto Rican dinner. He said the center served 46 meals (40 paid) and brought in \$263.00.

Louis Mincer and president Owen Miller will attend the Triple A (Area Agency on Aging) in Bandon the week of June 7. Thanks to the diligent work by Mincer the senior center is on track for receiving \$13,000 in grants for food purchases.

Bev Dunlap talked about the upcoming trip to Coquille. The center is sponsoring a trip to the Sawdust Theater on Saturday, June 11 for this year's melodrama. The bus will leave the center at 5:00pm for the 7:00pm performance. The cost is \$12 for the show and \$5 for the round trip bus fare. The center needs 15 people to fill the bus. There are some seats still available. Call the center to reserve one.

Bill Nelson and Paula Cracas will serve on the audit committee as well as Roger McSharry and Donna Olsen.

President Miller spoke about the dishwasher, which the center pays \$139.75 per month for and has for 16 years. He said do the math on how much has been spent on it. Miller said he had found a dishwasher for the center for \$2,500 including installation. It is 15 years old and includes a service contract. Miller said the center had received two contributions for the dishwasher from members.



Planning Commission Meeting

The City of Port Orford Planning Commission will hold a public meeting and hearing on Tuesday, June 8, at 7:00pm in the Port Orford City Hall council chambers, for the purpose of considering an amendment to the City's Zoning Ordinance and Municipal Code. The change applies to adding a definition to Ordinance Section 1.030 for "prefabricated, mobile or temporary office/commercial structure.

The Planning Commission will welcome public testimony regarding this matter to help in its review of the proposed amendment and in making a recommendation to the City Council concerning possible adoption of the changes. A copy of the proposed changes to the ordinance and code is available for public review at the Port Orford Public Library and at the city office window in Port Orford City Hall.



City Administrator Responds By Evan Kramer

I wrote City Administrator Ken Knight an e-mail last Tuesday after reading his interview in the previous Saturday's Curry Coastal Pilot and asked him about the ramifications of the voters passing ballot measure #08-41. I also asked about the comment in the article either by him or the reporter Donald Allison that the new ordinance appears to be worth only the paper it's printed on. City Administrator Ken Knight's response is as follows.

The ordinance requires that "(n)o employee of the City shall officially engage in or permit unlawful detentions or other actions that violate individuals' rights or liberties as specified in the United State Constitution's Bill of Rights and Fourteenth Amendment, or in the Oregon Constitution." Unlawful means that anything done outside of the 'law'. The only thing that this ordinance does is to require that City officials follow the law. If a law has not been declared, by a Court of the Land, to be unlawful, or unconstitutional, than City staff will enforce it. Local ordinances can not supercede State or Federal law, that is unlawful! Is the

ordinance only worth the paper its printed on, no, it is a strong statement to certain elected officials, but it doesn't change anything about how the City will conduct its business. (I do not recall if I said it wasn't worth the paper it is printed on, or if the reporter made the comment in response to my saying it doesn't change anything about how the City will conduct its business.) All the lawful laws of the Land will be enforced until a Court of the Land overturns them. Neither myself, the Police Chief, or any members of the Council are constitutional scholars, and even if we were, we do not have the right to decide which laws we wish to enforce. It is my understanding that some

of the people behind getting this ordinance passed had some personal issues with the Patriot Act. That is all well and good, but until a Court issues a decision, it is the law of the Land and this ordinance does nothing to change that. Until a Court decides that the enforcement of the Patriot Act permits unlawful detentions, than the detentions would be lawful, period. This ordinance does nothing to change that. I am bound by the Code of Ethics of the International City Managers Association. Whether or not I agree or disagree with a particular law, I am honor bound to enforce all laws fairly and without bias. I have left a position because I was asked to show favoritism in violation of that community's purchasing policy and, if directed by the Mayor or the City Council to violate a Federal or State law, would not do it.

I hope that this answers your questions.




State Parks Day



Ray's New Shopping Carts By Evan Kramer

Ray's Place Market in Port Orford got in 50 new shopping carts last week. These bright blue models have a body made of hard plastic, not like the last group, which were metal. The frame remains of metal construction.

The summer edition of Invention and Technology coincidentally has a two-page article titled "The Shopping Cart, the Invention that made 'Giant Economy Size' Possible."

The article by Curt Wohleber points out that before the 1930's people didn't need to use shopping carts because of the lack of home refrigeration, thus most people shopped for their food daily. Store prior to the 1930's were not self-service but each customer had to be individually waited on.

Who changed all this? A man named Sylvan Goldman in Oklahoma City. He owned a chain of Humpty Dumpty grocery stores in that city. Goldman noticed something occurring in his stores that still happens today. People using handheld shopping baskets would stop shopping when they got full. Goldman got the inspiration for a full sized shopping cart in 1936 based on the idea of a folding chair with two basket like shelves. Goldman came up with the idea and one of his workers Fred Young, built the first prototype. Once the kinks had been worked out Goldman starting using them in his Humpty Dumpty stores in the summer of 1937 but people initially didn't like using them. Goldman hired "ringers" who were paid to use the carts and set an example for the rest of the public. That broke the reluctance to use them and the

rest is shopping history. Goldman started the Folding Basket Carrier Corporation, which sold the carts across the United States. The nesting shopping cart, which is the rule today, was invented in 1947, along with the child seat. The new carts at Ray's have another difference over their predecessors. The back portion of the cart is recessed. None of us could figure out why until Wendell Bird came along and explained it to me. The new carts by having the recessed lower portion can't be spooned into the cart in front so tightly that you have trouble separating the carts. It is easier now to pull the carts apart.

The article makes a point that the majority of shopping carts being sold today are "made of corrosion-free injection molded plastic" like the ones that Ray's just bought.

Terry P. Wilson wrote what Curt Wohleber calls "the definitive biography of Sylvan Goldman" titled "The Cart That Changed the World" for those who want to know more.
