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It's Fair Time By Evan Kramer



Greyhound may be on the way out but two things that haven't been discontinued, and instead have been improved, are the Coos and Curry County Fairs. The Curry County Fair and

Rodeo opens their gates to the public this Thursday July 22. The theme of this year's Fair is "Dancing Waves & Fun Days". Port Orford's marble sculptor Eric Johnson was the person who came up with this year's theme and he did a good job.

The Curry County Fair features a big carnival of rides a rodeo and a demolition derby but that's not all there is to fairs, though they may be what attracts the big crowds.

The biggest piece of good news this year at the Curry County Fair is the reopening of the Livestock/4-H building, which had been literally falling apart earlier this year. Parts of the roof were gone and standing water stood in the building. But Curry County Fair Manager Tom Amsden wasn't about to put up with that and made it his goal to get the building ready for this year's fair. Using money earned

during the Biscuit Fire, the Curry County Fair had the livestock building rebuilt. The roof was completed on June 24 and O & S Contractors did the work. Tom Amsden said Rob and Jennifer Carrillo of Brookings helped save \$35,000 on the cost of the roof. The firewall is complete but not painted. The downstairs part of the 4-H dormitory is ready but the upstairs dormitory is not. New insulation has been installed in the 100 by 200 square foot building. Amsden said his goal is to have the 4-H dormitories complete by next year.

Way to go Tom. Whenever we attend a county fair whether it's the one in Curry, Douglas, Coos County or the State Fair we always enjoy visiting the livestock buildings.

Amsden came to the Curry County Fair as manager from his job as a GM parts manager for 20 years. He was involved in the 4-H program in New Hampshire with cattle and poultry in the 1950's for ten years.

The Coos County Fair opens one week later on July 28 and runs through August 1. The theme of the Fair this year is "Hay Bales and Country Tales." Port Orford resident Brenda Dell is very involved with the 4-H program at the Coos County Fair in the llama program. I asked her

what 4-H stands for and she gave me some information on it. The 4-H's are:

Head: thinking critically and solving problems.

Heart: respecting self, others and the environment – communicating.


Hands: preparing for a career servicing others.

Health: choosing healthy lifestyles, managing changes and challenges.

The 4-H motto is "to make the best better". Sue Blount is the leader and Brenda Dell the assistant leader of the Llameros 4-H llama club. They will be participating along with seven young people in the Coos County Fair all week. You can visit them and their llamas while enjoying the Fair in Myrtle Point. This year they will have more participation and have been given more space at the Fair. 4-H participation is for fourth through twelfth grade students. It is a learn by doing education program that helps youth grown and develop into positive citizens.

Tioga Mountain Men


Tioga Mountain Men Summer Rendezvous The members of the Tioga Mountain Men, a Coos County, Oregon area traditional black powder muzzleloader club, wish to invite everyone to join in the fun at their 31st annual summer rendezvous on August 6, 7, and 8. The Rendezvous will be held at the Historic Mast Family Farm near Coquille. There are free primitive and modern camping areas with lots of free room for the tin teepee users. There are no modern hookups.

The Rendezvous is a pre-1840 event where members dress in mountain man (and woman) clothing and use period equipment and weapons to emulate the hunters, trappers, and scouts from the fur trade era. The club members, their guests, and visitors gather each year to have contests, resupply their goods, have a great time and see old and new friends just as in the days of the mountain man rendezvous gatherings in the Rocky Mountains. Come find some unique shopping opportunities and enjoy a living history event.

There will be many shooting matches and other contests for men and women as well as juniors, pee wees, and little squirts. There is a potluck supper on Saturday evening for participants and their families. Those planning on attending the potluck should bring a family dish to share as well as table and place settings. The Tioga Mountain Men will supply hamburgers and hot dogs.

Many traders will be there to sell their special mountain man period goods and equipment. There will be something at the rondy for each member of the family to enjoy. There is no charge for admission or for parking. Registration for competition for singles is \$15.00 or \$25.00 for the entire family.

Newspaper Challenge By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford-Langlois 2CJ School District Board met on Tuesday night, July 13, and dealt with a challenge to the Port Orford News. A committee consisting of Buzzy Nielsen, Amy Brown, Kathy Cowan, Anne Guerin and Tobe Porter handled the challenge to the placement of the Port Orford News in the schools as part of the Newspapers in Education program. The challenge came from parent Tina Merryman. Nielsen was the chairman of the committee and wrote and submitted the report to the school board. Board member Gayle Rathbun suggested accepting the report as written.

Rathbun made a motion to accept the decision and conclusion of the committee but it died for lack of a second. Board member Nancy Dowdy read from the school board policy which said that the committee's decision stands as written and does not require a vote of the school board. The three-page report by the Port Orford News challenge committee concluded as follows:

Ultimately, the committee moved and unanimously voted in favor of retaining the Port Orford News and the Newspapers in Education program, both as an instructional and supplementary material. Committee members determined that the program and the newspaper itself complies with District policies and provides a valuable tool to support the teachers chosen curricula.

The next step as explained by the Board is that Tina Merryman can now file a formal written appeal to the school board appealing the decision of the committee. She plans to do this.

Matt Hall, editor of the Port Orford News told the school board that Scott Thiemann's column "Out - In the Country" had run its course and hadn't been in the paper since June 2. He called the situation a vendetta.

North Curry Families and Children's Center Director Tere Tronson gave a presentation on the Community Partnership, which has now concluded one successful year. Tronson talked about the Edible Garden and Sounds Fun projects. Sounds Fun is a radio program broadcast live on 100.9 from 7:00-9:00pm on Friday nights. The adult coordinators for Sounds Fun are Linda Tarr, Carol Malley and Jay

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Stoler. They helped the students put on a radio show featuring music and other things. Tronson played a four and a half minute tape put together by the Sounds Fun crew about the edible garden project. Carrie Shields is the coordinator for the edible garden project and she told the board, mainly first and second graders were participating in the program and they all got to take things home from the school gardens.

New school superintendent Marv Ott gave his first report to the board. He told them the district had worked out a two-year agreement with the Bandon School District for the soccer program. He talked about the necessity of re-keying all the outside doors in the district's schools at a cost of \$6,400. This is because so many extra keys are loose in the community.

Ott said he appreciated the work of the newspaper challenge committee. He also expressed appreciation for the volunteers who are painting the outside of Driftwood Elementary School. Painting of the school by volunteers will continue this Saturday morning. He further said PERS rates would be 8.05% for the District, which he felt was good news. Ott said an audit had been done on the school lunch program and that the lunches needed to be less costly.

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No Go on G.O. By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford City Council met on a warm Monday evening with many people in attendance at the meeting.

Ralph Donaldson spoke to the council about the GO bonds first and gave a brief history of the financing of the new sewer outfall and treatment plant upgrade. He said the council had voted to use Revenue Bonds to pay for the projects but that the citizens placed the GO bonds on the ballot and that issue lost by one vote 208-207. Then the revenue bonds were placed before the voters and won by a wide margin. Donaldson said democracy can't be run by ignoring the vote and said he would like to see the council affirm the vote. He said it's over.

General Obligation bonds are paid for by property taxes while Revenue bonds are paid back through utility rates.

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History: Sears kit house, circa 1910

Jack Pruitt said the council had passed a Resolution to pay for the projects with revenue bonds and that the council had put the GO bonds on the ballot. Pruitt said the GO bonds were best for the average residential users. He reminded the council they had to have one-third low-income people in the city to qualify for the loans. He asked the council to do the honorable thing and let the people vote on the GO bonds

Caroline Clancy told the council if they didn't put the GO bonds out for a vote they were just looking out for themselves and protecting their own pockets. She said the choice was between higher utility bills or property taxes. She asked the council to let the town decide its own destiny and said she trusted they would do the right thing.

Milt Nelson told the council that property taxes were less regressive than utility rates. He urged the council hold a public hearing on the issue.

City Administrator Ken Knight said the mil rate (amount of property tax per thousand dollars of assessed valuation) would decline over the life of the GO Bonds. He said the bonds would be for \$2.75 million out of nearly \$4.2 million for the project. Councilor Carl Eskelson said he would like to see it put up for a vote. Councilor Emily Francona said the decision about revenue bonds was made with the best of intent and there were no behind the scenes machinations. She said she would not support resurfacing the issue. Ken Knight said there had been no rash of phone calls to city hall about the issue, saying there had been three - two for the GO bonds and one for revenue bonds. Carl Eskelson made a motion to put the GO Bonds up for election and there was no second so the motion died

There will be more council notes in next week's paper.

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Wilderness Week

The fourth and final event in the Wilderness Week events sponsored by the Friends of Elk River is a hike on Sunday, July 25. The hike is into the North Salmon/proposed Copper Salmon Wilderness area. The group will hike into the northern part of the proposed Copper Salmon Wilderness Area and walk among enormous old-growth Douglas fir and Port Orford cedar trees. Some of the trees you'll see are 300 feet high and 8 to 10 feet in diameter.

The hike is a total of four miles and will take six hours. Hikers are asked to rendezvous at the Elk River Salmon Hatchery parking lot, eight miles up Elk River Road from Highway 101, at 8:00am. Children are welcome but no dogs are permitted on the hike.

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Wild Rivers Coast Promotion

Brookings resident and restaurant owner Peter Spratt gave a lively presentation to a small group of city, chamber and business leaders last Thursday at Port Orford city hall. Spratt is also chairman of the America's Wild Rivers Coast (AWRC) board of directors and he wanted to assure and inform the public that the promotion is still gathering steam as it is heads into a third year.

America's Wild River Coast is a 101 mile stretch from Klamath, California to Port Orford, Oregon and includes all the coastal cities along the way, namely Crescent City, (chosen because it has the only commercial airport) Brookings and Gold Beach. Klamath and Port Orford are the bookends and "gateways" into the area.

Spratt claims research in the early planning stages of the campaign showed that visitors were only spending an average of 1.2 days in the area. The goal was to make that a week-long visit and the creators came up with the idea to tie into the common element in all five cities, which is where the "wild rivers" came from. The aim was for nature-based travelers and those seeking a unique coastal and river experience at the same time. Throw in the fact that more state and national parks than in any other "designated marketing area" are right here in the AWRC and a marketing theme was born.



They have held a golf tournament, advertised in the Southern Oregon Vacation Guide, have produced T-shirts and other marketing gear, and just recently the Brookings television station produced an AWRC travelog that plays in all the motel rooms.

"They said it would be a miracle if this promotion were still happening in five years," says Spratt, referring to the speculation at the startup of the promotional campaign over two years ago.

"I'm hoping we'll have an office and paid staff by that time, but right now it's all volunteer, "Spratt continued as he clicked through an animated computer presentation showing the overview of the promotional concept.

"It's actually a consortium, Spratt said of the business and board structure of the AWRC which is made up of two representatives each from the chambers of commerce, city government, county government, ports and Indian tribes in the five areas. The first chairman of the consortium board was Port Orford resident Ronn Kerr, who also designed the logo and much of the presentation material. Kerr was in attendance at the presentation and was given credit by Peter Spratt for his help and guidance in creating the websites and website goals of the AWRC.

"I was resistant to having a commercial website at first, but Ronn kept on me and now I know that it is right, " said Spratt mentioning that the new commercial site was only a short time away.

Frank Smith, owner of the Port and Starboard restaurant asked Spratt if he thought the Transient Lodging Tax (TLT) fund money should be voted on by the citizens, with a portion going to AWRC. Spratt replied that he didn't think the citizens would care about the issue.

Currently the AWRC is selling flags with the AWRC logo for businesses to heighten local awareness and attract attention to the campaign. Interested businesses can buy a flag through the Visitor's Center or the Chamber.

Early Detection of Colon Cancer

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States. The risk for the illness increases after age 40. Early changes in the colon that may progress to cancer can by found by doing a colonoscopy. Removal of early signs of premalignant lesions during the colonoscopy can be effective in preventing progression of the disease to colon cancer.

In addition, there are thought to be some important factors that predispose one to development of colon cancer. Colon cancer incidence is higher in people with high total fat intake, and low dietary fiber intake. Dietary fiber plays a protective role in the colon. Be sure that your diet is high in fruits and vegetables.

Some studies have suggested that calcium intake lowers colon cancer risk. The calcium that provided this benefit was calcium citrate or calcium carbonate. The doses studied were between 1250 and 1500 mg per day. The more Vitamin D taken, the less risk there is of colon cancer. The calcium taken should include a dose of Vitamin D. Several studies have suggested that who women use postmenopausal hormones have a decrease in colon cancer, but possibly an increase in rectal cancer.

Family history of colon cancer, smoking, and alcohol intake also may contribute to putting a person at risk for acquiring colon cancer. Besides making changes in the factors that one can, there is colonoscopy as a tool that can identify early signs of colon The family nurse practitioners at The Brookings Clinic, 412 Alder Street can refer you to Curry General Hospital for your colonoscopy.



Wild Fire Management

Citizens for Emergency Preparedness, Gold Beach Chapter, will host presentations on two of Curry County's Emergency Services Department projects on July 29, 2004 at 6:00pm in the Blue Room of the Curry County Courthouse Annex. The meeting is open to the public to come and learn about these important projects. Emergency Coordinator Michael Murphy will be presenting a power point show on how Curry County is addressing community fire planning. Murphy is giving the same presentation to fire planners in Grants Pass on July 20. The presentation is being developed in cooperation with O&C Counties. O&C Counties is an organization of counties in Oregon and California that have federally managed railroad lands within their borders.

The Community Fire Planning Project will enable communities in the interface of public lands and private lands to prepare for wild land fires. Once these plans are written communities will be able to apply for funding through Public Law 106-393 (Title II) to do thinning and other fire protection projects in the interface. The concept began in the Healthy Forest Initiative passed by Congress.

The presentation on the Communications Towers Project will be an update on the project slated for construction as early as this summer. This 2 million dollar project is a County priority. Funding has come from Public Law 106-393 - Title III, Title II, the County Road Dept. and Siskiyou National Forest Community Development Program. The project affects all emergency response agencies within the county.

Also on the agenda is discussion of Emergency Procedure Manuals for individuals and businesses and regular business items.

Citizens for Emergency Preparedness is a group established in Gold Beach to work on disaster planning for the central part of the county. Volunteers are needed and the public is encouraged to come and participate.
