Voters Prefer Incumbents By Evan Kramer



Voters in Oregon and in Curry County decided to stick with the incumbents running for office in the November 2 election. All five Oregon Congress people were reelected and all by

healthy margins. Nine term Congressman Peter DeFazio beat challenger Jim Feldkamp in a hard fought campaign by a 60.7 to 37.7 margin and will return to Washington in January for a tenth term. U.S. Senator Ron Wyden facing token opposition from underfunded Republican challenger Al King beat him by a 2-1 margin.

Two term State Representative Wayne Krieger won a handy victory over challenger Dr. Charlie Hochberg with a 64 to 35 percent victory. State Senate Seat First District was an open seat and Roseburg Republican Jeff Kruse beat Roseburg Democrat Bruce Cronk by a 2-1 margin. Ken Messerle who was redistricted out of Curry County had held the seat until 2002. Senator Bill Fisher was "districted" into Curry County but chose not to run for reelection. Kruse joins a Republican Senate caucus that lost three

seats with the State Senate now 18 Democrats and 12 Republicans.

Democrats Bill Bradbury (Secretary of State); Randall Edwards (Treasurer) and Hardy Myers (Democrat) were all reelected. Only Bradbury of the three won in Curry County.

Curry County voters stuck with the two incumbent county commissioners and reelected Democrat Lucie La Bonte and Republican Marilyn Schafer. La Bonte narrowly edged Republican challenger Craig Mickeslon with independent candidate Stephen Bradley getting a little more than nine percent of the vote. Curry County Treasurer Isabella Brock handily won reelection over challenger Linda James. County Clerk Renee Kolen and Sheriff Mark Metcalf were reelected with no opposition.


The face of the Port Orford City Council will change in January 2005 because of the election. The city will have a new mayor, Jim Auborn, who will replace two-term mayor Gary Doran. Auborn ran unopposed and is currently on the city council. Long time city council (13 years in two different stretches) Carl Eskelson was the top vote getter on the council with 389 votes. Steve Abbott and Milton Finch finished second and third and will join the council in January.

Incumbent Emily Francona finished in fourth place. Councilor Jim Campbell did not run for reelection along with Mayor Doran and both have just two more months to serve. They both deserve a big round of applause and thanks for their service to our City over the years.

Jim Auborn will resign from the city council after the first of the year creating an opening on the council. He will choose a person to replace him with the consent of the city council. Auborn said in an email they would wait a few weeks to decide on whether to advertise for the position or not. As soon as it is decided how to proceed on his replacement it will be publicized in this paper. City voters by nearly a 2-1 margin approved the four-year Police Levy proving voters will increase their taxes if they approve where the money is going. The proposed new City Charter was defeated by a 57-42 percent margin.

Oregon voters bucked the national trend and gave their seven electoral votes to John Kerry. 27 of Oregon's 36 counties voted for President Bush and 9 went for Senator John Kerry. The Democratic challenger won by enough of a margin in Multnomah County (Portland) to win the state. He beat President Bush by a

Build a New Library By Evan Kramer

The Port Orford Public Library is in the midst of fundraising efforts in order to build a new library. They have the land for the library, which was donated a few years ago and a set of architectural plans for the building. Now they need the money to build it.

So far the Library Foundation has raised over \$350,000 for the planned 10,600 square foot building. It is now expected the structure and furnishings will cost \$1,700,000 which includes \$140,000 for site development (Fifteenth and Highway 101), \$1,175,000 for the building, and \$145,000 for furnishings and equipment. There are other expenses including a 5% contingency feel and fees for permits, testing and surveys.

It sounds like an intimidating amount of money still to raise but I have confidence in Library Director Tobe Porter and the Library Foundation, Friends of the Library and Library Board. This is a large group of people who left personal politics at the door and committed themselves to building a new library and they'll do it. They have several major grants they have submitted, which are pending and four, which have been approved.

Costs for the new library have gone up \$300,000 since it was originally planned because of the rise in cost of materials. The people behind building our new library have come up with a new fundraising effort called the \$100,000 campaign. Two anonymous donors have agreed to tackle a \$100,000 amount. The Friends of the Library and members of the community will take on raising \$100,000 and the Library Board and staff will take on the third \$100,000.

Here's the part where we the public comes in. We can help raise the \$100,000 by asking our friends, relatives, acquaintances, and business associates to help build our library. Tobe Porter has written a letter, which you can get copies of at the library. The letter includes an overview of the situation and requests tax-deductible funds to support the new library. People interested in helping achieve the \$100,000 goal would get one or as many as they like of Tobe's letters and send them out to people. Each letter comes with a return envelope and an envelope to mail out. There is room at the end of Tobe's letter to personalize the letter with a written request from the sender.

It sounds like a good idea to me and I asked for several sets of materials to send out. Tobe Porter told me that people donating to the \$100,000 campaign wouldn't be put on a mailing list for future contributions. The library folks are hoping to get the fundraising letters out by November 30 so contributions received can get their tax deduction for 2004.

"\$300,000 Challenge" is On! By Tobe Porter, Library Director

The good news is that we have a realistic funding plan that is well underway to raise the original estimate of \$1.4 million to build the new Port Orford Public Library. The bad news is that due to unforeseen inflation, construction costs have risen by 30%, which means we need an additional \$300.000.

We didn't know how we could raise those additional funds until we came up with "The \$300,000 Challenge." Three groups were formed: two anonymous donors, the Library Boards and Staff, and the Friends of the Library along with other community members. Each group made the commitment to try to raise \$100,000 through personal and professional contacts.

We ask you to join this challenge: become an ambassador for the Port Orford Public Library and ask your personal and professional contacts to send a tax-deductible donation. To make it easy, we've prepared a "Campaign Packet" that includes a letter explaining the project and need, a self-addressed envelope with a donation transmittal form, and a mailing envelope. All you need to do is think of people to ask, come by the library to pick up the materials, include a personal note if you want to, and mail the packets. There are only two rules to this Challenge: you can't donate your own money, and you can't ask anyone in the Port Orford Community.

Coos-Curry Electric Update

The Board has interviewed three different audit firms and selected Moss–Adams, LLP as CCEC's new auditor ending a 47-year history with the previous auditor. The Audit will be done on time, complete and correct.

Most of the Employee Performance Evaluations have now been completed for all employees. The evaluations help identify areas of expertise or need for improvement, areas that would benefit by continuing education seminars, and, identifies management's expectations. Several employees have reached retirement options and CCEC will have a plan in place to train or hire replacement people, as needed, for those positions.

The changes from the budget planning for 2004, our past operations in the red, the need for the increase in the Basic Service Rate and Bonneville's per kWh rate increase, and, changes in personnel or management require that the budget for 2005 be carefully constructed, and approved by January 2005.





Voters Prefer Incumbents Continued from Front Cover

71.58% to 27.15% vote collecting 245,733 votes to Bush's 93,219. Kerry won Oregon by 69,040 votes. The rural counties went for President Bush including Curry County, which favored the President by a 57-41 percent margin.

Curry County voters were on the winning side in seven of the eight ballot measures. They voted the losing way only on Ballot Measure 35, a Constitutional Amendment that would have limited non-economic damages recoverable for patient injuries. Measure 35 was defeated by 15,000 votes statewide but narrowly carried in Curry County.

To clear up a few questions people have asked - over votes means people voted for more than one candidate for the same office, under votes means they didn't vote for any of the above, and people also have the option of connecting the line for write-in votes and placing a written name on their ballot. It's normal to see lots of under votes when candidates run unopposed. And last but not least of those people registered to vote in Curry County a whopping 88.9% voted!
