Time to Vote by Evan Kramer

The Curry County Elections Department will be mailing out the ballots for the May 16 primary election no sooner than Friday, April 28 and no later than May 2. The Voter Pamphlets came out last week and if you didn't receive one there's plenty of "extras" at the local Post Office which people have left behind.

There are two ways to get your ballot counted. One is to mail it in. Chief Deputy County Clerk Connie Higgins said that it's best to get your ballot in the mail no later than May 12. Postmarks don't count and ballots not received by Tuesday, May 16, 8:00pm won't get counted. A popular alternative to mailing in your ballot is the drop off location in the Port Orford City Hall council chambers. You can drop your ballot off starting the week of May 8 from 9:00am-4:30pm and on May 15 same times. May 16 the county will operate the ballot drop off site from 7:00am to 8:00pm.

Higgins told me if you haven't received your ballot by May 5 that you should contact the Elections Department. Their toll free phone number is 1-877-739-4218.

As for the spring primary election it's not as busy as the 2004 primary election but

there are two hotly contested races. One is for Curry County Commissioner to replace the retiring Ralph Brown. There are 5 Republicans and 2 Democrats running for the chance to represent their political party in the November election. The Curry County Commission is a three person board. There are eleven candidates (three Democrats and eight Republicans) vying to become Oregon's next governor including incumbent Democratic governor Ted Kulongoski running for a second four year term.

Dancing in the Streets

The theme of this year's Port Orford July 4 Jubilee is "Dancing in the Streets". July 4 is on Tuesday this year and there will be events going on starting the weekend of July 1 through Independence Day. Forms for people who want to run a concession booth at Battle Rock Park on July 4 are now available and may be picked up at Chetco Federal Credit Union. The spaces at the park are for non-profit and commercial entries. The entry fee is \$20 and must be paid in advance of setting up your booth. People selling food items must have a current permit issued by the Curry County Health Department. Booths may be set up starting at 8:00pm on July 3 or on the morning of July 4 at 7:00am.

The Jubilee Auction is set for Saturday night, May 20, 6:30pm, at the Community Building. The Jubilee Committee has a great bunch of donations which will be auctioned off with proceeds going towards purchasing the fireworks.

Lichtig New Circuit Court Judge

Last week Governor Ted Kulongoski announced he had chosen Port Orford attorney and Langlois resident Howard Lichtig to replace Judge Hugh Downer on the Circuit Court. Downer is retiring on April 30. Howard Lichtig currently practices law in Coos and Curry County and will be closing up his practice in anticipation of becoming the Circuit Court Judge. It is expected he will be sworn in at the County Courthouse on May 20.

Howard Lichtig has served as the Port Orford Municipal Court Judge since 1998. He will serve one more time in May in that position before leaving to become the Circuit Court judge. He has been a sole practitioner in Port Orford and Coos Bay since 1990 with emphasis on bankruptcy law, probate and personal injury.

Lichtig was a member of the Langlois Library Foundation Board for eight years

We need to be working together to prevent and deter crime in our community.

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Awareness Campaign

In November, the Curry Health Foundation was the recipient of a \$5000 grant from the Oregon Community Foundation (OCF) to promote charitable giving and highlight the important work of the Foundation in Curry County.

Realizing that smaller foundations can not afford the advertising costs to build awareness like large charities, the Oregon Community Foundation supplied the funds for a concentrated media campaign in May and October of 2006 using television, radio and print ads throughout Curry County as well as capitalizing on the Curry Health Foundation's website: www.curryhealthfoundation.com

The Oregon Community Foundation, established in 1973 and with assets exceeding \$800 million, has managed charitable funds donated by individuals, families, and businesses to enhance and support the quality of life in their communi-

ties. The OCF also manages half of the Curry Health Foundation endowment and have previously provided a grant to the Foundation for the "Leave a Legacy Locally" campaign.

Among the community leaders, health care professionals, and Curry Health Foundation board members participating in the awareness campaign include Lori Kent from Curry County Home Health and Hospice, Dan Brattain from Cal-Ore Life Flight, Mark Williams from Curry Good Samaritan Center in Brookings, and Curry Health Foundation Board President Dale Thomas.

"Rural areas present a challenge for providing adequate and affordable health care. For over a decade, the Foundation has been developing a legacy of helping to bring advanced technologies, like CT scanning, and new services, like the cardiac health center, to our communities," said Thomas.

Through a separate grant from the Regional Investment Board, the Curry Health Foundation is now able to provide helpful planned giving information which can be emailed to the public on a weekly basis by signing up on the Gift Law web page on the Foundation website.

The Gift Law pages contain articles and updates about current legislation and lobbying, case studies of real situations and challenges relevant to financial advisors and the planned giving community, as well as opinions the IRS is giving taxpayers about planned giving and its tax implications.

"The essence of planned giving and charitable estate planning is the creation of a plan that expresses your personal values through the integration of philanthropic, family, and financial goals. Gift planning can significantly affect your life

Become a "Key Contributor"

CurryISP, the local non-profit Internet Service Provider (ISP) is talking to community groups and local citizens this week asking them to become Key Contributors of its broadband (high speed) internet project.

"We've got the technical, operations and business know-how to design and deploy a high speed internet network," said Ed McQuade, a founding member of CurryISP, "and now we need community Supporters to prove to the USDA Community Connect grant folks we're committed to getting broadband internet here."

CurryISP, Inc. was formed by Ed McQuade, R. Scotty Auble, and Valerie Kramer specifically to make broadband a reality in Port Orford, after telecom companies indicated our town was too small for them to make a profit building a high speed network. Kramer said, "If we're going to get high-speed internet, we're going to have to do it ourselves and that means getting donations and grants."

McQuade said letters from Key Contributors can greatly improve our chances of being awarded the grant by pledging volunteer hours by May 10th to help staff a Community Access Computer Center that will be built with the broadband network in 2007.

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"We also have a short survey to fill out that matters a lot to our grant," McQuade said. If everyone who wants high speed internet in town fills out a survey or makes a donation of any size, the impact will be very positive to the USDA grant people."

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Letter to the Editor,

Thank you for the opportunity to respond to Joan Calhoun's letter on Coos-Curry Electric. I tried to call, but no Calhoun listed.

Calhoun referenced the 2005 Financial Form-7 at www.ccec.coop (page 1, comparing yearend 2004 to 2005) that shows:

For Operations and Maintenance, Calhoun reported a 33% increase; expenses went from \$19,358,899 in 2004 to \$20,313,864 in 2005, a 4.8% increase. Most of the increase was delayed tree trimming plus items like higher gasoline prices. For Administrative and General Expenses, Calhoun reported a 19% increase; Form 7 shows \$2,228,808 for 2004 and \$1,982,011 for 2005, an 11% decrease. For Consumer Services and Accounts Expense, Calhoun reported 17% increase; Customer Accounts expenses increased 18% while Customer

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Service and Informational Expense decreased 28%. Calhoun didn't mention Sales Expenses decreased 47%.

For Tax Expenses, Calhoun reported a 215% increase. 'You can't avoid death and taxes' and this was a timing issue. Calhoun reported interest increasing 37%. Interest expense increased 10%. Benchmark interest rates increased from 2% to 5% (150% increase). In March 2005, we converted all variable rate debt to fixed rate, avoiding continuing interest increases. For Purchased Power, Calhoun reported a 2% decrease; this pass-through cost increased 2.6%. Not mentioned, Member's Capital Credit Accounts increasing 127%. Some expenses

have been cut in every department since 2004.

While questioning my honesty, Calhoun's 100% erroneously reported numbers resulted from, 'lengthy conversations with knowledgeable people'. Was Calhoun's 'knowledgeable' source the endorsed candidate from Sixes?

Please feel free to contact any director to get the facts.

The Member/Owners of We Own Coos Curry Electric are aware that amongst us there are Member/Owners who are in financial straits and oft unable to pay their electric bills before approaching the deadline, then forced to pay \$200.00 reconnect charges to restore their services.

Harsh treatment indeed, particularly since we are a co-op, which in every sense of that word's meaning implies we should be doing everything possible to mitigate the problems of Member/Owners that find themselves in financial difficulty.

These outlandish penalties are comparatively new and extensively documented in Coos Curry Electric Policy Handbook. Anyone reading its various violations and penalty fines would find it exceedingly disturbing since the usurious rates remind one of greedy moneylenders.

The practice of gouging Member/Owners for company services will be thoroughly reevaluated when new members for the Board of Directors, endorsed by We Own Coos Curry Electric, are elected.

It's clearly evident that CCEC's pricing structure has gone berserk - a conclusion drawn from the fact that currently they appear flush with a money surplus. Don Heinzman, an astute observer of Coos Curry Electric's financial status states that in the first two months of 2006 CCEC showed a profit of \$624,000.00. Why then is CCEC profiteering at the expense of Member/Owners? This mercenary act alone is reason enough for ousting the 3 board incumbents.

All of Curry County electric ratepayers must be made aware that when ballots are mailed out in June the day of reckoning will have arrived. Undoubtedly, this will be the most important election ever held. One which will determine whether we remain a Member/Owner non-profit co-op, or a for profit utility — sold to a

foreign nation or partnered with them, or perhaps CCEC being dissolved. All of these transitions, according to our Charter's By-Laws can be adopted by the Board of Directors for consideration.

Never throughout CCEC history have we witnessed the vast changes in infrastructure that have come about under recent new management and a dormant Board of Directors. All of these innovations, mind you, implemented without Member/Owner input. No one can foretell where these reforms are leading since secrecy has hitherto been company policy.

The outcome of our dilemma will depend on Member/Owners' participation and support of the 3 board candidates We Own Coos Curry Electric are convinced will best represent Member/Owners' interests in the days and years ahead.

New people and policy are essential in order to reestablish price fairness — prevention of outsourcing of service and automating jobs replacing our local workforce that were the primary employees before new management took over.

Before closing, let me once more impress upon you that unless you vote and return your ballot, you are allowing the present Board of Directors to remain in office. Not only will you be comforted with more costly electric rates and service charges but perhaps our termination as a coop. A total of about 1,200 voters

determined the outcome of last year's election. There are approximately 16,000 plus Member/Owners of CCEC. It's disgraceful that only 1,200 Member/Owners thought it important enough to exercise their vote. Thus we allowed to co-op to dominate that election.

Member/Owners should not relinquish the ownership of our utility to a handful of people, whose ability to govern has proven itself questionable, lest we lose the entire company.

The only way we will remain owners of Coos Curry Electric Coop is by fulfilling our rights, each and every one of us, with our vote. Only then will common sense and fairness prevail once again.

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
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Garrison Lake meetings by Jay Stoler

The Garrison Lake Restoration Committee met on Thursday, April 20 from 5:30 to 7:00pm in the Council Chambers. A turnout of over 30 interested citizens and agency people got a lot accomplished.

Mary Pfauth and Rich Miller from Portland State's Center for Lakes and Reservoirs gave the audience an overview presentation of what they see as some of the problems and solutions and several scenarios that could move to those ends. And, according to Pfauth, it would be a minimum of a five-year plan to even stabilize the Lake, but with a little help from Mother Nature, it could be potable water again one day.

Amy Wilson from the USDA facilitated a "visioning" session where the citizens and committee members told their visions of the Lake in ten years. There were many common themes, especially having the Lake be drinkable and a recreation haven with concern for the wildlife that populate the lake area.

One big problem that was seen was the leaching of septic systems and sewage into the Lake creating nutrients for weeds, reeds and taste and odor problems. One possible solution would be continuing education programs to enlighten residents about their possibly old and malfunctioning systems. This has been an area of great concern by the committee and many of the agency people.

Property owners wanted to see all of the necessary agencies, ie: City, County, State, Fed and all other players on the same page and taking responsibility for their part of fixing and maintaining the Lake.

The way Oregon Parks and Recreation, under the direction of Frank Eckley was taking care of the drain pipe and outflow problem was pointed out as a positive example of agencies stepping up to the plate.

Fortunately, in the audience were Pam Blake from DEQ, Cindy Myers from South Coast Watershed Council, Pfauth and Miller from PSU, Amy Wilson from USDA, Todd Confer from ODFW, Steve Abbott from Port Orford City Council and soon-to-be Administrator Mike Murphy as well as ORPD manager Frank Eckley and Watershed Committee chair John Luethe.

The unanimous consensus was that the citizens wanted to see the Garrison Lake Restoration Committee continue to work for a total Lake Management Plan and keep the community motivated and informed.

As a side-note, Pfauth and Miller actually spent several hours out on Garrison Lake on Friday and have already started to gather data pertaining to salinity. For more news on this meeting see www.garrisonlake.org and click on news.

Halibut Season

ODFW reports that ocean sports anglers are gearing up for one of the best Pacific halibut opportunities off the Oregon coast in the last decade.

Halibut season will open May 1 in near-shore waters (waters less than 40 fathoms). The all-depth halibut fishery for Oregon's central coast, between Cape Falcon and Humbug Mountain, opens May 11.

"This year's sport halibut quota is more than 276,000 pounds for Oregon," said Don Bodenmiller, sport halibut project leader for ODF&W. "That's up about 4 percent from last year and is more than twice as much halibut as 10 years ago."

The area south of Humbug Mountain runs from May 1 through October 31, seven days a week. There is no minimum length for Pacific halibut. Sport anglers do not have to keep the first fish they catch. Sports anglers are reminded that possession of groundfish is not allowed north of Humbug Mountain when a Pacific halibut is in possession on the vessel during all-depth Pacific halibut dates. The exception is sablefish (black cod), which may be retained with halibut between Humbug Mountain and Cape Falcon. Both sablefish and Pacific cod may be retained north of Cape Falcon. Other non-groundfish species, such as tuna and salmon during authorized seasons, may be possessed with halibut, on open all-depth Pacific halibut days.

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
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Scott Halse Promoted


"Halse has been acting in a supervisory capacity for the past year, and is in charge when I am away," advised Creighton.

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Port Commission Meeting by Jane Cramer

The Port Commission with Evan Kramer, Bob Mielenz, Scott Luhr and Dave Rickel and Port Manager Gary Anderson present met in regular session on Tuesday, April 18. Commissioner John Mobley was absent. Here are highlights of that meeting.

Anderson gave a report on the status of the Connect Oregon Grant application. There is a lot of competition for the money.

Anderson gave the details of the settlement negotiated during recent sessions in Coos Bay. Of the \$160,000 awarded to the Port, 40% went to the attorney and 60% to the State of Oregon to satisfy conditions set forth in a grant awarded some years ago. Anderson is hopeful that the Port might now receive the remaining \$25,000 of the grant since all condi-

tions have been met. This would enable the Port to perform some much needed repairs to the rip-rap beneath the floating dock.

The salmon closure and its effects on the Port and local fishermen came under discussion. This closure will be disastrous to the local fishing community. Representative Peter DeFazio is working to increase the amount for relief from \$11 million to \$25 million.

There have been a couple of applicants wishing to lease the 10 X 16 building. One would like to lease with a different rent schedule than proposed by the Port. Anderson will meet with the other applicant to see what she proposes. Commissioners would like to see the lease signed and the new business in operation as soon as possible to take advantage of the anticipated tourist season which will be starting in May.

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Commissioners discussed possible reimbursement for fuel used by employees who use their own private vehicle for Port business. Anderson will check with the Port's insurance agent to learn if there would be any consequences for the Port if the employees would be involved in an accident while using their own vehicles.

Commissioners discussed the possibility of all three Port districts working together to annex all areas of the county not currently included in a Port district. This would probably be done in small increments.

Commissioners authorized Anderson to write a letter in support of a local effort to obtain hi-speed internet in Port Orford.

Commissioners were reminded of the upcoming Budget Committee meeting on Tuesday, May 2 at 6:00pm at the Port office.


