It's John Prine Time By Evan Kramer



I may not have been writing much about road trips, but I did get a good one in this past weekend. One of my all time favorite singer/songwriters is John Prine and he is currently on tour.

Prine is a little bit folksinger, a little bit country a little bit rock, and a great poet to boot. As part of the west coast swing of his concert tour he stopped in Portland and played at the Portland Paramount Theater (now known as the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall) in downtown last Friday night. I went up there with my friend Malcolm Young and his long time friend of 30 years from Denver, Michael Sherva, Malcolm drove his Volvo "town car" to Portland and we got there with plenty of time to spare before the concert on Friday night. That meant a trip to Powell's, the world's biggest bookstore. Then we took a trip on the Portland Streetcar to Twenty Third Street to eat dinner at one of Portland's legendary and reopened restaurant's Rose's Deli. Then we hopped back on the streetcar and took it back to within a few blocks of the Paramount and eagerly walked over and into the theater. The three of us had seen John Prine at other times in his

career but we all felt a lot of anticipation over Friday night's performance.

The show began with folksinger-song-writer Tom Russell and by the end of his 40-minute set, Russell had the people in the palm of his hand – not easy for many opening acts where the audience can hardly wait for the headliner. Russell's style of music is described as Americana and his current album is called Hotwalker. One of the best guitar players I've ever heard, Andrew Hardin, accompanied him on guitar. Every time Hardin got a solo the audience would reward him with a generous round of applause.


John Prine came on stage at 9:00pm and began his set with some of his material from the 1970's albums starting with the anthem-like "Spanish Pipe Dream" and followed with "Your Flag Decal Won't Get You Into Heaven Anymore." Prine explained that he had retired that song in 1978 and put it on his mantelpiece. He said he had no desire to play it again but recent political events called for it to be brought back into his repertoire. That song brought many in the crowd to their feet. Prine played songs from his entire career including his latest album entitled "Fair and Square". He told a few stories in between and stayed on stage until 11:30pm for a final song with Tom Russell and Andrew Hardin joining him. All this from a 58 year old man who survived a bout with squamous cell carcinoma in his neck seven years ago and who has an artificial hip. Someone yelled out "Thank you John" towards the end of his two and a half hour show and the smile on his face then and during the concert showed a man who enjoyed performing for the nearly 2,500 people in the auditorium.

The next day we took a trip on the new MAX rapid transit yellow line from Lloyd Center to the Exposition Center. This is MAX's newest line and goes through one of the more interesting parts of Portland along Interstate Boulevard.

When we got back to Lloyd Center we ate at Burgerville. This is a small chain of fast food restaurants that specializes in local Oregon and Washington products. They feature Oregon Country Beef and when in season serve Walla Walla onion rings and blackberry milkshakes. Cattle ranchers selling their beef under the Oregon Country Beef brand cannot feed their cattle any animal by-products, antibiotics and hormonal implants.

Later on that afternoon we drove over to Hawthorne Boulevard which is the hip home of the Baghdad Theater (see "What the Bleep Do We (k)now!?" which features the Baghdad Theater). We planned

City Budget By Jay Stoler

The Port Orford City Budget Committee met for rounds four and five on Tuesday, May 17 and Monday, May 23 for two hours in each session. Here is a summary of those meetings.

The budget committee tentatively added the Old City Jail as a line item, creating a new mini-park at the corner of Jackson and 7th and preserving an historical asset. The new park was allotted \$2,100 from the Tourism and Beautification fund, for repair, maintenance and some transfer of ownership fees that will come due in the next few months.

A key variable in the mix is the "unappropriated ending balance" which in effect is a floating reserve. This number changed by nearly \$100,000 over the course of meetings as the Committee searched for the ways and means to fully fund all departments. The starting figure was about \$129,000 and dipped to about \$27,000 during various scenarios. The low-end number would not be enough to tide the city over in the first fiscal quarter until tax revenues came in around October according to City Administrator Ken

Knight. That number is still up in the air at this point and will be reworked for the next session.

Desperately in need of a crystal ball the Committee questioned and quarreled, in a positive way, over every aspect of the budget, especially manpower. Only after justification for every person and position in question, they consensually agreed to not eliminate any positions or personnel. However, in a strange twist the Committee voted 5 to 4 to hire another laborer, but the four no votes were cast by City Councilors; Beck, Campbell, Finch and Eskelson. This group agreed the need for a laborer was real, but instead of cutting current personnel or positions, they would prefer to "postpone" the hiring of the laborer for six to twelve months and save \$12,000 or more dollars that would go to increase the ending balance. It looks like that decision will be reversed by a majority of the Council in the very near future.

During the review of the Police budget Chief Mark Creighton was asked about the optimal size of the police department. Creighton said six officers would be needed for 24 hour / 7 day service. Councilor Milton Finch asked about coverage in the Urban Growth area just

outside city limits. Creighton said there are calls for service from the UGB area but he only goes in emergencies when requested by the Sheriff's Department. Creighton said that for the outlying area to participate a Police District could be formed. Committee chair Gary Doran said that when he was Mayor he and the former Chief looked into a Police District but ran into a lot of resistance. Councilor Finch said that he is hearing from people in the UGB area that would be open to forming a special district as a way to fund full local protection.

The Committee will hold a sixth session on Wednesday, May 25 at 6:00 pm in City Hall Council Chamber. This will most likely be the final session.



05-17 A report of a female transient unlawfully entered a building during a storm for shelter, and was refusing to leave. Officer contact was made, and the




subject decided to leave without further incident.

SAFETY TIP: Remember when summer arrives so do many transient people. Keep your home, and vehicle doors locked as much as possible. When you lock your vehicle doors always remember to hide valuables from sight. We have a large amount of people committing car clouts up and down the Oregon Coast during summer months. These people check out parked vehicles, and look for valuables. They usually drive into a parking lot, then get out and check

vehicles by looking through the windows. When they see something like a purse or other valuable, they break the window, take the item, and quickly leave the area. If you see someone suspicious pull into a parking lot, and start looking through vehicles, copy down the license plate and report it to the police.

Chiefs note: illegal U-turns; Oregon Revised Statute 811.365 states that a person commits the offense of making an illegal U-turn if the person is operating a vehicle, and the person turns a vehicle so as to proceed in the opposite direction in any of the following places (a) within an intersection where it is controlled by an electrical signal (b) upon a highway within the limits of an incorporated city between intersections (d) at any place upon a highway where the vehicle cannot be seen by another driver approaching from either direction within a distance of 500 feet within an incorporated city.

School Board May Meeting by Nancy Dowdy

The 2CJ School Board met in regular session on Monday, May 9 in the Pacific High School (PHS) Library. Board members in attendance were: Virginia Hughes (Chair), Liz Brady, Alan Brown, Joseph Brown, Nancy Dowdy, Gail Rathbun, and Shirley Van Loo.

Awards were presented to the 3rd quarter most improved students: Kristy Watson from PHS, Nathaniel LaFlamme from Blanco Elementary, Tashina Taylor from Blanco Middle School, Michael Daniels from Driftwood Elementary, and Jeremy Johnston from Driftwood Middle School.

Stacy Romele, President of the Port Orford Arts Council (POAC), presented a plan for improving the appearance of the deteriorated fence at Driftwood School and raising money to buy supplies for art classes. POAC would collect spare plywood pieces, cut them into fish shapes, and paint them with a primer coat of paint. Each student would be asked to paint his or her fish, which would be hung on the Driftwood fence in an artistic arrangement to dress it up. Members of the community would be asked to sponsor a fish for \$10, and the money collected would be used to buy badly needed supplies for art classes. In addition POAC will seek grant money to replace the old fence. The Board thought it was a great idea and encouraged POAC to go ahead.

The Senior Class presented their plans for the senior trip to Sunriver over Memorial Day weekend. 19 seniors have signed up, and there will be six chaperones and a bus driver along. After some discussion, the Board enthusiastically approved the trip.

In personnel action, the Board approved a contract as Jr. High Asst. Track Coach for Jamey Freitag, accepted a letter of resignation from Millie Geller, and declined to reopen consideration of a job share request by Amy Brown.

Adam House reported on technology in the district. Each school now has a media cart — outfitted with a computer, speakers, and projector — that can be checked out by any teacher to show videos previously downloaded or using real time digital streaming. The PHS building network is completely wireless now, which makes it possible to move computers around and access the Internet from anywhere in the building. The district website is being improved constantly; check it out at www.2cj.com. A technology plan is in place to continue updating the equipment and improving its usefulness in instruction.

Superintendent Marvin Ott reported that scholarship funds for graduating seniors stand at \$392,000 and are growing, thanks in large part to the efforts of Jerry Cox. 47% of PHS students achieved a grade point average of 3.0 or better and only 17% received one or more failing grades.

In workshops in April and May, the Board worked out the next steps in the strategy for eventually having all schools on a single campus at the PHS site. A staged plan for the buildings would be developed so that as money for construction becomes available, possibly from the sale of unused property, it can be put into construction immediately. Otherwise it is difficult to protect unspent money for future construction. The 7th and 8th grades would be the first to be moved since these students could benefit most from access to high school classes.

The next regular Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, June 13 at 7:00pm in the PHS library. A Board workshop to evaluate Board performance against goals during this school year will begin at 6:00pm, preceding the regular meeting. The public is encouraged to come to any of these meetings and provide input. Further information may be obtained by calling the district office at 348-2337.

Bus Service Restored

Curry Public Transit General Manger Bill Dooley announced last week that service is being restored on the southbound bus runs from Port Orford to Gold Beach and Brooking as of Monday, May 23, 2005. The money, which Curry Public Transit needed to restore bus service, materialized through political intervention. The Oregon Department of Transportation Public Transit Division issued a memorandum of understanding that allocated the money to resume bus service. Then the Curry County Board of Commissioners stepped in and voted in special session to grant an emergency line of credit to Curry Public Transit to get the buses rolling immediately. They will be reimbursed by ODOT. Now you can get a bus four times a day from Ray's Place Market transporting you to the two cities south of Port Orford. Bus service north to Langlois, Bandon, Coos Bay and North wasn't curtailed during this crisis and continues its normal schedule.

The four southbound buses leave Port Orford at 8:00am (except Saturday), 10:40am, 2:15pm, and 4:40pm.
