Fire Season Alert

All citizens should be well prepared for our fire season. Because we have had recent rains, this fire season may be extremely severe. We have more prolific fuels (grasses, etc.) that, once dry, can easily ignite and quickly result in large uncontrollable fires. If we plan and prepare as a community; we will be more able to escape the fire season with no damage or loss of life.

The first step is to remember to immediately phone 911 if you see fire, think you see fire or smell unexplained smoke. We would rather respond to a false alarm than to an out of control fire that was phoned in late.

You need to make your property and home as safe from fire as possible.

Follow all burn permit rules and regulations. Permits are always required for all burn barrels and open burns. Call 332-9013 for permit info.

Remove overhanging limbs – especially dead ones and ones close to flue outlets.

Remove all flammable material from against buildings, under foundations and

in eaves. Remove leaves, moss and needles from gutters and between shingles.

Outdoor fireplaces and barbecues should be maintained in good working order, screened when appropriate, be clear of surrounding debris and overhanging limbs. Extreme caution should be used in disposing of brickets. Have a method of extinguishing fire close at hand.

Make sure your road is clear for our fire apparatus. We will be happy to inspect your road for access if you call us. (Daytime 332-0445). The current County driveway specifications require a 16-foot wide clearance and must include a vehicle turnaround if your driveway is longer than 150 feet. For additional details, please consult the County Planning Department.

Wood piles should be uphill and at a safe distance from your home.

Rake leaves and twigs away from your home.

Keep hoses attached to your outside hose bibs.

Keep grass mowed, especially when dry.

Remove accumulations of dead wood, limbs and shrubs from under trees.

Have an escape plan from your home and your property.

Make sure your home has smoke detectors and that they are working.

Be aware of fire dangers and potential dangers wherever you are. Lend a hand to a neighbor or friend if they cannot accomplish these tasks themselves.

Call us (Port Orford Volunteer Fire Department at 332-0445, 332-9035) if you have any questions or concerns.

Call 911 for a fire emergency.

You must post your address so it is clear and visible from the road. The ambulance and fire crews need a visible address on your house and/or pointing to your house. This saves valuable time in locating your residence. The City of Port Orford has an ordinance requiring your street address be visible.

With wildland fires burning and the potential danger of one starting in our community – Please make your property fire safe. It is your responsibility. If you have questions please phone me at 332-0445. Your fire department is here to serve our community.

Our department has just completed a process including child seat technician training to insure that we can provide vehicle safety seats for parents who are having difficulty securing one, and training on installing the seats, and seat inspections. If you currently have a child seat and are unfamiliar with it, and need some help figuring out how to install it, or you want us to check a used seat to insure it hasn't been recalled, and is still safe for your child to use you can contact the police department anytime and our technician will check it for you.

Orford Reef

In an effort to include local voices in coastal and ocean resource management, the Port Orford Ocean Resource Team (POORT) is initiating a series of public events to highlight research and stewardship of Port Orford's marine ecosystem. The first event will begin with a locally-harvested seafood reception at Wild Winds Cafe on Friday, June 30 from 5:30 to 6:30pm. A forum will be held at the Savoy Theater in Port Orford from 6:30pm to 8:00pm. POORT and its partners will describe projects, provide community involvement opportunities within these projects and premiere a Greenfire Productions film on the area's beautiful marine features. Special guest Dr. Michael Webster, a marine ecologist who has SCUBA dived and photographed Orford Reef, will also give a presentation.

Healthy coastal resources are essential to Port Orford, and the community has a real stake in their management. "If you came to Greenfire Productions' Common Ground in February, you should come to this event" says Jeff Miles, Port Orford Fisherman. "If you want to have a hand in maintaining our fishery, you should come to this meeting. POORT has been doing heaps of work for the fleet and the community. You should come learn more about how you can get involved and help shape future projects."

Everyone is welcome at this event. POORT's efforts are intended to help the community by incorporating ideas from people who live here. "We hope that local fishermen and other residents will become partners in our work" says Leesa Cobb, POORT manager. "Port Orford is an incredible community. We have the opportunity to guide our own coastal management, and this event is an impor-

tant first step. Community economic stability depends on the fleet's success and many families rely on both; it's time for us to acknowledge our reliance on our living resources and manage them carefully for the future."

POORT is community initiated, inclusive, and locally run not-for-profit organization founded in November 2001 to address local coastal resources. The vision of POORT is a sustainable fishery on the Port Orford Reef that combines the best science and experiential knowledge for the community to make local fishery management decisions that: 1) sustain/improve the habitat and population base of fish, 2) provide high quality, high value seafood products to consumers, 3) support the economic viability of the Port Orford community.

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Sole Pursuits Winner

Gerda Ramer, who brought her walking habit to Gold Beach from her childhood in Germany, is the latest winner of Curry General Hospital's Sole Pursuits walking card drawing. Her card was picked from among several dozen prior to the group's recent hike into the Kalmiopsis Wilderness, Saturday, June 3. The \$50 cash prize is made possible by the Chetco Federal Credit Union, co-sponsor of the Sole Pursuits Walking Card Program.

Ramer, who has lived in the United States now for most of her life, says she picked up the walking habit early when she belonged to a hiking club as a youngster in her native Germany. She points to her active lifestyle as the primary reason for keeping her borderline diabetes in check, her "good" cholesterol number off the charts, and her blood pressure under control.

"I feel very privileged to live in this beautiful country. Every fresh breath of air and every step makes me feel alive and happy" she says, adding that she walks at least a mile almost daily.

Ramer graciously donated her prize to the hospital's Cardiac Health Center.

Walkers are eligible to enter the drawings for free after they've tracked 15 hours of walking, or about a month of daily half-hour walks.

Walking cards are available from Curry Family Medical in Port Orford. Participants can return their completed cards to the same location for entry in quarterly drawings. The next drawing will be scheduled in September.

Walkers interested in guided group walks can take advantage of the program's monthly nature hikes. June 24, Sole Pursuits will host a hike for Wilderness Week with eco-forester and naturalist,

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Jerry Becker and Cathy Boden, program coordinator. Becker will lead hikers to the top of Barlow Mountain within the proposed Copper Salmon Wilderness near Port Orford.

A 12-mile hike through the coast redwoods and Fern Canyon is planned the last weekend of August. The trip will include bus transportation on the "Redwood Rocket" for early-bird registrants and a two-night stay in an historic hostel overlooking the ocean. Slated as a fundraiser for the hospital's Cardiac Health Center, the guided trip will be completely catered and appropriate for hikers of all ages and skills. Applications are available now.

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Commercial crab pot limits

The Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission today moved to establish limits on the number of Dungeness crab pots commercial crab boats may fish in the ocean during their Dungeness crab season.

The decision came after more than two years of meetings with the public and members of the crab industry. The pot-limit plan grew out of a crab summit last July, when crab fishermen met with ODFW staff to discuss issues important to the industry. Since then, ODFW staff have worked with Oregon crab permit holders, processors and other interested public and received hundreds of phone calls, letters and emails.

The Commission directed staff to develop a plan for crab pot limits after members of the commercial crab industry voiced concerns about derby-style behavior during the winter opening of the season and problems associated with excess gear in this fishery.

The Commission was briefed on the development of the plan and heard public testimony on it during its regular monthly meetings in October, March and April.

The plan adopted today will have three tiers of limits - 200, 300, and 500 pots per vessel, depending on the vessel's landings during the six seasons between 1995 and 2001. This plan meets the Commission's target of reducing the total number of pots in the fishery from approximately 200,000 pots to around 150,200.

The pot limits will be in effect throughout the season, which usually begins Dec. 1 but seasons may be delayed to ensure the crabs are of top quality. The Commission directed that the pot limits take effect for the 2006-2007 commercial crab season.

The Commission is the policy-making body for fish and wildlife issues in the state. The seven-member panel meets monthly.

Rotary Club News

MAJISAFI means "clean water" in Swahili and describes a Rotary World Community Service project to bring clean and safe water to several communities in southern Tanzania. According to Platon Mantheakis, a Rotarian from the Rotary Club of Jacksonville-Applegate, an estimated 35-40% of children currently die

from water-borne diseases in that area. The project he initiated through his home Rotary club and with the assistance of his family in Tanzania will need to raise approximately \$125,000 to build a six-mile pipeline to bring gravity-fed clean mountain spring water to over 30,000 villagers. The longterm impact of a successful outcome of this project is enormous: access to fresh and disease-free drinking water has obvious health benefits for children and adults. However, ready access to clean water inside these communities also frees children from the burden of walking many miles each day to reach clean water sources and allows them to attend school instead. Healthier children not only live longer, but have a chance to become educated and self-sufficient — a much-needed renewable human resource for this AIDS-ravaged region.

Port Orford Rotarians were moved by Platon's passion and dedication and made several donations to the project's tax-deductible fund on the spot. The club may also consider joining this Rotary World Community project as a co-sponsor. www.PortOrfordRotary.org.

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Crosswalk Safety

The Port Orford Police Department will be conducting periodic pedestrian crosswalk safety programs aimed at educating drivers, and pedestrians on the dangers of not yielding. According to Chief Creighton "A pedestrian hit by a vehicle traveling at 40 mph has less than a ten percent chance of survival". "Most pedestrian accidents result in serious injury or death, and our department is committed to minimizing those deaths and injuries by aggressively enforcing our traffic laws". Chief Creighton further added "We have one of those communities where vehicular travel is very fast, this year; the fastest speeder cited into court was traveling 73 mph through the school zone in the daytime". "The average speeder stopped in Port Orford is traveling above 40 mph or more, and those speeds are too fast". Creighton added "there will be a total of six pedestrian safety operations in four hour segments at different intersections in town". "The first intersection will be in front of the Downtown Fun Zone where we'll have a video recorder set up to record the violations. A decoy will walk out onto the crosswalk and those who don't comply with the law will be stopped, educated, and the worst offenders will be cited". "As part of the operation, our Municipal Court will be providing diversion classes to those who wish to attend in lieu of paying the \$242.00 fine". "The safety program funds overtime hours for court and patrol and was provided by the Oregon Department of Transportation". Creighton further added "The intent here is public safety through driver education and awareness, and if we educate enough people, and one life is saved we've done our job".

Curry County Reporter endorses Hanscam-Thomas-Doran

The *Curry County Reporter* (June 7, 2006) has endorsed Terry Hanscam, Dale Thomas and Gary Doran for re-election to the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative Board of Directors.

2006-05-02 Tuesday (continued)

We got into Vegas at about 1:00pm and dropped Valerie off at the Mandalay Bay to attend the Interop Convention while Evan located a motel.

The Interop convention covers aspects of technology such as Application Networks, Security, Storage, VoIP, Infrastructure & Services, etc. but in particular, it offered a wealth of information and contacts which will be of help to Curry-ISP in building Port Orford's new high speed Internet service. There were more than 400 vendors and Valerie came away with lots of good ideas and information to share with the rest of the team. Her cardiologist would also be proud of the amount of walking she did at the convention!

Meanwhile Evan had a tougher time finding a room than anticipated. The prob-

lem was Honey Bear. The first three motels he tried wanted a "non refundable \$50 deposit" which is a tricky way of saying they charge more for the dog than for a second human. He finally got a room at the pet-friendly Motel 6, our new heroes.

Because this was Tuesday, Valerie's work didn't end after the convention closed at 5:00pm. She still had to put together the masters for Port Orford Today. This was something new we were trying. In the past when we've taken a trip, we've just not published papers for those weeks. With the growth of the Internet and the availability of WiFi hot spots, we felt it was time to change so we brought a laptop computer with us and Valerie spent the evening editing articles and typesetting advertising. She managed to finish the masters but ran out of time to send them to Brenda at the Fun Zone for publication – the coffee house/WiFi busi-

ness closed at 9:00pm. We had to shut down and wait for the morning.

We were both ready for dinner anyway by this time so we went back to the motel and found the closest restaurant which happened to be at the Hooters Hotel/Casino. We had a hamburger in their coffee shop with was quite good and still showed evidence of its 1950's heritage. Finally it was off to bed and a good night's sleep!

2006-05-03 Wednesday

We left Motel 6 and Las Vegas about 6:45am now with 1332.8 miles of the trip behind us. Our first stop was "The Coffee Bean & Tea Leaf" – our Las Vegas WiFi watering hole – to send off the masters for this week's paper. Their upload speed was noticeably slower than their download speed and it took a while but in a few minutes the paper was sent. We got on Hwy 95 south at a most unusual freeway entrance. At a normal entrance, we would have turned right and gone up a ramp to merge with the southbound traffic. Instead, we went under the freeway, curved right onto a cloverleaf-like curve but it went OVER the whole freeway then curved back to the left to merge in with the southbound traffic. We actually made a reverse "S" shape pattern! Weird, but at least it worked ok.

A bit later we drove through Boulder City, Nevada and enjoyed reading some of the signs (much as the doddering father did in the movie "Forget Vegas."): "Sinclair Gas \$3.05", "Alpaca Pete's", "Dick Blair Realty" (could he be married to Connie?) Ok, the last one is obscure... Valerie is into juvenile series fiction and one such series is the "Connie Blair" series of mysteries.

Leaving Boulder City we soon found ourselves approaching, then crossing, Boulder Dam, now known as Hoover Dam. Actually the dam's name has had

quite a history. Originally the dam was supposed to be at Boulder Canyon and the project was called the "Boulder Canyon Project". Later it was decided Black Canyon would make a better location but the project name was left as it was and the dam became known as Boulder Dam. In 1930 it was renamed "Hoover Dam" after president Hoover who was unpopular because of the depression and wanted to call attention to the 5000+ jobs he'd created with the project. He didn't get reelected which tells you how that idea went over. In 1933 Franklin Roosevelt's Secretary of the Interior decided the name should be the original "Boulder Dam" so back it went until 1947 when Harry Truman signed a congressional bill changing the name back to Hoover Dam again. Mapmakers must hate that place! We have taken the tour before and would love to do it again but we needed to keep moving so we stopped only briefly to take a few photos and let Honey Bear out for a few minutes. Before you are allowed to drive over Hoover Dam all vehicles are stopped at checkpoints and though we were waived through it looked like people with bigger trucks and moving vans got inspected more thoroughly.

By 10am we were in Kingman, Arizona and already starting to melt with the heat. Here we got a phone call from Brenda saying she'd received the paper ok but that I'd somehow left out a couple of

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classified ads. My apologies to those advertisers.

Kingman gave us a chuckle though. We saw a sign on one motel claiming the "Best View In Kingman!" It may well be, but all we could see were some gulches and a fine view of the railroad tracks and some housing tracts. Maybe the good views were on the other side of the building. We never found out. We did grab breakfast at the Silver Spoon Restaurant in Kingman. Given that name, we couldn't help but remember Port Orford's gone-but-not-forgotten Silver Door.

We stopped off at the Route 66 town of Seligman, Arizona, home of the famous Sno-Cap Drive-in. It might have been April but there were two tour buses stopped in Seligman and Evan got to take a photo of an Elvis mannequin perched on a pink Edsel (wrong car! Should have been a Cadillac!) He then hitched Honeybear up to the town watering hole and walked over to the railroad tracks which are the mainline of the Santa Fe Railroad from Los Angeles to Chicago. He got some photos as a fast freight flew by him. By town watering hole we don't mean saloon. The residents living outside the city of Seligman in the rural areas get their water from a common well/water source near the train tracks. You can bring your own water containers and fill up or hire a service which will fill up and deliver. Evan met a man who makes his living delivering water to rural residents.

At 5:50pm we crossed the continental divide at an elevation of 7,295 feet. Despite the height, it was still hot and the heat continued all across Arizona and New Mexico. As you can tell by the lack of notes from most of the day, we crossed a whole lot of nothing for hours at a time.

We passed turn-offs for the Grand Canyon and Meteor Crater and other places but there wasn't actually much of anything to see from the Interstate.

We finally stopped at another dog friendly Motel 6 in Grants, New Mexico having driven over 500 miles since morning. We had dinner in the 4B's restaurant. It's a Montana chain with only one restaurant in New Mexico and we were lucky enough to find it. The 4B's specialty of the house is tomato soup – maybe the only restaurant in America with that specialty. It was good and creamy with tomato chunks in it. The place was popular with the locals who seemed to know what to order. At least it wasn't like everything else in our rapidly homogenizing society.

2006-05-04 Thursday

Once again we were up early and on our way by 6:44am. Again, there wasn't a lot to see from the freeway besides a lot of billboards (thank goodness for them! At least they kept us entertained and awake!) and the occasional fireworks stand. You can buy just about any kind of fireworks in New Mexico. I guess they must figure if the government could set off atomic bombs in the state, the public ought to be able to set off some high-powered firecrackers. (No, we didn't buy any.)

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By lunch we were getting pretty hot, tired, and very hungry. We stopped at a Lottaburger in Tucumcari. After placing our order we had to stand around and wait for it. While waiting we observed two employees coughing on their hands and another pulling on plastic gloves by using his nose and upper lip or maybe his teeth. While we didn't lose our appetites, we certainly lost our desire to eat there and quickly cancelled our order to seek a healthier place to eat! It's truly appalling how little regard some food-service employees have for the health of their customers and how many businesses don't enforce strict health standards. It's bad enough if you're at home but the last thing one wants when traveling is to pick up someone else's cold... or worse!

At 1:00pm we entered Texas and observed their welcome billboard which read "Welcome to Texas. Proud home of President George W. Bush."

We eventually stopped for lunch at a Stuckey's. Remember them? They are no longer in California but the chain, founded by W. S. Stuckey, Sr. in 1937, still exists and they still have their Pecan Log Rolls and other goodies. At one time there were 350+ locations but when the chain was bought in the late 70's by a large corporation, it began to decline until there were fewer than 75 stores left. Today there is a Stuckey family member back at the helm and the chain is up to over 200 franchised locations in 19 states.

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Many of the stores now have a lunch country operated by Dairy Queen but we managed to stop at one that was still independent and it was Gooo-ood! ☺

We finally ended the day at the pet friendly LaQuinta Inn in Amarillo. The billboards advertising a 6 pound steak for free (if you can eat it all in an hour) sounded interesting (to watch, not to try to eat it!) but we were too tired to go exploring. After a quick bite at the Arby's next door, Evan crashed while Valerie stayed up until 10pm working on the newspaper for next week. This LaQuinta offered free WiFi but for some reason it wasn't happy with our SSL connection to Google's Gmail. Apparently it was because of an update to Norton Internet Security which had changed the Email port address but at the time it was a mystery.

2006-05-05 Friday

We slept in a bit this morning and didn't leave the motel until 7:14am PDT (9:14am local time as we were now in the Central Time Zone.) We'd traveled only about 370 miles the previous day for a trip total of 2,211.8 miles and still had a long way to go.

On the road we first encountered Texas-sized rain drops which later became bean-size hail. We had to hide under an overpass because we were afraid the hail might break the windshield if we kept

driving. Fortunately the hail didn't last long.

By 9:45am we had just left the Oklahoma welcome center / rest stop and were enjoying watching the lightning and rain. Valerie saw her first dead armadillo of the trip by the side of the road. Sadly, we were to see several more as well as a variety of deer, raccoon, possum, skunks, snakes, and even a cow. Cars and animals don't get along well at all.

While driving through Oklahoma we talked for a while about Tom Paxton. Valerie has one of the best web sites devoted to his music at www.mydfz.com/Paxton. He was born in Chicago but lived in Oklahoma and considers it his "home state". Paxton has written a number of songs about Oklahoma, especially about the rivers, including "Passing Thru Tulsa", "Deep Fork", "Along the Verdigris", and, of course, "Home, Sweet Oklahoma". It's easy to see why he would fall in love with it. It was almost as pretty as Oregon but maybe we're prejudiced.

At 10:16am we stopped at Elk City, Oklahoma and got gas at a Phillips 66

station at what seemed by now to be a bargain price of only \$2.79/gal.

Some time after leaving Elk City we finally acknowledged we had a problem. The flap controlling the air flow vent wasn't working properly so sometimes we had no air flow. Another problem also came to our attention. We had had some condensation on the window but now we began smelling antifreeze. We stopped at one Ford dealer but he said he couldn't even talk to us until Monday so we decided to continue on. He was the kind of service manager who looked like he never got his fingernails dirty. We soon got to Weatherford, Oklahoma and our cloud demonstrated its silver lining. The Weatherford Ford dealer had the part and could replace our heater core and fix our vacuum leak right away. Meanwhile we had a superb BBQ chicken lunch at Willie's Diner across the street. Once again Evan got mashed potatoes (plus okra) as a side order rather than fries. Willie's is an old Route 66 drive-in restaurant, but now you park your car and eat inside. In just a few hours we were back on the road again and smiling. Even Honey Bear was happy as she'd had a chance to enjoy a nice

walk in some grassy areas. Thank you Rick!

The weather had been nice while we were stopped but the rain began again once we got on the road. At least the rain was better than the heat we'd endured From California to Texas!

We had to smile at the occasional signs along the Oklahoma highways. They read, "Keep our land grand."

At 5:30pm PDT (7:30pm local) we stopped at a McDonald's on the turnpike east of Oklahoma City and west of Tulsa. Eventually we found our way to a Best Western motel in Stroud, Oklahoma.
