Shetland Islands Experience By Evan Kramer

No, this isn't another travel article of our



experiences in the United Kingdom. Instead John Goodlad from the Shetland Islands came to Port Orford and spoke to a large public gathering at city hall on Monday night.

Leesa Cobb said that the Port Orford Ocean Resources Team was sponsoring the talk by Goodlad. She introduced Gil Sylvia from the Coastal Oregon Marine Experiment Station to introduce Goodlad. He said Goodlad was formerly head of the Shetland Islands fishermen's association and then head of the European fishermen's association. Goodlad now is a salmon and halibut farmer and fisheries consultant.

Goodlad was happy to report he had gone fishing earlier that day and caught a Chinook salmon. He said Port Orford reminded him of the Shetland Islands, which are located between Scotland and Norway in the North Sea. He described his talk being about small communities trying to make a living at sea.

Goodlad spoke about two initiatives that fishermen worked on and got going in the Shetland Islands including the Community Investment in Tradable Fish Quotas. He said tradable fish quotas were becoming the preferred method of managing fisheries around the world. Goodland said of the population of 23,000 people on the Shetland Islands twenty five percent of the people made their living through fishing either as fishermen, fish processors and related businesses. He said the Shetland Islands were surrounded by some of the best fishing grounds in the world.

Goodlad spoke about the Sectoral Quota System established in 1984 establishing fish quotas for all fish species. The ability to buy fish quotas came about in 1997 with the Shetland Fisheries Association purchasing 2,386 tons of the whitefish quotas. The purpose was to make sure the quotas didn't get purchased by fishermen from other countries and thus see the Shetland Islands lose their fishing industry. Another group called SLAP, composed of local government agencies, purchased 10,000 tons of fish quotas between 1999 and 2001. The SLAP quotas were used for renting many but not all quotas to new fishing entrants.

Goodlad said the whitefish industry had reduced in size since 1999 and seen

serious financial problems. But he noted that the pelagic species like herring and mackerel had been very profitable the past five years.

Goodlad spoke about the relevance to the Pacific coast and asked if there were well-defined and coherent fishing communities and fish processor groups.

Goodlad was asked where the Shetlands community got the money to buy the fish quotas and was told the capital came from North Shore oil. He said the fleet had been reduced by twenty five percent but the quotas remained the same. He said prior to 1984 every fishermen went to sea with a quota of how much fish they could catch. Goodlad said Port Orford was now where the Shetland Islands had been in 1983.

Goodlad said that scientists set the fish quotas for the Shetland Islands and that the scientists go on board fishing boats for assessments and that fishermen go on the science boats to watch their assessments.

Shetland Islands Experience Continued from Front Cover

Goodlad next talked about the Shetland Regulating Order (SRO) regarding the inshore fisheries. These include lobster, crabs, scallops and welk fished out to six miles from shore. Previously the only regulation was a British shellfish license. He said there was no local control and that local management was needed. He said the fishermen worked for establishment of a regionally based partnership, which became the Shetland Shellfish Management Organization founded in 1996. The organization includes representatives from the fishermen's association, government representatives, and one from the North Atlantic Fishery's Council and the environmental group Scottish Natural Heritage. Regulations were put in place for all shellfish within six miles of the coast. The regulations included a vessel size limitation, gear restriction for scallop dredges, restriction on the number of pots, closed areas and seasonal closures, minimum landing sizes and a restocking program for lobsters. The SRO granted 175 permits in March 2000. The program has been running now for four years. Goodland said if you didn't fish you lost your permit.

He said policing the agreement was difficult with one enforcement agent so it was left to fishermen to self-police themselves. Goodland described these as "bottom up" regulations.

Goodlad said getting funding for the project was difficult and spoke about extending it to other species. He also spoke about getting the catch certified under the Marine Stewardship Council, which means they could put a logo on the fish and fish products when they were sold to the public.


Goodlad said the success of the SRO was due to community consensus and em-

phasized again the importance of the bottom up decision-making process.

Curry County commissioner Ralph Brown told the group that the United States was moving towards centralization of control for the fishing industry. He said this was different from the rest of the world, which was going away from centralization and towards local control. Brown is a member of the Pacific Marine Fisheries Council, which often gets overruled by the National Marine Fisheries Service.

New Commander

The Port Orford American Legion has elected Owen Miller as its new commander. Miller replaced outgoing commander Frank Smith who had served in that position for 14 years. Miller thanked Frank Smith for his years of dedication and service to the American Legion. The Legion sponsors the local Boy Scout troop.



September Port Meeting By Jane Cramer

Commissioners Ed Dowdy, Dave Knapp, Evan Kramer and George Welch as well as Port Manager Gary Anderson were present at the September 21 regular meeting of the Port Commission. Commissioner Gifford Barnes was absent.

Under New Business the group discussed the sport fishing closure that was mandated with short notice right before the Labor Day holiday weekend. Anderson noted the Port lost about \$2,000 because of the closure while charter operators lost even more. Other community businesses such as motels, restaurants and stores were also adversely affected by the closure. Since 76% of the total groundfish catch is by sport fishermen, the quotas for sport fishing need to be adjusted to allow the season to run longer. Anderson advised the commissioners of scheduled meetings about the closures. One is October 11 in Brookings and the other is October12 in Bandon, Anderson will attend one of the meetings as a representative of the Port.

Another issue discussed was signage on the dock. Anderson has had several in-

quiries about allowing local businesses to place their signs on the dock as a method of advertising. Consensus of the commissioners was to allow dock tenants to place signs on their buildings. All other signs would not be allowed.

Anderson presented some literature on Grant Writing classes being conducted in early October and advised that he has registered for all of them. One of the class projects is for each student to write an actual grant proposal and submit it. A short discussion followed as to the best grant to pursue for this project.

Anderson and commissioners all expressed their regrets and best wishes for the Ashdown family on the sinking of the Andrea Marie and their relief that no lives were lost.

There was a discussion about changing the existing ordinance to allow larger boats to be hoisted since the current ordinance maximum is less than the hoists are certified to lift, which is 50,000 pounds. Some commissioners were concerned that lifting heavier boats would put too much strain on the cranes, eventually destroying them. Anderson is to research the situation by confirming

weights of boats being currently lifted and by discussing the matter with the Port's hydraulics expert.

Under Old Business commissioners discussed a letter from Congressman De-Fazio about his efforts to obtain dredging funds for small ports. This letter was sent in response to a letter from Anderson about the Port's dredging needs. Anderson feels that if we have a mild winter and the Nehalem dredge comes in and dredges the hole under the hoist three or four times we might be able to get through until summer.

The situation with La Frugata may be resolved with an offer by Dave Rickels to tow it down to Gold Beach for the owner.

Anderson advised that three of the five fuel vendors solicited had returned bids. Winning vendor was Hodge Oil Company, whose bid was lowest both for diesel and unleaded.

Anderson then reported on his efforts to find a solution to the problem of liability insurance for vendors and service contractors. After a brief discussion, commissioners requested that Anderson continue to research the situation.

During a discussion of the Manager's Report Anderson told commissioners about a special meeting scheduled for Monday, September 27 in the Council Chambers on the subject of community based management. Commissioners agreed to try to attend the meeting.

Additionally this month, two women's workout facilities will waive their membership sign-up fees for women who get a mammogram the week of Oct 11; or for women who attend the Curry General Hospital women's health screenings, Oct. 1, 14 and 23. Curves For Women, located in Brookings, will waive its normal \$149 fee, and the Circuit Workout in Gold Beach will waive its \$100 fee. In Gold Beach, patients can schedule screening mammograms Mondays and Wednesdays in Curry General Hospital, 94220 Fourth St.

Some women may be eligible for free mammograms and pap smears through the federal Breast and Cervical Cancer Program. For appointments, or for information on free mammograms, patients can phone (541) 247-3117; or toll-free, 1-800-445-8085, ext. 117.

The American Cancer Society recommends annual mammograms after 40; clinical breast exams every three years for women 20 to 39, and annually starting at 40; and a thorough, monthly breast self-exam beginning at age 20. Women at increased risk - those with a personal or family history of breast cancer - should talk with their doctor about the screening plan that is right for them. Excluding skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer in women. Advances in early detection and treatment, however, are allowing more women to conquer the disease. Death rates from breast cancer declined significantly from 1992 to 1998, especially in young women.

I originally wrote this back in February 2004. I lost it in a stack of papers, then recently found it. I just want the public to know where their tax dollars are going.

I've recently notice the \$32,000 worth of repairs to the bleachers at Pacific High School. In my opinion I just don't see it. Oh sure I see a dozen boards replaced, new hand rails, bolts, and some rollers. All of which needs replaced, especially the hand rails which has been an OSHA requirement for years.

The boards, which should've been 1 1/4" or 1 ½" - 1 X 3's vertical grain Doug Fir, in reality are 1 ½" Flat grain laminated wood stock. Which doesn't match the original boards. Laminated are boards that are glued together not a solid board.

Where I usually sit, and I'm a big fan of Basketball, there are tow boards that are wood filled or glued together. Why not two new boards? At 32 grand certainly we could've afforded them.

My main concern is that I don't see \$32,000 worth of repairs that comes out of PHS's budget.

Follow the Money Online

Secretary of State Bill Bradbury unveiled a new online campaign finance database, allowing the public to follow the money from the comfort of their own computer. By providing campaign finance information online, the Secretary of State has exponentially increased the ability of the public to access that information. "Open access and full disclosure of the money behind a campaign protects the public's trust in the election system and helps people cast an informed vote," said Bradbury.

Bradbury earlier this year convened a nonpartisan panel to recommend improvements in the campaign finance system in order to "make it easy to follow the money." The panel unanimously found that the state should pursue continuous online reporting and a web based

searchable system. This new online database demonstrates Bradbury's commitment to improving campaign finance disclosure, and online access to PDF's is an interim step towards reaching the panel's recommendations.

Pre-election contribution and expenditure reports for the November general election were due last night in the Elections Division, and, for the first time, those reports are available online. The online database provides a summary and a PDF of the full report, allowing the public significant access to information until a complete online campaign finance system can be developed. The new online campaign finance database allows you to search by committee name, by year and office, by ballot measure number, or by various other combinations.

To search for campaign finance information, visit the Elections Division website, click on "Campaign Finance," then "Oregon Campaign Finance Database," then choose your search parameters. The system also allows the public to save money on copy fees by printing out the campaign finance reports themselves. The web address is egov.sos.state.or.us/elec images/c&e search.html.



Court Backs Bradbury

The U.S. Supreme Court today denied Ralph Nader's petition to overturn the Oregon State Supreme Court. Nader failed to gain access to the Oregon ballot at the beginning of this month, falling 218 signatures short of the statutorily required amount. A Marion County judge then placed Nader back on the ballot, but last week the Oregon Supreme Court found that the judge had erred and ruled in favor of Bradbury's fraud prevention procedures. This ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court is final, and independent presidential candidate Ralph Nader and vice-presidential candidate Sandra Kucera will not appear on the Oregon ballot.

"I appreciate the Supreme Court's consideration," said Bradbury, "and I'm thankful that elections remain the province of the states, that our ballots are accurate, and that our protections against fraud will stand."

Ballots without Nader's name have already begun printing, and will be mailed to 1.9 million Oregon voters beginning October 15.

2CJ Student Are Best!

At the September 14 meeting of the 2CJ School Board, Superintendent Ott reported that the Port Orford/Langlois School District was the only district in Coos and Curry Counties that last year had all its schools meet Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under the 'No Child Left Behind' testing program. Only 64% of Oregon schools overall and 23% of Oregon high schools met AYP. He said that 2CJ writing scores are higher than those of any other district in the two-county area, and the World Newspaper plans to run an article highlighting this accomplishment.

Ott said that school was off to a smooth start. Enrollment is down from last year by about 10 students.

The board, considering an appeal on the challenge to the Newspapers in Education program, upheld the recommendation of the committee formed to investigate the challenge. As reported in the account of the July board meeting, the committee had recommended that the NIE program be continued.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 12 at 7:00pm in the PHS library.


