Ordinance Questions By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met on Monday, July 19. All councilors were present except Jerry Steinhorst. Mayor Gary Doran spoke to the council about the request from Stacey Romele to close Hamlet between Wyoming and California Streets on August 15 for a street party. The council didn't need to vote on the request for the party, which has become a yearly occasion and permission was granted.

The council then briefly went through the departmental reports. The public works report showed that the water treatment plant pumped 6.866 million gallons of water from the Hubbard Creek reservoir and treated 5.429 million gallons of water at the treatment plant. The wastewater treatment plant discharged 2.82 million gallons of treated wastewater in June. That makes 2.61 million gallons more of water coming out of the water plant than the sewer plant, which better mean people are doing a lot of watering their lawns and gardens. The report by Public Works Superintendent Dave Pace noted that volunteer George

Gehrke has been mowing the street right-of-ways. Thank you George.

Police Chief Bill Rush's report showed 128 service calls in June. The department issued 70 citations. They handled 26 cases including two felonies, 10 misdemeanors, and 14 listed as other. They made six arrests. The police report now lists a record of ordinance violations including dates, locations, violation and disposition of the case – something the city council had been requesting and is now receiving.

The Parks Commission report listed a discussion by city administrator Ken Knight on the Integrated Trail System and whether or not to apply with the Port for a \$200,000 grant to develop part of the trail system. This includes a trail from Battle Rock Park to the Port.

Ann Larmer spoke to the council under citizen's concerns. She was representing the Bill of Rights Defense committee and had questions about how Ordinance 08-41 would be dealt with by the City. This is the Ordinance passed by city voters in May dealing with Bill of Rights protections. Larmer noted the vote was 255 for and 155 against. She asked the council if they planned to inform the public that the ordinance was in effect. She asked about any instructions to the

city administrator about how to enforce the new law. Larmer said people wanted to be protected against flagrant violations of their civil rights. She asked the council what they intend to do, noting again the law is supposed to be currently in effect. Mayor Doran told her it was in effect and had automatically been put in place. Ken Knight said the law went into effect 30 days after the election. Knight then read from his report to the council as follows:

“City Code 2.30.010 – to the best of my knowledge no employee has been engaged in or permitted detentions or other actions based upon a law that has been declared unconstitutional by a Court of the United States of America. Furthermore, to the best of my knowledge no employee has engaged in or permitted detentions or other actions based upon a law that has been found by a Court of the State of Oregon, or one of its subdivisions, to be in violation of the Oregon Constitution or the Oregon Revised Statutes.

The prior statement notwithstanding, **IF**, a Court action has been taken, but **STAYED** by a higher Court for further considerations/appeal, **THEN** the City and City staff shall enforce said law. **IF** a Court action has declared a law uncon-

stitutional and/or in violation of the Oregon constitution and/or Oregon statutes and **NO** stay has been granted, then said law shall not knowingly be enforced by the City or City staff. When I asked Ken Knight via e-mail for a clarification of what this means so they would be understandable he responded, "My comments fulfill the requirements of the ordinance and stand as written."

Knight told the council the city employees have been made aware of the ordinance and he has spoken to the police chief.

Mayor Doran spoke about the recent SWACT (South Western Area Commission on Transportation) meeting he had attended. They have a long list of projects ODOT will move forward on in 2006-07 including the Pistol River rehabilitation project, Rocky Creek shoreline protec-

tion, Highway 101 south of Bandon three lane project, and work on the Frankport slide.

Doran thanked the volunteers who kept the Visitor Center open during the July 4 holiday. They are Jim Auburn, Jim Billings, Kay Neal, Bob Speir, and Wayne Wesley.

Under council liaison reports Jim Auburn said the Parks Commission had filed a letter of intent with ODOT for a walking trail grant. They need to do an engineering study to complete the grant. He spoke about getting \$5,000 in bed tax funds to pay for the engineering study for what's being called the Integrated Trail System. Besides the portion from Battle Rock Park to the Port it includes part of Seventh Street.

Ken Knight told the council there was no reason to believe the sewer treatment plant upgrade project will go over time or over budget.

Councilor Jim Campbell made a motion to accept the lease extension of the A-Frame Adventure Center in Buffington Park and it passed 5-0. The lease extension is for two years. The North Curry Families and Children's Center leases the building from the City and used it for the Parents Unite, Mommy and Me programs, Families Night Out, and the RAD outdoor club program.

The council will hold a police department workshop on Tuesday, August 3 at 9:00am in the council chambers. They will hold a workshop session on the water master plan with SHN on Tuesday, August 10.

July Port Meeting By Jane Cramer

Commissioners Ed Dowdy, Evan Kramer and George Welch as well as Port Manager Gary Anderson were present at the July 20 regular meeting of the Port Commission. Commissioners Gifford Barnes and Dave Knapp were absent.

Under unlisted items, Kramer spoke about the town meeting Peter DeFazio has scheduled for Port Orford in early August. He has been in contact with DeFazio's office to try to set up a visit to the Port. Other south coast Ports will be encouraged to send representatives to discuss current problems with DeFazio.

Welch asked if the trimaran now anchored in the harbor will be a problem as it is in the way where he is now. Fishermen in the audience confirmed it is in the middle of the navigable channel. Anderson advised the owner plans to move it farther out. He will check with the Coast Guard; it is their concern now that it is no longer on the beach.

Under Public Comment, Jeff Miles raised the question of fuel prices, which seem awfully high compared to other ports. He

wondered if the Port is charging too much mark-up or if they should change suppliers. Anderson says the Port is charging the same 20% mark-up they always have. Kramer and Welch commented that all fuel is higher on the south coast. Anderson will talk with Russ Crabtree of the Port of Brookings, who is an expert on the fuel situation.

The first item of New Business was a presentation by Alex Linke, manager of the Port of Bandon. Linke gave a slide presentation that reflected the history of the Port and showed some of the methods used by the Port to increase their income and profitability. Linke showed that there can be a lot more to the business of a Port than just commercial and sport fishing needs. One thing his presentation made clear was how important continuity is. He has been manager at Bandon for 25 years with commissioners who have served multiple terms in contrast with the Port of Port Orford with many changes of managers and commissioners in recent years.

Election of Officers came next, with Kramer being elected president, Dowdy vice president and Barnes secretary trea-

surer. Kramer extended thanks to Welch for his past services as president.

Next was a report by Dowdy on a recent meeting he attended in Coos Bay with Senator Gordon Smith, port managers, fishermen and buyers. The 100 attendees heard the preliminary report of the US Commission On Ocean Policy. There is no action to be taken at this time.

The next item of business concerned landings and Anderson reported on his efforts to be sure the Port receives its percentage from fish sold to the public directly off the boats.

Anderson then reported on recent crane repairs, which went smoothly with less cost than expected.

Under New Business, Anderson mentioned his discussions with Ken Knight, Port Orford City Administrator, which resulted in a decision that the Port will piggy back the cost for a branch sidewalk down to the Port onto the City's grant application for a scenic walkway rather than applying for a separate grant for the Port sidewalk.

Other new business included a review of the ACOE budget for dredging and a target time for the DEQ Brownfields Assessment to be performed the end of July or early August.

After a review of the Manager's Report and an explanation of the financial report for the year, the meeting was adjourned.





Glitch in the Plans


The Oregon Department of Transportation's plans for a Highway 101 and Paradise Point Road left turn lane are on hold. Everything was set to go except for one potential glitch in the plans. The project was put out to bid by ODOT and both bids came in way over what the agency has to spend based on the engineer's estimate. The low bid was for \$204,614 and the high bid was for \$295,000. The two bidding companies were Laskey-Clifton and Bracelin and Yeager.

Lee Sparks, Assistant District Manager for District 7 with ODOT, said that the plans for the left turn lane at 101 and Paradise Point Road would be cut down including use of less materials and a reduction in the aesthetics of the project. The project will then be put out to bid again. The ODOT goal is still to put in the left turn lane this summer but it depends on getting a bid within budget. Sparks said one thing that may have caused the bids to be high is the contractors are all busy right now.

New Speed Law in Effect

The Oregon State Legislature in their infinite wisdom has enacted a law affecting the speed limit through school zones. It went into effect on July 1.

In Port Orford the speed limit in the school zone is now 20 miles per hour at all times (24-7). The speed limit through the school zone in Langlois remains 20 miles per hour when school is in session and the lights are flashing or children are present. The reason for this is the legislature decided that areas with a speed limit of 30 miles per hour through town would see the school zones moved to 20mph all the time. For areas in which the normal speed limit is 35 miles per hour and above the 20 mile per hour in the school zone only applies when the lights are flashing or children are present. So you can go through Langlois in the middle of the night at 40 miles per hour. Representative Wayne Krieger promised to look into this unpopular law, which he said the legislature passed as an amendment to a bill in the middle of the night.

Coast Guard Day

The Point Orford Heritage Society will observe Coast Guard Day on Sunday, August 1 at the Port Orford Lifeboat Station Museum. The museum will be open from 10:00am to 3:30pm. There will be a short ceremony at 1:00pm.

On August 4, 1790, President George Washington signed into law a bill creating the Revenue Cutter Service. In 1915, the Revenue Cutter Service merged with the U.S. Life-Saving Service to form the U.S. Coast Guard. The Lighthouse Service became part of the Coast Guard in 1939.

This year the Heritage Society is pleased to welcome two special guest speakers, both retired U.S. Coast Guard "surf men."

Wayne Gage is a recipient of the Coast Guard Medal, awarded for a voluntary act of heroism in the face of great personal danger. On December 27, 1970, he rescued three men from a grounded ship under hazardous Oregon coast storm conditions off Heceta Head. Senior Chief Gage entered the water six times, swimming out to the stranded sailors in the dark, fighting heavy seas, successfully bringing the men to safety. He was award-

ed the Coast Guard Medal for his conduct in the face of imminent personal danger. Wayne was the last commander of the Port Orford Lifeboat Station before it closed in 1970.

Don McMichael was the last executive officer at the Port Orford Lifeboat Station. Following retirement from the Coast Guard, he became one of the country's best-known marine artists. He specializes in marine mammals. When he dives into the ocean today, it is to be among the gray whales in California and Oregon or with the humpbacks during the winter months in Hawaii. What he sees there swims to life on canvas in his studio that overlooks the waters of Coos Bay, Oregon.

Port Orford artist Elaine Roemen will display her maritime art. Plus, several Coast Guard veterans, including some who served at the Port Orford Lifeboat Station will be present. For more information, visit www.portorfordlifeboatstation.org.

Port Strategic Planning

The Port of Port Orford held its first public Strategic Planning session on Wednesday, July 21. There were only three commissioners, the port manager and Planner Dave Cheramy of Maritime Consulting International in attendance. This Strategic Planning effort is being funded by the Oregon Economic and Community Development Department with a match from the Regional Investment Board. It was suggested as a first step to financial security by Governor Kulongoski when he visited the Port back in April.

Items that were covered were: Development of a Mission Statement, examination of the strengths and weaknesses of the port, opportunities and threats as well as financial history and trends from that history.

Specifically what was talked about was a permanent dredge solution that the port would take over, possible removal of the hook from the jetty, renegotiation of the \$500K loan with OECDD, introduction of incentive pricing with fishermen, diversification of revenue with a boatramp, overnight camping, redevelopment of the cannery for tourist related retail outlets and development of the Fourth and Washington property.

This was the first of four such Planning Sessions to which the public is invited and Dave Cheramy will facilitate. The next one is scheduled for August 18 at 6:00pm at the City Hall. If you have any suggestions or would like to be part of this process please plan to attend.


