Tsunami Warnings Signs By Evan Kramer



The Port Orford City Council met on Tuesday night last week and both the council and public viewed some graphic video of the recent tsunamis in Southeast Asia.

Mayor Jim Auborn announced that citizen's concerns would be at the end of the meeting in February.

Steward Parmele from the accounting firm of Michael Piels reviewed the completed 2003-04 audit with the council. Parmele said the accounting records were adequate for the audit and that the city staff did a very good job providing information to the accounting firm. Mayor Auborn noted that the audit reports were being done on time. He said a copy of the audit would be available for the public to read at the Port Orford Library. City administrator Ken Knight complimented city financial officer Dave Johnson for his efforts.

Curry County Emergency Services Coordinator Mike Murphy gave a brief presentation on tsunamis. Murphy told the public there would be an in depth public forum to discuss the issue in Port Orford in March. He described a tsunami as a major surge of water traveling at 50 miles per hour. He showed some short video footage of the some of the tsunamis and the damage that occurred recently in the Indian Ocean. Murphy said we have a tsunami warning system in the Pacific Ocean. He said Garrison Lake and the houses around the lake would be at risk during a tsunami. He described two kinds of tsunamis - one being caused from a long distance away that could take 2-3 hours to reach Port Orford and secondly an earthquake in the subduction zone off Port Orford where there would be no warning time. Murphy urged people to head both inland and "up" after an earthquake. Murphy said the county has tsunami route signs available. Councilor Milton Finch made a motion to have the public works director work with the county and put up the tsunami signs and get the evacuation routes posted. The motion passed 6-0.

Paul Hewitt spoke under citizen's concerns. He told the council he had made several donations to the police department. He said he had been working with former police chief Bill Rush on the radar speed trailer. The City paid Hewitt's company H & H Custom Solutions \$2,750 as a deposit for the speed trailer on August 20, 2004. City administrator Ken Knight sent Hewitt a letter recently

advising him that the City "expects" delivery of the trailer within 30 days or it wants a refund of the deposit. Hewitt does custom work and does not give refunds so the electronics package part of the trailer is now in city hands.

City Attorney John Trew said he had spoken with CIS insurance company regarding police chief George Simon and they had no issue with continuing the city's insurance with the current chief. Mayor Auborn said that Simon had an executive certificate when he retired and that it was fairly common for cities to hire retired police chiefs. Auborn said the council would want someone currently certified when they hire the permanent police chief.

Mary Loan told the council that citizen's concerns should stay right where they are on the agenda and that it was every citizen's right to express their opinion. City Recorder Beverly Manes told the public if they turn in a letter to the Mayor on or before the Tuesday before the council meeting they could get their issue put on the agenda.

Caroline Clancy urged the council to look at the water/sewer bills from the point of view of the people who live in the City and not look after speculators and out of towners. She said the base rate had increased over 300% in the past few years.

Next on the agenda were departmental reports. The city Administrator said the city would be moving forward on the water master plan and be advertising it locally in both papers.

The public works department will look into buying a generator for the Hubbard Creek water impoundment and one for the water treatment plant.

Police Chief George Simon told the council that hundreds of bottles of medicine, which had been stored at the police department, had been disposed of properly. He said this medicine had come from

homes of people who had died. Simon said the police department didn't have its files computerized. He spoke of our department getting connected to the LEDS (Law Enforcement Data System). Simon said the Sheriff's Department has a complete record system and our department doesn't have access to it. Ken Knight said there would be budgeted items in the 2005-06 budget for updating the system.

Councilor Jerry Steinhorst and now Parks Commission member talked about plans for the Pinehurst Boat dock and a small beach at the Twelfth Street boat launch. Councilor Carl Eskelson told the council that roads should be up to city standards or the city shouldn't accept them. (There is a possibility of Coast Guard Hill Road becoming a city road).

Steve Donovan, SHN project engineer for the water treatment plant upgrade and effluent outfall projects discussed Change Order #5 with the council. He said it wouldn't cost the City anything. It pro-

vides more time for the contractor Laskey-Clifton to finish the sewer treatment plant upgrades that were to have achieved "substantial completion" by January 24. Donovan said the final completion date would be February 24. Laskey-Clifton is asking for 14 extra days to complete their work and for getting that, they will give the city \$6,000 worth of extra work for free. Donovan said the delay was caused by a supplier in getting the clarifier to Port Orford. Milton Finch made a motion to accept Change Order # 5 and it passed 4-2 with Finch, Abbott, Eskelson, and Beck voting yes and Campbell and Steinhorst voting no.

Deneen Kahman, city ordinance compliance officer, gave a report to the council. She said they had made progress on the Eleventh Street property. She talked about the recent citation issued to a homeowner regarding stabling a horse and said the citation was issued for a health and safety

issue, not a nuisance ordinance. Kahman said the City needs animal ordinances and should look to the community and other cities for ideas.

The council passed a motion setting water rates for contractors using the hydrant at Nineteenth and Idaho Streets. Staff recommended \$50.00 for the first 1,000 gallons per two month billing cycle plus \$5.00 for each additional 1,000 gallons and that the contractor has a valid business license. The motion passed 6-0.

Jim Campbell made a motion to accept the consent calendar and it passed 6-0. Items on the consent calendar including a Proclamation naming February 23, 2005 as Rotary Centennial Day in the City of Port Orford and a Proclamation proclaiming January 30 through April 4, 2005 as a "Season for Non Violence". January 30 marks the day Mahatma Ghandi was assassinated and April 4 is the day Dr. Martin Luther King was assassinated. As part of the consent calendar Howard Lichtig was reappointed as municipal judge. The council next meets on Tuesday, Feb. 22.

January Port Meeting By Jane Cramer

Commissioners Gifford Barnes, Ed Dowdy and George Welch, as well as Port Manager Gary Anderson were present at the January 18 regular meeting of the Port Commission. Commissioners Dave Knapp and Evan Kramer were absent.

There was no public comment so the commission proceeded directly to Old Business.

Anderson gave a status report on the Ice Machine Grant. Some of the money already awarded has been spent to get the freezers in working order. There is \$20,100 unspent so far. Cost of the ice machine is \$20,352, shipping and installation would be an additional \$1,500 each or \$3,000 out of pocket expenses for the Port. Anderson stated there was still \$13,000 left in the Rural Investment Board's grant pool, with an application deadline of January 20. He proposed that the Port fill out a grant application with RIB for the difference in the cost of the ice machine, shipping and installation and the \$20,100 funding already in hand.

He also proposed that the Port and the Library each apply for a \$2,500 grant toward the cost of a survey of residents in the Port and Library districts, which cover the same area. The survey is necessary in the event that either or both of the districts would want to apply for a Com-

munity Development Block Grant. Although the two grant applications would be separate, they would enable the Port and the Library to partner in the survey.

Barnes moved and Welch seconded that Anderson apply for a grant for the survey money as well as a grant for the additional money for the ice machine.

Anderson advised he would be attending an Oregon State Marine Board Grant Workshop on February 1 & 2.

Dowdy has requested that an update on progress in meeting Strategic Plan goals become a regular agenda item. A discussion followed in which the commission

determined that one goal had been met – raising of dockage fees – and a start had been made toward three more goals.

Dowdy gave an overview of the DEQ assessment of the contamination on the upper lot and the three possible solutions, which ranged from \$3,000 to \$90,000 in cost. After some discussion, commissioners asked Anderson to invite DEQ representatives down for a conference with the commission about the merits of the individual options.

The commissioners reviewed correspondence that ranged from tsunami warning time to dredging needs to the possibility

of Anderson making a trip to Washington DC.

Under New Business, Anderson presented a list of possible fee increases for daily dockage and use of the boneyard, which may be needed in light of the recent increase in monthly fees. Anderson is to monitor the situation to see if additional increases are needed

The commission also reviewed a recent letter from Anderson to OECDD reviewing the Port's financial situation and intent to work toward paying off the loan. No response has been received from OECDD yet.

Anderson raised an issue of how vacation pay for Port employees should be awarded. After several suggestions were given, Anderson was instructed to research other personnel policies and report back with a proposal for the Port.

Anderson reviewed information he had gathered about what would be needed to put in an RV park at the Port. Jeff Miles suggested they could just start by providing parking (with no services) for a fee

and then add services and develop into a full RV park later. This plan was adopted.

Bob Bailey, Coastal Program Manager for Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development has proposed possible funding for a city-port cooperative planning project or Master Plan for this area. Anderson will get started with an application for funding and meet with Bailey and City Administrator, Ken Knight.

After a review of the Manager's Report, Anderson discussed the need for a new computer in the Port office. There is money available for this need. Anderson was instructed to proceed with the purchase after checking prices with various dealers.

After a review of the Financial Report, the meeting was adjourned.



It's a good time to join the Friends of the Library. This group meets the first Tuesday of most every month in the City Council Chambers to plan book sales, bazaars and other activities to raise money for computers, new shelving, program speakers and much more. The Library Board voted to change our Computer and Internet Use Policy to bring it more in line with other libraries around the state. As of February 1, we will no longer require written permission from a parent or guardian for a minor (under age 18) to use the Internet. That means any young person 10 and older may use the Internet. A library does not serve in loco parentis (in place of a parent), and our staff cannot provide constant supervision of children as they explore the Internet. We strongly urge parents and guardians to set guidelines for their children's Internet use, and we offer a handout called Child Safety on

the Information Highway to help you in this effort. Children under 10 may use the Internet only when accompanied by a parent, guardian or an adult sibling.

Thanks to the Friends of the Library, we will soon have another Internet computer available for public use. We know our regular web surfers will be delighted to hear that. In the meantime, catch a wave between the pages of *Surfer Magazine*, just one of the many kinds of reading material waiting for you at the Port Orford Public Library.
